

New €3.5m visitors centre for Lighthouse

Six years after a local community group took over the Lighthouse at Fanad Head as a tourism project, they have now set out plans to build a new visitors experience centre at an estimated cost of €3.5 million.

The design plans have been created by Vincent Hannon Architects, Galway and the outline of the project reflects the flow of the landscape blending into the nautical environment surrounding the Lighthouse.

With a grass roof and a design concept that is as much a part of the past as the future, the 7800+ square footage has been a work in progress since last Autumn and it will add immensely to the range of facilities that continue to be developed as the popularity of the location grows.

The plans will go to



an open public consultation session next Wednesday afternoon at Fanavolty Hall where the details of the 725.2 sq. metres project can be viewed. Subject to planning

permission, the development will go to tender next Spring followed by the construction phase in early 2204.

Finance will be sourced from a range of funding agencies and there is quiet confidence and enthusiasm in making the project a reality given the extent of the progress made in a few brief years.

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Council - Revenue deficit of €6m

he said, been reduced by €3.624m from year-end 2016 (€9.717m) to year-end 2021 (€6.093m). "The objective of continuing to reduce the revenue deficit remains a priority and will be aided by the ongoing approach to budgetary control across the Council."

Local Government Auditor Seamus Leonard said that in his opinion the annual financial statement presented fairly the financial position of the Council at 31 December 2021.

The targeted waiving of Commercial Rates liabilities in 2021 was an important initiative that provided support to many Donegal businesses. In Donegal, 2,895 businesses were granted Commercial Rates waivers totalling €11,967,683. The cost of applying the waiver was fully compensated by central government.

The Auditor said that COVID-19 and the emergency measures taken to mitigate it have

continued to have a significant impact on the finances of local authorities during 2021. This has resulted in a reduction in income from some sources, an

increased level of COVID-19 related expenditure and related government subvention for the local authority.

The Government continued its support for the local government sector, with the provision of an amended commercial rates waiver in 2021. This waiver, funded by Government, at a cost of €542m supported local businesses in payment of their rates bills, and ensured continuity of services at local authority level.

The total amount received by the Council for 2021 was €11.97m. The Council had net current assets of €50m in 2021 (2020: €44.6m). The increase of just over €5m is in the main due to: An increase

Celebration of Church Lane Historic Towns Initiative

There will be a celebration of the Church Lane Historic Towns Initiative on Church Lane in Letterkenny this Friday, July 22 at 5 p.m. The project involved conservation repair works to seven historic buildings along Church Lane and the initiative has served as a blueprint for similar projects in Ramelton and Ballyshannon. Entertainment will be provided by Letterkenny Comhaltas, Elusive Theatre and Maria McCormack and food and light refreshments will be provided by Wholegreen restaurant from 4:30 p.m. The event is free and everyone is welcome to attend.

The Church Lane Historic Towns Initiative represents the culmination of a partnership between Donegal County Council, the Letterkenny Cathedral Quarter Committee, local property owners, The Heritage Council and the Department of Housing, Local Government & Heritage. The project involved conservation repair works to seven historic buildings that included roof and chimney repairs, structural works, installation of cast-iron rainwater goods, reinstatement of timber sash windows and doors, and the repair of a historic shopfront. The works were supervised by conservation architect Duncan McLaren from Dedalus Architecture and the works were undertaken by John Doherty Construction and John O'Loughlin Construction. The works employed traditional materials that were informed by best conservation practice. The initiative was managed by Collette Beattie & Joanne McMenamin, Conservation Office and Joseph Gallagher, Heritage Officer with the Council. The Church Lane Historic Towns Initiative saw the investment of €200,000 by The Heritage Council, €40,000 by Donegal County Council as well as private investment by property wners on Church Lane.

quiet '12th' in the North Ą

The '12th' this year in the North was quiet. There was not a single contentious parade. That has rarely happened over the years. There were no deaths from violence. There was some very low-level violence. Stones and bottles were thrown at a Catholic area of Portadown. Eggs were thrown at a young bandswoman in Coalisland. There were a few incidents of sectarian vandalism.

