### Election shocks... and a missing bull

With Saturday's deadline approaching for nominations in the Council elections, it is reported that most of the candidates have 'signed in' at County House in Lifford.

The exact number of candidates will not be known until Saturday afternoon and it is predicted there will be numbers of last minute runners, particularly with an non-party designation. However, new names are entering the race almost every day. Kathleen Deeney of Newton, Carradoan and the Saltpans is running for Aontú in the Milford area while Vincent Bradley, Kill, Carrigart is to run in Milford and Letterkenny as an Independent. The new Aontú runner has worked for the Dyslexic Association and the HSE and she has a pro-life agenda: this is her first campaign.

Aontú contested a seat in Milford in 2019 and Dermot Hardy got 338 (4.4%) first preferences and the party hopes to build on that this time.

Vincent Bradley is campaigning on a range of issues: health, hospital beds: home care for the elderly: lack of creche spaces: mass emigration: immigration and farming. He said that for centuries Ireland has been looking after the rest of the world: now it's time for the rest of the world to look after us.

The funding will go towards the construction of a new central hub as the village continues its journey of healing after the explosion when ten people lost their lives and many others were injured.


Cllr. Martin Harley, Cathaoirlach of the Council said: "It is my sincere wish that it will be an important source of hope and support to the community as it looks to the future."

The regeneration project, which has a total value of €13,529,935, forms an integrated part of the Village Plan. The co-funding balance of €1,352,093 will be provided by Donegal County

"The new central hub will support Creeslough on a journey towards a vibrant, healthy, well serviced and socially inclusive and sustainable community," said the Council's Liam Ward. Along with Fr. ### Border Counties will be magnet for asylum seekers - Peter Casey

EU election candidate, Peter Casey has claimed the Northern Ireland High Court ruling means that both the North and border counties will become a magnet for illegal immigrants from the mainland UK who

fear being deported to Rwanda," . He added: "There is a misconception that Dublin has the most asylum seekers in the country – it is actually Donegal that has the highest percentage of migrants per head of population. One in every 100 people in Donegal is an asylum seeker - and that's just the official figure!In truth, it is probably much higher now with illegal immigrants flocking across the border because of the UK's no nonsense policy to deport them to Rwanda – and that will increase tenfold with this alarming High Court ruling."

The former Dragons' Den star said

that the Irish government has now admitted that - due to extreme pressures on the asylum systems - they cannot screen all illegal immigrants, which is required by law to be carried out within 30 days of an illegal immigrant's entry into the state.

"This is a worrying concern. For example, the Irish government has just come out and said that

He said "Donegal barely rated a mention in the last European Parliament. We were invisible and that's because of the abject failure of outgoing MEPs. Farmers were treated as second-class citizens and that was wholly wrong and grossly unfair. I will have their backs in Europe and argue strongly for an extension of the Nitrates Derogation and be vocal in negotiations on a new CAP. I will seek to play a role on any EU Agriculture or Fisheries Committees to help support farmers and fishermen back home.

Migration has to be confronted and solutions found. Our towns are bursting at the seams. Our public services, including health and schools, are stretched beyond capacity. Illegals who are here have to be processed without unnecessary delay to ease the pressure on our towns and villages. An aid package promised by Leo Varadkar last year to ease pinch points in population centres never materialised and that is unacceptable.

On infrastructure, Donegal must get special attention from the EU. We fought hard to get Directive One status in the naughties. We want to create a corridor from the border counties right across to the west to help us attract new investment and create high-value jobs. Having Objective One status should mean that our roads are upgraded and it is imperative we see investment

Our position in the EU 'league table' has slipped to a worrying level. Out of 234 designated regions in the EU, we sit at 218th for infrastructure. Our southern constituency In Ireland is Number Two in the EU. That's close to the bottom on the Index alongside some of the poorest regions such as Romania and Bulgaria.

"We have been allowed to languish in the EU backwater long enough. "I want to stop the brain drain. This can only be done by building the infrastructure that will truly make us an Objective One area. It's only when we become more accessible will industries start taking us seriously and create the jobs that will keep our young people at home. That is nothing more than we deserve. The 10 years of apathetic representation by MEPs

who failed this constituency are over. Give me your Number 1 on June 7<sup>th</sup>, and I'll make sure Donegal is put back where it belongs – right at the heart of where all the key decisions that affect all our lives are made."

