

Roadstone rules out concrete mix to North Donegal

Roadstone Laghey has said that almost all parts of north Donegal are out of bounds for their delivery of readymixed concrete products.

This effectively challenges the Councils own decision to construct social housing in North Donegal given the clarification that Roadstone Laghey cannot service this area with ready mix.

The Roadstone clarification is due to a time constraint from leaving the quarry until being poured onsite to ensure

A spokesperson for strength, air content and serviceabilty. "At a stretch, we could reach as far as Letterk-

enny, depending on the temperature levels. Otherwise all parts of the north of the county are beyond our reach due to travel and distance time limits," said a spokeswoman at Roadstone Laghey. Their products include concrete for foundations: easy-flow screed for underfloor heating: pathways, yards and specified demands including major marine works in Killybegs.

A spokeswoman for Roadstone Laghey said there are no difficul-



ties delivering cement blocks to all parts of Donegal. All their products meet with full certification and testing guidelines.

The areas beyond the reach of the Laghey production includes Inishowen, the Finn Valley, all of the Milford electoral area and locations on the N56 through Kilmac-Creeslough, rennan, Falcar-Dunfanaghy,

Rosses and Gweedore. Cement Roadstone has 42 locations in Ireland and the company is amongst the largest in the world. The Council has told

the Members their decision on Social Housing contracts going to Roadstone Laghey is based 'on assessments by geologists'. They've identified 'negligible levels' of mica in the aggregates testing as carried out on concrete blocks from Roadstone.

adds to the problems already there for those who are planning to construct a house. He said the Roadstone Laghey 'time constraint on concrete mix' is understandable, but he queries why it was the Tribune, rather than the Council that alerted him to this news.

He said: "This news will leave more than half of Donegal with very difficult decisions about concrete mixes if they want to follow the Council's guidelines for their own projects. If Roadstone Laghey is the preferred option, I'd like to know what advice I should give my voters if they do not have that option available to them."

He is to put down questions to the Council seeking to clear up public concerns where those constructing a house wish to go along with the Council's own recommendations and if that is

possible where those people are not within the reach of Roadstone Laghey.

Members of the Council said they expect further clarification around the Council's decision and the uncertainties involved for the industry in Donegal. However, there are real fears that these new regulations, the cost for construction for the end user will become prohibitive because they have no way of meeting these additional costs

We understand that a number of Mica damaged homes have already been rebuilt using a local company for concrete blocks and aggregate materials.

The Council statement says: "Certificates to demonstrate compliance with these specification requirements shall be provided by the concrete block supplier for the blocks and the aggregates in advance of delivery to site.

Samples of concrete blocks are taken from the depot of the nominated supplier in advance of delivery to site and again at random during construction, where the full suite of tests are carried out."

Private housing contractors point to increased costs all over the place: however the confirmation from Roadstone Laghey to the Tribune this week, ruling out their inability due to time constraints has added a new dimension to the situation.

However, 'the cost of requirements for compliance' and the 'random tests on site' has no clarity of costs involved.

Those in the process of building a private house are in the dark, not knowing that the Council regulation would have excluded the local quarry materials and now the distance factor from Laghey Roadstone has left very few choices.

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Rough Park Ramelton: water scarcity a disgrace

Cllr. Pauric McGarvey has met with residents of nine houses at Rough Park in Ramelton where the supply of public water has been quite a disaster.

Cllr. McGarvy said "They have no water supply in their homes. They cannot put on the washing machine, dishwasher or even have enough to make a cup of tea at the best of times. They have a fear of breaking appliances. The families affected in this area have had enough.

Christmas morning they hadn't even water to make a cup of tea. The area is supplied by a group water scheme and was maintained by Donegal County Council. On handing over to Irish Water last January one thing that stood out to me was that the Council was to continue maintaining and ensuring these group water schemes were serviced and maintained until such times as they were taken over by Uisce Eireann.

I am calling on the Council and Uisce Eireann to come together to ensure they do what they need to do to ensure these homes and families have a constant water service.

In response to a motion from Cllr. McGarvey to Tuesday's Municipal District meeting the Council response was predictable, even if the water supply is not.

"Donegal Council Council has corresponded with Uisce Eireann and requested that they respond to the issue of Rough Park Ramelton as a matter of urgency."

Letterkenny Tidy Towns consultation meeting

Letterkenny Tidy Towns is inviting the general public to come along to an open consultation meeting next week to allow them an opportunity to have their say and filter their suggestions and proposals into a three year plan.

"This will give all residents of the town the chance to be directly involved in what we will be doing over the years ahead," co-chairperson, Gerard McCormick pointed out.

The local Tidy Towns committee has appointed Billy Flynn – himself a senior Tidy Towns judge. - from Flynn Furney Environmental Consultants based in Clones, County Monaghan as a consultant in the process.

"He's fairly familiar with the town and he came and met us as a group and is now reaching out to all the stakeholders that we work with within Tidy Towns, such as schools, County Council and all the local authority people and businesses, all the strands that we would touch base with over the year.

"He wants us to create an open consultation forum and the Mount Errigal Hotel has very kindly agreed to host the meeting."

That meeting is scheduled to take place next Thursday (21st) and will run for approximately an hour from 7.30.p.m.

"We're inviting a cross section of the local community to come along to the meeting and have their say and tell us what we should be concentrating on. Billy will then filter that into the information that he knows we should be doing and what we currently are doing, what we have in the pipeline and what the public say.

