Milford and Ballyshannon are being reconfigured into North and South with the administration of Milford being consigned to history. The Milford District Headquarters along with the Office of the Garda Superintendent will be part of the new Northern Division along with Letterkenny and Inishowen. The rest of the county will become known as South Donegal. The current Milford

see the transfer of Garda operation in areas south of Lackagh Bridge including Creeslough, Falcarragh, Gweedore and the Rosses and other parts of the former Glenties District to Ballyshannon.

These are the most sweeping changes ever in Garda operations in Donegal with Headquarters based only at Letterkenny and Ballyshannon.

The new policing model is to reduce Divisions Garda from 28 to 19 and a reduction of its regions from six to four. This was part of what was described as part of a restructuring model.

Back then the Garda Representative Association said it had no no confidence in the Government's com-

Donegal schools named in abuse report

The scoping report details the violence, sexual assaults, and rapes amid a culture of silence.

Victims' groups are calling for a redress scheme to be set up for the survivors. This report referenced only Catholic schools and there are new demands for all other schools run by other religions to also be investigated.

A Commission of Investigation has been announced, but a redress scheme recommended in the report has not been decided upon. The Government's long-awaited report into sexual abuse at religious-run boarding and day-schools was prompted by revelations of systemic abuse by the Spiritan order at Blackrock College.

The report reveals that abuse was much more widespread in schools, more pervasive and more flagrant than imagined. They include 17 special schools which recorded 590 allegations involving 190 alleged abusers. At least half of all the alleged perpetrators are known to be deceased.

Education Minister Norma Foley said the Government will begin the process of establishing a commission of investigation into the abuse, though survivors fear this could delay redress or justice.

Tribunals of inquiry have taken an average of six years and cost €53m each but the cost of any com-

mission of inquiry into sexual abuse in schools, or of a redress scheme, is impossible to quantify at this stage given the scale of inquiry ahead. Ms Foley said she is open to expanding the commission's remit to all second-level schools.

Across 700 pages, the report details harrowing accounts of sexual assault at the hands of members of religious orders, teachers, priests, other school staff, or visitors to their school. Some victims said they had been groomed, others that their abuse occurred at random, while most described it occurring alongside "ferocious violence".

The report outlines how the victims felt shame, did not understand or were afraid to speak out. One said they felt they could not go to mass because they had committed an awful sin. Abusers would groom children, become ingrati-

ated with their families or invent extra-curricular activities as a pretence for sexual abuse.

The majority of allegations came from men. Many reported never telling anyone about the abuse at the time.

Most who came forward are aged in their 50s, 60s and 70s now with the abuse dating as far back as the 1960s. Some said it was the first time they discussed the abuse and its impact on them. Numbers had emigrated, leaving their towns and communities as soon as they could to escape the reminders of their abuse.

The representative body for Catholic orders across Ireland said it is "deeply sorry" that victims experienced abuse in religious-run schools. Responding to the O'Toole report Monsignor Kevin Gillespie, Raphoe Diocesan Administrator said "This betrayal of trust is unlikely to be confined to one type of school, and the commitment of the Government to undertake a Commission of Investigation to look further into this question is to be welcomed. A wide remit for this Inquiry would help to address the trauma suffered by children and young people across the entire school community in the period in question.

For its part, The Diocese of Raphoe will provide its cooperation to the Commission should any of its schools be included.

I encourage anyone who may have been abused, or is suspicious of any abuse, to report it to the State authorities, or the diocesan Safeguarding Office immediately.

Another Northern leader bites the dust

Colm Eastwood of the SDLP was the second Northern party leader to resign in August. Fittingly he made the announcement in a field. Twenty-six years ago the SDLP was the largest Northern party in votes. That was in the first Assembly. The party polled 172,963. That was over 5,700 ahead of the Ulster Unionist Party (UUP). The SDLP is now in fifth place. Since, the vote has more than halved. In the 2022 Assembly election it was 78,237. That was despite an almost 50,000 increase in total voters. Worse, the SDLP no longer qualifies for a minister in the Executive. Rather, it is now the Official Opposition.

