"Milford Cllrs must buy-in to attend meetings"

With reference to "As a result of one Member not likely to be in the Council Chamber, we've been left facing an uphill battle in fighting our corner. And we are losing out because that is how things work and we do not have the necessary

Proof of this is that in the foreseeable future there are only ten social houses planned for the Milford area.

This electoral area is left with a serious loss of revenue, be it in housing, roads, infrastructure in project delivery and we've also lost a Board Member on DLDC," he stated.

He said he does not understand why any Cllr. would be absent from meetings on so many occasions.

"I do not have answers, but there has to be a better way. We

need to get a 'signed volved in the concommitment' from the three new Councillors that they will attend all our Council meetings. What's been happening is ridiculous. While almost all the electoral areas have a strong presence in meetings, I cannot say the same for Milford. We are the smallest area and that needs three very strong voices at all our meetings."

Whilst not naming representative, Cllr. Blaney presumes the process of elimination should inform the electorate. He points to his own strong presence at Council meetings and he wishes that all others could do likewise.

Cllr. Blaney has also moved to clarify the Council works on the new footpath from Milford's main street out the Kilmacren-Road where nan €365,000 has been spent.

Cllr. Blaney said: "Part of a field instruction of the new footpath had earlier been donated by a private landowner to the SVP to build social housing. However, since this was not suitable ground, it was then handed over to a subcommittee of the original Milford IRD which became the current MDRC.

First of all I got a motion through the MD meeting and that was accepted by the plenary meeting in Lifford. And we were lucky in that Milford was then chosen as the 'location of choice' for the Town First Project.

Along the way, two government Ministers, Joe McHugh and Charlie McConalogue were instrumental in negotiations with Social Protection Minister Heather Humphreys in the provision of $\in 100,000$ as the first phase of the project. And the Council Contd. Page 39



Calls reiterated for N56 access - McClafferty

The failure to allow access to potential home builders along the N56 is helping drive emigration and negatively impacting local employment opportunities, it has been claimed.

Cllr McClafferty said many people are being denied the right to live near their home area and is creating "a negative atmosphere" across the region.

He said he is calling, yet again, for access for those local people seeking to build homes along the road-

He stated: "I am renewing my efforts to lobby for access to the N56 to be granted. It is critical that the N56 retains its planning status and remains accessible without any

imposed restrictions. Such restrictions are creating a negative atmosphere in the county and are contributing to the emigration of our residents to distant places. This has a major impact on our local economy, as it means we are losing many of our skilled residents.

He added: "The County Development Plan seeks a population growth to 183,500 people by 2031 and upwards of 200,000 by 2040. How are these targets achievable when current restrictions are encouraging Donegal residents to emigrate?

He said those wishing to build in areas along the N56 can strengthen family ties and also retain a skilled

workforce.

He stated: "The government is denying people the opportunity to live on their own land and near their families, which is eroding family ties to certain areas. It adds additional pressure on home builders, as they cannot use their own sites and face the financial burden of having to purchase new sites. The construction of local houses is crucial for the construction sector in Donegal, which is a significant source of employment for us. By denying the right to build houses on their land and encouraging emigration, people are opting to construction their homes elsewhere and we are losing employment opportunities'

Council spends €15.2m extra

Last year the Council spent €15.2 million more than was agreed in the annual Revenue Budget which was adopted in 2022. The amended figures were revealed during a Council meeting in Lifford on Monday.

So the actual spend in 2023 was €192,882,000 compared to €175,555,907 which was agreed at the Budget meeting in November 2023. Cllrs were told that the increase is accounted for by the extra money the Council were in the position to draw down in grants.

Over €9 million of that figure was spent on maintaining and improving roads, while over €1.5 million was allocated to housing

Head of Finance Richard Gibson also told Monday's meeting that the Local Authority ran a surplus of €1.2m in 2023. That surplus allowed the Council to do additional extra capital works in

the county.

Cllrs were also told that €1 million was transferred from Revenue to Capital last year to co-fund energy efficiency works at Council buildings, €500,000 was transferred from Revenue to provide additional funding for Public Conveniences capital works and €100,000 was transferred from Revenue to provide extra resources for Disability Access works.