People's Document with the politicians

A joint campaign group of defective concrete desperate situation. This is the People's Docuhomeowners are calling for support of the 'People's Document', which lays out a "true definition" of 100% redress.

The document has been sent to all public representatives in the Dail, Seanad and to local Councillors in Donegal.

It sets out four principles of 100% Redress and addresses areas where it's believed that the government's enhanced scheme falls short. The document calls for 'like for like' home rebuilds: a government managed, cost-free process with self-built opt out; inclusive supports for all those affected; and prevention of similar crises.

The document was finalised after a meeting of 800 people at the An Grianan Hotel. The initiative is led by campaigners Paddy Diver, Lisa Doherty Hela (100% Redress No Less), Lisa Hone, Tricia Doherty (MAG), Roisin Gallagher (Redress Focus Groups) and Michael Doherty.

Paddy Diver from 100% Redress No Less stated, "It was incredible to see so many people turn up for the meeting last Monday, it was standing room only, which sends a very clear message in itself - the DCB scheme is falling way short of what it needs to deliver. The Government have had two opportunities to get this scheme right and they have messed up because they refuse to listen to the people that are going through this

ment because it reflects back what they know is needed to ensure no one is left behind."

Michael Doherty states, "We have gone through every single comment whether written or verbal and done our best to ensure that they are woven into the principles of the document and ensure the people's voices are heard. Every single public representative in the Dail and Seanad has received a copy of this document plus local Councillors in Donegal. We are also conscious of the full support of the Dail on 15th June 2021 when a 100% Redress Motion was passed unopposed. We had politicians from all over the country voicing their full support for 100% Redress on the stage at both mass rallies in Dublin and we look forward to their continued support in delivering a true 100% Redress as defined by the people."

A letter accompanying the People's Document asks all recipients for a written response by the Monday 25th March as to how the public representatives and/or their political party will support the principles and practical requirements detailed. In addition, politicians are invited to address a public meeting of homeowners on Tuesday 26th March, 7pm at the Gateway Hotel, Buncrana where they will have the opportunity to communicate their response.



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retro-fit update

The tender for the retro-fit works to 51 houses at the Glenwood Estate in Glencar, Letterkenny has been issued with the deadline for expressions of interest being March 28th. The matter was raised at Tuesday's Municipal District meeting by Cllr Jimmy Kavanagh who was told that the works at Glenwood are scheduled to commence in either June or July.

No funding for **Conwal footpath**/ **Cllr.** Donal Mandy Kelly has been told that

there isn't sufficient funding available to extend a cycleway and footpath from Conwal Graveyard to the Newmills Corn and Flax Mill. During Tuesday's Letterkenny/Milford Municipal District meeting the Fianna Fail Cllr was told that the scale and estimated cost of the project is greater than the funding currently available via the Footpath & Public Lighting Programme. Alternative sources of $\frac{Y}{M}$ funding are being sought but as yet none have $\frac{C}{K}$ been identified.

Horror of Scappaticci

Last week the North's police issued a report into Freddie Scappaticci. He wasn't named in the report 'Operation Kenova'. It was clear who he was. The report was like a spy novel where there are no good guys. Above all, in this there is the trauma for families. In some cases the loved ones had been tortured before being murdered. More traumatic again, many of the families were Republican. They had made sacrifices. In some cases, those killed were informers. In others, they were not. Now, families face terrible truths. A British agent had got so far into the IRA to be head of internal security. Solicitor Kevin Winters has said this was joint enterprise between the British state and the IRA.

Yet more upsetting, families have found their loved ones could have been saved. Security services knew where they were being held. They knew they were to be killed. There was no rescue because that would have exposed Scappatici. I can't imagine what that feels.

Many of those killed were putting themselves at risk to help the British state. Why is it not relevant. That state showed no duty of care. Any employer must show this towards their employee. Worst of all, it seems some were deliberately betrayed to Scappatici to boost his credibility.

The IRA, too, comes badly out of this.

The IRA had initially denied Scappaticci was an agent. That's because it is an institution. Thus it acted like other institutions. The first reaction to the scandal wasn't about the victims. It was denying there was a scandal.

I don't support killing people for being informers. The IRA must face up to allowing Scappatici to be judge, jury and executioner. British

and Irish courts are very far from perfect. At least there is some sort of legal process. Journalists can attend hearings and report what happens. Those wrongly convicted are sent to prison. They have a chance of appealing. If successful, they can be released.

Those wrongly accused of being informers can't be brought back from the dead. Some were wrongly accused because of grudges. In some cases their faces didn't fit. Some were vulnerable, for various reasons.

I dislike double standards. I do accept there was a different political background. However, Scappaticci was allowed to live. Killing him would have had political implications. It would also have been very embarrassing.

Let's remember, over the years the IRA 'disappeared' several fairly senior members. Former monk Joe Lynskey was an early member of the (Provisional) IRA in Belfast. He became a senior intelligence officer. In 1972 he tried to kill another

IRA man. That was because he was having an affair with the man's wife. His fate was not revealed until the 1990s. Eamonn Molloy was quartermaster of one of the Belfast brigades. He was disappeared in 1975. The IRA did not make this known for another 24 years.

Thus the IRA, too, come out as hypocrites.

There is a wider political aspect to

this. The North's current Chief Constable, John Boutcher, was central to the investigation. I know little of Boutcher personally.

To me, the report raises a question. Has the British state produced a monster it cannot control? That is, the whole security apparatus in the North.

