Ringing endorsement for Peoples Document

of the Mica Action Group said the fact that a thousand people came to the Inishowen Gateway Hotel on Tuesday to universally approve The Peoples' Document is a ringing endorsement for the campaign.

"That is testament that huge progress is being made in finding a solution to the crisis that has destroyed people's homes and their lives and this is a campaign that cannot be allowed to fail the people," he stated.

He was happy with the political response and numbers of issues were raised that will be followed to a conclusion by the Leaders Group within MAG.

He also welcomed the contributions from the politicians and noted that they had three full weeks to keep the date of the Buncrana meeting clear in their diaries.

Asked if the absence of a number of Oireachtas Members was significant he said that was their problem and it does not in any way

diminish the great response from the people of Donegal or the families forced to live in damaged homes.

Sinn's Fein's Padraig MacLochlainn and Pearse Doherty sought confirmation that the big corporate developers and others would be prevented from 'cashing in' on the deal for Mica Redress.

Michael Doherty (pictured right) told the Tribune these were points well made and would be fully developed and addressed in good time for the general elections.

Declan Kerr was among the huge crowd for the two and a half hours meeting.

He writes, "While there was universal endorsement of the document across the political divide and plenty of promises of its delivery the Committee is certainly taking nothing for granted. Michael Doherty said there were no signs that the current Government is going to make changes to the scheme adding that at departmental level the objective ap-



peared to make the process as difficult as possible for the homeowners.

Doherty said a change of Government appeared the only hope of delivering a true 100% Redress Scheme. Sinn Fein were represented at the meeting by their two Donegal TDs Padraig MacLochlainn and Pearse Doherty who both pledged to make the Peoples Document a priority if they form part of the next Government. Also in attendance were Deputies Joe McHugh of Fine Gael and Thomas Pringle who also endorsed the document. McHugh said he had lost the Party Whip

over his stance that the scheme was not fit for purpose and had been effectively 'butchered'. He told the meeting that when his initial six-month expulsion had expired he was invited back into the Party by Taoiseach Leo Varadkar but had declined as there was no scheme.

Among the Cllrs in attendance were Pauric McGarvey, Michael McClafferty, Michael McBride, Kevin Bradley, Martin McDermott, Paul Canning, Johnny McGuinness, Martin Farren, Barry Sweeney, Nicholas Crossan, Gerry Mc-Monagle, Albert Doherty, Jack Murray and Terry Crossan. That meant that issues regarding rental properties and community buildings had to be addressed as well. As well as the actual defects of the buildings the Peoples Document also highlighted the need for support for people who have suffered physical and mental ill-health as a result of the Mica problem.

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Mental Hospital strike 100 years ago



Next Monday, April 1st marks the 100th anniversary of the big strike that took place at the Tirconaill Mental Hospital in Letterkenny. It would be reported in media outlets in different parts of the world.

On the 1st April 1924 over 100 employees withdrew their labour and marched out the gates of the institution leaving just seven employees to look after more than 600 mentally ill patients.


As the dispute garnered worldwide interest, there were a series of violent incidents between the striking staff and those employed to replace them. Shots were heard on Letterkenny's main street and Gardai baton-charged the crowds to maintain order.

After fourteen days the striking staff members were all sacked and their pensions rights cancelled out. It was a lost generation and many of the younger staff emigrated whilst others fell on hard times and destitution. The dispute generated ill feelings in the town for many decades later.

Local historian, Hugh Devlin, said it was a strike that captured the public imagination and divid ed opinions.

The extraordinary story of the strike will be commemorated by the Donegal Historical Society on Sunday 9th June when Mr. Devlin will give a talk on the subject at the County Museum, Letterkenny, and during a walk around the grounds of St. Conal's Hospital. The hospital had first opened in May 1866 to provide a place of refuge, care, and psychiatric treatment to the population of Donegal. Then known as the **Donegal District Lunatic Asylum** it was built to provide accommodation for 300 patients. In subsequent years it was enlarged in response to increasing demand until it had in excess of 700 patients by the early 20th century.

Creeslough €13m Village Plan unveiled

The Council's Director of Service, Liam Ward has told a Creeslough meeting that a funding application for €13 million for the new community project has been prepared and submitted in February. He said that planning permission has been

Fr. John Joe Duffy said it was now important the project and the required funding received strong support from the government now and on into the future.

A large crowd gathered in Massinass Hall, Creeslough on Thursday night for the event to showcase the new Village plan for the area.

Following a number of public consultation events in the village over the last year and a half, the report into the regeneration of the area was compiled and presented to the audience.

The event was hosted by Donegal County Council, Arup, the Creeslough Working Group and the Creeslough Community Association.

The Council's Liam Ward welcomed the 100 strong audience to the event and highlighted that the newly produced Village plan document was the work of a number of agencies who enjoyed a high level of input and consultation from the local community.

Mr Ward said it has taken a broad effort within the local community who have come together in the aftermath of the October 7th tragedy in which ten people died.

He paid tribute to the members of the Council who have worked on the project and terms of planning and preparation.

He also paid tribute to the members of the Creeslough working group and the Community Association for their role and helping to facilitate the events and meetings and public consultations that are now contained within the new village re-

He highlighted that one of the major needs identified early on was the requirement of a communal space where people can gather and come together for various social community and sporting occasions.

Fr. John Joe Duffy of the Creeslough Community Working Group thanked all the members of the Council, Arup and the Oireachtas for their assistance and bringing the project to this point. He added that the new community centre will also be a place where healing and counselling can also take place as the area and its people, particularly in the bereaved, can receive this support needed

He said this would be a new "beating heart" of the community and explained the need for the facility that can help people deal with the trauma of just over a year ago was necessary in the future on what may be an "intergenerational" need within the community for years to come.

Representing Arup, Maire McNamee, said that the plan was made possible by the high level of engagement between the local community and the various groups and agencies involved.

She said that she had not seen such high level public interaction on such a community project and that the new regeneration plan contained the ideas fed back to them during the public consultations. She added while the community centre

is one of the first steps of the plan, many other ideas are contained within the document, as well as information and resources on how to progress these projects on and into the future.

She urged everyone to read and engage with it as many of the plans contained within it will be driven by the community in the future.

She said the need for a communal space was strongly identified across the community, but particularly by young people who are looking for a central place to gather and be with others within their community.

Matthew Byrne of the Creeslough Community Association also thanked the huge input from members of the Council and highlighted the significant role played in producing the regeneration plan for the village by global consulting firm Arup.

He highlighted that their input took place across

their offices in Ireland, the UK, Madrid and Los Angeles, and saw the input of 34 different individuals within the company.

