Election campaign moves out of first gear

The campaign for the local and European elections has finally moved out of first gear this week and with Peter Casey again running for a seat in Europe.

By John McAteer

Obviously, after the 'pass the parcel' tug of war between London and Dublin about the legal status of refugees in recent days - this was the perfect timing that Casey needed to enter the campaign.

It has added momentum to what's really been a lacklustre battle despite 28 candidates contesting the five seats in this constituency. Three weeks ago, Casey told the Tribune that he was not ruling himself out are different and highly of the EU campaign. "I will consider my options but I'm not ruling myself out,' he said.

In 2019, Casey surprised many with his vote of 56,650 first preferences in a field of seventeen candidates. He shocked the main parties when he won a share of over 9.5%. It

was a low key, slow campaign and the turnout from among the 1.224 million voters was just over 50%.

This time around there divisive issues: migration: emigration for a start - and there is the latest Red C poll in the Sunday Business Post with SF on 27%: FG on 20%: Independents on 19% and FF on 14%. It does make for the perfect storm in the lead-in to polling

In the local elections most more independent names are due to be announced in the next week with much of the focus on Letterkenny.

Declan Jordan is the latest candidate among the Independents contesting the seven seat local Letterkenny area. He said he's bidding to follow in the footsteps of his grandfather James Larkin who served on the Town Council for 32 years. This is a political legacy that dates back to the early days of Fianna Fail and later the founding of Independent Fianna Fail in 1973.

Across the electoral areof the party candidates have as: FF's convention for the trict. already been chosen and Glenties area in Burtonport tightest of battles between former Cllr. Enda Bonner

and John Reilly, Burtonport who won out on a vote that was not confirmed to the media. However, according to sources, it could have gone either way especially with a number of delegates absent on the night.

Reilly is a well-known figure in fishing and a former trawler skipper on a number of fishing vessels including 'The Atlantic

Long standing FF Cllr. Gerry Crawford is to run in the Stranorlar area alongside Patrick McGowan: the party is defending twelve Council seats.

Sinn Fein has completed its election runners for the Glenties area. John Sheamuis O'Fearraigh and Brian Carr will be joined by Kellie Rodgers from Mullaghduff. She works in customer service and operations at Carrickfinn Airport.

Blaney clarifies Downings funding

Cllr Liam Blaney has responded to concerns raised in last week's Tribune that due to ongoing delays, €700,000 in grants could be lost in the Rosguill area.

Members of the community had raised the lack of progress over recent weeks and it was also up for answers at the recent Milford Municipal District Meeting.

Now Liam Blaney has statd categorically: "This money is staying put, because I put it there. That money for the Walkway and the Pontoon is never leaving Downings and I can assure you that is the case because I was the Cllr. that fought for the money. Unfortunately there have been lengthy delays.

Work on the new Pathway is about to start and the first phase from the Rosapenna Golf Pavilion is expected to be completed in a couple of months. And the final completion phase will proceed as according to plans.

Due to my representations, this project has been grant aided by €500,000. This is a very good amenity but it will also make the public safer on a very busy road.

With the inclusion of the pontoon, there is €700,000 to be spent and Downings is assured that these delays will be resolved soon.

Insofar as the new pontoon on Mevagh Pier is concerned, the Council sought a foreshore licence at the end of 2019 and despite our best efforts that process has been delayed. Efforts at the Council's Marine Dept. are ongoing to have the foreshore license granted and I'm assured that progress is being achieved with the relevant government bodies," said Cllr. Blaney.

Local Elections FG candidate for Milford, Aaron Sweeney, said he has been canvassing in the Mevagh and Downings areas over the last number of weeks and the importance of this project has been mentioned to him on the doorsteps, and it is welcome news that progress is ongoing to ensure this becomes a reality.

"The Parish of Mevagh continues to grow its services around tourism, including the exciting development at the Carrigart

Hotel and the success of the gteic building, and this greenway will be a big asset in the area," he add-

Several non-party candidates have also declared. They are: Michelle Smith, John Waters, Dr Gerry Waters, Saoirse McHugh, Charlotte Keenan, Peter Casey, Daniel Pocock and Stephen Garland. Carolyn Fahy is listed as a candidate for the Party for Animal Welfare.