The Troubles produced that security apparatus. This became self-reproducing.

The various intelligence services were intelligence-led. That is, they weren't about solving crime. They were about gathering information. Scappatici was head of IRA internal security. That was a key position. That enabled the British state to monitor the IRA campaign. By their nature, security services were secret. They were under no scrutiny. They were independent of police and, to a lesser extent, of military.

They certainly reported to sections of the British Cabinet. By the nature of their reports, this could only go to some of the Cabinet.

We have to be careful about seeing conspiracies in everything. However, is this report at a time that suits? Scappaticci's handlers are retired, and even dead. Living members of the Establishment will be safe. At present, the Troubles are being wound down. Dissident groups are unable to wage a serious armed campaign.

Is the huge security apparatus that

grew up round the Troubles now a danger? Has it gone out of control? Let's remember Boris Johnson was removed because he was out of control. His behaviour, for whatever reason, was increasingly erratic. Security services can be a threat. In the mid-1970s there was serious talk of a military coup against the British Labour Government of Harold Wilson. Two years ago, police in Germany discovered a coup plot. The plot involved senior army and police officers. The aim was to restore a right-wing monarchy. When they feel they have to, the British Establishment is ruthless. Here we have had Bloody Sunday; the Ballymurphy, Springhill and New Lodge Massacres; and the Dublin-Monaghan Bombings. Those were mild compared to slaughter in Iraq and Afghanistan. Let's forget the guff. The British Establishment is not loyal to democracy. It is loyal to defending its own wealth and power.

But the Welsh socialist Aneuyrin Bevan explained its favourite strategy. He once said: "How can wealth persuade poverty to use its political freedom to keep wealth in power? Here lies the whole art of Con-


servative politics in the 20th century."

That strategy has generally worked. Universal franchise has existed in Britain for 106 years. The Conservatives have been in power for 73 of those years.

There is worse. In Britain and Western Europe, Governments are using democracy to restrict democracy. The invasion of Gaza is a big excuse to restrict rights to protest. Police have arrested people in France and Germany for wearing the Palestinian scarf.

Thus the Establishment will clamp down. But they want a number of hands on the levers of power. At times that means clipping the wings of politicians, or sections of the security forces, who have lost the run of themselves.



Work has been completed on the Ramelton Safe Routes to School Active Travel Scheme that has provided a one-way system on Church Street from the Rectory Road Y-junction down past St. Mary's N.S. to the main Letterkenny Road. There are new footways throughout the scheme with appropriate controlled and uncontrolled crossing facilitates to the school. It also includes a new front of school design in accordance with the NTA's 'Safe Routes to School' guidance documents and includes an amenity area (shared space) and extension for the current overflowing car park. A new pedestrian crossing will also be provided on the main Letterkenny Road with additional uncontrolled crossing points on both the R245 and Church Street to improve carriageway pedestrian crossing points to furthermore promote a shift from a car dependent society and encourage walking to school. The Council says the new improved infrastructure will benefit the local

community particularly those in the surrounding housing estates aforementioned.

The Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Programme was developed in partnership with the NTA and Green- Schools in 2020 as a response to the need to support schools to increase walking and cycling to school. The new traffic system aims to address the existing poor or lack of facilities for active travel to link Scoil Mhuire NS to Ramelton Health Centre, St Mary's Church and adjacent housing estates of Lennon Grove, Elm Court, Meadowvale, Chestnut Grove, The Steeples, St. Mary's Terrace and Cúl na Cille.

With approximately 190 students enrolled at the school, the programme aims to relieve congestion at the school gate during drop off and pick up times and encourage a shift from a car dependent school by providing encouragement and support to students to opt to walk as a primary choice of transport.

Hyper-Suspicious

I got a message from a friend this morning. Her sister had been scammed - some scheme that gave hackers access to her Amazon account, from which they had bought several phones.

For some months there was hardly a day went past without some sort of scam call. It's not just calls, but texts from random numbers claiming to be your bank, or An Post, or DHL or whomever. It's easy to ignore them unless it is a message claiming to be from your bank, or if you were actually expecting a parcel! Then it seems all the more plausible.

Last week my brother (who is reasonably tech savvy) posted a message in our family WhatsApp group: "Just a warning - think I'm being the victim of an attempted scam. It seems pretty convincing."

He had made a purchase which had seemed to be accepted and paid for. A while later he started to get messages asking him to verify the transaction, then an automated phone message warning that if he didn't confirm the transaction, his card would be blocked and so on.

A day later my brother said, "They kept calling and calling yesterday." He googled the number and up came a website with a list of warnings about the number - along with some positive comments saying it was legitimate-

ly the bank. My brother reported, "Amongst majority negative comments there were a few positive, but I presume that's the scammers. I blocked the number."

devious nature of the scam, "The more sophisticated bit, I think, is that they have a transaction that did originate with me."

Another day later, he posted this message, "Turns out it was all totally legit. Tried to pay for oil on the card today and it had been blocked."

It was the bank after all, there was no scam, the bank was just doing its job. Of course it is better to be safe than sorry. Double check everything. Look up your bank's card helpline and ring it if need be.

But it did make me think. We live in a world with a thousand and one scams going on. Offers that seem too good to be true. Cheap goods coming from China that vastly undercut the real thing, made from inferior materials He further commented on the apparent and not fulfilling their function.

We are rightly suspicious of a 'good thing'. But maybe we can be hyper suspicious and miss out.