He added that over 1,400 submissions were made by the local community during the consultation

This work, he added, was completely 'pro bono', with no cost incurred for any of their input which they offered in the aftermath of the tragedy. He explained one of the main reasons for this was because the company employed locally based members of staff, Agnes Monahan and Hannah Sheridan.

Matthew then made a presentation to the Arup representatives for their role in assisting the pro-

Other speakers on the night included Deputy Joe McHugh, Cathaoirleach of the Council Martin Harley, as well as Cathaoirleach of the Glenties

Municipal District, Cllr Michael McClafferty who all welcomed the plan and offered good wishes to all involved. After the event concluded the guest speakers and the audience of over 100 people, enjoyed refreshments provided by the Community Association and it gave everyone an opportunity to view and discuss the plans which were displayed on boards in the hall on the night.

New €1.4m project at Letterkenny Community Centre

Work on a major new €1.4 million development The balance must be met by the Community at Letterkenny Community Centre is set to begin this week. The first sod was turned by Cllr. Kevin Bradley, Mayor of the Letterkenny-Milford Municipal District, on Wednesday afternoon. The new building, with two new state-ofthe-art dressing rooms, will be built beside the existing astroturf (4G) playing pitch which has been a huge success since it was completed in

Funding for the project is coming from the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys, who has approved a grant of €300,000 and a further €100,000 from the Dormant Accounts Fund, with Donegal County Council providing a grant of €200,000.

Two released in Creeslough tragedy probe

Two men arrested on Friday in connection with the explosion in Creeslough Village on October 7th, 2022 have been released without charge.

The men, both described as tradesmen in their 50's, were questioned at separate garda stations in relation to their work on a gas installation at the site where ten people died and several others were seriously injured.

The two men were arrested by gardaí investigating alleged offences contrary to the Non-Fatal Offences Against the Person Act 1997 and were detained under the provisions of Section 4 of the Criminal Justice Act 1984.

Following questioning they were released without charge, Gardaí confirmed on Saturday morning the investigation is "ongoing with the intention of submitting a file to the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions".

Gardaí said the investigation into the explosion is continuing. The probe, which is the most complex undertaken by gardaí in recent years and involves over one thousand lines of inquiry, is being coordinated from Milford Garda Station. It is led by local gardaí in the Donegal Division, supported by the Garda National Bureau of Criminal Investigation and other agencies, including the Health & Safety Authority & the Commission for the Regulation of Utilities.

The Irish Times reported at the weekend that there are several "people of interest" that Gardaí are intending to interview in their investigation, as they assess if there is any criminal culpability involved in the case.

It is understood there has been no suggestion that any deliberate actions were taken to damage the gas system.

Packie Bonner to unveil Gorey Curran memorial seat

Harris will be Continuity Varadkar

Leo Varadkar is still something of a hate figure for Unionists and some British Conservatives. Jim Allister called him "venomous Varadkar." Boris Johnson summed up Conservative attitudes: "Why isn't he called Murphy like the rest of them." Simon Harris was clearly the anointed successor. Everything points to him following the same line. Mind you, that line has been as simple as shooting at an open goal. **British Conservative Governments** have made a mess of Brexit for nearly a decade. They have presented themselves as the worst type of 'Little Englander'.

Varadkar reflected a big part of the identity of the (Southern) Irish state. This was born from a revolt against British rule. Much of that state was part of England, then the United Kingdon (UK) for 750 years. Dublin was an English city since 1170. That was almost 450 years before Belfast existed.

ness. Part of the identity is that the Southern state is not Britain. Fine Gael shares that identity. There has been a perception that Fine Gael was less Nationalist than Fianna Fáil. Sometimes, even, there was a perception of being pro-British. The history, though, is far more complex.

Such closeness produces a touchi-

Fine Gael can out-nationalist Fianna Fáil when necessary. For example, Fianna Fáil under De Valera stayed in the British Commonwealth. Fine Gael was the main party in the Interparty Government which withdrew in 1949.

Northern political commentator Chris Donnelly identifies as nationalist. In his Irish News column, he wrote: "Yet (Varadkar's) legacy will also include deftly managing the Brexit crisis to avoid a hard border on a founder member of the National the island, whilst also firmly repositioning Fine Gael as a more authentically pro-Irish unity party just at

the time when serious planning and preparation for unity are beginning." Like Varadkar, Harris has placed himself on that wing of Fine Gael which sees themselves as Republicans. He is from Greystones in North Wicklow. Greystones is seen as a middle-class commuter town. That is generally, not completely, true. Official surveys indicate the town has a couple of fairly deprived areas. While Harris is Varadkar's preferred successor, he is different. Harris was born with no silver spoon. His father is a taxi driver, his mother a special needs teacher. He dropped out of third-level education. The best description would be a genteel boy, not posh.

His home territory is not seen as particularly Nationalist. It's not like the Border Counties. Nor does it have the history of Kerry or Cork. Like many places, though, you don't have to scratch too deep to find a strong Nationalist streak. And now we come to the paradox of recent years. Fianna Fáil has better relationships with Unionism than Fine Gael.

Micheál Martin is a strange contradiction. Martin is from a working-class part of Cork. His father was a bus driver. More, the father was Bus and Rail Union (NBRU). This was a militant split-off from the old Irish Transport and General Workers Union (ITGWU, now SIPTU). Like many of his generation, Martin attended a Christian Brothers school. He was in the first generation of his family to enter third level.

Varadkar is very different. He comes from a relatively privileged background. His father was a doctor. He attended King's Hospital. That is one of Ireland's poshest schools. Then he studied medicine at Trinity College. However, he seems to have a better feel for attitudes on the street. Sometimes such a feel can be positive, other times less so.

I can't understand why there is such a difference. (In my defence. I studied psychology at university for a year. I failed, dismally).

Harris's background is nearer to the street. From the start he has been pushing the buttons. He is about stressing core Fine Gael principles. He has spoken about law and order, backing small business, and immigration. He raised a cheer from the faithful when denouncing the tricolour being placed on the coffin of Pearse McAuley. On one hand that was anti-Sinn Féin. On the other, he was whipping up that section of Fine Gael which sees themselves as recapturing Republicanism from Sinn Féin. Thus he is very different to the late John Bruton. Bruton came from the tradition of the old Irish Parliamentary Party.

Harris will have to use his rhetoric.

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This is going to be a rough election for Fine Gael. The party is 13 years in Government. One-third of the Parliamentary party is retiring. Some are relatively young. That's a sign of poor party morale. There is a danger sign for Harris, too. Simon Coveney is not retiring. That suggests he may still have leadership ambitions. For Harris, very bluntly, there are no votes in being soft on the DUP or

British Conservative Governments. So I expect him to continue to be greener than Fianna Fáil. As to being hard on the DUP, that's

not as easy as it used to be. Emmna Little Pengelly is not old-style DUP. You will wait a lifetime to hear her insulting the Pope. Fortunately for Harris, the likes of Sammy Wilson and Ian 'Baby Doc' Paisley can be guaranteed to shoot their mouths off. They will, thus, push the buttons of Nationalist Ireland. Unlike the real old-timers, they won't insult the Pope. But they will do enough. A few attacks on Harris will help him.