Donegal retains 12 Blue Flag beaches

Donegal has retained all 12 of its Blue Flag beaches, it has been announced. They are Killahoey, Marble Hill, Downings, Portsalon, Bundoran, Rossnowlagh, Murvagh, Fintra, Naran/Portnoo, Carrickfinn, Culdaff and Stroove.

In total 85 Beaches and nine marinas were awarded the Blue Flag for 2024. The Blue Flag awarded to Greencastle Marina in 2023 was withdrawn by Donegal County Council in July 2023 as construction works at the harbour on a breakwater necessitated closure of the seasonal marina there. There was no application for Greencastle Marina for 2024, it was stated.

Disability day service charge being reviewed

A query over a €4 daily charge for disability day service users in the HSE area that includes Cavan, Donegal, Leitrim, Monaghan, Sligo has been raised by Cllr Ciaran Brogan.

He raised the matter at a recent Regional Health Forum West meeting.

He asked: "Can the HSE remove the €4 daily charge for service users who attend their disability day service in CHO 1 area? This charge is not formally charged to all disability day service users in the CHO 1 area nor is it applied to disability users outside of this area."

Dermot Monaghan, Chief Officer, Community Healthcare Organisation, for Cavan, Donegal, Leitrim, Monaghan, Sligo responded saying the matter was under review.

He stated: "The Chief Officer of Community Healthcare, Cavan Donegal Leitrim Monaghan Sligo (CH CDLMS) attended a meeting on the 3rd May with Disability service users, an Advocacy Liaison person and senior HSE Disability Service Managers. An in-depth and forthright discussion took place and the points raised are now subject to further discussion within the HSE. The matter of the charge is currently under review by CH CDLMS."

Covid enquiry: Red faces in the North

There have been some red faces in the DUP over the past week. Embarrassing WhatsApp messages between DUP Ministers and advisors were published. This was not the best way to mark 100 days of the Executive. I have to say they have been excellent on presentation. Unfortunately, delivery has been less excellent. The messages got below the surface. They show the parties still don't get

Sinn Féin has not suffered quite so much embarrassment. I would advise them, though, not to congratulate themselves too much. Michelle O'Neill wiped her phone. This was against legal advice.

All is coming out at the Northern leg of the British Government's inquiry into Covid.

While Sinn Féin avoided embarrassing messages coming out, unprecedented events happened.

Michelle O'Neill and former Culture, Arts and Leisure Minister Cearál Ní Chuilín both gave abject apologies. Clearly, that was a party

As we know, apologising is not in the nature of Sinn Féin. One of their advantages has been confidence. That was the big advantage over their Nationalist rivals, the SDLP. The SDLP didn't seem to know what it was doing.

Sometimes Sinn Féin confidence becomes a problem. They forget the central rule. When in a hole, stop digging.

O'Neill and Ní Chuilín's apologies were for attending the funeral of senior IRA member Bobby Storey. Storey died four years ago. Thus his funeral was at the height of the Covid pandemic. There were strict restrictions on attending funerals. However, mainstream Republicans organised a large funeral. Part of this the voters were unhappy.

was the arrogance, which bursts out from time to time. As significant, though was politics. The funeral was a message to dissident Republicans. If they challenged the IRA and Sinn Féin they would be crushed. The mainstream still had the numbers to do so.

At the time of the funeral, O'Neill was firm. She said: "I will never apologise for attending the funeral of a friend." Last week was different. She said: "My actions compounded the hurt, my actions also angered families. I am sorry for going and I am sorry for the hurt that's been caused." The Chair of the Inquiry asked her if she was aware of the hurt and anger she had caused. O'Neil replied: "I didn't and I ought to have."

Ní Chuilín had also apologised the previous week. She said: "I attended the funeral of my dear friend Bobby Storey in a personal capacity, and I accept that in doing so I caused hurt to families who lost a loved one during the pandemic. I apologise for the hurt caused by my actions."

O'Neill and Ní Chuilín are both seen as very careful. Neither is likely to speak carelessly. Obviously, Sinn Féin strategists had realised defending the Storey funeral was untenable. Yes, a hard core of true believers would defend anything. But many of

Those weren't the only dramatic events. Arlene Foster did her best to upstage them. She showed her famous temper. The barrister for the inquiry asked if she had sleepwalked into Covid. Then the barrister pressed for a straight answer. Foster's reply was: "Well, it is an answer. It's the answer I'm giving to the inquiry," She was asked about the famous statement from Agriculture Minister Edwin Poots. Poots infamously said Covid was more common in Catholic areas. Her tone about Poots was more dismissal than praise. She said: "Edwin is very much his own person in terms of his opinions, however it's not a view I shared and he knew it was not a view I shared - and indeed it wasn't a view shared by the other DUP ministers either."