As such, it has delivered a few blows. They are tempered, though. It is the Official Opposition to an Executive of which it was a part for 24 years. The SDLP faces two problems. The first is demographics. The SDLP vote is older and dying.

More importantly, its role is uncertain. Is it Sinn Féin-lite? Or is it Alliance-a-bit-green?

July's Westminster election showed its difficulty. It admitted to only seriously fighting three seats. Yes, two of these were won. The third, though, was South Down. There it was heavily beaten.

Fermanagh and South Tyrone shows the slippage. This constituency is part of the traditional heartland of Nationalism. The Alliance candidate is not known to have done any real campaigning. He still polled more than the SDLP. That's because the SDLP vote there is 75% down in less than 30 years.

Again, the Fermanagh and Omagh District Council area covers much of that same constituency. The SDLP has only three of forty councillors. The West Tyrone constituency is one of the most nationalist. The SDLP

only has one councillor in the constituency.

The last local government election was last year. The SDLP vote fell by 25%. One-third of council seats were lost. That puts the party tottering close to not being viable.

Thus, it is uncertain if there is a direction. All it needs to do is look at the Ulster Unionists. They keep changing leaders. They swap between traditionalists and modernisers. Neither direction has brought serious recovery.

Eastwood belongs to the SDLP's more nationalist wing. He wanted the party to link up with Fianna Fáil. His stance partly reflects the constituency. Foyle is Derry City and a small area on its edge. Eastwood can out-Sinn Féin Sinn Féin when needed. There is a clip on X (formerly Twitter) of his speaking on Gaza at Free Derry Corner. He was wearing a GAA fleece.

Eastwood is popular personally. Non-SDLPers speak well of him. He has used his seat in Westminster effectively. But his Fianna Fáil link sank without trace.

Claire Hanna is the anointed successor. She is a mainstream social democrat. She is very pale green. Her constituency of South Belfast and Mid Down is very different to Foyle. She works it hard. She pulls a significant small-u unionist vote.

But we do not know how well her type of SDLP will travel. Yes, rural and small-town nationalist voters are more liberal than people assume. After all, look at Donegal. However, they still lean in more traditional directions.

Many SDLP problems are self-inflicted. For years, it was in denial. Any suggestion of difficulties was just Sinn Féin propaganda. The Sinn Féin vote was personated. Or SDLP supporters had 'lent' their vote. Then 'John Hume had sacrificed the party for the peace process'.

Reality is Hume had many strengths. He was not an organiser. He failed to delegate organising to somebody who was. After all, Ian 'Papa Doc' Paisley was no organiser. So he had Peter Robinson.

The SDLP was always poorly organised. Various party barons had fiefdoms. There was only a small group who actually believed in some form of social democracy. As long as the IRA campaign continued, the SDLP could get the majority of nationalist votes. Afterwards, it continued to campaign on the IRA's past. That was as that past became further past.

It failed to deal with the new situation.

Then it showed how not to run a party in the 2003 Assembly election. The party's four most senior figures all stood down at one time. No organi-

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sation can withstand that. Certainly, the SDLP has very capable representatives. In the Assembly, it probably has more than any of the other parties. But it has difficulties appearing like a team.

I used to make a living by reporting on the SDLP. I was passed a trove of party documents. In 2003 the peace process was tottering. 

Support meetings for bereaved parents this September

A new year, in terms of the school term, has begun and schoolbags have reappeared. The holidays have been taken and the long evenings shorten. September can be a very difficult month for bereaved parents. Many milestones are achieved during the month, many milestones their beloved child will never get to mark.

Anam Cara, the only organisation of its kind in Ireland with services available to all bereaved parents, will hold fourteen face to face meetings throughout the month. All their support services are free

of charge. Operations Manager, Leanne Milligan reflected "at this time of the year, we can all get caught up with the return to school, the return to routine and our busy lives continuing, but for those missing loved ones, time remains still. It is important to understand that less obvious occasions such as the return to school, can be hugely triggering". 