The negative image of the DUP is burned into much of the Southern

electorate. Yes, the party is improving its image. Sensible members recognise it has much improving to do.

As regards the British Government, that is in chaos. The attitude to the Irish Government is not as crass as under Johnson. Britain used to pride itself on diplomacy. Little is evident in recent dealings with Ireland. Meanwhile, the North has relatively settled. There are, though, very much two communities. 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

Arrests as drug hauls found in Letterkenny and Ramelton

Mary Lou visits Donegal

A significant amount of illegal drugs were recovered in Letterkenny and Ramelton at the weekend following an investigation by

The Donegal Divisional Drugs Unit detained a person for the purpose of a search on Sunday March 24th in the Letterkenny area and a quantity of cannabis was subsequently found.

They then conducted a follow up search in the Ramelton area and they located cannabis valued at €25,000, MDMA valued at €840, Ketamine worth €600 and Cocaine with a value of €210.

Two people were arrested and charged to appear at Letterkenny District Court this week. Gardaí have urged the public to contact them if they suspect drug dealing is taking place in their locality.

They stated: "This seizure forms part of Operation Tara. The focus of Operation Tara is to disrupt, dismantle and prosecute drug trafficking networks, at all levels - international, national, local - involved in the importa-



tion, distribution, cultivation, production, local sale and supply of controlled drugs".

skip through to the live semi final and, fingers crossed, the live final.



Mental Hospital strike 100 years ago

of World War 1 the hospital was experiencing financial difficulties. Hugh Devlin said it had become the most expensive hospital in Ireland to run and in December 1921 the Board of Management, at the suggestion of Donegal County Council, wrote to Dail Eireann to send in an inspector to enquire into the financial and general working of the institution.

Owing to the outbreak of the Civil War no enquiry would take place until October 1923. When the enquiry was held it reported 'that the administration of the hospital was slack to an extraordinary degree (with resulting extravagance) and that several of the officers were not carrying out their duties efficiently; that the nursing staff, from a lack of supervision, had an imperfect sense of their responsibilities' and that the high cost of maintenance was not due to a high standard of care and treatment".

In forwarding the report, the Minister pointed to the necessity of immediate steps being taken to reform the management and bring about retrenchment. Several senior officers of the hospi-

tal resigned. The response of the Board of Management was to unilaterally impose a 10% pay cut on all staff from 1st April 1924.

'The Irish Mental Hospital Workers Union', of whom the hospital staff were affiliated, threatened strike action if this went ahead. The matter would be further complicated by the appointment of a stone mason to the position of Head Male Attendant, whose terms and conditions required him to cease being a member of the Union, something that his predecessor was not required to do.

At 7am on Tuesday morning 1st April the male and female staff assembled in front of the hospital, and with music playing and banners flying, they marched out the main gate to commence

Inside of the building seven staff remained, including the Resident Medical Superintendent, the medical doctor, clerk, storekeeper, land stewart, and the Head Male Attendant and Head Female Nurse. Patients were organised into workgroups to look after each other, and they showed remarkable resilience under unprecedented cir-

Initially the strikers' picket was a good humoured and cordial affair, but as days passed, and the hospital management offered employment to "outsiders" to replace them, the atmosphere became more embittered and acrimonious.

Meetings in support for the strikers were organised throughout the county in towns including Letterkenny, Milford, Carrigart, Lifford, Castlefin, Ballybofey, Donegal Town, and Ballyshannon, and were well attended.

After two weeks, the strikers were informed that they were dismissed from their employment and their pensions were declared forfeit. At a meeting in support of the workers in Letterkenny, Mr. O'Connor, union organiser, said they would blockade Letterkenny before the dispute was over. Local firms refused to handle goods destined for the hospital in sympathy with the strikers and deliveries were stopped at the entrance

The hospital management persevered in their determination to hold out and they eventually succeeded in their objectives. The strikers were





If there's one group of people you don't want to pick a fight with it might just be corporate lawyers. If you infringe upon their client's intellectual property then you'd be ready for an expensive

Nike is one mega-corporation that is known to litigate when someone strays a little too close to its branding.

While most of their attention is focused on those in the footwear and apparel market, I can't help but wonder what its lawyers make of Iceland's latest Easter offering.

In case you missed it, the supermarket chain has announced that in addition to selling traditional hot cross buns, it will also be stocking a version with the customary cross removed and a tick, not entirely unlike the famous Nike swoosh, included in its place.

Given that the American company doesn't seem to have a baked goods division, its lawyers are unlikely to start any bunfights over these develop-

But what about Christians? Some in the media (knowing that controversy drives clicks) have certainly tried to talk up a supposed sense of disgruntlement over the move. So are Christians outraged by this sacrilegious removal of a cherished religious symbol at such an important time of year? Are we feeling thoroughly ticked off?

The simple answer is no. Rather than being upset, most people I know will merely roll their eyes and then move

Clearly Iceland's new Nike-esque product is motivated by a squeamishness about offending those from a non-Christian background. Some might find this aversion surprising given that the cross has adorned churches, jewellery, graveyards, and flags for hundreds of years. Yet ironically Iceland's squeamishness is closer in spirit to the original message of Jesus' crucifixion.

One thing's for sure: you wouldn't have dreamt of decorating baked goods with a cross in the first century. Crucifixion was a ghastly and a humiliating thing; even the very word "cross" would not have been uttered in polite company. Crucifixion was reserved for the scum of society; it was the most contemptible fate imaginable.

So imagine the shock and scandal that gripped the world when Christians began to spread their message of God himself coming into the world, living

as a man, and dying a shameful death on the cross. Is it any wonder that Paul described the message of Christ's crucifixion as "a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles"? (1 Corinthians 1:23)

Given the prevalence of the cross today we are somewhat inured to its scandalous connotations. Yet Christ's crucifixion remains an offensive message when we understand its true implications.