'It will take a miracle'

Stormont honeymoon is over

I thought the honeymoon for the Northern Executive would last longer. The end, though, came quicker on Thursday of last week. Finance Minister Caoimhe Archibald delivered the first Budget.

Health Minister Robin Swann voted against it. That was because of cuts of 2.4% to his Department. That is to a health service in serious crisis. I know from personal experience over the past couple of weeks. Swann has said the cut will cause "serious and irreparable damage." He is not spoofing.

This is particularly damaging because health is very immediate and emotional.

The Budget raises big questions about the Executive's substance. The style has definitely been good. Certainly, the First and Deputy First Ministers have good skills in presentation. Michelle O'Neill attended a Northern Ireland game in Windsor Park. She stood for God Save The King. She attended the graduation of PSNI (Police Service of Northern Ireland) recruits.

The change in the DUP is more notable. The party has not publicly acknowledged this. However, it is clear they have taken aboard criticism from the late Martin McGuinness. Before McGuinness died, he said he expressed disappointment. He said he had made significant gestures towards Unionism. He felt they had not been reciprocated.

This time, the DUP is clearly into positive gestures. First we had Emma Little Pengelly giving camogie a try. Ok, that wasn't a complete shock. She gives the impression of being a woman who would join in the craic. Importantly, she is very much 'New

much 'Old DUP'. (That is despite being younger than Little-Pengelly). The first school Givan visited as Minister was a Catholic grammar school in South Belfast. Then he wanted to attend the opening of a new building for a Gaelscoil in Dungannon. First, he did a few steps of Irish dancing. Then he spoke a few words in Irish. Certainly, he had travelled some distance from what most would assume as his comfort

Certainly, the two have picked up some credit in the Nationalist com-

I did not rule out that a few extra pounds might have been found somewhere. That, of course, would have been on a short-term basis. That's not because I'm soft-headed about British Governments. First, the return of the Assembly and Executive is one of the Conservative Government's few apparent successes. More, permanent collapse would seriously damage their international prestige. Thus they have much invested in the deal succeeding.

They are a government in chaos. That impacts on everything. I don't know how quick crisis will

develop. At time of writing Swann has not resigned as Minister. I can't rule out his having resigned by the time you are reading this.

Not only that, but if he does so the Ulster Unionists will leave the Executive. The Ulster Unionists are not the force they once were. They are still sizeable. Yes, they have messed up some issues very badly in the past month.

However, Swann is popular. He is seen as having done a good job when he was Health Minister during Covid. On a personal basis, he is a friendly wee man. He is still the North's most popular politician. Fairly uniquely, he has cross-community appeal.

Health is very clearly in trouble. Swann calculates the offer in the Budget was 16% of what is needed to clear waiting lists. There are currently 115,000 waiting for some sort of inpatient care.

One aspect of education is facing a similar crisis. Childcare is only receiving 6% of what is needed. The Executive has three prestige

projects to finance. These are the A5 dual carriageway: Casement Park GAA stadium in West Belfast: and the Strule Shared Education Campus in Omagh.

There are questions over them all. The A5 is to run from Aughnacloy to Newbuildings, just south of Derry. Not a sod has yet been turned. Despite that, costs are still £6.8million (€8million) to date. The Department has twice conceded judicial reviews. That is, they accepted the project had not been properly gone about.

The A5 was to have been completed in 2018 at a cost of £799million (€934million). At best, it will not be completed until 2028. The cost will be £1.7billion (€2billion).

As to Casement Park, residents in Andersonstown are opposed. Antrim GAA teams have met rather limited success in recent years. Thus residents fear concerts. When Casement was open previously, there was traffic chaos. When first built it was on the edge of the City. Now the area is very built up.

The Strule Shared Education campus brings six second-level schools together in Omagh. The site is a former British army camp. To date, the only school there is a Special School. The schools are to be two Controlled (that is, Protestant), and three Maintained (that is, Catholic). The schools will stay completely separate. Is it a way of avoiding Integrated **Education?**

Flagship projects will not stop industrial unrest. In January we had a general strike in the public sector. This was the biggest ever in the North's history. Most claims from

then now seemed settled, for the time being.

Now, support staff in education are to strike.

In January last year the education employers made an agreement with the unions. The unions expected this would be honoured when the Executive returned. Now they find it is not to be funded. A bitter dispute is possible.