### **Thoiba Ahmed launches** council campaign

Thoiba Ahmed, independent candidate for Donegal County Council in the Letterkenny Municipal District, launched her campaign on Saturday, telling a diverse audience at the Letterkenny Community Centre, "This is our time. Your issues will be my policies." Thoiba said: "We need to take action to make a positive change for Donegal and for Ireland as a whole. I am Sudanese, and I am Irish, and I am a proud Donegal woman. I always introduce myself as a peace-builder between communities - everything starts with peace. The main thing will be that the whole community can prosper going forward, and this will be my mission," she said. Thoiba's campaign priorities include affordable, sustainable housing for all; 100% redress for homeowners affected by defective blocks; and work toward an equal and inclusive society.

She also committed herself to advocating for a fully inclusive Donegal, including increased accessible housing for people with disabilities and accessibility in workplaces

"We need to have clear policies about equality and accessibility, and my commitment is to promote policies that ensure equal opportunities for all," she said. She also spoke of the importance of bringing communities and cultures together.

Thoiba said: "We are that beautiful mix of identities and we are proud to bring that together in this space, giving people the opportunity to interact, to exchange cultures and to exchange knowledge. It is the beauty of diversity."

Independent TD for Donegal, Thomas Pringle, who also endorsed Thoiba in her 2019 campaign for the council, told the launch



audience: "Thoiba will be a great asset to the Council. Donegal is changing for the better, and Thoiba can bring her voice to council to show that. That's what the Council should be, and that's what it needs to be as well.

"It's a great honour for me to come and support Thoiba and to give her any help that I can. And in her work after she's elected, if there's anything I can do at the Dáil level we will be working together in relation to that, too," he said.

After moving to Ireland in 2015, Thoiba's visa did not allow her to work, though she has been very active as a volunteer for many organisations in Donegal and on national campaigns. Thoiba and her husband, a doctor in LUH, live in Letterkenny with their two children, aged 17 and 14. She holds a degree in sociology and has worked as a sociologist and a journalist in Sudan as well as a community worker in Donegal.

### **McClafferty highlight** issues with childcare

Cllr. Michael McClafferty has told the Tribune that out on his door to door canvass on his campaign trail, one recurring concern that arises is the lack of childcare facilities in Northwest Donegal.

Cllr. McClafferty told the Tribune last night "Local community childcare facilities currently have extensive waiting lists. I've been hearing stories of parents registering their child before birth in an attempt to secure places, allowing them to return to

Although I acknowledge benefits of the Earl Childhood Care and Education Scheme, which offers free care and education for preschool children, its effectiveness is compromised when there are no available places.

The existing social welfare payments fall short of meeting the basic needs of families, necessitating parents to re-enter the workforce to secure a sufficient income for survival. How-



This situation significantly impacts employers, as many parents are unable workforce availability and productivity. Î've heard instances where

childcare facilities had to cancel their services for the day due to staffing shortages caused by sickness or other factors. Consequently, parents were forced to take the day off to care for their children. The government must take action to address this crisis and aid," he concluded.

### 45 estates takeover since 2019

Cllr Ciaran Brogan has been informed that 45 private housing estates within the Letterkenny-Milford Municipal District have been taken over by the Local Authority since 2019. The work carried out has varied in each estate, depending on the level of completion, compliance with the planning permission granted and condition of existing services. A resolution was passed at the April Municipal District meeting to take in charge College Park Letterkenny.

### **Bradley seeks Town Bus Services** update

At Tuesday's Municipal District meeting the Mayor of Letterkenny Cllr Kevin Bradley sought an update on the Town Bus Services. Cllr Bradley was told that the current Town Bus Service is operated under license from the National Transport Authority. Discussions and meetings have been ongoing between the NTA and Donegal County Council regarding preparation works for the provision of a fully functional town transport service for Letterkenny. These discussions have involved the proposed development of two new bus routes and agreement of proposed bus stop locations. A request has been sent to the NTA for an update on the current status of the project and Mayor Bradley and his fellow Cllrs will be updated when this is received.

### **Temporary ramps at** Kilmacrennan N.S.?




available to establish if any additional measures are required. Additional funding may be required depending on the scale of improvements deemed necessary.

### Dublin Monaghan atrocity... 50 years on

Friday is the 50th anniversary of the worst terrorist attack ever on the Southern Irish state. The UVF exploded three bombs in Dublin and a fourth in Monaghan.