So, before we get too depressed, let's think of the '12th' week 50 years ago. Thirty-seven died in that week in 1972. In one night, an estimated 6,000 rounds were fired in gun battles across West and North Belfast. The IRA were taking on the British Army and Loyalists. In Portadown, the British Army forced an Orange march through the Catholic 'Tunnel' area. That followed a gun battle between the IRA on one side and the UDA and British Army on the other.

There was a warning, though, that there is still a nasty underside to the North. Effigies of Michelle O'Neill, Mary Lou McDonald and Naomi Long were hung from a bonfire in Carrickfergus.

Most Unionist leaders condemned the burning. Doug Beattie of the Ulster Unionists was strong. Loyalists once produced an effigy of him with a noose round his neck. Jeffery Donaldson also condemned, with no ifs or buts. Orange Order Grand Secretary Mervyn Gibson might have been quicker. That said, he "totally condemned" the action, with no equivocation.

Only Jim Allister managed to mess things up.

He did condemn the incident. As well, though, he queried whether the Alliance Party would use the incidents to political advantage. (As a political party, they have every right to do so. And Allister himself would, rightly, do the same. That's what politics is about). The appalling event happened in one of the North's most Protestant towns.

During the '12th' preparations an unfortunate man fell from a bonfire in Larne. He was killed, leaving two small children. That tragedy produced some vile tweets. All these events have left a bad taste in the mouths of many. We must first of all be realistic. The North has come a long way. The Orange Order has been willing to compromise with residents – and residents with the Orange.

There are no Sinn Féin councillors nearby. Over the years Carrickfergus only suffered a handful of IRA attacks. There is, though, a frightening underbelly of sectarianism mixed with social disintegration.

There are serious problems in parts of the North. Carrickfergus is one of those. Once it was a heavily industrial town, but most major factories have closed. Several estates are dominated by the South East Antrim UDA. That devotes its energies to drug dealing. It has largely turned its back on sectarian violence. That is bad for business. The business is poisoning its own community. Those it poisons and kills are not necessarily all young.

It has taken to devouring its own community, and itself. Mark Gourley was the most recent of the North's 'Disappeared'. He was a 'foot soldier' in the South East Antrim UDA. He suffered schizophrenia, other mental health problems, and was a drug addict. Drug use led him to run up sizeable debts. He lived in one of Carrickfergus' more deprived estates. He was last seen in March 2009. His body has never been recovered. Both his parents died without knowing where his body is. Gourley's many issues meant he crossed the South-East Antrim UDA. They killed him and dumped his body at sea No-one has been charged in connection with the murder. What was done on those whom the IRA 'disappeared' was appalling. There has been some spotlight on their cases. Political parties have taken them up. The effect has been to embarrass Sinn

Féin. Unfortunately, there is no great political advantage in championing Gourley's case. That's why so few have heard of the tragedy.

Glenn Quinn also crossed the South East Antrim UDA. Thus they broke into his flat two years ago and beat him to death. The 47-year old was terminally ill. He was unable to resist the attack. His family are campaigning for iustice.

In both cases, witnesses fear coming forward. The South East Antrim UDA rules parts of Carrickfergus. Why the security forces don't act has never been properly explained.

The South East Antrim UDA has itself split. The former leader Geordie Gilmore was killed in a feud in 2017. He was returning from the trial of other members of his faction. They were accused of attacking a pub doorman because he had barred them.

These events on their own are enough to make us concerned at where the North is. Then there was the infamous song about Michaela Harte, sung in Dundonald Orange Hall. It is frightening that the crowd knew the words. It is so frightening that someone thought it fit to be streamed live on the internet.