The good news of Jesus is the best offer available. It promises the greatest gifts - forgiveness, cleansing, redemption, salvation and eternal life. But perhaps we've been bombarded with so many religious claims, false promises, fakery and dishonesty that we are hyper-suspicious and end up giving it all a wide berth. That would be a shame. Checking in with the bank would have shown my brother the truth. Checking



The Citizens' Assembly on Gender Equality recommended replacing the wording on the Family with language that was not gender-specific. Their proposed text obligated the State to take reasonable measures to support care within the home and the wider community. Leo, look closer to the Cabinet table because the electorate hit you between the eyes with a massive vote of no confidence in your administration.

Conveniently, the Dail is not sitting this week. In fact there are two sittings of the Dail between now and Easter. No time to linger on the referendum defeats: no time to consider the Supreme decision in favour of widower, Johnny O'Meara and his right as an unmarried father to the Widowers Contributory Pension: the Dail may not have a minute to consider the role of new RTE Chair, the Housing Crisis or much else.

Obviously, the Dail will return after a lengthy break at Easter and they'll have calmed down from the stress of abandoning Ireland for the St. Patrick's Junkets Extravaganza. In fact, the Dail will only sit two days on March 20/21 and they're off again until April 9th.

In fact it is worth looking at how many days the Dail is scheduled to sit in the political year from September until the end of July. That's 335 days: guess how many of those days the Dail is sitting? Who said 95: that's 20.6% of our time and money to keep them in the manner that goes with high office, secretarial expenses, travel, subsistence, notebooks, pencils and mobile phones. And before you ask, the TD's get well remunerated for every day of the year.

Meanwhile at the battlefront of last week/s referendums, all the main parties were remarkably silent; remarkably absent. We'd have presumed that winning these votes was important in the brave new world of 'progressive' thinking and the government would be embarrassed around Europe if the nation said No.

The reality is that Europe is bemused at the fact that we need referendums on such basics as Family and Care. Many in Ireland would have been equally embarrassed.

Why do we need to nail down this legislation? After all, family and care is in a unique space that needs the most basic input from the government because the EU Convention on Human Rights is part of what we signed up to joining the EEC the very first day. And the UN Conventions are also there if needed.

Beyond the bedroom door

The Bishops were always going to put their oar into this debate because that is what they've always done, ever since Archbishop John Charles McQuaid gave them a unique voice in the construct of the Constitution in 1937

You've only to read their views in a press release the week previous to the voting with the warn-ing: "Referendum will lead to a weakening of the incentive for young people to marry." What a statement. Nowadays, young people are free to make the decision that is right for them regard-

ty, care, love and truth can best be taught and learned by children. We recognise, of course, that there are families in all our communities which are not founded on marriage. They form part of the reality of family life, which Pope Francis described as 'a challenging mosaic made up of many different realities with all the joys, hopes and problems," said the Bishops They claim that families are the glue of society,

their welfare cannot be taken for granted, but must be promoted and protected by every ap-propriate means." Really!

Does that include protecting unmarried women in Mothers and Babies Homes? Magdalene Laundries? And protecting children from clerical sex abuse?

Do the Bishops extend their concept of family to unmarried mothers and their children? The Bishops state: "The Constitution right-ly qualifies the Family as a "moral; institution" and one that enjoys "alienable and prescriptive rights, antecedent and superior to all positive law" law."

It would seem the Bishops have no regard for the Supreme Court Ruling in January that upheld a constitutional challenge of a man who was denied access to the widower's pension because he

was not married to his long-term partner. However, Ireland through its Catholic ethos has, since 1937, chosen to have a foot in the bedrooms of the Irish nation.

This thinking of how best to control the Catholic flock is a faith based concept and some see it as invasion of their privacy and question if it is in breach of international conventions.


Why or how the Church ever wanted to control people's behavour beyond the bedroom door does draw many reasons, many concerns and suspicions about their motivation? Was it merely to condemn normal people from doing normal things, or what in the name of God are the Bishops seeking?

Landmark Supreme **Court Ruling**

This referendum was hardly needed given that the seven-judge court unanimously ruled that Johnny O'Meara is indeed entitled to the widower's pension despite the fact he was not married to his partner of 20 years, Michelle Batey, when she died in 2021.

Chief Justice Donal O'Donnell told the court that the distinction in the legislation between a married and unmarried couple was "arbitrary and capricious".

plied for the pension. The January judgment was eagerly awaited ahead of the Family referendum which sought to provide for a wider concept of family (i.e. not

one only based on marriage) in the Irish Constitution. Delivering judgment for the Supreme Court, Chief Justice Donal O'Donnell observed that

"the payment is a social welfare benefit payable in the event of the occurrence of an event giving rise to a recognised need for support" and "cannot be easily characterised as a consequence of a status deliberately chosen".

He continued: "Ín general, it is notable that social welfare provisions, unlike succession or taxation rules, do not tend to distinguish between married couples and cohabitants. In the case of s. 124, bereavement and the impact of the death of a partner, both emotional and financial, is not in any way different whether the survivor is married or not."

Mr O'Meara, along with his three children, brought proceedings challenging the first respondent's refusal to grant him a widow's, widower's or surviving civil partner's (contributory) pension.

Mr O'Meara was not married to the children's mother, Ms Batey, due to her negative experience with the breakdown of her parents' marital relationship. Although the couple had contemplated marriage following Ms Batey's breast cancer diagnosis, she contracted Covid-19 and died in 2021 before any arrangements were made. Mr O'Meara subsequently applied for the pen-

sion which is payable pursuant to Chapter 18 of Part 2 of the Social Welfare Consolidation and his application was refused.