British intelligence services were actively involved in the attacks. The bombs killed 33 civilians. Around 300 were injured.

The bombings took place during the Ulster Workers Council strike in the North. This was not a normal industrial dispute. Rather, it was enforced by Loyalist paramilitaries. The aim was to bring down the first power-sharing Executive. That had been set up in 1973. The strike led to the Executive falling.

There were broader issues at stake, too. A Labour government had been elected in Britain earlier that year. Labour had defeated the sitting Conservative Government. This had called a General Election during a national miners' strike.

Sections of the British establishment were discussing the need for a military coup to overthrow that Labour Government. Events in Ireland were part of that wider picture.

Soberly, we have to remember what happened 50 years ago. Three bombs exploded in Dublin during the rush hour. All exploded within four minutes. All were on busy streets withcommuters walking towards railway stations. The fourth bomb exploded 90 minutes later in Monaghan. That was a decoy. The clear purpose was to draw Gardai away from the Border. Thus it would be easier for the bombers to return North. All was wellplanned and well-scouted.

I remember the horror of the night. I had been drinking in a club. Then I heard bombs had gone off. On one hand, being stuck in a basement drinking is not a healthy way to spend a May evening. On the other,

drinking meant I had the good luck not to be on the streets. I knew people who had the bad luck to be there. Luckily none were killed. Some did see the horrors, though.

I knew Greacen's pub in Monaghan Town. This was destroyed. As people of an older generation will remember, the Dublin Express bus stopped for a break outside Greacen's. Sometimes I took a quick bottle of stout during those stops. There is a sad paradox. Greacen's was Protestant-owned. People of all backgrounds drank there.

Two of the Monaghan dead were Protestant. One of the Dublin dead was Jewish. She was French, and had lost much of her family in the Holocaust.

The three cars used for the Dublin bombings had been hijacked and stolen in Belfast earlier that morning. They were then driven to Mitchell's farm at Glenanne, Co Armagh. This was the base for the 'Glenanne Gang'. Glenanne is a mostly Protestant area, but close to South Armagh. The 'Glenanne Gang' was responsible for over 100 killings. It worked very closely with British intelligence. So close was that they were, in fact, a pseudo-gang. Robin 'The Jackal' Jackson was one of its main killers. He was a known agent.

The Dublin bombs were loaded at Mitchell's farm. Then the bomb teams set off. The bombs were primed in the carpark of a pub in

North County Dublin.

The car used in Monaghan was hijacked in Portadown. It was then driven to Mitchell's Farm to collect the bomb.

Some of the reaction at the time to the horror was appalling. Official Unionist Assembly member John Laird said "people who are suffering [in Dublin] are people who have quietly condoned a terrorist campaign [in the North and Britain]."

That can be dismissed as an offthe-cuff remark from a very minor politician.

The reaction of official Ireland was as callous. The phrasing was just more subtle. There was no national day of mourning. Initially, the Government decided flags were not to fly at half mast.

The events of the next 50 years are very concerning.

That was despite eyewitnesses recognising at least two drivers of the bomb cars. Within weeks, the Gardai had names of 20 suspects. All had links to the UVF. Within three months, the Garda investigation was closed. That was into the largest multiple murder ever committed in the Irish state.

Finally, in 1999, the Irish Government set up an inquiry into bombing. Justice Henry Barron, who was Jewish, chaired. The British Government refused to release documents. They cited 'national security'. This is not the act of a friendly neighbour. Barron published his report in 2003. This pointed to involvement of British security services.

We need to remember all this as the pressure is coming on to abandon Irish neutrality. Sometimes there is hysteria about the Russian threat. Many who should have more sense go along with it. For example, the front page piece of the Irish Times on Saturday last read: 'Russian disinformation targets Irish voters.' The source is the French intelligence service. The 'disinformation' is, on their evidence, one website. We wonder if a similar warning from Russian intelligence services about France would be taken quite so seriously.

No Russians have ever been involved in terrorist attacks against the (Southern) Irish state. No Russian spies have been charged, let alone convicted. One Guard has been convicted of

spying for the British. There is strong reason to believe British spy agencies recruited numbers of others to spy against the Irish state. Important Garda files on the 1974 bombings went missing. You don't have to be paranoid to suspect agents of the British state as responsible. Those agents had to be either Guards, or civilian employees.