The Knockalla Coast Road taking shape

A new film dedicated to the pioneers in the building of the Knockalla Coast Road will be shown in Fanad at the weekend. The film details the vision, skill and effort that went into creating one of Ireland's finest scenic coastal drives.

The Knockalla Coast Road is world famous in tourism and motorsport circles for the superb

views and breathtaking scenery and filmmaker Arthur Lynch has made a new film detailing how the roadway came into existence in the late 1960's.

Arthur said he made the short film as a tribute to the men who built the Knockalla Coast Road to highlight the foresight of those who could see its potential for the area as well as the high level of skill and labour that it took to create it.

Arthur has created a number of local history documentaries in recent years, including the LetterkMilford Bakery, and developed a powerful way of who owned the golf course and hotel, they telling these important local stories that capture tried but it didn't go anywhere, but Blaney unique moments in time for generations to come. 'The reason I decided to do this, and I have been thinking about it for a while, was because it was done so locally. There was no big firm hired in from Dublin or London. When I mean local, I mean from as far over as Creeslough, there were a few men from Gweedore and Falcarragh, but the vast majority were people living around the area. I know that when making the film I used to look at all the names I could find and thought that's a wage packet going into lots of houses here?

The pay started at £6 and 4 shillings a week. The work started in February 1964 on the work that stretched eight miles, although some roadway was already in place and just needed to be incorporated into the new work.

"There was a lot of new road that had to be made and that was up over the mountain of Knockalla itself and that was by far the most challenging part of the whole job. That was from the bottom of Glenvar on down into Killavee coming on out to the Kerrykeel/Fanad Head road.

There was not much by way of top brass involved and I believe there was just one engineer. Denis O'Sullivan, a Cork man who lived in Portnablagh and he seemed to be a good man at his job.

After Knockalla finished he moved to Co. Clare where he became the county engi-

The overseer of the job was James Deeney of Clondallon in Rathmullan and the ganger was Eddie Deeney from Glenvar until his retirement when it was taken over by John Carr of Glinsk in Fanad.

Arthur says the skill of many of the machine and lorry drivers was second to none and showed in the completed job that has stood the test of time to this day. Their day began at 8am until 6pm, Monday to Friday with just one tea break and also a half day on Saturday to 1pm.

"This was a very exposed place to the easterly winds. The workers would have had to be out of their bed by 7am at least to start at 8pm and not getting their tea break until 1pm, they'd have been well ready for it," Arthur said.

He added that this work should be considered an important local heritage amenity that should be mapped with signage to indicate the level of work it took to create this stunning driveway that towers over the beautiful Ballymastocker Bay and is considered one of the finest rally stages anywhere in the world.

Mother hits out at lack of additional needs transport

A Carriagrt mother has highlighted the ordeal she and her family are facing after she learned at short notice that transport for her son with additional needs to his college was not being provided.

Tanya Roberts Browne raised the plight of her 18-year-old son Oisin who has started higher education this week but she only learned his planned transport to SOAR in Letterkenny was delayed with no alternative arrangement in place.

She highlighted the matter on social media to say it was "a disgrace" that with just three days before Oisin was due to start his new college they learned the wheelchair transport required was not in place.

This resulted in the self-employed mother of three having to undertake the journey herself.

She said she believed she had been working with the HSE on ensuring all matters were in place before he started on Monday but last Thursday she was informed it was not in place and may take some time to resolve.

She said what meant to be an exciting week for Oisin starting his new college has been hugely stressful for her and her family.