Supreme Court unanimously found in fa The

tion what had been said in the case law - that the rights of children were the same irrespective of

the marital status of their parents". The court pointed out: "There may be good reasons to debate what the Constitution should now say, and indeed the Court was informed by the Attorney General in the course of argument, that proposals to amend Article 41 in this regard were under consideration, and proposals are before the Oireachtas as of the date of delivery of this judgment. But, the forum for any debate on what the Constitution should say in this or any other regard is not the Court."

Accordingly, Chief Justice O'Donnell made a declaration that s.124 of the 2005 Act is unconstitutional insofar as it does not extend to Mr O'Meara as a parent of three children, and made an order of certiorari quashing the first respond-ent's decision refusing Mr O'Meara the pension. I'd love to hear from the Bishops and their interpretation of the Supreme Court decision in relation to John O'Meara from Nenagh.

Let's hear the Taoiseach

Taoiseach Leo Varadkar has said he was unsure that the wording on care proposed by the Citizens' Assembly is stronger than the care amendment that will be put forward in the upcoming referendum.

The Citizens' Assembly on Gender Equality recommended replacing the wording with language that was not gender-specific, and "obliges the State to take reasonable measures to support care within the home and wider community". The wording being put forward in the referendum instead says the State "shall strive to support" the provision of care by family members to one another. That's why it was hammered. Asked about the chosen wording, the Taoiseach said that "there is a different language that some people preferred".

Varadkar said: "And that was the state would take 'reasonable measures', but what's reasonable? Is that actually stronger? I'm not even entirely sure it is.

Meehan campaign launch raises the rafters

As Declan Meehan got his local election campaign off to a thundering start at the Ray Community Centre on Saturday afternoon, it was somewhat reminiscent of the campaigning days of the late Neil T. Blaney in the nineteen seventies and eighties. Ever since then, nobody has come close - that's until now.

The big, big crowd raised the rafters in an amazing response to Declan Meehan's opening statement and there were ovations as the roof was raised with the response of a diverse crowd; some already well versed in the art of gathering in the votes. And the start of proceedings were delayed for ten minutes to allow the overflowing crowd to be seated.

Obviously, Meehan has put his challenge to win a seat up to all three outgoing Councillors and with many a good reason, in fact 1.8 million of them.

"The Full House" sign is effectively a sign of what's to come and Meehan has his homework well done and he's already attracted a wide constituency of support right across swathes of the Milford area.

This was not expected to be a big turnout: there was quite a bit of interest in the match between Man U and Everton, despite neither of them going anywhere and the Irish Rugby team was bidding for history at Twickenham... not for the faint hearted. That so many came to Ray for a campaign launch is a very big statement indeed. This part of Donegal has created a tradition down the years. That obviously has changed and Meehan has set out his stall in what was a great opening appeal to the electorate.

At the last local elections, Declan who was virtually unknown polled 677 first preferences and his ambition is to significantly increase his 8.7% well into double digits on June 7th.

Fiona Boyle one of the founders of the Ray Community Centre said she was given the honour of introducing her fellow Ray Committee member, neighbour and friend.

"Since Declan has taken over as chairperson, Ray has been developed even further with around €300,000 in grants secured, resulting in almost €500,000 worth of projects including the Ray Wonder Woodland, Community Garden and Astro pitch."

Declan is a community person and has got stuck in not just in Ray but he is heavily involved in projects in Milford, Rathmullan and Ramelton providing support. In total he has achieved \notin 1.8m in funding for the Milford electoral area as a whole.

From my experience I am very confident Declan will make an excellent Councillor. No job is too big or small for him – from writing difficult applications for funding to helping with the teas at social events. He is very reliable, intelligent, witty, creative, approachable and above

We are the disbelievers: the disbelieved and the disregarded in the higher halls of political opportunism, cast aside in the knowledge that we would merely obey the ringmasters of spin and make believe.

The Taoiseach will spin the referendum result to avoid his failures and to somehow hope that come the elections on June 7th, all will be forgiven. However, in Friday's vote he was reminded that mothers and women can never be classed as gender neutral... Ireland's woke thinking will not downgrade that status.

For the first time since February 8th 2020, the nation's electorate of 3.5 million had a vote last Friday in two referendums. However, last Friday's vote was one of rejection of a government that has failed on the country's chronic failures to address health and housing as the cost of the National Children's Hospital has gone through the roof and all the electorate is turn down the nine o'clock as excuse after excuse is rolled out by members of the Government. The Taoiseach will spin the referendum result to avoid his failures and to somehow hope that come the elections on June 7th, all will be forgiven. However, in Friday's vote he was reminded that mothers and women can never be classed as gender neutral... Ireland's woke thinking can never be allowed to downgrade that status.

They know fine and well that the electorate was waiting in the long grass for the referendums and it was time for a vote of no confidence: there is a silent anger: a disconnect and no trust in the system. And FF in particular has been surprised, perhaps not shocked because they actually have such trust in Martin that they'd like to caononise him with a top job in the EU but they've nobody else to lead them.

In Donegal these feelings are palpable and the Mica crisis has not gone away because the legislation that was rammed through the Dail clearly needs a total rewrite if the families are to get their homes replaced.