This isn't just history. The 'Spycops Inquiry' in Britain has established that an undercover London Metropolitan policeman was at Shell to Sea protests in Mayo. He was also in Dublin. Mark Kennedy then used the name Mark Stone. That's proven, not alleged, subversion.

Since becoming a Member of the Council in February last year, Cllr. Pauric McGarvey has been instrumental in providing vital road safety measures around Ramelton contributing €13,000 from his Members Contribution Fund because the Council does not have money immediately available.

He's also had a traffic survey carried out by the Council amongst many meetings and negotiations seeking solutions that will ensure the safety of the community.

He points out that he's been lobbied for action by many residents, groups and business interests in the local community worried about the speed of cars coming into town.

He said: "The road through Ramelton is the main artery for two major peninsulas and sees major traffic daily travelling through. I have been working with engineers to find solutions to the speed of cars coming from Milford into Ramelton. I had a traffic survey done by the Council and the results show that something needed to be done, but unfortunately the answer was "no funding" was available.

Cllr. McGarvey added "To help alleviate this problem I agreed with the Area Roads Engineer Donal Murphy to allocate €4,000 from my members infrastructure fund to purchase and install a new flashing speed sign for the top of the Bridgend. It will be installed this Friday 17th May and I am delighted that this has come to a conclusion.

The same story on Church Street and Rectory Road - I also signed off with the Area Roads Engineer funding for two traffic calming ramps on Church Street and one pedestrian raised ramp outside Cul Na Cille on Rectory Road which I purchased with my members infrastructure fund costing €13,000. 



"The trustees helped us in every way in looking after Finn Park. The trustees were so good to us. When the Stranorlar site was first being mentioned many years ago I was told by a very senior County Council official that the sensible option was to upgrade the current Finn Park because it has the infrastructure right beside it. So this move can't be allowed to happen. It doesn't make sense and it's not fair or right to be putting public pressure on the trustees. I'm all for progress but certainly not the way things are being done here. I have enough knowledge to know what is in the best interests of senior football is to stay in Finn Park and upgrade it," McGowan said.

Whatever your reasons, we want

to encourage you to read the Bible for yourself. Its message is far more straightforward than people assume and it is designed to be read by everyone, no matter how much or how little prior experience they have.

That is why our church is running "The Bible Course". The format is simple: we'll watch a brief video that explores some of the Bible's themes and then there will be an opportunity to ask questions or discuss what we've just watched. You're not there to be lectured to; this is a chance to explore God's word together.

We hope that those who attend will come to see that the Bible isn't nearly as intimidating as they've been led to believe. We hope they'll develop

an appetite to go away and read it for themselves and we hope that they'll come to love it dearly. We want you to have the joy of seeing that the Bible contains the greatest, most life-changing, most hope-giving news the world has ever seen.

So please feel free to come along and see more for yourself. You won't be put on the spot, forced to speak, asked for money, or pressured to commit to coming again. The course begins this Sunday (19th May) and runs for the next eight Sundays. It's well worth attending all eight nights but you're free to dip in and out as you choose. 



### New online radio supports emerging singers

A passion for helping new talent to get more airplays has prompted a Churchill woman to launch her own radio station. Well known singer/songwriter Maria McCormick is going to do exactly that with the official unveiling of Over the West Online Radio this Saturday at the A.O.H Youth and Community Club aka the Devlin Hall on Letterkenny's Lower Main Street. It was back in 2019 that Maria first had

the idea after listening to the RTE's recommended playlist for emerging talent. She felt there was much more that could be done. A year later Maria was researching what was in-

volved in opening her own radio station. That had to get a back seat for a while when her mother became ill and caring for her took priority until she sadly passed away. But, Maria's mission to set up her station was still on her radar and she completed all the formalities including obtain-

ing the necessary license last year. "I had been getting frustrated with the lack of opportunities for emerging

> talent trying to get airplays. Lots of them were getting frustrated and dropping out after spending money in studios. It was in 2020 that I first got the idea of radio to help these people and give them a chance" Maria said.

The official launch of Over the West Online Radio takes place on Saturday at the Devlin Hall with a 3pm start. "This is much

more than just a radio station. It is a platform for the emerging artists of Ireland. Our motto is " If You Create It, We Will Play It ". As you know I am a singer/songwriter myself and I have been releasing music since 2019. I have been one of the lucky ones when it comes to radio plays and as the old saying goes "right place, right time. Unfortunately this is not the story for so many, if not the majority of emerging artists in Ireland and because of this there was a massive need for what I have created."