Then there is the trolling of SDLP Assembly Member Cara Hunter. A pornographic clip, wrongly purporting to be her, was circulated online. She received numerous nasty messages. DUP Assembly member Diane Forsythe received similar treatment. She is the mother of three small children. She is also seen as on the DUP's more lib-







Currently across the island there are, he added "almost 6 million sheep which can provide a substantial volume of wool. This wool can be utilized in many different ways such as bed clothing and clothing including personal safety clothing, insulation, carpets, furniture coverings, natural air filtration, composting and pelleting as a natural fertilizer. In addition to these Lanolin which is used extensively in the cosmetics industry is a very valuable by-product of the wool scouring process. With regard to further research and critical infrastructure Molloy stressed the "need for Third Level Institutions to be involved in ongoing research so that other products can be identified which will further strengthen the demand, and price for wool. Beyond this we also need to see the establishment of a wool scouring facility within the Island of Ireland as soon as possible so that the true value of wool can be achieved."

Your Bed Could Talk

If your bed could talk, what would it say about you? When we get dressed in the morning we can put on our masks but when we slip under the covers at night we inevitably take them off again. More than almost anyone else, your bed probably There are some people who appear to be cool and calm in the face of a crisis. As friends and colleagues watch them, they see people who are resolutely unflappable. Yet one wonders how many of those who appear cool in the daytime are bundles of nerves at night as they toss and turn in search of ever elusive sleep. I've been thinking about this over the last few days because I was preaching on Psalm 3 on Sunday evening. This psalm comes from a time of crisis: rebellion was in full swing and peril was in the air. King David, the author of the song, had to leave his throne behind and desperately flee for safety. Worst of all, the man who lit the blue touch paper of conspiracy was none other than Absalom, David's very own son. As David wrote this song, he had no idea whom he could

trust. Could he trust his friends? Could he trust his bodyguards? Not if he couldn't even trust his own son. The stab in the back could have come from anyone at any time; you could hardly fault David if he spent the night with one eye open. That makes what David

verse 5 absolutely baffling: "I lie down and sleep; I wake again, because the Lord sustains me." So what allowed David to sleep like a log in the midst of such a cataclysmic storm? His confidence in God: in verse 3 he describes God as his shield and in in verse 4 he outlines his confidence in the fact that God will answer his prayer. Of course, none of us are in exactly the same position as

David. None of us have received the sort of specific promises from God that this man did. Yet surely all of us who are followers of God can share in something of this experience as we pass through the storms of life. Don't get me wrong, I'm not saying that every single Christian should fall asleep the second the light goes out. What I am saying is that even in the crisis we can entrust ourselves into God's hands and enjoy the

same peace and confidence that David did. Becoming a Christian won't make you immune from hard times. We still have to wrestle with shrinking budgets and expanding waiting lists. We still get caught in the crossfire of feuding family members. Yet this psalm tells us a wonderful truth: even if the winds don't ease, followers of Jesus can trust their heavenly father to uphold them as they pass through the storm. If we could just take that to

heart, it might just transform the way we spend our nights. Perhaps our beds would see the difference.





The fisherman, the paperman, and the steel men

It started with a WhatsApp voice message at the end of June as he prepared to fly back from Dubai for the summer holidays. Letterkenny man, Sean McFadden, was keen to take on a challenge and had secured an entry for the Mizen2Malin 570K Cycle over Friday, July 16th and Saturday, July 17th. In its first year, the event was the brainchild of mountaineer and endurance athlete, Jason Black. To cut to the chase, Sean put together a support crew of Ciaran Doherty from Burtonport and this columnist. Ciaran is the operations manager and skipper with the Aine Fishing Company and also knows a thing or two about life in the fast lane of sport, having posted a personal best of 14.20 for 5K.

The trip up and down the country was, not surprisingly, a 48-hour stint like no other. Having been part of the support crew for a team in The Rás, Ireland's international stage race held over eight days, back in 2017, one had a fair idea of what the gig was about. For the 19 hours and 36 minutes it took Sean to cycle from Mizen Head to Malin Head, he was off the bike just four times. He changed from a time trial bike to a road bike a few hours in, stopped in Athlone to stretch his back, took a ten-minute nap on the outskirts of Enniskillen around 1am, and dismounted to change a wheel in Derry City after picking up a puncture.