In the background, too, there are rumblings. The Starmer **Labour Government intends** to keep to Sunak's spending limits. Thus the Executive is being pushed towards revenue-raising measures. Sinn Féin and DUP have promised not to introduce water charges. If they are squeezed, will they keep that promise?





Top job for Tom

The Irish Pharmacy Union (IPU) has announced the appointment of Tom Murray as its new President. Mr. Murray, a community pharmacist based in Donegal where he has businesses in Ramelton, Castlefin and Convoy, will lead the IPU at a pivotal time for the profession, with major changes to the role of pharmacists expected in the coming years.

Outlining his priorities he said "The role of pharmacists is changing thanks to the work of the new Expert Taskforce. Our profession is ready and excited to implement these, which may include independent prescribing powers, the provision of a service for common clinical conditions and enhanced contraceptive care. However, it is essential that these changes are well managed and do not create undue stress or workload for an already stretched profession.

"My top priority will be to work to address the funding crisis within pharmacy. 80% of Community Pharmacists' time is devoted to state services in administering the community drug schemes. The fees paid for providing this vital service have been frozen for 16 years, as a result pharmacies are dispensing at a loss for significant portions of each month. This is unsustainable and cannot continue."

"As President I will be supporting the ongoing efforts of the IPU to see the introduction of a €6.50 flat fee structure for all pharmacies."



Volunteers sought for Ards tree planting

An invitation has been issued for volunteers, community gardeners and allotment holders to

assist with the planting of more than 1,000 baby trees in Ards this weekend.

It takes place on Saturday, May 4th, between 10am and 2pm.

The "New Spring" project will see more than 1,000 baby oak-trees together with many other native species including pine, birch, hazel and alder in a new 'sanctuary woodlands'.

Organisers say having gathered over 1000 acorns locally in the autumn of 2022, these young oaks are now old enough as baby trees to be introduced back to their homeland.

The planting takes place in the Pollnabuckan field along the path to the headland which is easily accessed on foot next to Isabella's beach.

This may well be the first woodland establishment project of its kind - helping the local oak woodland community re-establish at Ards Friary on behalf of the Capuchin Order in Ireland. The Ards Walled garden Community Project say they will also establish a mini-nursery for more native shrubs and herbs like honeysuckle, roses, sloes, spindle and herbs to attract bees and but-

Former priest Crossan to be sentenced next Wednesday

Former priest, Eamonn Crossan, will be sentenced next Wednesday at Letterkenny Circuit Court for sexually assaulting and indecently assaulting a young boy in the 1980s and 90s.

The 73-year-old pleaded guilty to nine sample charges out of a total of 96 charges in relation to the victim who was aged between 10 and 15 at the time of the offences.

The State entered a nolle prosequi in relation to 44 charges and the guilty pleas related to seven counts of indecent assault and two counts of sexual assault.

A statement on behalf of the Diocese of Raphoe said the abuse suffered at the hands of Crossan had done "terrible damage to the lives of his victims and they bring shame upon our diocese".

The victim went to gardaí after he heard that Crossan had been convicted of sexually abusing another boy in 2021 and was sentenced to a two year jail term, the court heard.

Crossan appeared in court via video link from Midlands Prison. The court heard he

was a regular visitor at the victims home who recalled when he was about 10 was sent to stay with the priest to look after him when the priest had the flu. He told gardaí that it became regular for him to stay over and the abuse progressed very quickly. He would feel embarrassed and ashamed after the abuse and during the abuse would spend most of the time in the

The incidents became so regular that it became normalised, and he would stay over in the priest's bed hundreds of times, he said.

A Bad Day At The Office

The next time you have a bad day at the office, remind yourself that it could have been worse. Unless that is, you're the janitor at the centre of a New York lawsuit amounting to over \$1 million that is, because bad days don't come much worse than his.

For others, the alarm can take the form of setbacks. Whether the disappointment comes in our professional lives, in a relationship, or in our sporting endeavours, it can often leave us questioning whether the things we desire more than

anything will truly satisfy even if we acquire them.

Often times the alarm can be devastatingly painful. Many if not most of us will have to wrestle with crushing diagnoses and gut-wrenching bereavements; these most painful aspects of our existence can act like alarms, warning us of the brevity of human life and the urgency of considering what will happen in the life to come.