Already there are 350 artistes that are featuring on her online dukebox every day. They also get the opportunity to be played live on air by Maria's 12 D.J.s who are behind mic at nighttime for live shows. "A woman from Downings contacted me who had started writing a song three years ago. She heard what I was doing. Now she has it finished and the song is out of this world. So far I has been a D.J. herself on Strabane Radio. Maria have had ten good news stories" Maria said.

She had special praise for the Ramelton man Paul Mooney who tragically lost his life in road traffic collision earlier this year. "Paul Mooney was a very good friend of mine. He helped me get up and running with the radio. Paul created the jingle and organised the software. It's also fitting that the launch is taking place in the Devlin Hall which first opened in 1939 and where people will have 20 of the artistes present for the launch. I have D.J.s covering the Munster, Connacht and there. Leinster areas and hope to have one in Ulster Among the D.J.s that are signing up are the late shortly" Maria said.



### **EU** candidates offering miracles: believe them not!

The reality is that the EU candidates do not have any plausible solutions to our farm woes and within a 720 member parliament, they will lack the power to deliver the kind of results needed to save farming. But try telling the candidates whose profiles hang on every pole and gatepost in the land. Just look closely at the lot of them and wonder are these the new miracle workers sent amongst us to save farming and to ensure the producers are paid a proper price for creating some of the finest food in the world.

On June 7th 450 million people in 27 countries will be entitled to vote in the EU elections and decide the makeup of the Parliament for next five years. This is also the first time the EU goes to the polls without the UK and for the first time since Covid, voters will be asked to make a decision that will be crucial for Ireland.

This constituency straddles the seaboard of the west of Ireland and your vote could be a bellwether for the general election which has to take place by March 22nd next year. It is pretty evident that there are big issues in this EU constituency and nationally there is a disconnect between farmers, food production and those representing us in the EU parliament. There are huge issues around new European regulations and the costs not being funded to any degree in meeting the projected farmer outlay.

Income and sustainability, and attracting a new generation into farming seems well beyond the chattering classes in politics. But in reality, this issue is at least thirty years old: now we are seeing a decline not only in numbers, but also in income for those struggling to make ends

The reality is that the EU candidates do not have any plausible solutions and within a 720 member parliament, we seem to lack the political power to achieve results to safe farming as a viable industry in this country.

But try telling the candidates whose profiles hang on every

Just look closely at the lot of them and wonder what are their key objectives to save farming and to ensure they are paid a proper price for producing some of the finest food in the world.

Can any of the candidates explain why the EU is not including these costs in the CAP Budget: it's already been heavily stripped back. But which candidate offers a real chance of recovering the money lost? Does any EU candidate have a coherent plan to get more young people to stay on the farm and what's the incentive for them to break their backs in compliance with EU regulations? In many ways the EU has failed to answer these awkward realities in Ireland's indigenous enterprises... farming so going the way of what was a lucrative fishing industry.

So who sold them out and why are the super trawlers just off the coastline hoovering up or fish?

It's true that we need a strong voice in Europe and an even stronger lobby group where a majority of our newly elected MEPs might join... any hope of that happening?

As of now there are seven political groups in the European Parliament. The largest of these is the European People's Party. However there is a distinct possibility of another new group emerging, and there is speculation that Fianna Fail is one of the interested parties that will consider a move away from 'The Renew Group' to a more liberal

A group must have 23 mem-

one-quarter of the EU Member States must be represented within the group.

The new parliament will meet on July 16th and talks may continue right up to the first plenary session and new groups may be formed. The meeting in Strasbourg will continue for three days where much of its initial agenda will be discussed.

Since 2019, Ireland's thirteen members have been aligned to the big lobby groups in the parliament and in many aspects that system, will remain with maybe one new group

However in the next three weeks you will hear many candidates put their case on the media and on the doorsteps as to what they can do individually.

Reading across the literature

from the main parties, I seem to reach that basic conclusion that things are quite the disaster and we've not had much luck or a proper voice for farmers... I notice there is no mention about the drastic state of Ireland's fishing industry that has collapsed since we joined the EU. Cast your mind back to 2019 EU elections: establishment parties took a hit as the Greens and the populist farright made significant gains. The UK still hadn't left the EU, with Nigel Farage's Brexit Party winning the day. Most people had never heard of a coronavirus.