She stated: "Already feeling emotional and anxious about this next stage that's upon us I get a phone call on Thursday from HSE transport to say Oisin has no transport for starting college and this could be an ongoing issue for a num-ber of weeks/months. I went through a long application process that started last year with getting things in place for him starting this week and was never once over the course of this process informed

that this may not be 'ready' in time. To be told less than 3 days out that he has no transport going forward is an absolute disgrace. I am disgusted by the system and when I asked what am I supposed to do now to be then told, we can't advise or help you, is even more of a disgrace."

She added: "This lack of support and communication is unacceptable and leaves families feeling abandoned and helpless. It's so frustrating to see how easily the system fails those who need it the most. Despite exhausting all possible avenues in the past few days, I am at a loss for what steps to take next until the transport issue is resolved as there seems to be no one available to provide guidance or assistance and I cannot physically be in two places at the one time despite trying my very hardest."







Grow towards the light

There's a place we go to on holidays - a cabin on a lakeshore in the woods. Buried amongst nature, a place to eat sleep, swim, wander, and repeat - a reset for body and soul. I was walking through the woods one day, pushing my way through the trees down to the lake's edge. Trees had been blown over by successive storms over the years and trunks needed to be clambered over. Some were only tilted and had kept on growing at crazy angles, others were completely flattened, roots torn out, lying there dead. But one caught my eye. It was broken off just above the roots, it's trunk stretched out on the forest floor. It seemed as if

something more violent had happened to this one. Its roots were still in the ground - its trunk jaggedly fractured just above ground level. Yet as my eye travelled along its trunk, it took the most astonishing turn - ninety degrees upwards. I checked to make sure it was the same tree and trunk. I looked at the shattered trunk I had presumed dead. But no, there was still a connection - somewhat fragile, yet life giving. And this valiant tree, shattered and flattened by a storm had not given up. Amidst the dense foliage of the forest, it had turned and reached towards the light. And grew, and grew. Strong. Wandering through the all the more marvellous.

forest, just looking ahead, this tree looked like a normal tree - branches, leaves all as normal. But when you turned your eye lower, vou saw it had a story, a story that made its growth

Life does that to us doesn't it? Storms flatten us, life gets broken just when we were getting going, we fall and lie on the dirt of brokenness, face down in our pain. But what will we do? Some give up, they let their brokenness define them, they let the pain conquer them, they see only the dirt floor of life's undergrowth. And that is understandable - storms are brutal. But they don't have to be the last word. What this tree reminded me of was this: Whatever storms come, however flattened you are, grow towards the light. Yes, life will be different, there will still be a 'before the storm', but there can also be an 'after the storm'. Look up and grow towards the light.

If for whatever reason God has permitted a storm to blow into your life, that storm doesn't need to define you - it will shape you - but it doesn't need to leave you lying face down in your pain. Look up to him, and reach your life out towards him, and you will find yourself growing towards the light - and a newness of life that didn't seem possible after the storm floored you. And more than that, as you look up you will find light from him percolating down through the dark clouds to replenish your soul. I read these verses on Sunday at the start of our service: The LORD is good to those whose hope is in him, to the one who seeks him;

it is good to wait quietly for the salvation of the LORD... For no one is cast off by the Lord forever. Though he brings grief, he will show compassion, so great is his unfailing love. (Lamentations 3:25,26,31,32) Here is reason indeed to put our hope in him - in Jesus Christ - and to grow towards him who said "I am the light of the world, whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." (John 8:12)



'Housing for All' target only 33,450 new homes this year

Under the Housing for All plan, the Government's official target is 33,450 new homes. This has led to a substantial housing deficit, with the Housing Commission estimating that the underlying shortage ranges from 212,500 to 256,000 homes based on the 2022 census figures. The country will need up to 53,000 new homes a year to keep up with population growth, even without factoring in all the "pent-up demand" from years of undersupply...

Friday was a record day for building houses in Ireland... and a record one as well for homelessness. Somehow the promise of 40/50 thousand new builds do not sit comfortably. Because lack of housing is a primary cause of homelessness, is it not? Simon Harris popped into NewsTalk on Friday to tell Pat Kenny that the Government target of 40,000 would be reached.