If we could be saved in any other way then surely Jesus would not have subjected himself to such agony and disgrace. The fact that he went through atoning for our sin. Therewith this shameful death points us to an inescapable truth: we cannot save ourselves. All of our best efforts and most virtuous deeds are of no value whatsoever when it comes to

Urgent call for Creeslough safety barriers - Harkin

the N56 at Drimnaraw, Creeslough has prompted calls for the immediate installation of safety barriers. Aontú local election candidate, Mick Harkin in Creeslough, said the situation is a "tragedy waiting to happen". He stated: "It is only a matter of time before a vehicle and its occupants come to grief on this stretch of road." He claimed locals are up in arms at the danger posed on this dangerous section due to the sheerfall from the

road over the verge. He stated "There's only 150mm of a yellow line between the roadside and a 5m of a drop. Only good forprotection of a metal safety barrier, even though traffic here is extremely fast-moving. There is not even an

Concern over the safety of drivers on earthen embankment between the road and the potential 20 foot plummet over the precipice by any car that loses control especially on a wet or icy surface."

The Glenties Electoral Area candidate added: "I demand that council authorities immediately carry out safety measures at the scene before we have a major tragedy at this spot. The installation of a crash barrier would be the main ask. However, prevention sometimes is better than the cure. The widening of the road and appropriate speed calming road features and warning signs would be a most welcome addition. Action must be taken pronto and far. This part of the road lacks the call for Donegal County Council to place this on their high priority list and sort out this hazardous situation once and for all."

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

A Rathmullan Woman in exile...

My experience in a Mother & Baby home

(Girls names have been changed to protect identities)

Last week saw the opening of the Mother and Baby Redress Scheme. As a so-called survivor of one of these institutions, as obviously is my son Mark, I spent years doing what I do best and postponed thinking about it until it became unavoidable. In order to survive this life, I have put a lot of issues into secure boxes and locked them in the furthest recesses of my mind because they were too damaging, painful and potentially destructive to deal with at the time.

Being forced to take refuge in an institution for homeless mothers and babies was one of those issues. Owing to complications around his birth I had lived in Rathmullan with my family for about nine months after having Mark. However, as I was a volatile and temperamental person at best, and even more so when I had an infant to care for it was decided that it was in the best interest of the family as a whole if I returned to Dublin. There were four other children in the house at the time, including two foster children, and the needs of the dependent, younger children had to take precedence.

Hunting through the accommodation section of the Evening Press I found a flat share in the upper half of a house in Terenure with another single mother. She had two children and needed someone to share the rent and the bills. It was a difficult situation, having two families sharing a few upstairs rooms, especially as she used to get me to mind her kids when she went "down to the shop" at night for fags; and wouldn't arrive back till all hours, three sheets in the wind. The arrangement became unbearable when the father of her children was released from a psychiatric hospital and moved into the flat. He was an unpredictable person and I was very uneasy living in the same house as him, so we spent much of the day out walking the streets and the evenings in the safety of our room.

A distant relation offered Mark and me a spare room in her home in Sandymount, until we could source alternative accommodation. In the 1980s it was very difficult to find landlords who would accept lone parents. This was shortly after the Kerry Babies incident and the death of Ann Lovett, and the holy Catholic Church ruled the Irish roost with an iron fist. In Britain the "No blacks, No Irish" signs were not uncommon outside flats to let, and in Dublin it was "No children".

I placed an advert in the Evening Press, stating clearly that I was a single parent looking for somewhere to live and was delighted when a couple in Donnybrook replied and offered me a flat.

They had previously converted their garage into a self contained unit for their daughter and it was empty since she had married and moved to a home of her own. It was a grand flat and we moved into what was our fourth home in under a year. OK, so it had no bath or shower and I washed the baby in the kitchen sink along with our clothes. It had no window to the street and all we could see was the back hedge, which meant that we lived in absolute isolation when we were indoors, which was a lot when you have a one year old baby. There were no mobile phones then and not everyone had a house phone; certainly not lower end rental accommodation.

To contact anyone entailed loading the child

into the buggy, gathering change for a pay phone and then walking the streets till you found one that wasn't vandalised or being used as a flop house for junkies or winos. Isolation was a big problem before phones became widespread. Despite the domestic shortcomings it seemed that at last life would settle down, now we had a home. Which it did... for about six weeks; until my landlady heard (from someone she was chatting to at Mass) that my son's father was a married man. She promptly took out an eviction order against us on the grounds that I was a prostitute using her flat to pursue my trade. Given that the only three men who ever entered the flat were my father, Vincent De Paul and Mark's father, I don't think I was running a very successful enterprise. I started the search yet again for a home for us and I can still feel the fear, the knot in my stomach when I recall some of the bedsits that were available to single mothers. They were horrendous, frightening, filthy pits; some of them fire hazards and many of them below street level in basements with rising damp and no natural light. More than one landlord suggested "coming to an arrangement" in lieu of some of the rent. If you had a child you were obviously a slut and up for anything.

I turned to Cherish, the charity for unmarried mothers, to get help and they referred me on to Threshold, the homeless charity. Threshold felt that they could bring a case against my landlord for letting an unfit property because there was no bath or shower in the flat. However, when they looked into it further they discovered that there was no planning permission for the garage conversion and they were unable to take a case involving a property which legally didn't exist.

Someone somewhere suggested that I needed a social worker and offered to put me in touch with the district nurse. I point blank refused to engage with the Health Board or any state run organisations, I didn't trust them. Few single mothers trusted them. I was referred to Barnardos, an autonomous childcare service and was assigned a social worker called Miriam. She approached my landlord to see if the eviction order could be retracted, but they were adamant that as soon as the summer court recess was over the order would be processed. With housing for single mothers almost nonexistent the only option remaining was to apply for a place in a Mother & Baby home as the whole issue was having a detrimental effect on my mental health and we desperately needed a home.

Again, I refused to have any dealings whatsoever with any Catholic institutions, and was fortunate to get a place in one of only two (I think) non catholic homes. We were allowed to stay for a year, although it was actually thirteen or fourteen months later when we left. Mark was a little over a year old when we finally had a secure home for a while. For me and for the other girls in that home, it was a haven, a place of safety and relative peace. It's not that it was a wonderful house; with everyone sharing two baths and two toilets, it wouldn't be acceptable nowadays, but it was so much better than what went before it.

Of course there were problems, as there always will be when several households from diverse backgrounds share a small space, but we usually sorted our own differences, rarely requiring outside help. It was a year's respite where we were encouraged to study or work and become independent. I was eventually housed by Dublin Corporation on the top floor of an inner city block of flats. By that time Mark was attending a day nursery for three hours in the morning (also provided by the Mother & Baby home), leaving me free to do cleaning and housekeeping for wealthy women around Ranelagh.

After leaving the Home most of us went on to make lives for ourselves, some got married, some went abroad and some didn't survive. Mary died when her bedsit went up in flames, leaving her daughter an orphan to be raised by her grandparents in Clare. Margie was so severely beaten by her boyfriend that she was permanently brain damaged. Her son was raised by her parents and her several subsequent children were taken into care at birth. May was reported for leaving her son alone in the flat while she went to the pub. He was taken into care for a year before she was allowed to have him back again under supervision. I went on to have a very chequered life with many ups and downs; happy times and deep regrets, great love and desperate despair, but my time in an Institution for Mothers and Babies was never a bad time. In that respect I was one of the lucky ones.