Now in 2024, the EU's 27 countries are a very different

The war in Ukraine has delivered the kind of consequences and the catalogue of inflation nobody in politics ever dared to predict.

Now, voters across the EU will once again go to the polls between the four days of 6-9 June to send 720 new MEPs to Brussels and Strasbourg. Across the bloc, pro-EU politicians are worried as anti-union populist parties are predicted to top the polls in at least nine EU member states, and make significant gains elsewhere.

There has also been a strong kickback against the implementation of green policies, with farmers' groups in many countries holding widespread disruptive protests, and demanding changes to key EU nature restoration laws. In reality Ireland's fourteen new members will make up

1.9% of the Parliament and a lone voice will simply be whistling in the wind. So, if and when a candidate lands at your door telling a tall yarn about what they plan to do if elected, then it is wise to ignore that kind of chaff and select some other candidate that you can trust.

Inform your view by asking prospective MEP's which of the lobby groups they are planning to join and if its objectives are best served in promoting the Irish economy, farming and global warming. And if not satisfied with the spin, then search elsewhere because this is a crucial decision. The last thing we need is candidates splattering on about what they can do as if you need them to fill a pothole or get a blocked drain cleared.

The Fianna Fail and Fine Gael parties have long-standing participation in the EU. However, from hearing some of the claims from their candidates, you have to wonder what they've been doing in Brussels or Strasbourg for

forty five years. This is the largest and most diverse constituency Ireland has ever seen. From the heart of the Midlands and it central location, to the remote fishing ports and islands in Donegal: from lack of connectivity, not only to the EU but also to Dublin, very little has changed since Partition and the new issues facing the future of the EU are profound in egal and Mayo: these issue are all about. as old as the EU itself. Questions must be raised with the candidates about the future of farming: of convergence, of the CAP budget, the Nature Restoration Laws and its implications. And what about the suckler

herd in the West where traditional farming is in decline and what have the main parties done in Europe to halt this decline.

Do the candidates want to see more money from the Exchequer going into farming if CAP fails to resolve the funding needed to comply with emissions, loss of income and what will you do to promote agriculture's future in places like this county?

What are your plans to ensure that the producers get a fair payment for their hard work with a ceiling under the farmgate prices?



With every new election there are so many things that never change as candidates seeking election to the EU Parliament keep talking up their own capabilities to change the ways things are going to change... false dawns, false promises and fifty years of attempts to cut red tape have had the opposite impact.

Ireland's MEPs are in a number of groups: FG is part of the biggest group in the Parliament, 'The European People's Party: FF is in 'The Renew Group' however it is not vet certain whether they will remain there: Sinn Fein is part of the Left group: GUE/ NGL as are a number of Independent Left leaning MEPs and the Greens are in European Free Alliance.

So why not ask the prospective MEP's what their groups' alignment and if that is serving Ireland well... and if not, why not? After all, you may have to wait for another five years to see them again, if you are very

Farming and its future is high on the agenda if only due to changing weather conditions: rising temperatures impact on crop growth stages of the growing seasons. Rainfall and drought are predicted to result in flooding, reducing grass growth, fodder shortages, water shortages and the industry is being bombarded with predictions of gloom and doom.

In reality, Ireland's global footprint of 0.1% is so small as to be literally irrelevant. However, rising seas and coastal erosion is all around us, yet leading scientists are in disagreement about the reasons why. Farming is bearing the brunt of the accusations, yet this industry must prepare to feed another three billion people by 2050. Who else is prepared or equipped for that huge task or does the EU have a secret plan of their own to manage the crisis?

Once the results are confirmed the MEPs get down to negotiations to form political groups. These groups are cross-national groupings which broadly represent an MEP's domestic party's values and are filled with like-minded politicians. There are this remote heartland of Don- times that you have to wonder what that is

> The first task of the MEPs will be to elect a new President of the European Parliament. This is a sitting MEP usually from one of the biggest political groups whose job it is to preside over the debates and activities of the parliament. They serve a two and a half year term, so there are usually two presidents per parliament term.

> MEPs will also elect 14 Vice-Presidents and five Quaestors, these people oversee administrative and financial matters directly affecting MEPs and they will also vote on the composition of Parliament's standing committees and subcommittees, which will officially launch the new term.

The first committee meetings will then be held and each committee will elect its Chair and Vice-Chair.