Poots was later to lead a coup against her. Then he was to be himself dumped within weeks. This gave just another interesting look into the DUP. Like Sinn Féin, the DUP likes to present itself as united. Foster's answer showed divisions existed. It also showed that Poots was too powerful to be sacked.

message he said: "I see on (Press Association) Archbishop Eamonn Martin is writing to me urging me to close all the schools. Wasn't aware of his qualifications in virology." He later called her: "Mad Mallon". The Inquiry also brought out the problem with the North's political structures. The DUP used the cross-community veto to stop some Covid restrictions. The cross-community veto was seen as a strength of the Good Friday Agreement. Nationalists particularly welcomed it. They felt it gave protection from Unionist misrule. But it has been completely abused. Covid restrictions in no way disadvantaged Protestants. They were advantaged, like everybody else. And the political paralysis disadvantaged all.

Ramelton Hospital due "major refurbishment"

Ramelton Community Hospital is in line for a works in 2023 and plans are progressing in ormajor refurbishment in 2025, a meeting of the Regional Health Forum heard recently.

The news came in answer to a question by Cllr Ciaran Brogan.

He asked: "Can I have an updated report on the current status of the proposed new community nursing units of the the following hospitals and what plan's / services we envisage having and the numbers of staff provided to meet the needs of their respective patients and communities Ballyshannon, Stranolar, Lifford and Ramelton and a timeframe to the programme?"

Dermot Monaghan, Chief Officer, Community Healthcare Organisation, for Cavan, Donegal, Leitrim, Monaghan, Sligo, explained the work is planned for next year.

He stated: "Ramelton Community Hospital has undergone fire upgrade works/refurbishment der to provide a major refurbishment in 2025. Staffing numbers in all locations are aligned to residents assessed care needs and in line with safe staffing guidelines."

He also outlined in Ballyshannon Community Hospital their new building was officially opened this April, and 26 residents relocated from the Rock Nursing Unit in February. It is envisaged that a 20 bed short stay unit and an additional 13 bed long term care bed unit will open in Quarter 3 2024. Staff recruitment is ongoing at present for these units.

When fully operational this new hospital will have capacity for 80 beds, which consist of 52 long-stay beds and 20 short stay beds providing convalescence, rehabilitation, respite and palliative care beds, and a further eight Dementia specific assessment beds and a Day Hospital Service.

In relation to St. Joseph's Community Hospital he said it remains a 63 bedded Unit and provides the same services as provided in Ballyshannon Community Hospital for all residents. Staffing numbers are dependent on residents assessed needs and in line with safe staffing guidelines.

He added, "HSE Estates have received Capital approval for a new 25 short stay bed Community Hospital, alongside a New Primary Care building on a greenfield site in Lifford, which is currently owned by Donegal County Council (DCC). First stage tenders have been received for the full design team for both these new builds and now await second stage tender documents to be prepared for issue to the Design



The language of tears

I came across a set of photographs of tears taken using a microscope. They are fascinating to look at; vastly different in their detail and patterns, like looking down at changing landscapes from an aeroplane. The photographer, Rose-Lynn Fisher, has pictures of tears from all sorts of circumstances: tears of happiness, grief, pain, reminiscing, tears caused by irritation or for lubrication, and many other sorts - each like a unique work of art.

Some are jagged and angular, some are densely detailed, like an aerial view of the Amazon rainforest. Others pictures are sparse in their detail, yet others square and block-like like a city plan. I love how she describes them as "aerial views of emotion terrain." Our tears are mostly salt water but contain a variety of substances - including enzymes, oils, antibodies, hormones, and even natural painkillers the body releases under stress. Each of these seems to impact the detail.