It was a disgrace and a shame on Ireland and society that we had to resort to homeless hostels for refuge. We were second class citizens and we feared the health board, the social workers and most of those in authority; anyone who could have our children taken away. It was a hard and unforgiving world in the eighties, the isolation and the loneliness of the country girls in Dublin destroyed some of us. Not many people now in their 30s or 40s could imagine an Ireland where being pregnant outside marriage was cause for gossip and shame; most in this age of instant communication could not envisage a time where communication with home was an ordeal, frequently unsuccessful.

Did I deserve it? Maybe. Did I provoke it? Probably. Would I do it all again? I don't

know. I have a brilliant son, of whom I am endlessly and absolutely proud. Mark is without doubt my greatest achievement in life; a wonderfully strong, kind, loving and level man, despite what I dragged him through. He is a credit to himself. I have a lot of scars, mentally and emotionally; a lot of anger and bitterness inside me. I will probably be a psychiatric outpatient on anti depressants for the remainder of my life, but life is one hell of a lot better now than it was.

I have spent years in therapy and counselling and most of the time now I'm in control of the dragons, but occasionally the dragons win for a while. What of Mark's father? That's another story for another day and perhaps not mine to tell. Suffice it to say that he was as good a father to Mark as it was possible for him to be under his circumstances until his death. I loved him, he loved me and we both loved Mark.

I wouldn't be who I am now if I hadn't gone through what I did, and I've reached a stage, at long last, where I'm happy with who I am and where I'm going. The clashes and controversies are probably not over, I'm not ready to toe the line yet, but my future fights will be chosen by me, on my terms and I will, as always, take the consequences, whatever they may be. Finally... The Mother and Baby Institutions were not all bad all the time. They saved some of us from a society that was worse.

I want to know if you can be with joy, mine or your own; if you can dance with wildness and let the ecstasy fill you to the tips of your fingers and toes without cautioning us to be careful, be realistic, remember the limitations of being human.

Blaney promises a positive campaign for Europe

Senator Niall Blaney, is promising to fight a positive campaign to win a seat in the European Parliament in June.

He said: "Our effort will be characterised by energy and drive to reach as many people as possible in Midlands-North West. It will be a positive campaign as, frankly, voters want to hear what I can offer them and their families and are switched off by unproductive shouting matches.

Fine Gael's top ministers line up... to escape!

The new Fine Gael generation that became Varadkar's style and spin saw so much of their important grassroots support base vanish without any trace. Great workers, campaigners and election organisers are gone and there is an urgent need to recruit a new local dynamic around the 43 constituencies. They're the ones that Simon Harris must win back. With the local elections looming ever closer, FG here in Donegal is struggling to put enough candidates in the field to increase their numbers on the Council in Lifford.

Simon Harris must turn take back more than Ireland's flag....

Last week's incredible 24 hours in the world of Fine Gael politics was about as much as people could take. Because it was only ever going to be Simon Harris to grasp the hottest of pokers to be the new Taoiseach and FG party leader.

And that despite his very poor record as Minister for Health that led to the Taoiseach calling a general election in January 2020. He knew the vote of no confidence in Harris was one he could not win: the preference was a February election that would see FG losing another fifteen seats.

On Sunday the coronation was completed in Athlone with Harris hammering Sinn Féin and this went down well with elements of the national press and the blue rinse brigade.

He promised to repay his party supporters with blood, sweat and tears. The sort of hard graft one hears wherever McAlpine's Fusiliers is the soundtrack.

In 2011, he was elected as a TD for Wicklow. As the youngest deputy in the 31st Dáil aged 24, he quickly came to public attention and in 2014 was elected as a Minister of State in the Department of Finance. As part of his meteoric rise, he was appointed Minister for Health in 2016, and remained there until June 2020.

His time in this portfolio came with a rake of controversies. He was at the helm in 2018 when it emerged that over 200 women had developed cervical cancer after receiving incorrect smear results. Some 162 of these women had not been told their smears were incorrect. Some of them died.

Then in April 2017 Minister Harris confirmed the Government has approved the investment required to enable the National Paediatric Hospital Development Board to award

the construction contracts for the building of the main child-ren's hospital on the St. James's Hospital campus and the two Paediatric Outpatients and Urgent Care Centres on the Tallaght and Connolly Hospitals sites. This decision means that the project can proceed without delay. Construction of the new children's hospital will commence within weeks.

Minister Harris said: "Today is a huge step forward for the children's hospital project, ending years of doubt as to whether it would ever be built. Today, there is no more doubt. This hospital will be built. Our children have waited a long time for this new hospital but there is light at the end of the tunnel now. I anticipate that the new hospital, which will serve all of the children of all Ireland, will open in 2021, with the two Outpatient and Urgent Care Centres at Tallaght and Connolly opening well in advance at the end 2018 and the first quarter of 2019".

Why are we still waiting?
He studied journalism for a year at DCU and I'd imagine he may need to go back there to deliver on FG's hopes and aspirations. He also said he would be going back to the "decent, hardworking grassroots" of Fine Gael. Has anyone told him who they are and if they can be contacted?

And Harris made "empty promises" as Minister for Health to children with scoliosis, a campaign group has claimed.

Scoliosis is a condition which means a child's spine begins to curve sideways. In 2017 as the Health Minister, Simon Harris said waiting times for surgery were "appalling".

"We're going to fix it.We're going to make sure by the end of this year, no child waits in this country longer for a scoliosis procedure than four months."

Seven years on, Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus Paediatric Advocacy Group founder Amanda Coughlan said little has changed since then. "We had more empty promises from **Stephen Donnelly and Simon** Harris. We have been consistently beating this drum since 2016; we wrote to Simon Harris when he was Minister for Health in 2016 to highlight not only the orthopaedic issues that were being faced by our children. But also the urology issues that were being faced by our children." One parent who knows only too well how serious the condition is is Tony Foley, whose son Ronan

Foley waited three years for scoliosis surgery.

Mr. Foley described his son as an "inspirational young man" and now at the age of 18 he is "doing very well". When Ronan

and now at the age of 18 he is "doing very well". When Ronan was diagnosed with scoliosis at the age of 12, they were told he needed surgery within three months.

"Time passed and time passed and it went on to a year and a half, nearly two years and we decided we can't wait any longer. We had to do something about it, so we started up a media campaign to try and get the thing rolling as much as we could." Although his son is now doing well, Mr Foley said: "Here we are seven years later from the situation and it is still as bad as it was then. Successive Governments and successive Ministers for Health and the situation is still the same and it's very disheartening."