The question is, what do we do with these alarms when they sound? It is part of our human nature to seek to silence them - to pull out the plug rather than put up with their disturbing cry. Some turn to entertainment and distraction. Others turn to substances. Many simply embrace their stiff upper lip and keep on the alarms in your life?







Decade of disconnect between politics and the people

The Red C Poll in this week's Sunday Business Post reflects the mood of a nation in waiting for a general election. FF on 14%; the Simon Harris bounce has seen FG's vote share increase by one point to 21%.

The mood of the electorate is obvious. Independents are on a high of 19% and their base is, to some degree, coming from the negativity of political spin.

These are very different times for canvassing on the doorsteps: a nation still impacted by Covid and the subsequent lockdowns and people are angry about precious years and the lives of loved ones stolen from them.

The government is blamed for many things in this crisis... the silent wakes and empty graveyards as the nation stayed at home in a country literally under curfew as the pandemic crisis worsened. The funerals of four years ago were made more lonely by regulation and absent mourners.

People were afraid to be in the cemetery for a neighbour's burial: grandparents forbidden to visit grandchildren, the health system on life-support and too many unable to rent or afford a home... age-old failures made worse during the lockdown. Many now see the local elections as their first, and perhaps only chance to hammer home these issues that have been in their minds for four years. This issue and its consequences have not been forgotten and every day an enquiry into the consequences is delayed, it is a day too long. The trauma of the lost years burns deeply in the public mind and they believe that the politics of communicating the message about the intense precautions have been left blowing in the wind. That wind of discontent remains across this year's and perhaps next year's elections.

And the new sceptre of emigration as young couples leave for foreign shores unable to rent a house here.

People do feel let down and they are quite mad that proress is a failed docket. And then a new leader stretches credulity to claim he will build

250,000 new houses over the next five years.

That is the kind of Darby O'Gill politics that drives people to despair about the kind of leadership this country now has... The politics in the world of make-believe sees a new leader who is not a dry week as Taoiseach when he promises to build 250,000 new houses in five years - and a week later Micheal Martin is scattering an extra two billion to the 2025 budget. Given that the promise has come from a Fianna Fail leader is enough to carry a government health warning.

Fianna Fail is already bringing their experience into auction politics promising a whack of two billion euros in the October budget (provided they're still in government).

These are the kind of promises not seen since the 1977 general election when Jack Lynch's general election bandwagon literally bought the nation's goodwill in an election handout and we are still paying a hefty price in lost revenue to fund the system of local government. Who do you think took away the rates that, in previous generations, ensured that every home in the country paid its fair share to help sustain local councils and jobs in the services?

And I'd bet that nobody has forgotten the shamrock economics of Bertie Ahern. In the past year FF has tried to bring Bertie back into fashion... the fashion of not having a cheque book is back as the new fashion. He's the FF Leader who's remembered for not being able to remember: his failure to truthfully account for lodgements of over £165,000 at the Mahon Tribunal.

party and being talked about as a contender in the Presidential Election.

THE final report of the Mahon Tribunal stopped short of making any findings of corruption against Bertie Ahern - but it said he failed to truthfully account for lodgements of over £165,000 to accounts connected with him. While the Tribunal accepted Ahern's claim that he did not have a bank account for years between 1987 and

1993, and that he usually cashed any wage or expenses cheques given to him in that time, it rejected his evidence that he had built up around IR£54,000 in savings during that time.

And true FF tradition Bertie is back in the fold perhaps to run for the Presidency next year... Jesus wept.

There is no doubt that there is a serious disconnect between the political parties and the people who are not satisfied with so many aspects of a government well into its fifth year in office and with FG being part of that leadership since 2011.

In the meantime the electorate sees disconcerting issues: migration and emigration are two of the emotive issues. There is anger, frustration, broken promises, the clapped out health service, inflation and the return of auction politics that was fashioned as a mission statement by good old Fianna Fail in a day when the nation could not afford an arse in its trousers.

The sceptre of emigration is back with a vengeance and that is down to the Government's pathetic record on housing construction while rental prices have raised the

And there are the issues of migration that nobody dares mention its name in public places. Normal people are incensed with the government policy on migration: much of it down to a lack of trust. The government does not trust the public in telling them that refugees have been arriving in their towns and villages, often late at night and before the dawn.