All this brought to mind a verse in Psalm 6. The songwriter is at the end of his tether, he says his "I flood my bed with weeping... my eyes grow weak with sorrow". Perhaps you know that feeling. But what really struck me was what he said next: "the Lord has heard the sound of my weeping" The Hebrew language is picturesque. The word translated 'sound' also means 'voice' - the Lord heard the voice of my weeping. God understands the language of tears. He is fluent in it. Of course, as God, he knows all things instantly, but there is something richer, closer, more personal about this way of putting it. And perhaps we need to be reminded of that. Sometimes people think of God as unapproachable, cold, distant. Perhaps like that detached and pristine parent who when their child comes with tears running down their cheeks pushes them away so they don't mess up their own clothes. As if God isn't interested in the mess and messiness of our lives.

But Psalm 6 paints a different picture. It's the picture of a God we can come to, tears and all - a soggy mess of emotion and pain - and he won't push us away. We should let our pain bring us to God, rather than push us away. When we go to God with our pain, we'll find that he offers a much richer, deeper answer than simply wiping our tears away, patting us on the head and telling us to run on. He offers us a place in his family, to be our Father who will work all things for the good of his children so that even our most tearfilled moments will work out for good. In order to make that offer, God the Son had to become a "man of sorrows and acquainted with grief" (Isaiah 53:3). That's why he knows the language of tears. And it's to God the Son, Jesus Christ, that we must go for this richer deeper answer to our tears. Let your tears bring you to Christ, and the God who heals the broken-hearted and makes the wounded live. Mark Loughridge is one of the ministers in Milford

27 objections lodged over Creeslough Supermarket

Donegal County Council have detailed 27 submissions objecting to the proposed redevelopment of the Creeslough Supermarket. The owners of the shop recently unveiled plans to redevelop the petrol station and shop at the site where 10 people died tragically in an explosion in October 2022.

Planning permission was lodged by Vivo Shell Limited with Donegal County Council seeking the demolition of existing building and erection of new building which will incorporate a class 1 commercial building including shop, post office, off-licence, store, deli, toilets including accessible toilets, staff welfare facilities and forecourt.



A Rathmullan Woman in exile...

The Garden of Eden has vanished they say...

The two horses that I sent to the sales on the bank hollier Monday were successfully sold, thanks entirely to Rachel and Ed. It's a relief to be down in the numbers and down in the workload that they entail.

I'm looking forward to doing work with my single remaining young horse and to enjoying my time with the pensioners. It's a pleasure to see the old horses and Jenny the jinnet relaxing and basking in the warm sunshine after the long winter. They have all given long lives of loyal service and pleasure to many people and I'm proud to be able to allow them to have a safe, comfortable end to their days.

When the weather did finally give in and brighten up I dedicated the business end of a week to getting the gardening in order. I cleared out beds and planted in about a hundred strawberry cuttings, I suppose there'll be a deluge of fruit all at the same time, but sure I can give them to friends and freeze the rest. I'm setting no cabbages this year because I'm fed up to the tonsils (if I had any) doing endless losing battle with the slugs and caterpillars. Himself can buy a cabbage if he wants it and I'll plant bug proof flowers in the soil that will give pleasure for months. The only veggies I planted this year are spuds, tomatoes and lettuces; every other nook and cranny has handfuls of mixed flower seeds thrown in to take their chances. Everything is so late this year that I couldn't be bothered with many veggies; I hope we get a good back end to lengthen the season at the other end.

I had Himself in Newry with the dentist a couple of weeks ago. His few remaining teeth and his falsies were giving bother and as he was due for a sojourn in the Bon Secour the following week it was essential that he get the gob in order. Thankfully the rain let up and it was a grand trip both ways, although there was no noticeable improvement in the teeth department afterwards.

I left him into the Bons on the Monday and collected him the Friday afternoon after a week's poking and prodding. It was great to have the place to myself for a while. I could eat when I liked, not tied to dinner at one o'clock and tea at six. I could leave the front door open till I went to bed without any complaints about draughts. I got the range cleaned out and the floors swept and hoovered and they stayed clean for the week. just up the road outside Oldcastle. I think I

The telly plug was pulled out of the socket and didn't go in again till Himself returned. I read and listened to music, and this time I also got quite a bit of wood carving done. I love to work away to the smell of timber and the sound of music; I find it very absorbing and relaxing, sort of like meditation or mindfulness. It was a lovely oasis of peace and quiet. Jim had a rare four hour block of care for Herself a couple of weeks ago so we headed to Tullynally Castle and Gardens outside Castlepollard. It's quite a big castle or fortified house, the home of Thomas Packenham (Earl of Longford) and the guided tour was fascinating, if somewhat chilly in parts. He is the author of many books, including The Scramble for Africa, which I remember from home. One of the other guests on the tour spotted a piece of equipment on a mantelpiece in the great hall and asked our guide Joe if it was for some Morse code type communication. Joe had no idea what it was and promised to find out. I was quite chuffed with my little old self because I recognised it as a barograph for measuring barometric pressure. There used to be one in my grandfather's study when I was knee high to a grasshopper. Come to think of it, I haven't seen or heard a grasshopper in about 40 years. Are they extinct?