Our vehicle was a feeding station on wheels. He drank litres upon litres of plain water, water with a carbohydrate, water with a hydration supplement, several bottles of freshly brewed coffee, various selections of sandwiches, dozens of gels, several packets of wine gums, loads of nutrition bars, a few croissants, and a plain Papa John's chicken burger. Three of the first four competitors over the finish line were from Donegal. Rory Devlin from Buncrana won the event in a quite incredible time of 18 hours, one minute and 52 seconds. He was, literally, in a different parish,

unforgettable, honest, respectful and good-spirited dingdong with fellow Errigal Cycling Club member, Colm Richardson, Sean McFadden finished third in 19:36:38. Colm, who had the solid pair of Martin Temple and Seamus Wilkinson as

his support team, placed fourth in 19:52:55. Sean and Colm started out with the aim of breaking 20 hours and both did so with plenty to spare, but only after taking the best out of each other. Their competitive qualities simply know no bounds. Dipping under the 20-hour mark would have been a much bigger ask had they not gone toe-to-toe over the final 150km. Despite the privilege of having had an up-close and personal view of proceedings, the mindset of those who push themselves to the absolute limits is difficult to explain. The will and desire to continue when the body is having completely different notions is a truly unique tool. Their ability to ignore the pain and overcome the urge to sleep is what sets them apart. The 16 riders that left between the flapping flags at Ireland's most southerly point on Friday were all that bit wiser when they reached the iconic landmark of Banba's Crown on the northernmost tip of Malin Head. Ditto the support crews.



There was a patch-up plumbing job done to tide us over till Monday morning when the professionals can get at it. Our regular professional who can fix and improve just about anything made by mankind is the little whiskery fella.

The poor divil got a touch of cancer a few years ago and put it over him but the fekn thing is back and he's off to the Mater for a bit of poking and prodding this week. I sincerely hope he can be repaired because apart from being one of the best handymen in the country he's also a damn good friend and life is better with him in it.

Mark had been to school with one of their gossons in Cavan and they attend Mass in Oughterlin when they're in Rathmullan. Small world. We've been up and down the country with sheep and lambs to the slaughter and mares to stud this last week or so. It's fabulous driving round the country these lovely long, warm evenings but it's dear bought the next morning when you have to crawl off the nest and get to work after not enough hours sleep.

My cousin Auriel was staying with Garrett and Margaret in Rathmullan while I was up and it was lovely to see her and spend a bit of time nattering. She was going for a swim each day at the Kinnegar and I went with her for the walk on the Saturday. She invited me to swim with her but I'm not a water baby; I can't stand water in my ears... not in the shower, not in the hair dressers and definitely not in the sea. I said I'd go along to offer immoral support and tell how it happened in the event of a mishap.

Needless to say all went perfectly, as long as you don't count the yelps and screeches as the very cold water reached higher and higher! I'm sure it was very invigorating and healthy but not for a pension will I risk getting cold water into the nooks and crannies in my head although I don't mind it in any of the other ones. New funding categories have also been added to Reach 2022, including innovative green projects and events/ awareness campaigns that contribute to equality policy and legislation.





Rebels in Fianna Fail: but that's okay

But wait for it: over the weekend the term FF rebels caught the attention of the media.... perhaps rebels without a cause would have been more appropriate since those named are all backbenchers who will be expected to vote for Leo Varadkar as Taoiseach come December. I don't recall that agenda being part of DeValera's thinking in the formation of his new party in 1926 to deliver a United Ireland.

The huge slew of opinion polls putting SF into top spot with the electorate has been pretty well this way since the General Election of February 2020 when the country voted for change... which was not delivered. Ever since, the electorate has been waiting in the long grass of the next general election when the outcome may well be more marked.