Regardless of the enthusiasm of the Taoiseach, I just read the analysis by John Burns in the Indo saying that the rate of completions for the first six months of the year was down 8.6% and only 12,730 were finished.

Simon Harris must know that his government has to construct 21,000 new houses by Christmas if the 40,000 promised new houses is to be achieved.

But the good news of the FG gospel was not yet over. On Friday afternoon FG's Senator Barry Ward popped by on the 'Hard Shoulder' on Newstalk with Ciaran Cuddihy. And there was more good news for the bemused listeners. Ward was pondering the housing completions possibly rising to 50,000 by Christmas. That my arse I thought that happening given we are a million miles, (21,000 houses) short going into the second half of the year.

To achieve this objective the supply would need to treble. Can that happen... is it possible? Or are these houses mirages of a political imagination that defies logic? Realistically it is quite pathetic for Simon Harris to be talking about reaching housing targets when it's already obvious for half a generation that what is needed is somewhere north of 60,000.

At the end of 2023 it was calculated that there were 115,425 households, either on social housing waiting lists or in receipt of the Housing Assistance Payment. They consist of 58,824 eligible households on the main social housing waiting list plus 56,601 active HAP tenancies.

And well into their fourteenth year in power, FG does not want any debate around these stats because they simply speak of government failure and poor policy decisions. And all they can do is talk in the hope that some new government will take on the task of fixing the problem. Against this background of failure, perhaps it is not surprising that 34,700 left Ireland ny's box room knowing that Simon Harris is not going to fix the crisis.

But with FG it seems to me they are fast becoming the party where miracles never sleep. But had that been the case, then FG must wonder why they lost 5,200 votes in June's local elections here in Donegal.

And I suppose it would be blasphemy to suggest that Simon Harris does not believe in miracles on the basis that were that the case he would not have chosen politics as a career move. I know politics used to be the art of 'make-believe' and the voters fell for that claptrap of lies and false promises. This, actually, is quite like the miracle of the affected homeowner with defective blocks reaching a wall of make believe when the miracle proved to be total fluke or else it was something else that was genuinely defective.

Meanwhile, Simon Harris got his much higher than expected figure on housing construction in correspondence from the Housing Minister, Darragh O'Brien. No one better than Darragh given the housing crisis keeps coming back to bite his arse every time the record for homelessness is published... as happened last Friday. See the travel of the two FG politicians putting a totally new shape on housing. Harris could easily double the 250,000 new houses he promised to deliver in five years and perhaps Senator Barry Ward might add his own tuppence worth in his own inimitable manner. And while 40,000 new builds would be welcome, it falls short of the 60,000 that is needed to allow supply to overtake demand in the private sector. It is quite shameful that the FG led government since a way back in history, 2011 have failed to resolve the housing crisis, the Mica

crisis, the health crisis, the infrastructure crisis, the lack of children's classrooms crisis, the constitutional crisis where the numbers of Dail Deputies is growing by the year of at least 2.2 new members, the climate crisis, the farming crisis and the rural depopulation crisis and Letterkenny's traffic crisis, the child orthodontic crisis, the invasion of Ireland's air space by the IDF crisis and the scoliosis crisis, to name a few. The Ditch website has reported a number of occasions that Israeli arms passed through Irish airspace from the United States on a number occasions since the beginning of the conflict in Gaza last October.

The issue for the Government ultimately is that the flights passed over Ireland in apparent breach of Irish law.

Back on terra firma, the best vardstick by which to judge the lack of housing is to simply check the ever increasing costs of new builds and again in the rental sector where €1,600 a month is about average. What young couple could afford that? Simon Harris made the claim that almost 40,000 homes will be completed this year, when he spoke at the annual Michael Collins commemoration at Beal na Bláth last Sunday week.. That is way above what most commentators believe is the reality of housing delivery in 2024. Industry figures put the likely final tally closer to 34,000 homes. However, the rate of completions in the first half of this year was down 8.6pc, when only 12,730 new dwellings were finished – so almost 21,000 homes must be built between now and Christmas if this lower target is to be met. To hit 40,000 by Christmas would require a trebling of supply from July to the end of the year.