We are the disbelievers: the disbelieved and the disregarded in the higher halls of political opportunism, cast aside in the belief that we would merely obey the ringmasters of spin and make believe. The threecard-trick men have no place in politics and when Leo Vardaker says doing about reversing Saturday's loss of the two referendums. The answer as always is that he'll simply forget about it and hope for a better result on June the 7th.

That boat has long since sailed on government leaders taking responsibility and they should stop treating the electorate as fools.

Was the outcome predictable or not? Obviously there is the arrogance of an inept government and a weak opposition brought about by the merger of Fianna Fail and Fine Gael while the electorate is left on the sidelines without a voice or a hope to have their voices heard on the political stage.

Obviously there was a message within the proposed changes and the fault line for failing to deliver that message rests with the three government leaders. The electorate stood well back from the debate because of the incoherence of wording on the ballot papers.... It simply did not make sense. In such circumstances the public was guided by their own experience and voted no..... overwhelmingly.

There will be claims by different sides as to why these referendums were toppled. After all we voted in favour of marriage equality nine years ago and divorce and these new plebiscites were supposed to support these changes. However the nation did not need to hold its breath on Saturday with a massive landslide vote rejecting the Government proposals... or should that read the Green Party agenda? This is a party with a mere 7% of the first preference vote in the 2020 General Election. There is no doubt that the Greens have punched well above its weight ever since... until Saturday. Witness only the arrogance of Tanaiste Micheál Martin confrontation with stay at home mother and barrister Marie Steen on the referendums. The Tanaiste said that the proposed amendment was not just about offering constitutional recognition to single-parent families, but other families that fall outside the current definition of "family" in the Constitution.

"I think the vast majority of people in Ireland ... know people in these situations, know couples who are not married but who have children for different reasons," Mr Martin said.

Marie Steen said the term "durable relationship" has been interpreted by the Supreme Court to mean "an intimate, romantic or sexual relationship between two people akin to marriage but not marriage".

On RTÉ's Prime Time on Tuesday of last week, she said the judgment was handed down by Ms. Justice Marie Baker, Chair of An Coimisiún Toghcháin, Ireland's independent electoral commission.

Ms Steen said that if this definition applies "then single parents are not included in this Government proposal" to amend the constitution.

Martin argued single-parent families "most certainly are included" in this. "Do you want to include children of different family types within the definition of family within the Constitution, single parents, unmarried couples who have children, grandparents raising their children and so forth, vote Yes to include them."

Steen then asked Mr Martin if he would tell "a Muslim man who has fled persecution to make his home in Ireland with his two wives and children that they are not in a durable relationship and that his family is not a moral institution?"

The Tánaiste said he was not "making comment on specific

tutional rights, legislation can be overruled and declared unconstitutional".

Martin was well out of his depth and that was the general opinion.

And across the country's grand slam of hopes a true political walloping would emerge: The Family amendment No vote was 67.69% with 32.31% saying Yes.

Donegal as ever the forgotten county was as predictable in its solitary isolation from the radar of Government thinking: look no further than the Mica disaster... cue 800 hundred at the meeting in Burt last week.

There was never any doubt about Donegal saying No on both ballots: we don't do things in half measures. But again the Government has been saying No to Donegal's demands through the span of many governments and more than enough generations.

And if that was shocking, worse followed in Saturday's vote: The Care vote was No. 83.97% with 16.03% voting Yes. That's a No majority of 33,196.

In the Family vote on durable relationships the Donegal view is rejection. 80.21% voted No with Yes on 19.79%. The constituency has an electorate of 123,452 and the turnout was 39.99%. We've lived with infrastructure neglect: political neglect: the legacy of neglect of families in mica infected homes. We faced the trauma of elderly and sick citizens leaving home in the middle of the night to see a consultant for ten minutes in Dublin or Galway.

That is utter neglect from a government whose weakest link is pandering to the wishes of all three party leaders in an inept and failed government. What a three way government has delivered is inertia that is out of kilter with the needs of a modern nation where the leadership has not set deadlines to end the health and housing crises.

So, given that kind of political legacy, our political destiny is to keep saying No until there is a strong enough voice in Cabinet to force the kind of change that really does make a difference and starts the much needed process of creating a new Constitution for the next generation. On Saturday it was obvious within the first hour of the count that the electorate was handing the body politic of the nation a plastering and one wonders why and how the government managed to turn what should have been an easy win into a catastrophic defeat. Although it did take Leo Varadkar some time to find his composure before facing the cameras with the same blase comments that surly led to this defeat. The three government leaders' mantra being whittled down to one... Eamonn Ryan and the Green Party agenda. In 1937 the Land Commission divided the Gerrard Estate in Gibbstown, Co. Meath into 22 acre farms, and among those to receive land were 59 Irish speaking families from the western counties of Cork, Donegal, Kerry and Mayo. They in turn, gave up their farms to be divided among those who remained in these congested areas. In Donegal the majority came from Fanad and there are still close ties between the two areas even to this very day.

A new bi-lingual book Ceann Scríbe Baile Ghib (Destination Gibbstown) was compiled and edited by the Gibbstown Book Committee who dedicate this book to their courageous, spirited forefathers whose vision for a brighter future for their descendants led them to the plains of Meath.

They brought with them their language, culture, traditions, heritage and faith.

Fanad launch

The Fanad launch is in the Fanavolty Hall on Friday March the 22nd at 7pm, the Crolly Distillery West Donegal on Saturday March the 23rd from 6 to 7pm and it features each family's story as recounted by family members. No stone was left unturned when it came to researching their journeys.