However, the next general election is some way off and nobody can begin to predict the result. For any party to be in a position of winning overall power, they will need to win second and third seats right across the country to reach the magic figure of 85 deputies. No party, so far, has emerged with a poll rating into a mid 40% figure so it is all to play for over these next two years. The one thing that is certain is the government is ignoring the big ticket issues at the risk of further falls in their popularity. Cost of living is by far and away the top priority and the demand for a mini-budget is clearly evident. Housing and Healthcare are the next two major concerns with Government corruption/incompetence slightly ahead of climate action in the public mind. The notion that the government can sail off into their holidays and do nothing about the effects that

inflation is now having on those who can cope the least will come back to bite them when the Dail returns. Because the prospect of a budget with record increases in pensions and social welfare will have been overtaken by inflation and no amount of posturing will excuse that kind of political

opportunism.

The cost of living crisis is impacting nearly every person in the country and inflation is at the highest point in 38 years: yet the Government sees no need to intervene.

The Irish Times poll ranged across 17 different choices and the findings are quite stark for the government.

The Dail adjourned last Thursday evening with those findings already well publicised and debated across the country's media platforms. But was anyone in the Cabinet listening? Perhaps they were otherwise busy. But wait for it: over the weekend the term FF rebels caught the attention of the media.... perhaps rebels without a cause would have been more appropriate since those named are all backbenchers who will be expected to vote for Leo Varadkar as Taoiseach come December.

I don't recall that agenda being part of De Valera's thinking in the formation of his new party to deliver a United Ireland. But that's another beaten docket

in Irish politics. The mind boggles!

What is also most startling are the findings from the opinion poll figures with 70% saying the country is going in the wrong direction and a further 70% predicting the economy will worsen in the coming year. The government has ignored the fact that almost 50% of those polled about the effect of the cost of living increases saying that life is a lot more difficult. Almost three quarters being polled are saying that the financial position of their household will get worse in the next year. And there are very strong public indications (45%) suggesting that the cost of living crisis will last for more than two years.

All the poll figures reveal that support for the Government, at 31% is a slump of 12 points while Leo Varadkar's rating is at 36%: down 12: with Micheál Martin down 11 to 40%. And as inflation digs deeper into the political landscape, there is a 56% figure in favour of an increase in public sector

pay. Last week's Ipsos MRBI poll for the Irish Times shows that support for the coalition has slumped as cost of living pressures mount.

Earlier in the week, the Sunday Independent poll indicated that 78% think there will be a recession in the next twelve months. Perhaps, more significantly 39% of respondents said there should be an emergency budget. These figures indicate why the polls are playing out in a certain manner and the public believes the Government is simply not listening to their pleas for help.

In these past two years things have changed dramatically, but that applies to all parties and not Sinn Fein alone. The polls of the past ten days are quite dismal for the Government, much to nobody's surprise. Listen only to the FF and FG spin about how they

and FG spin about how they are delivering for those most in need as food and fuel prices have already raced miles ahead of wages and we all know that worse is to come.

Come September 14th when the Dail returns, Micheál Martin will be on the last lap of his legacy tour of the three green fields attempting to massage our egos in the hope that he can convince people to look away from Sinn Fein and back to the Republican Party as their only hope for the future... The main issue there is that people have been putting their trust in the Eff and Effers for close to a hundred years. After that time, patience is running against the party with the new younger generation showing scant interest in what Martin's party represents. Insofar as Fine Gael is concerned, they're now into their 12th year in continuous office aided and abetted all the way by Fianna Fail: yet they have this

unique ability forget their own

failures and they want to shine a light on Mary Lou who said it would take SF ten years to resolve the crises now increasing with every passing day. There is no point in ignoring the reality of Ireland's failed politics: failed policies and a whole new raft of oven-ready plans that are not going anywhere because they are loaded with the failed twaddle of the last twelve years. At the same time it would be premature for SF to start talking up being in Government. They should have been at the Cabinet table in 2020: but the politics of exclusion dealt a hand. We've already witnessed this in Northern Ireland and even in this year's Assembly Elections, the basic fault lines of the Good FridayAgreement were laid bare when Naomi Long and the Alliance Party got 17 seats and never a hope of getting one of the Province's top table posts at Storment. However, both FF and FG have form on these issues. They do not want a border poll. That is a very basic reality. The time has come when swatting away any demand for a border poll with the feeble excuse of 'now is not the time for a poll.'