"The figures quoted are from correspondence received from Mr O'Brien," his spokesperson said. "Housing is the Government's number one priority and we are on target for the highest number of completions since 2008 and the highest social-housing build since 1975." Under the Housing for All plan, the Government's official target is 33,450 new homes being built in 2024.

This has led to a substantial housing deficit, with the Housing Commission estimating that the underlying shortage ranges from 212,500 to 256,000 homes based on the 2022 census figures. The country will need up to 53,000 new homes a year to keep up with population growth, even without factoring in all the "pent-up demand" from years of undersupply.

Meanwhile the misery of homelessness continued on Friday. As if you need to be reminded about Government spin, FG did their best to talk positively because the figures for homelessness in Ireland had reached a new record, a new low. As the number of people in homelessness reaches yet another grim record, the Government is appealing to local authorities to assess all zoned lands suitable for housing, and to determine whether further tracts should be zoned "residential". Latest data from the Department of Housing on Friday, shows there were 14,429 people in emergency accommodation in July, including in excess of 4,000 children in more than 2,000 families. The figures represent the seventh consecutive monthly increase since December and the "devastating consequences of this Government's housing failures", said the Social Democrats spokesman on housing, Deputy Cian O'Callaghan. Sinn Féin spokesperson on Housing, Eoin Ó Broin, said: "Once again, another grim homelessness record has been reached under Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael."

The figures say that during the week of July 22nd to 28th there were 10,028 adults and 4,401 children in emergency accommodation.

The latest numbers represent a 12.3 per cent increase in the 12 months since July last year, when there were 12,847 people in emergency accommodation including 9,018 adults and 3,829 children. None of this data includes homeless people who are in domestic refuges, those in direct provision centres who have leave to remain in the State, those who are sleeping rough, or the 2,539 male asylum seekers awaiting offers of accommodation.

Focus Ireland's chief executive Pat Dennigan said it was a "harsh reality" that "thousands of kids have just started a new school year coming from emergency accommodation".

Rabble Fairs recalled as old friends meet sixty years later

When Liam Kelly and Jerry sprightly 78 with a memory that McBride last saw each other they were hired hands on neighbouring farms near Torr Head in county Antrim and it was sixty years ago in the war time era of 1944.

Liam came from Shandrum outside of Buncrana and now lives in Drumfries. Jerry hails from Kerrykeel high above Mulroy Bay and after a lifetime of working he's now back there, as happy as the day's ong

Both had been hired out to farmers at the Derry rabble fair on November 19th in 1943 and they found themselves working in Antrim and they became good friends with memories of some great times out in the country around Cushendun. Those times came to an end in mid 44 when they moved on and until last Sunday they'd never met again. And when Liam and his grandson drove over from Buncrana they had no idea if Liam would even recognise Jerry. But a bottle of lameson's Crested 10 soon rekindled the memories and they spent hours reminiscing of former times and how their lives have changed in those sixty years.

It was a wonderful occasion up at the McBride ancestral home and friends and neighbours gathered round to hear the tales of farming life: being hired out to farms in Northern Ireland: going to the UK to work on the hydro dams or the open cast mines.

Sitting at the fireside in the McBride home and listening to these two men chat was a revelation: a privlege and a real eye opener for a younger generation who'd never before heard of a 'turnip snedder,' hoeing spuds and sewing barley in the Spring time.

The fact that the Council is now estimating the cost of the work at such a huge fee has shocked and angered the local community. Spokespersons for the community said that this was only 'another lame duck excuse' since it was fairly obvious that this sort of funding was not forthcoming. And it is also pointed out that on the current priority lists for water services in the Milford area the Gainne hill reservoir is bottom of the heap.