Amidst the political backdrop of the 1920s and 1930s, Ireland grappled with the aftermath of the Civil War and sought to address land distribution and the restoration of the Irish language. Legislation was enacted, empowering the Land Commission to purchase vast estates for redistribution, easing congestion in the west while rejuvenating the Irish language. It was within this context that Baile Ghib emerged as a beacon of hope, fulfilling two intertwined objectives: providing fertile lands for those in the west and fostering the resurgence of the Irish language in the east.

Of the 59 households that moved to Baile Ghib and Cluain an Ghaill - 18 households came from Mayo; 21 from Kerry; 18 from Donegal (Fánaid and Gaoth Dobhair); 2 from Cork while two of the Donegal families returned home.

another son of Ned Carr. He married Sheila Callaghan from Ballyhiernan. They were known as the 'Mickey Dens'. A field in Ballyhiernan called 'Mickey Dens' field belonged to Sheila Callaghan's family at one time.



Hannah died in 1950. John later sold his house and farm to Johnna and Josie Shields. He bought a house belonging to Neddy Smith on Winchester Road near Oristown Church, towards the 'Stone Cross'. He remained single. John died on 11th September 1972, age 63. He is buried in Fletcherstown with his mother.

The McGarry family

The McGarry, or McCarry family as they were originally called, came from Kinnalough (below). It was a frosty morning, and he could see the first beams of sunlight on Kinnalough. This was to be the last morning he would wake up in the cosy little house nestled by the lake. Everyone was excited, especially the younger ones, who were about to embark on an exciting new adventure in their lives. But Daniel and his wife Hannah were sad. He was almost 60 years of age, she was 47, and they were about to say goodbye to the place they were born and raised in. It would have been much easier for them, at that stage of their lives, to remain where they were in Fanad with their neighbours and friends and the only life they knew. But they were not thinking of themselves

of course, they were thinking of their family, the household and the future. The farm in Kinnalough was too small, and the land was too poor to sustain a big family. If they stayed in Donegal the family would have had no choice but to emigrate to Scotland, England or America, as the generations before them did.

The McCarry family, Daniel, Hannah and their children Mary, Eddie, John, Nellie, Michael, Henry and Jimmy, settled into their new home on the Mayo Road and soon began to learn new farming methods with help from the inspectors from the Land Commission. The children started attending Oristown National School, an English speaking school. With the addition of the Gaeltacht children, there were 180 pupils now crammed into two classrooms. Some did not understand a word the teacher spoke, however, and of course they only knew their prayers in Irish.

The success of the move from Donegal for the Mc-Carry's and other families to Meath, despite the obvious difficulties associated with uprooting, is perhaps reflected in how well they adapted and contributed to their new community and how, to this day, their offspring are so embedded yet still retain a connection to Fanad and other parts of Donegal some 85 years on.



Johnny and Mary had two daughters, Catherine (known as Kitty) and Sheila.

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Council charges: funding cuts loom

As Donegal County Council meets in Lifford on ly to be scrapped on Monday and it remains to be Monday to make a decision on the controversial issue of the development contribution charges Cllrs. have already been advised that funding cuts will kick in if the existing charges are not increased.

However they are hardly likely to be impressed by a suggestion floated behind closed doors on Tuesday that buildings under 2,000 sq. feet be exempted from the new fees and that a flat rate of €3,000 be applied to houses above that level.

It seems that most new homes are well above this floor space and Cllrs. say that an exemption of around 2,500 square feet might be more acceptable.

However it seems unlikely they will go along with a proposal that a flat rate of three grand might be acceptable.

And in response to the farming lobby the Council officials have stated that the proposals for agricultural structures above 400 square metres is €36. 'This, says the Council's administration, "is con-

sidered reasonable and the scheme should be applied equally to the agricultural sector as to the first time buyers on the residential ladder."

According to our political soundings the majority of members are happy enough with the existing level of charges and some are inclined to go with the decision made in four other counties to leave well enough alone at this stage. And with the local elections looming on June 11th the Cllrs. will be anxious not to rub the electorate up the wrong side insofar as additional costs are concerned. The public is continuing to claim that this is only another stealth tax and a backdoor method of paying for benchmarking that is costing the local authorities a fortune.

The current proposal for a charge of €6,300 is like-

All age groups are catered for from ten years upwards and it also embraces the local school areas. There are full-scale debates and information and appropriate behaviour is also part of the agenda. There are various grinds and Ian McGarvey teaches dancing.

Sport also plays a big role in youth development while social living and group talks also play big role. There is a moral dilemma group and they also produce their own magazine, the second edition has been completed and it is a fair reflection on what the project is all about.

The Community Centre project is a hive of activity all day and evening long and it is now an established factor and facility in town. First defeat for Murphy's men

Finn Harps 0-1 Cobh Ramblers

A flat Finn Harps performance on Friday night saw Darren Murphy's side suffer their first league defeat of the new 2024 season. Cobh Ramblers made the long journey south with a deserved first three points of the campaign thanks to a fine 24th minute Jack Larkin strike. Despite an improved second performance after emptying the bench Harps rarely tested the Cobh keeper. The narrowing of the pitch on both the Stand and Stranorlar sides of the ground appeared to work against the hosts on this occasion. No real explanation has been given for the alteration to the pitch dimensions other than it is within the specifications laid down by the FAI.