Now the new Taoiseach, the last one standing in the race to replace Varadkar has told the nation he's prepared to serve and we collectively wish him

However, the same issues dominate the headlines. Housing: Health: Waiting Lists: Homelessness, Ukrainian refugees without a place for a bed: Student Accommodation: the Infrastructure: they are all crying out for funding in a country with a wealth of money - yet the vital services are struggling to stem the tide of demand and with many hospitals reporting overcrowding, it would seem the clock has stopped ticking a decade ago.

But that is now the business of Simon Harris whose been in cabinet for so many years
Last Wednesday they'd all lined out to pay tribute to Leo Varadkar, his seven years in the sun now gone and then all thoughts

turned to who'd take on the job. But really, who'd ever want to lead a party that has lost 41 TDs since 2011? And there's no escaping the reality that they've also lost over 351,000 voters in those years. So that makes FG a party on a downward spiral and who would want to be in the vanguard of their new Project 2040? Not a task for the faint hearted, but Simon Harris does have a highly promising past. As Leo Varadkar turned back to Government Buildings for the last time as party leader last Wednesday, the media circus was instantly naming only one man for Taoiseach. It was going to be a one horse race with the experienced senior ministers having the common sense to step away.

Paschal Donohue who'd spent most of the past five years saying no to ministerial requests to spend money (maybe even for a mica solution in Donegal) was not up for a run to the top of the ladder. Simon Coveney had already walked away and the numbers were dwindling by every passing hour. For one frightful hour I'd have put good money on Jennifer Carroll MacNeill stepping into the breach. But she's a mere novice in politics: a first time deputy and a very junior, junior minister. But if need be, she might be tempted.

Those still in the hunt were
Helen McEntee and Heather
Humphries and Simon. Suddenly McEntee was backing Simon
and thereby avoiding an embarrassing demotion. What would
Heather Humphries have done
as Taoiseach? At least she knows
how to talk to the electorate and
could have been the catalyst
to rebuild a run down party
structure.

Hark back to 2017 when Leo Varadkar was the promised son, set to deliver a new beginning for FG. The party was being rebooted, reimagined as Leo, all style and little else, led his team to the nearest gym. Slick, trendy, on message and rebooted. This was the new FG that got up early in the morning and they'd emerge as a slimmer, fitter team. That was never going to happen because Leo was very new era. Soon the grassroots of the party realised that their role was virtual only, surplus to requirements, but they could turn up for branch meetings, even if those they elected, sometimes were absent. It sure was the birth of the FG whizz kid generation, jetting off to Brussels and the USA for a never-ending agenda



of meetings. Meanwhile the core base of the party was left to wonder what was going on. Never mind the fact that in the 2016 general election FG lost 26 seats but the slump in grassroots support was worse. The proactive branch era of Fine Gael took a hit when Paddy Harte lost his seat in 1997.

However, Enda Kenny brought his own personna to the party. He was equally at home in Donegal on a Saturday at midday having lunch with the local party stalwarts or in Churchill on a Friday evening putting up a pint for everyone in the bar.... That all did count come the elections.

The question is can the new FG Taoiseach achieve more in one year than Leo Varadkar had achieved in his seven years as party leader and most of the time as Taoiseach?

In a year's time we will have answers to all the questions. The optics might be different, the emphasis on areas of most concern may well take on an extra urgency and in the coming months the mettle of Harris will be tested on the doorsteps as the nation votes in two important elections.

Fine Gael was reduced to 35 seats in 2020 and with a tsunami of experienced deputies quitting, it is possible that few may have a change of heart with Harris offering them a better deal should he return to office after the general election.

And so to Athlone for the party's ratification of their two EU candidates in the EU elections. But the comments of veteran Mayo's Deputy Michael Ring were being processed all morning in the media.

Ring, a former rural affairs minister had earlier hammered the direction that Fine Gael had taken under Leo Varadkar.

"We are not a left-wing party, we are a centre party and Fine Gael has to move back into the centre again, and more to the right. We need to go back to core issues, law and order, we need to be doing more on law and order.

We need to go back to small businesses and farmers and we need to forget about a lot of these social issues we have been raising over the last few years that have been annoying people and upsetting people."

Deputy Ring told Simon Harris that he needed to go back to Fine Gael core values.

Harris, who will never be mistaken for a leftie, is keen to hammer home that despite all of his own talk of renewal, revitalisation, and reinvigoration, he was happy with the last 13 years of Fine Gael rule.

And herein lies a crux because he's seen as more in the mould of Varadkar and the FG grassroots may have to wait a year longer for the aspirations of Michael Ring to be considered. But the test for Mr Harris won't be how well he can preach to the choir but can he fill the pews to turn up the sound of a Sunday morning in traditional homes where the gospel of FG still shines?

Nobody can echo that proud sense of Irish freedom more than Márín Shiels whose grandfather, the legendary, 'An Tailiúr Rua' from Doaghmore was part of that small band of Fanad Patriots that put their lives in peril to assassinate the Third Earl of Leitrim on Tuesday morning April 2nd 1898 at Cratlagh Wood. Today's generation owes just about everything to those gallant men - we are surely standing on the shoulders of giants in Irish history that continue to echo around the hills and valleys of our native land.

It was a night where pride in the native language spoke a million words in tribute to an earlier generation who made the brave decision to leave home, perhaps never to return. Some of them knew no other language and would not have travelled outside their own parish before leaving everything to seek a better life in Gibb-

Those memories, the very strong links so deeply rooted in Fanad and Gaoth Dobhair of the nineteen thirties, are the stuff of dreams for a new generation with babies in their arms when, for one night only, Fanad wrapped its collective heart and soul around their special visitors from Gibbstown.

The fifty year old hall never was more resplendent in the county colours of Meath and Donegal and the place rocked to the memories of the generations, the names and the traditions of those who departed to establish Gaeltacht colonies far from home. And the local community came out in big numbers in heavy rain and gales to ensure that the welcome was well worth waiting for 87 years. And it was... and more!

The crowd lingered to visit the display of old photographs of the thatched cottages and the homes and families that the migrants left behind.

The fine old townlands: the family names were all there: the Shiels connection, the McCarrys, Carrs, Clintons, Boyle and Callaghan. And the many McAteers: some of whom we met on Friday night. The legendary 'Johnny Mac an tSaoir' from Baile Uir, a sage with wisdom to match his age. A wise man, of a generation from An Gorta Mór, the hunger and poverty and mass emigration. He was 104 when he died and we heard about the family lineage, the thatched home on the edge of the Atlantic Ocean, the few cattle on the small holdings, fishing in the currachs.