We all know that there will be a time for a border poll but we are lagging away behind in making the essential preparations for this plebiscite. That is a democratic reality but the preparation for a poll will take at least five to ten years. Offering only denial is no longer an option because the electorate of this island deserves better. Can you just even begin to imagine what the political landscape might look like in an all island assembly? Would it promote the demise of FF and FG: is that their biggest fear and their one-dimensional response to a Border Poll? Most certainly, it would see the end of the current two-party agenda in the Republic and it would create a whole new dynamic that will challenge all those elected representatives to deliver a better life for those now left behind in the tailspin of Government Ministers reciting a handful of points joined together by the party marketing machines merely to make the public accept the kind of unambitious bluster that is used to talk down the clock on interviews. This is an insult to our intelligence. Here in Donegal, we've been forced to listen to this twaddle



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on the Mica Redress Scheme as Government spokesmen try to convince us that this deal is the end of the rainbow and the good fairy is waiting with a trowel full of money to pay off our mica rebuilding.... Nothing could be further from the truth: yet we heard the Taoiseach with this same repetitive old line last Friday. So how does Micheál Martin and Charlie McConalogue square the circle that saw the

McConalogue square the circle that saw the redress bill railroaded through the Dail and 80 hard-worked amendments were tossed in the dustbin of political failure? How do they square the circle where hundreds of families are lining up to join Colman Legal in a High Court action to recover the losses that these families expect as the redress payment from this legislation falls well short of meeting the overall cost? People and particularly, the Mica Action Group with their forensic insight into the failures of the redress legislation are no fools. But why has the legislation fallen woefully short of expectations and why has the Mica campaign been left with no other option, apart from forming a new political party?

Then, of course the FF backbenchers are now tied into voting for Leo Varadkar as Taoiseach on December 14th! For the first time in the history of the Dail, Fianna Fail will have to back a FG Taoiseach. So where did it all go wrong after FF and FG basked in the glory of defeating SF's no confidence motion in the House.

Their parliamentary party meetings were beside themselves with the excitement of it all. But roll forward a couple of hours when the worst opinion poll result for this government came rolling off the Irish Times presses.

Leo Varadkar hit out at Sinn Féin, hailing the no confidence win as a good day for both party and Government.

"There won't be a Sinn Féin led Government this year, next year, the year after or maybe not even after that," he said exultantly. He did not even have time to sleep on it when the grim news of the poll came along. Satisfaction with the Government and its leaders was simply out the window.

The Government's rating has fallen by 12 points, from 43 per cent in April to 31% today, the lowest rating since the Government

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was formed two years ago.

Fianna Fáil down three points, Fine Gael by four points and the Greens are at just 3% to give the Government parties a combined support of just 41% of voters, compared to a combined support of 53% a year ago. Support for the Shinners grew has grown by three points to 36%, its highest level ever in this series, and younger voters are particularly impressed.

Just under half of respondents (49) say that it has become a lot more difficult to manage financially and obviously nobody among the Government grassroots told Micheál and Leo that the cost of living was already out of the reach of normal people with no money to pay for the basic essentials.

This latest slew of poll findings will cause much anxiety in government circles: but nothing compared to Fianna Fail with the news of the rebels putting their heads above the parapet. But don't say I told you: nobody will face a court martial or be expelled.

Over at Arraheera, with the lighthouse in the background, a big crowd is busy at work: they had assembled earlier in the morning with the task to restore 120 metres of dry stone wall. If it's stone you are after, you'd he hard put to find a better place.

The original wall was probably a part of that history of a bygone era when it was the only way to mark land boundaries: either that or the long acre. It is amazing the amount of interest and energy that goes into these restoration pieces of work and the scene across the road from the local tavern resembled beavers building a dam.