The day was perfect; hot, dry and breezy and it was lovely to stroll through the castle gardens before adjourning to the tea rooms in the stable yard for refreshments. We thoroughly enjoyed our few hours respite from the daily grind and hope for more outings if Jim can get care for Herself. It was only fifteen miles from Mountnugent, practically on the doorstep, but it took me 26 years to get there. We're planning our next trip to Loughcrew Gardens,

was there about 25 years ago but I have almost no recollection of it so I could be imagining things. That happens with age.

I was gone to work at 7.30 the following morning so didn't see him before he left, but I intend going up to Rathmullan next week, so I'll see him again then. Himself is murmuring

about venturing north as soon as the weather remains warm enough for him. That will officially herald the start of summer, though if last Saturday's cold, northerly breeze was anything to go by, he may sit tight for a while yet. There's a great whim of work taking place on my house build these weeks. The domestic water pipes and the floor insulation are being fitted before the under-floor heating goes down and the floors are poured. I must have the best team of tradesmen in Ireland; I couldn't fault one of them. They come when they say they will and do their work quickly and efficiently and, above all, they communicate with each other and co-ordinate the work perfectly.

Last Sunday was a pet day with the sun belting down at 22 degrees and not a wisp of a cloud in the sky. I had the garden up to scratch, my latest wood carving was at a stage that I was happy with, there was nothing pressing to do so I snared Jim for an hour and we had an ice-cream and a lovely stroll along the river Inny in Finea. It's a nice little village just seven or eight miles away in Westmeath, with the claim to fame that it is mentioned in the Percy French song, "Come Back Paddy Reilly to Ballyjamesduff."

"The Garden of Eden has vanished they say But I know the lie of it still Just turn to the left at the bridge of Finea And stop when halfway to Cootehill." The only slight difficulty there is that there is no turn to the left at the bridge except for an old bog lane some distance from the bridge. Maybe in Percy French's day it was a well travelled highway, but I wouldn't fancy my chances now in much more than an ass and cart. Did you know that donkeys are asinine creatures; like dogs are canine and horses are equine? That's where the name "ass" comes from. Just another bit of useless information!

Without Cllrs. the Cardiac Cath Lab would have gone

April 2022 - The Fight for the Cath Lab in LUH. The Donegal Cllrs. on the Western Health Forum played a key role. Ciaran Brogan was the first politician to back the Tribune story....

He was also the last and the only one to recognise the campaign in the paper when a successful outcome was confirmed. Behind the scenes there was a massive battle to recognise the rights of LUH and the people of Donegal to have this vital service close to home.

Let us never forget that this means life for so many...

One of the most talked about topics in Donegal politics right now is the Council Elections while the EU campaign seems many miles distant. And on social media and indeed on record by some candidates, there is the view being spun that the Cllrs do nothing and it is time to put new names and new faces into office because the existing ones have done nothing these five years.

This is a campaign like no other because there is an evident anger on the doorsteps that is driven primarily by social media and a false narrative without any clarity or substance.

It is also a campaign with record numbers of candidates including this county where more than ninety are running. They all deserve a fair hearing and in return, they have the added responsibility in not creating false presumptions, hoping the electorate might be persuaded to accept an agenda with no substance or knowledge of how local government works. Being an elected Member of a Local Authority is a long, arduous and tedious process grinding out the best returns for the electorate. So many successful candidates have entered the Town Halls of this country hoping to change the Council in one fell swoop. How disappointed have they been because this is a collaborative process where many of the decisions are beyond the power of the Chief Executives.