Once all this is done, the committees selected, the work of the parliament will get underway. It is time for business to commence: but not before the summer holidays from the end of July to the beginning of September.

And they all are well-paid and there are no penalties if the MEPs don't deliver for Ireland and its rural heartland.

### **Sainsbury: Unions** to confront NWHB

for mental health in the north west is back in the news again this week after John Hayes the regional manager of the service said it is planned to go ahead with the proposals.

The statement from Hayes is presented through an 'inter office memorandum' which has not even been circulated to the nursing staff or their unions. However the Tribune has been handed three copies of the document in recent days.

The memo, for some inexplicable reason manages to avoid any mention of Sainsbury and nursing staff say this has become the latest policy with the Board. Instead the memo refers to the proposals as 'health board reform'.

This decision to plough ahead with the implementation of Sainsbury comes against strong opposition from the Unions and many of the elected members of the health board executive committee and a vote on the proposals has already been deferred twice.

It would now appear that the NWHB is embarking on a collision course with the unions since it is already well known that the SIPTU head office in Dublin will instruct its members 'not to lift a single finger' to implement Sainsbury.

The reasons given is that such a strategy will have major implications for the rest of the country and that there are ongoing concerns that these proposals will mean serious job losses especially at nursing lev-

At the same time nursing staff say that SIPTU officials have been mandated to ask Dr. Sharkey, the Clinical Director at Letterkenny to withdraw comments he made during a board meeting in March purporting to represent a point of view that a majority of staff supported Sainsbury.

Staff members in the mental health sector say they have their own representative on the board and they are totally opposed to the new proposals and the views expressed by Dr. Sharkey are in direct conflict with the facts. And they have pointed out this week that no member of the medical profession has any right or authority to speak on behalf of the nursing

Devenney is currently Vice-Chair of the prestigious Scots-Gaelic Agency appointed under the terms of the Good Friday Agreement.

Between '91 and the last local elections in '99 Jim Devenney represented the Donegal Progressive Party and he was the virtual lone voice for farming concerns on Donegal County Council and he made a very powerful contribution.

He now says he's coming under intense pressure once again to represent the agriculture lobby since the role of local authorities in the future will have much more relevance insofar as the EU farm agenda is concerned.

At the '99 election Devenney polled

a credible 11% and was on 1,229 votes. However he lost out on the sixth and final count when Jimmy Harte FG on 1840: Dessie Larkin with 1,713 and Sean Maloney on 1,656 were deemed elected without reaching the quota.

In fact Devenney's vote including transfers had reached a total of 1,462: he was a mere 194 votes behind Maloney at that stage However he had reached the end of the road and he would have needed a much stronger share of the transfers to be in real contention. In fact Maloney had a transfer of 291 as against 126 for Devenney.


With Maloney opting out of the equation it is possible the Devenney could pick up some of his votes but as yet that situation is much to fluid to call.




three day event will see the top Irish 150 dogs and their handlers qualify for the Irish team for the International in September 2024.



On Sunday in Clones, Jim McGuinness guided Donegal to Ulster Senior Football Championship glory just nine months after returning as manager. It completed a double for the Glenties native in 2024 having already won the Division 2 league title. And as he said afterwards there is only one other trophy left to play for this summer. Full focus on the All-Ireland Series began this week with the first group game on Sunday week against Tyrone in Ballybofey. Sunday's decider against Armagh came down to very fine margins with Donegal eventually getting over the line thanks to Shaun Patton's sudden death penalty save.

There was really very little to choose between the sides over the 96 plus minutes in Clones. The shakiest spell for McGuinness's outfit was in the period leading up to the 50th minute of the second half when they fell four points behind the Orchard County. But as they had done against Tyrone, the Donegal men showed real resilience notching five points courtesy of Niall O'Donnell, Oisin Gallen (free), Jason McGee and Paddy McBrearty to draw level at 0-15 each with seven minutes of normal time

interval in extra-time including points from Andrew Murnin and Aidan Nugent. McBrearty from a free and Jeaic McKelvey were on target for Donegal. On the restart Peader Mogan drew the sides level again before Armagh went two points in front. But again that sheer tenacity allied with composure saw McGuinness's side force the decider





In the annual, Martin McGinley traces Samuel's upbringing in Ramelton and details his business success in the US and travels throughout the world.


This is the Society's 76th annual, and it's a treasure trove of fascinating information and stories from right across the county.