And they had loud, loud music blaring... Christy Moore was giving it the full whack. "Oh once this quiet crossroads was a place of gentle prayer: Where Catholics got indulgent once or twice a year. You could buy a pair of rosary beads or get your candles blessed: If you had a guilty conscience you could get it off your chest. Then came the priest from Partry, Father Horan was his name: And since he's been appointed, Knock has never been the same. "B'God" says Jem, "tis eighty years since Mary was about": 'Tis time for another miracle," and he blew the candle out. From Fatima to Bethlehem, from Lourdes to Kiltimagh. There's never been a miracle

> like the airport up in Knock." The craic seemed to be quite the gig in the stillness of the afternoon heat and perhaps it suited the occasion that was unfolding. As the ballad faded away, the rains came phishing down, but nobody minded because building dry stone walls is done best by keeping your head down and your backside in the air. It made for great pictures: but originally photography, perhaps not!

> > It's the chain gang.... And when things

were in full flight, the unexpected happened. A carload of American visitors stopped by to ask the obvious question.... "Are you all part of the same Chain Gang?"

The toils of the workforce made life easy for the expert eyes of the instructors to ensure that the stones pointed in the right direction. But it took time and a fine degree of skill but the craic was mighty. Given that there were dozens of new builders onsite, there were many different styles, yet somehow they were all neatly entwined in a work of art for future generations.

And there are many skilled stonemasons in Fanad and their work is now joined by the many others who came along to help out.

Dry stone walls date back for hundreds of years and they are essentially a huge part of our heritage. Right now, a big effort is ongoing to rebuild those ancient walls. The craft is alive and well and is being passed down the generations. Fanad, like most other rural parishes, has a large number of such walls surrounding fields and the farms. However, so much of that heritage has been plundered in the name of progress.

However, restoration is never too late and we witnessed that prime example of community enterprise over the weekend at Fanad Head. And the workers have many skills that are a vital part of these restorations.

Nowadays there are many women involved and they are equally adept

as their male counterparts when it comes to putting stones in perfect symmetry: a joy to behold, really. A stonemason, like that of the thatcher, is an art and today its promotion is proving vital in so many of our communities. The existing course is regarded as one of the prime links courses in these islands and a nine hole academy course is also being developed. CAP deal to cost €300

The IFA has hammered the CAP mid term reforms announced in Brussels on Wednesday by Commissioner Fischler amid fears that the new deal will see Irish agriculture lose out on payments by over €300 million a year.

John Dillon President of the IFA has vowed to fight the new proposals tooth and nail. Meanwhile the ICSA has given a broad welcome to the reforms and while opposed to the 20% cuts on payments over €5000 they say that the new deal offers a good opportunity to remove much of the bureaucracy that has bedevilled farming over the last number of years.

Responding to the announcement of the proposals for the Mid-term Review of CAP John Dillon said "The deep cuts proposed are a breach of faith with farmers by the EU Commission. The Berlin Agreement in March 1999 was a contract with EU farmers for seven years. These Mid-term Review proposals are a breach of that contract before Agenda 2000 is even fully implemented and will result in a permanent cut in the incomes of Irish farmers".

He said "Following an appraisal of the proposals, the "most likely case" scenario is a loss of €300 million annually of EU transfers to Ireland and to Irish farmers".

The IFA leader dismissed claims by Commissioner Fischler that his reform plan would be positive for Irish farmers. He stated: "there are several strong reasons why the proposals would leave Irish farmers worse off and more vulnerable to future erosion of the CAP".

"First, there is no guarantee that the savings from the 20% cut in CAP Direct Payments would stay within the Member State. Ireland will lose out as the proposals shift payments away from traditional livestock production. The criteria he is setting out for the take-up of the Rural Development measures will ensure a redirection away from Ireland."



Blaney Road... Letterkenny's second main street

The prospect of the Neil T. Blaney road becoming a second main street for Letterkenny was raised this week at the Town Council meeting when Cllr. Dessie Larkin put down a motion calling on the County Manager to develop a financial strategy for lands adjacent to the road.

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In a lengthy discussion on the matter Cllr. Larkin said it was the most important portion of land owned by the Council and he was now seeking a financial strategy for the area concerned. He asked the Manager to establish a public-private partnership.