Because of the system that governs how local authorities work, results do not come easily and it is a time consuming and laboured process. And after years of putting down the same motion, I can understand the frustration of the Members and those that elected them when there are no results

However, Councils do not have pots of gold at the end of the rainbow. Cllrs must adopt a revenue budget for the county and one the ratepayers can afford. SME's were never more stretched for finances and for keeping their doors open. How many of those seeking Council seats actually know what the revenue budget is or how it is accumulated in the first instance?

There are so many ill-informed and abusive comments out there, and prospective Cllrs may find themselves being elected after June 7th and they'll not have a clue what hit them. The very notion that new names can instantly deliver for Donegal is self-serving and self-centred because it ignores the reality that the Council's 37 members work with the Executive to get the best deal possible. Really, nobody in Donegal expects miracles or a new Messiah to pop and deliver the goods

How many candidates actually believe their own versions of reality and how they can change the way Donegal County Council works? Because the way the Council works is through central government. After the 1997 general election, the government dumped household rates and car tax... It seemed like a pretty stupid idea... and it still is. Because the finances required to fill the loss of rates has never been fully addressed other than asking Councils to do more for less availability of money. Of course it goes without saying that elections are there for a definite purpose every five years, new members with new ideas are alway welcome and needed. They must convince the public to come out and vote to elect the best possible team for the coming five years: a period that will challenge local politicians with huge changes and the national government with having to confront how they can address the housing and health crises on top of many new developments.

However, one has to assume that all those nominated already have a fair idea of what's involved and how that work is set out under the structures of the Minister for the Environment. Because it is the Minister who sets out the system by which Councils run their administrations.,

Being a member of a local authority comes with a demand for hard work and experience serving the community: a desire to serve the electorate in a manner that is laid down under Standing Orders in Council Chambers or wherever meetings are held. Councillors in the Chamber in Lifford are on the first rung of responsibility where the Members work to ensure a fair deal for the electorate against an ongoing background that central government's funding to this county is woefully inadequate. Look no further than the already obsolete legislation of this current government to put in place a 100% remedial redress scheme fit for purpose.

Why do you think that mica homeowners have been forced to register their own political party in the campaign for justice, fair play and equality? Do not tell me the people living in damaged homes: the Mica Action Group, the Cllrs and others in the Oireachtas and the MEP's did not try... and try again! The fact that they have done their best with determined campaigns of lobbying, research and two huge public meetings in Dublin were ignored. That really showed that Donegal doesn't really matter in a Dublin centric govern-

More recently our 'Comment Page' headline read 'How to get to Buncrana from Brussels' as a thousand people packed the Gateway Hotel on the Inishowen Peninsula without any Oireachtas voice from Fianna Fail. Is that not taking the people for granted, is it not? The fact is that there is a 'permanent government' of civil servants who effective-

The fact is that there is a 'permanent government' of civil servants who effectively are highly paid to manage department budgets, make the big calls and no government seems, either willing or able to confront the fact that once every five years, the electorate votes for what they believe to be change, real progressive

changes in how issues like health, housing, the infrastructure, and the nation's finances are managed.

Can you imagine that once upon a time Government Ministers made the decisions. Were that not the case can you imagine Donagh O'Malley announcing free education in Ireland? The civil servants were hearing the good news for the first time when O'Malley confirmed the decision.

Can you imagine the orgasms of disbelief on September 10th 1966 when FF's Donagh O'Malley, the Education Minister famously made his unauthorised speech announcing plans for free upper second-level education in Ireland.

Back in the day, the role of the permanent government was to manage how to pay for these fundamental changes in Irish society and to ensure the Ministerial decision was delivered. Actually life in Ireland right now is about more mundane things: like the politicians being guided every step of the way by the secretaries general of the various departments.

And every one of the Ministers reading from a carefully choreographed piece of copy on Morning Ireland. James McDaid was the exception. When he came to make any announcement in Donegal, he took the script from his pocket.... before throwing it in the nearest rubbish bin.

Those were the days my friends when common sense prevailed, Donegal has fought many campaigns and the battles will continue because that is what living in Donegal is all about. We love this remote and wondrous landscape - proud of place and time to reside here and this newspaper is privileged to go that extra mile as part of the lobby infrastructure to get a better deal from the government at all levels. I recall being out on the road to cover a story on the afternoon of Good Friday 2022 and getting an urgent call on the mobile and being advised the information being provided was placed in my trust to put it the public record in the next edition of the Tribune. Being the Easter Bank Holiday I was acutely aware that contact with the real world seemed to be suspended, indefinitely. In the brief conversation I suddenly became aware that the loss of the vital cardiac cath lab weekly service at LUH was imminent. Galway was to be

the future option.
'Get the details out immediately,' I was warned.