And after two years since the war in Ukraine began and the subsequent arrival of 105,000 refugees in this county, things have changed, and in some towns, quite dramatically. Obviously, everyone has a right to their own opinion, but when it comes to trying to burn down property earmarked for migrants, we've

reached a crossroads in this election year. And the anger and paranoia that is out there is manifest. It could lead to a further backlash against not just asylum seekers but all sorts of migrants to this

It would be no bad thing if everybody who professes to care about standards in public life paused right now to reflect on where this might be going and if the government messaging has not only failed the electorate, it has also not helped the Ukrainian refugees fleeing their homeland for fear of their lives.

So, the public blames politics: and right now they are getting hit by accusations of the failure of the three Government parties for allowing too many Ukranians into Ireland at a time when the Cabinet cannot solve the country's housing crisis and Simon Harris is desperately seeking a solution for the huge number of migrants sleeping under canvass in Dublin City Centre. With all due respects, the government has instilled their own culture of fear in their inability to communicate with communities that it was planned to bring Ukraine refugees to local hotels and other abodes of accommodation. It has led to the claims that there is now far more money in housing refugees rather than tourists. One has to ask what has this

secrecy been all about? And why no communication or preparation has been done in talking to those towns where substantial numbers were about to be located.

Candidates are now hearing the anger on the doorsteps. Seriously this situation has nothing to do with the local election candidates - but try and convince the public of this fact!

Perhaps these are some of the reasons the electorate is not exercised or enthused by the local and EU elections in five weeks' time.

And then Fianna Fail produced a policy document on migration. One proposal is that asylum seekers convicted of a crime be deported. But how serious is this record of crime amongst migrants? There is no record of asylum seekers committing crime to any greater extent than the rest of the population. The Garda Commissioner and Department of Justice have confirmed this. Why put this

And then there's the confusion over how asylum-seekers arrive into Ireland. The Minister Helen McEntee, in response to a Dail question stated, "Information on how a person enters the country when not through a designated port, including by travelling over the land border, is not recorded." Responding ot Deputy Michael McNamara at last week's Oireachtas Justice Committee she said that 80% of asylum-seekers turning up at the IPAS office in Dublin these days have arrived in the UK first and then came here from the

The 80% figure is not a hard data point because with an open border, nobody actually knows the true facts, not even Micheál Martin.

Regardless, Micheál Martin then repeated this figure: honestly, there are sane people wondering if these figures are plucked out of thin air.

Asked on Monday if the UK could agree a returns scheme with Ireland, RishiSunak said: "We're not. I'm not interested in that. We're not going to accept returns from the EU via Ireland when the EU doesn't accept returns back to France where illegal migrants are coming from."

Does the Government actually know which hand is which in this disaster? And all around us, SMEs have been shutting down: the sense of failure is all around and nobody is listening, allegedly! It makes for the perfect storm. Perhaps we'd already witnessed the public response in the referendums on March 8th when all the political parties were given a resounding response about what the public felt... and for the Government, it was a plague on all

This is the first time since the pandemic that the electorate has a chance to make their voices heard to candidates on the doorstep... provided the door is open in the first instance. The pandemic has changed Ireland and it will take time and trust to restore confidence for the future. There is a distrust in politics: a younger generation complaining the country has falled their generation And they are refusing to get registered to vote. They say this is a silent protest in a country that will never afford them the price of building a home.... and anyway, as soon as they're finished college they are leaving this kip for better times overseas.

It is not a new expression of mistrust in the government, but at least this FG led government has had a decade to sort out

Meanwhile this week's Red C poll in the Sunday Business Post shows that the main parties in the coalition government are heading for the perfect storm as the elections approach on June 7th.

The headlines are reading FF on 14% in the Red Sea poll and the Simon Harris bounce has seen FG's vote share increase by one point to 21%. Independents are on 19% with Sinn Féin on 27%. The third party in the coalition, the Greens are on 3%.

But more significantly it is from across the political spectrum with a nation unhappy with the entire political dynamic and specifically with the public relations exercise that is as predictable as it is negative.



Old rifts in the Fine Gael party have been reopened this week with Cllr. Sean Maloney laying the blame for the party's woes at the door of the Harte organisation.