Cllr. Larkin said that applications for development on the road were being dealt with singly and an overall strategy as to what was allowed was necessary.

He was joined by other members who complained that single developments on the Railway Road had left piecemeal development and as could produce a financial legacy.

Cllr. Ciaran Brogan was optimistic saving their application for a flagship tourism project on the Blaney road was important and he too called for public-private funding for the area.

Cllr. Sean Maloney said they must not repeat the mistakes made on the Railway road and he warned that the developers and speculators would drive the agenda on the Blaney road, regardless of what the Council said.

Offering a different perspective on the matter Cllr. Jim Lynch said it might just be a bit premature speculating on the future of the Blaney road and they should wait until the development plan was approved. 

Difficult decisions ahead for players


With the dream of an All-Ireland Senior Ladies title gone after Saturday's defeat at Croke Park a number of Donegal's senior players are expected to give serious thought to their futures in the county colours. Some of this team has been playing for over a decade at the highest level in the sport and that has meant many sacrifices being made in pursuit of GAA glory. There has been success for a number of the current squad with Ulster titles but stepping it up to an All-Ireland triumph has proved beyond this group of players despite their best efforts.



Minister Ryan's comments on Virgin media during the week reveal that his real objective is to reduce cow numbers in Ireland to appease those with an anti-animal farming agenda in his own party.

Since 1999, the number of cars in Ireland has increased by 75%, the number of plane journeys has increased by over 150% while the number of cattle has more or less stayed the same. Yet, the Minister wants fewer cows. The average cattle herd in Ireland is less than 80 animals but the Minister wants these farmers to cut back on their production from which they derive their income. No other sector is being asked to take a direct hit on their incomes and farmers, like all other households, will be impacted by the mitigation measures in the other sectors such as energy and transport," he said.

IFA President Tim Cullinan said that "Rather than looking to developter is playing to his own gallery by proposing to reduce cattle numbers without any concrete alternatives for farmers," he said.

"Minister Ryan talked about anaerobic digestion in his recent interview. However, the Government have done nothing to make this feasible at farm level. In any event it will take years to put such infrastructure in place and it's unclear that it would improve incomes for farmers," he said.

Tim Cullinan said the Government cannot force through sectoral emission ceilings without complying with requirements in their own legislation. "An economic and social impact assessment of the effect of a sectoral ceiling; how the distinct characteristics of biogenic methane are reflected; and the risk of carbon leakage are all requirements under the legislation. The Government, including Minister Eamon Ryan, would be derelict in their duty if these issues are not given due regard as required in the act," he said.

Former Donegal Judge laid to rest

Former Donegal District Court Judge Seamus Hughes has passed away. He was a former Fianna Fail Councillor and TD as well State Solicitor as for Mayo, his native county, before being appointed to the Bench in 2009. His first appointment was to District No. 1



which covers most of Donegal. He spent almost two years in the role before he was transferred to Longford and Westmeath District Court where was sitting at the time of his death after a recent illness. He was 69. He was the third eldest in a wellknown Westport family of 13 and a long-time Fianna Fáil party member. Mr Hughes was initially co-opted onto Westport Urban District Council in 1984 before his election to Mayo County Council in 1985. He was subsequently elected to Dáil Eireann in 1992, representing the Mayo West constituency, and served for five years. He was a keen athlete, known to run many marathons. He ran the Dublin City Marathon in 1984 with his seven brothers, which resulted in their entry in the Guinness Book of Records. Among those to pay tribute included Taoiseach Micheal Martin stated: "I knew Seamus very well, as a colleague in the Dail, and later in his time as a District Court Judge. He was a very calm, measured and decent individual. A thorough gentleman". He is survived by wife Maria, sons Colin, Emmet and Donal, daughter Sarah, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, granddaughter, brothers, sisters, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, nieces, nephews, relatives and a large circle of friends. He was laid to rest following Requiem Mass on Friday afternoon at St. Mary's Church, Westport with burial afterwards in Aughagower Cemetery.