I had learnt from previous encounters with officialdom that when in doubt, do the simple thing: but do it well because there may not be a second chance.

Attempts to seek responses from officialdom were never going to be answered. So what the hell, this is a story that must be told and it was a bare knuckle experience for our readers.

It was our first inkling that LUH and the people of Donegal were under threat of losing a valued service.

While the information was never going to be confirmed as definite, why should that stop us?

Because of the imminent closure of the cardiac cath lab service, we took the decision to publish the story across our front page in the following edition... and all others until the service became permanent.

Many readers simply did not believe what they were reading... not for the first time. And forever more the people of Donegal have good reasons to thank those politicians that made this possible.

"Why has LUH and HSE never recognised that the €750,000 donated to the Friends was for a Cardiac Cath Lab and that it was raised by donations to ensure the necessity of heart procedures within Donegal?

That might be a good starting point to recognise the reality of this fundraising initiative." So ran an extract of our coverage.

As we depended on further clarification from sources, we were not assured that it was a battle that could be won. But trusting our own instincts, the Cllrs and many others, it was going to be a fight to the finish. Many sources were involved and we kept the story running until it was finally resolved.

The Donegal Cllrs. on the Western Health Forum played a key role. Ciaran Brogan was the first politician to back our story.... He was also the last and the only one to recognise the campaign in the Tribune when a successful outcome was delivered.

Behind the scenes there was a massive battle to recognise the rights of LUH and the people of Donegal to have this vital service close to home.

Never, never say our county councillors are not working hard for all of us. As far back as when Simon Harris was Health Minister, he was being urged to extend the cardiac catheterisation laboratory services at Sligo University Hospital.

The fact that Letterkenny's Cath Lab was retained was great news and especially for The Friends of the Hospital who had previously raised €750,000 to facilitate the purchase of the equipment,

The cardiac services in LUH are greatly enhanced with the lab and long may their lifesaving work continue to benefit the people of this county.

And for those that continue to say that the Western Health Forum is a talking shop: stop and think again. Had the outworkings of the Forum and the subsequent plans not appeared in the Tribune, there is every good reason to believe the service would have been taken out of Donegal.

Meanwhile out on the campaign trail we wish fair weather to every candidate. However it is vital to put on record the work of locally elected Councillors and to recognise their valued service before we dismiss any one of them as being... useless and doing nothing for the past five years.

In basic terms, this is quite the lie of this campaign.

Swilly Rovers to mark 1974 youth title triumph

out to be yet another very memorable match in the checkered history of Swilly Rovers Football Club. Their U16s had reached the final of the first ever official Donegal junior competition.

It was a decider against near neighbours Letterkenny Rovers and to add much prestige to occasion the game was staged at Finn Park the home of Harps who the previous month had won the FAI Senior Cup for the first and as it turns out the only time in the club's history to date. Now both Swilly and Harps are celebrating the 50th anniversaries of their respective successes.

Church Street native Dessie Diver who was the team captain is the man that has literally got the ball rolling for this trip down memory lane and the response from the 14 players and management has been very encouraging meaning a reunion is being planned with a date to be confirmed shortly. It was the very first year of the Donegal Youth League so the winners in the inaugural year wrote themselves into the history books. Swilly managed by Hugh Diver and assisted by the late Brendan Duffy

Saturday 25th May 1974 turned were the winners of the U16 age also went to play for Finn Harps. The Carrigy. category after an epic battle with Letterkenny Rovers that went to extra-time with the decider tied at 2-2. John McDaid had given Swilly a 2-0 lead but Rovers roared back.

> The Ramelton outfit turned on the turbo in the early stages of extra-time with McDaid completing his hat-trick with a wonder strike from the left wing at the clubhouse end of the ground. Back came Letterkenny with an equaliser from captain Joe Devine. However, just when it seemed it was going to take penalty kicks to decide the outcome a 14-year-old boy beat the off-side trap to race clear and slot home what proved to be the winner.