The Jim McGuinness revival of Donegal football fortunes continued at Celtic Park on Sunday as he guided his side past Tyrone in a very tricky Ulster semi-final test at Celtic Park on Sunday. Niall O'Donnell and Daire O'Baoill put Donegal in front for









Summer start for new Harps Stadium

Diggers will be on the new Finn Park Stadium site in Stranorlar subject to planning permission approval being received. The application is being submitted to Donegal County Council for the €7.3 million amended design which takes three months to process but is expected to get the green light following extensive pre-planning engagement with the Local Authority. That was the positive news emanating from the Finn Harps F.C. public meeting on Sunday evening in the Villa Rose Hotel.

stakeholders were on board with the new modular design and the financing that section of the attendance.

was in place to start construction of a stadium saga that has been going on for nearly two decades. There have been many bumps along the road and no one can predict that there won't be more. The club has been working on debt financing for a total of €3.7 million. A €2.2 million slice of that figure will be serviced by a low cost loan to cover grant aid that is coming down the track from the Council and the FAI. The remaining €1.5 million is the figure that the club is obliged to raise themselves and an arrangement to secure that loan through a low cost facility or even a zero finance arrangement is ongoing. And the Club will pursue options here including approaching high worth individuals with Donegal links.

Around 50 people attended Sunday evening's public meeting and heard that Finn Park would have to be sold to complete the financing of the new stadium. However, concerns were raised about that from the floor in regard to what the extent of recent engagement was with the trustees who hold control of the ground for the communities of Ballybofey and Stranorlar. Finn Harps club stalwart Anne Kelly sought assurances that the Council were happy with the new arrangements to proceed with the development of

the stadium in Stranorlar.

Ian Harkin said that while it had been hoped to keep the current Finn Park for women's football it was now the case that they had the same rights to play on the new ground. But, the overriding reason for the proposal to sell Finn Park is the huge challenge of the matching funding requirement that the Club has to find €1.5 million. A former Harps Director Seamus Gallagher said the value put on Finn Park over a decade ago was €5 million but a more recent figure that he obtained four years ago was €1.5 million.

€1 million has already been spent on the Stranorlar so when the new stadium is completed there will be a total expenditure of at least €8.3 million. The design has moved from a total concrete construction project to a hybrid that now includes a significant modular component. Sunday night's meeting was told that the tendering process had been completed but the name of the successful firm was not disclosed. The capacity of the stadium will be somewhere between 5,500 and 6,300.

Harps are looking to purchase the new stadium site from the Council with a price tag of €200,000 being floated for an area that is zoned recreational. That is being pursued in order to secure bridging finance. If all goes according to plan the

current trustees of Finn Park would transfer to a similar position in the new stadium.

There were calls from the floor to name the current Finn Park trustees and that a public meeting should be held where communities of Ballybofey and Stranorlar could have their say on the proposal to sell the ground which has been the home of senior football in Donegal since 1969. It's not clear at this stage if Finn Park would be sold by public auction or private proposals. That was a question asked by former Harps Chairperson Sean Quinn. Plans to change the shareholders payment model arrangements for the Finn Harps Cooperative Society were not put to a vote on Sunday evening. A working group is to be set up focusing on fundraising and a project manager for the new stadium is to be appointed. In relation to a question from the floor on why the senior team did not have any overnight stays for a number of long away journeys this season Ian Harkin said it was a goodwill gesture by the management to help the club in a challenging financial environment. Former senior team kit man Dougie McNulty who alleged that he had been sacked by Club recently said the immediate focus should be on giving the players the best chance possible to be challenging for promotion at the end of the season in terms of sufficient re-

sources like the overnight stays. He argued that the scale of the new stadium facilities being proposed were not needed by Finn Harps and were at a standard more appropriate for a team like Shamrock Rovers.

Finn Harps Commercial Manager Aidan Campbell said unlike a number of other clubs they didn't have the luxury of a benefactor that could plug holes in budgets. He also pointed to the challenges of fundraising and nobody could match Sligo Rovers who were the champions in that regard. He said the club would never forget what the late Derek Wilkinson did for them. The Creeslough native who passed away earlier this month was very generous with financial support to Finn Harps for over four decades.

Campbell said three guarantors would be appointed next month with the remit to ensure that all monies earmarked for the new stadium would go there. He praised the amount of effort put into the project by the Chairperson Ian Harkin adding it was time to forget what happened in the past and move forward with the new stadium. Campbell said the talent and ability within Finn Harps was exceptional with representatives from their 2021 sponsor global Esports organisation Guild Esports saying some of those club people could work for top advertising agencies.