But as a result of the narrow pitch it was Cobh who benefitted putting Harps under a lot of pressure from long throw-ins and it led to the game's only goal. In the first half the ball was out of play with monotonous regularity especially on the Stand side. Murphy stuck with the same 11 that started against Athlone with the only change being on the bench with the inclusion of Conor Tourish for the first time this season. The former Letterkenny Rovers central defender had been out since pre-season with a hamstring injury.

Cobh started well and in the first minute, Matthew McKevitt shot narrowly wide of the target and then the visitors had an even better chance when James O'Leary's low cross wasn't cut out and really David Bošnjak should have scored from a couple of yards at the far post. Another O'Leary cross saw Larkin head wide. Ramblers deservedly took the lead courtesy of Larkin's

brought their dog Carlo with them. Eddie, their son, who was also a tailor, returned with his sister Hannah to Fanad around 1946.

Annie, Neil the Tailor, James and Bernadette returned to Moross in Fanad around 1950. Maggie emigrated to London but returned to the Shragh in the late 1970s.

Neil, Mary and Hughie remained in Gibbstown. Neil never forgot Doaghmore. The key to the old house they left in 1937 is nailed to the stable wall in the Gibbstown house to this day.

Neil the Tailor died on 25 February 1966. He was 83. Annie died on 26 Sep tember 1990. She was 97.

Neil Shiels

Neil Shiels was born on 2 September 1922 in Doaghmore. The midwife was Mary Amelia McGloughlin who was a half-sister of Pádraig Pearse. Neil was baptised in Fanavolty Chapel.

Neil said they got thirty shillings a week for a year. They got 23 acres of land, three cows, two heifers, a horse and cart and all the agricultural tools they needed. They also got 20 hens and a rooster, two pigs, twelve sheep and an acre of bog in Mountainstown.

His parents worked as a tailor and a dressmaker. Pedlars went door to door selling the cloth they needed.

Big Johnny Shields and Hannah Carr

Johnny Shields, his mother Kate Sweeney Shields, his wife Hannah Carr and their children Theresa, Cassie and Johnna left their home in Balloor in April 1937. Big Johnny, Theresa and Cassie travelled on the bus. The Land Commission provided a taxi for Kate who was 84 and for Hannah and baby Johnna. The taxi driver was from Shannagh and stayed the night in a hotel, before going back to Fanad the next day.

The family settled on the Donegal Road where Theresa's grandson, John, now lives.

The youngest member of the family, Sadie, was





born in February 1938. Kate Sweeney Shields died in September 1937.

Hannah Carr was one of eight Shiadhail agus ar dheis, Máirín Ní Shiadhail. sisters and two brothers. She was from The Moss in Fanad.

Hannah married Johnny Shields and they decided to go to the US. Hannah went ahead herself as Johnny had difficulty with his passport. Hannah and her daughter Theresa remained for six years in the US, returning in 1933. Her mother Mary Ann died in February 1937. Hannah's sister Annie was married to Neil Shiels, the tailor from Doaghmore.

Theresa went to Glasgow and trained as a psychiatric nurse in Gartnavel Royal Hospital.

Theresa and Mickey McGarry were childhood sweethearts. They married in England and had their home in Hither Green.

Big Johnny was a lovely singer and enjoyed dancing. House dances took place on a Friday and Saturday night on the cement floor, from 7pm till late at night, especially Friday night.







The deadline for completion of repairs to the structure at Portsalon Pier has been postponed once again. Originally scheduled to be finished for the end of October 2023, that date was pushed to March 26th.

The completion date is now moved forward until 'the end of April and this has added further urgency ahead of the tourism season.

As a consequence of this further delay, there are renewed concerns about the summer tourism business for the industry in Fanad. While there was a general acceptance of the project not being completed until March 26th the community did expect this deadline to be met given that the tourism business has been interrupted since last July.

Joseph McMenamin, the contractor in charge of the €1.5million project told a meeting in Portsalon in January that his rationale was based on the progress already made in the ten weeks prior to Christmas. The Council's senior marine engineer, Cathal Sweeney said this was 'an extremely challenging job' where structural difficulties were first raised 25 years ago. The Council had carried out works ten years ago but much more was needed.

He was confident the job would be completed on time. "We will have a safe, secure and stable structure that will withstand another fifty years. The width of the pier will also be increased. However, more needs to be done and we will always be involved in Portsalon... we will never leave it" he stated.

While this was a positive meeting there was a sharp edge in the room as Cllr. Blaney and tourism promoters in Portsalon aired contrasting views. Portsalon Pier is one of six Donegal marine infrastructure projects that was allocated a combined total of €8.276 million in a funding package announced by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Charlie McConalogue, in January. Speaking following a visit to Portsalon Pier earlier this week, Minister McConalogue said: "I'm delighted to see these major repair works taking place. The investment of €1.425 million in Portsalon Pier means that this vital piece of local infrastructure will be in place and will serve the area for many generations to





Super win for Donegal League

Then just past the hour mark the keeper was deemed to have committed a foul that led to Leinster making it 2-2. Doogan made three personnel changes from the Inishowen win with James Doherty, Mark Forker and Shane McNamee all starting. But it was the young visitors side that started the game well and were really stretching Donegal early on. lead after Donegal lost possession in the middle of the park. The move ended with the impressive Dean Sutcliff being fouled by Joel Gorman. Ref Barry Maxwell awarded the penalty. However, Forkan guessed correctly going low to his right to push away Reece Kavanagh's spot-kick.