> That boy was none other Con McLaughlin who would go on to score over a 100 goals at Finn Park during a stellar senior career for Harps in the League of Ireland. Castle Street native Con was one of three brothers along with his older sibling Denis and youngest of them Liam also went on to play for Harps. There were also two Sweeney brothers Sean and Gary from Castle Street in the squad while another set of siblings were Dessie Diver who played and his brother Hugh who was the manager.

> Sean Boyle from St. Mary's Terrace

goalkeeper was John Bryant from Ballylin now resident in Shannon, Co. Clare. Castle Street was very well represented with Hugh McCahill, Hugo Doherty, Sean Logan and Dessie Diver all on the team. The hat-trick hero John McDaid hailed from Swilly Park and is now resident in Milford. John McBride and Joe McHugh were the two Milford boys in the squad.

Hugh Diver was the manager while still playing at senior level with Swilly. The late Brendan Duffy of Aughnish Road was the assistant manager, a man who played his part in the successful history of Swilly Rovers F.C. having been a member of the first team from the County to win the FAI Junior Cup in 1962 and he repeated that achievement in 1967. Brendan went on to play senior soccer for Sligo Rovers. Duffy and Hugh Diver had the team well prepared for the U16 Final and they got off to a good start with John Mc-Daid putting Swilly ahead midway through the first half after being set up by Con McLaughlin. It got even better early in the second-half when McDaid doubled the Ramelton side's advantage when he raced onto a Sean Logan through ball to shoot past Letterkenny keeper Jim

But, Letterkenny got a lifeline when

Swilly then came mighty close to making sure of the silverware in normal time when McDaid's fine strike was cleared off the line by Letterkenny defender George Cullen. There was a frantic climax to the final at Finn Park as the boys from the Cathedral Town equalised seven minutes from the end of normal time when Kevin Kennedy headed home a George Cullen corner to make it 2-2. There was almost another twist just before the final whistle when Sean Sweeney headed wide from a corner.

50 years after captaining Swilly Rovers to

Dessie Diver who was the Swilly Rovers team captain on the 25th of May 1974 and is now organising

in a long time. I have been away for 40 years myself. After going to college in Coleraine I moved to Dublin and then Kildare. It was a big thing for Swilly to win that final in the first year of the league. We had grown up listening to the stories of the FAI Junior Cup successes. Ramelton was a soccer mad town with the summer cups so as young boys we were part of that" Diver said.

To win that decider and defeat their arch rivals from the big town of Letterkenny was extra special. "There was always a big rivalry between us so it was a nice one to win. The nucleus of the team was from the town of Ramelton mostly from Church Street where I was born and Castle Street. Just John McBride and Joe McHugh were from Milford. To play the final at Finn Park was just great a month after Harps won the FAI Senior Cup. And for me and a couple of the other players we actually played twice there in the one week. On the Wednesday we won the U16 Donegal Schools Final with Loreto Milford and then on the Saturday it was the Donegal Youth title with Swilly. We used to go up most Sundays to watch Harps play in the League of Ireland" Diver said. That Swilly Rovers team produced players who went to play at youth level for Ulster and win a national title with Donegal under the management of Killea native Richie Kelly who had strong ties with the Ramelton club for many years. Recalling the build-up to the final on the 25th May 1974, Dessie Diver said there was a big excitement as Swilly successfully negotiated the group stages to reach the

first ever Donegal U16 Youth Final. "There was big support for us with families and neighbours all getting behind us and a big crowd went to the final from the town. My brother Hugh was the manager and the late Brendan Duffy was assisting him. It was a great feeling to be captain and pick up the cup for the team. There was a nice homecoming in Ramelton and a drive around the town with the cup. We all then went off to the Lagoon to celebrate" Dessie said. He says there are huge changes in the way football is played now compared to five decades ago. "It was much more spontaneous back then. There was very little in the way of tactics. You just went out and played. As little boys we had started to play on the streets and then at U10 and U12 our coach was the late Charlie 'Chuck' Doherty but again it wasn't tactical. Later in the 1970s coaching did come in a bit more with the likes of Richie Kelly coming down and John Jarman who used to be involved with Wolves used to take us for coaching weekends in Letterkenny. Those were great times in Ramelton with the Sum-

mer Cups at Swilly Park. We had big games

with the likes of Fanad Utd and the Derry