The new book is in hardback and its as Gaeilge agus Bearla and in time it will become the family bible as new generations connect with their ancestors from this part of Donegal. Harry McGarry's contribution on Friday night set the scene for the return of the Gibbstown community and their sense of pride in being back in Fanad amongst

their own. Speaking in the fluency and flow of Irish he outlined the history of the migrant colonies in Meath and the political landscape of the era that led to the migrant colonies and their sense of pride in being a proud Gibbstown Gaeltacht.

Harry's own family was from Kinnalough and he recalled the morning of their departure with frosty shafts of sunlight coming through the window. It would be the final time he woke up in the little cottage nestling on the lake shore. He referenced the families that left Fanad that fateful day: those family steeped in Gaelic folklore, Eddie Daniel Neidi, the John Mhanais family, Johnny Mhor Shiels, the Paddy Hughie's and those

identities that gave them a sense of their own history and a place that would always be home to them

Mr. McGarry said: "They left their cherished homes and families, their fishing and working the land. It was a brave commitment to their children to give them a better way of life," he added.

Mr McGarry said those that left home were 'special people and that's why so many from Gibbstown are here tonight.'

Their first school was not Irish speaking: there were 180 children crammed into two classrooms. It would take quite some time before they got their own Gaeltacht school. That was real progress and they adapted to a new way of life and today they are delighted with the progress achieved.

Friday night was a homecoming with the families of Meath migrants coming back to join the heritage that has given them their own unique identity, the sense of belonging and being welcomed home to the laughter, the goodwill and the music of the bodhran, the tin whistles and the accordions.

A night to reminisce and to remember with nostalgia but one of a sense of quiet goodwill as those fourteen families from Fanad and four more from West Donegal came back to their roots. It was a night where extended relationships were explored, new friends were made and Paddy Sheamais Carr, a very local connection in Baile an Chnoic agus Seanach Dubh was honoured and proud to launch 'Destination Gibbstown' and to reminisce on the Fanad landscape his own family circle left behind, He made a fine speech, full of history, remembering his own father Barney, now 92 and resident in Dublin. Barney was five years old, the son of Mary and Paddy, like so many of the generation that lived in a small thatched house.

Among the crowd at the Community Centre was Mick Meenan from Ladden. He's now a sprightly 94 and he saw the Doaghmore bus passing by his doorstep on Good Friday morning in 1937.

Those thatched cottages were unique abodes and while families struggled for many years to earn a living, the big takeaway was the sense of friendship, the meitheal where families shared horses to work the land. They also shared fresh produce, milk and much more.

Life was more simple because people were equal: equally poor. But in that alone there was a sense of sharing and caring: where the hearth fire and the kettle forever on the crook with an open door always there to welcome any and everyone that might pass their way.

Paddy Carr said it was "an incredibly emotional moment for everybody. It is a remarkable story, a beautiful publication. The one thing that I take from it is the courage and the hope of the migrant families".

He added: "They left home that morning and the bus land. that brought them was full of hope. Tonight is a celebration and Baile Ghib is a very special place, enriched by all your families." he added.

The migrants would have come past the Celtic Cross to the Fanad Patriots at Kindrum Cross Roads as they passed by on their way to an emotive homecoming on Friday night. You could sense the tug of the heartstrings of belonging here in Fanad and the desire of being part of this night as a big group of musicians played the Irish melodies that are hundreds of years old, but a vital link in that very authentic chain that joins us as a truly Gaeltacht sense of being the bearers of a tradition that is hundreds of years old.

The winds and the hailstones battered off the the Community Centre at Traialocha on Friday night as Márín Shiels spoke from her truly republican heart of what it truly meant to be part of the Gibbstown Gaeltacht, their sense of belonging and being among the first born generation of the migrants is very special.

Márín said that in the early days life was not easy and they met with hostility from the local communities. She recalled that one of the earlier migrant families had a fatality when an eighteen year old youth fell out of a tree and was killed." The family could not get a burial plot anywhere to bury him and Peadar O'Ceallaigh cycled to Government Buildings on three consecutive days seeking a solution. The bereaved family carried the coffin all the way to Kilbride where he was laid to rest in an unmarked grave."

This was an evening that might never have happened but for the passion of members of the Gibbstown Gaeltacht community who've written an amazing book that traces the background of all 59 families that made the journey into the unknown: and for the Fanad families that departed, it was within a week of the departure on Good Friday in 1937.

And the Gibbstown community came back to Fanad and Donegal in strength on Friday evening and to join with their own kith and kin in an emotive welcome home.

In the 1930s in Meath the Irish Land Commission undertook a social project. Several large farms were acquired and tiny patches of the poorest land in the west of Ireland were exchanged for twenty-two acres of the best in the east. The government's objectives were, firstly, to relieve congestion on the western sea-

board, and secondly, to create an and reverse the language's centuries of decline.

This book, written in Irish with an English translation, is based on family photographs, oral histories and archival sources. It records the effects migration had on the fortunes of the families, their initial amazement at the lush grassland and broad meadows of Meath, and the process of integration with the communities they found themselves among.

It is a story of hardship and courage, and a testament to the pioneering spirit of a generation that took that step into the unknown to give the next generation a chance for the future. It was a brave decision but one that continues to make Gibbstown and Rath Cairn proud to speak the Irish language and proud of their forebears who gave them this opportunity of a

Eighty seven years is a very long time in the life of a small community: the Donegal-Gibbstown link is all the more precious and history does not diminish the importance of its legacy and its beating heart was there for all to see over the weekend. The West Donegal book launch was in the Crolly Distillery on Saturday evening.

And as the celebrations ended on Friday night, presentations were made to Máirín Ní Shiadhail, Marion NI Fhearraigh, Harry McGarry and Paddy Carr.

Controversy at FG convention

As the FG conventions for the Letterkenny Town and County Council elections came to a dramatic end at Gleneany House on Sunday night the meeting heard scathing and highly controversial remarks from Cllr. Sean Maloney in relation to the running of the country at both local and national level.

He ranged across the events that have shaped the nation under Fianna Fail and 'named the names' national and local whom he alleged were in full control of almost every situation in political life in this part of the island.

And nobody or no institution was spared. It was a night to remember in Donegal's colourful tapestry of political legend.

With reference to one specific claim we asked Supt. John Farrelly the Head of the Garda Press Office in Dublin for an opinion. "You are not real-

ly serious, are you?" he commented.

On Monday March 29 Mary Davis of the Special Olympics Council will be in Letterkenny to launch a major two million Euro programme for the old Chapel at St. Conal's. The project will cater for those members of the community with special needs. It will also provide services for other aspects of the hospitals service and this is where the Sports and Social Club comes in to the wider picture. In former times the chapel could accommodate over eight hundred people: but nowadays with the disappearance of institutional care the place is no longer needed and in recent times it's been used for a variety of other purposes.

On Tuesday afternoon we met with the executive members of the Hospitals Sports and Social club to hear what is going on and what makes them tick.

Terry McDonald explained the pros and cons of their group. They were established some years ago: in 1995 in fact to give the community working across such a large campus a chance to meet: to socialise and to provide a platform for getting familiar. Council response 'utterly

pathetic' MacLochlainn

has described as "utterly pathetic" the response from Donegal County Council in relation to his comments earlier this week on turnkey housing schemes in the county.

MacLochlainn has made allegations in relation to what he says is a situation where legal pursuance is being followed by the Council over unfinished works in Letterkenny and at the same time a further multi-Euro scheme has been awarded to the same client elsewhere.

A statement from the Assistant County Manager and Director of Housing, Liam Kelly has rejected aspects of MacLochlainn's comments but it accepts they are "pursuing a number of developers regarding compliance with planning conditions relating to road surfaces etc. He said that with regard to turnkey schemes in other locations referred to by MacLochlainn a number of minor complaints have been made.

"This is not unusual and the complaints are being dealt with by the Council in accordance with normal practice," adds the Assistant County Manager. Mr. Kelly said no issues have been raised in relation to another development referred to by the SF representative in the Inishowen area and the scheme is question is progressing satisfactorily.

Responding to Liam Kelly's statement MacLochlainn said that it was 'utterly pathetic and completely avoided the core questions he'd raised'. MacLochlainn said in relation to the problem on a Letterkenny estate the residents group had been campaigning for the past eighteen months to have essential infrastructure works completed and these works just had not happened. Liam Kelly knows exactly the problems to which I'm referring and it is a bit rich of him to come out with such a pathetic statement in these circumstances.

The Buncrana SF Cllr. Padraig MacLochlainn He has totally ignored my core question and I'm challenging him again in public to come up with a satisfactory response."

> Cllr. MacLochlainn says there are many other turnkey schemes left in a similar situation and the Council already has details of some. A further 'snagging list' of problems is now being compiled in a number of areas and he's demanding urgent action from the Council to find solutions.

> MacLochlainn said "After all one has to ask the Council if it is a good enough practice to allow schemes to be occupied for months and in some cases for years and they are not completed. I have visited a number of such schemes and they've been left in a disgraceful condition. Roads are not finished: there are difficulties with joinery: energy: plumbing and many other unresolved issues. Is the Council satisfied with the standard of completion in all cases? And if not what action have thev been taking?"



An appeal was lodged on May 22nd, 2023 by Dr Ann McDaid. Among the Grounds of Appeal listed was the planned construction would overdevelop the site, also the loss of privacy, noise disturbance, devaluing their property and impacting on the views previously enjoyed. An Bord Plenala granted permission with revised conditions citing that existing commercial development on and adjacent to the current site would not injure the amenity of property in the area.



The planning appeal was lodged against the building of the house in Kinnalargy, Downings after Declan McCrory had been granted conditional planning permission for the development by Donegal County Council on October 12th,

The planning appeal was lodged by Paul Fox November 02, 2023.

The grounds of appeal included previous planning history at the location, its eligibility for a rural dwelling, alleged inappropriate design and building regulations, and traffic concerns.

Refusing the application the Board stated: "Having regard to the extant permission for a dwelling on the applicant's landholding, taken in conjunction with existing and permitted development in the area, it is considered that the proposed development would contribute to an excessive density of suburban type development in a rural landscape that is designated in the County Development Plan 2018-2024 as being of 'High Scenic Amenity'. The proposed development, if permitted, would result in the expansion and consolidation of a suburban pattern of development in the rural area, would further erode the rural character of the area, would seriously injure the visual amenities of the area and, accordingly, would be contrary to the provisions of policies RH-P-2 and NH-P-7 of the Co. Donegal Development Plan 2018-2024. The proposed development would, therefore, be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable development of the area.





Election campaign trail see more nominations

A number of campaign launches for the local elections are due to take place in the next two weeks. They include Cllrs John O'Donnell, Michael McClafferty and Pauric McGarvey. Not all interested parties have finalised their election runners and rumour abounds that not all outgoing Cllr. are running again.

In recent days, Buncrana man Fionán Bradley has been selected to run for Fianna Fáil in the Buncrana area for the seat vacated by Cllr. Rena Donaghy. Bradley was elected ahead of Gemma McGrory-Fitzgerald, the only other contestant at the convention.

In the 2019 campaign, FF polled 37.3% followed by Sinn Fein on 26.2% with Indep. Cllr Nicholas in third place on 14% and Fine Gael got 10.1%. It is a five-seater. In 2019 the quota was 1,412: expect that be over 1,600 in June.

Ramelton Cllr. Pauric McGarvey will launch his campaign in the Town Hall on Friday week at 7.30. Among the guests are Independent Senators Gerard Craughwell and Sharon Keogan.

Independent Cllr. Michael McBride will launch his campaign to retain his Council seat this week for the Letterkenny area. On Friday his first launch is in Kilmacrennan Hall at 4pm and on Saturday in Wilkin's Bar Churchill at 5pm.

He first became a Cllr. in May 2011 and he has focussed on many local issues, originally in the Milford area and later in Letterkenny. He's been campaigning for the reopening of Kilmacrennan Health Centre and said the response to his queries from the HSE has been vague and disappointing. He hopes to establish over the weekend the issues around its closure and also that of Churchill. He has a long-standing interest promoting small business enterprises and is familiar with the pressures and demands in construction and in housing.

He told the Tribune: "During my time I am pleased to say that I have helped achieve the following. Helped to bring university status to the college in Letterkenny. Proposing a full transport hub for Letterkenny which will be delivered as part of the URDF programme. Strongly advocated for greenways and their maintenance in our county, Letterkenny to Burtonport.

Have supported numerous local organisations and sports groups, he has been a strong voice for the mica affected families, Consistently voted against the rise in property tax and business rates. Many roads projects, street lighting, footpaths, and water projects."

100% Redress Party seeks radical changes

Mr. Farren said: "As a proud Inishowen man born and bred and I'm a community centre manager and a tourism business owner. I've long been a campaigner for local issues and a vocal champion for all that the region has to offer.

Having experienced firsthand how the mainstream parties have failed the victims of the defective concrete block crisis, I helped form the 100% Redress Party in late 2023, along with other equally concerned and public service minded members of the community.

The crisis has affected the entire community of North Inishow-

en - directly and indirectly - and the 100% Redress Party is seeking a mandate to speak on everyone's behalf."