Cllr. Noel McBride says that the Council's estimated cost of €1.5 million is only putting the problem on the long finger and he's not prepared to sit there and accept this estimate of the job. He has indicated that the local community has now taken steps of their own to have the project evaluated on an independent basis and he's firmly of the opinion that a substantial job can be completed for a fraction of the cost given by a Council engineer. He

many years. The Cllrs. also heard accusations that a large part of the area was being deliberately starved of water merely to keep the supply from unauthorised holiday homes out on the Atlantic Drive beyond Clontallagh and Melmore.

The Council's water engineers have said that the project to give a guaranteed supply to this part of Downings is more complex than merely putting in a bigger reservoir. The local community does not agree. They point out that the original storage facility was put in place to serve less than forty homes as far back as 35 years ago.

It is now claimed that a simple extension to the storage capacity of the tank at Gainne Hill would solve the crisis and with water being pumped into the system at night the pressure on the existing daytime supply would no longer be a problem. As the controversy continues the Mevagh Development Association has already accused Council officials of 'toying about with local communities' and being 'faceless bureaucrats' who have no real interest in the problems facing rural communities.




Book Review by Connie McGranaghan

This novel which is set in Tasmania has an interesting premise and is a little different in that the narrative starts off with a court report based on a death resulting from a road traffic accident. The report is alluded to throughout the novel, but it is not until the end when the reader will find out which of

the characters has actually died. The novel centres around the intertwined lives of three women with chapters narrated at different times by each one of them. Zoe is a local high school teacher who is just at the start of a relationship and madly in love with boyfriend Nick. Grace is a vet and a single mother her daughter Emma has an eating disorder and due to being bullied has had to change schools. Zoe just happens to be her new teacher. Grace (the vet) grapples with the challenges of

raising a troubled daughter while hiding a painful secret. The third female character is Imogen and a doctor in training who faces intense professional





This book was very clever in the way the author weaves together the three lives without any of the characters being aware of the effect their actions are having on one another. The way in which she built the characters that were not without imperfections but were very likeable was also very clever. There was a lot going on with each character so particularly at the beginning I found it all a little confusing. I was glad that I stuck it out until the end as it all became clearer and I thought it

was a very worthwhile, gripping and enjoyable read.





In the latter stages of the half Cobh began to pose a threat with Matthew McKevitt's effort going wide while Jordan was in the right place to clear another attempt that was goal bound. Oisin Cooney who started in goals for the second game in a row was called into action to divert McKevitt's shot out for a corner. In early second half action, Harps were on the front foot with a Ferry shot being blocked while Johnston's rebound strike went the wrong side of the upright. uniformed gardaí by creating 'business services' units, which will tackle more bureaucratic aspects of policing such as paperwork and financing.

However, the GRA says that feedback it's received from the divisions where the operational model is being piloted shows administration actually increased because gardaí were "bringing timesheets and other documents from one station to another in garda cars due to the inadequacy of the IT infrastructure".

The loss of administration status and Garda numbers in the Milford Headquarter has once again raised the uncertainty of the local service. It is pointed out it faces an uncertain future, similar to Glenties which was a former Headquarters for a large part of West Donegal.

It has not been clarified how many Gardai or administration staff will remain in Milford - although there is a public viewpoint that numbers cannot fall much lower than they are at present. Almost all of Milford outlying stations are already closed on a daily basis and none of them is expected to open again.

Progress on these changes to create a new polic-

ing model stalled last August as the local and EU elections loomed.

However, none of these locations have moved one inch and now there will be only two Divisions to cover Donegal.

With the transfer of the Milford District, the current service is to be absorbed elsewhere. And there are no guarantees of 24 hour cover, gardai on call locally or the location of Garda cars.

Meanwhile, we understand that a premises has been leased in Ramelton and is being reconfigured as a new Garda Station: however, it is only five kilometres from Milford and it seems quite unlikely there will be enough officers to operate both stations.

Community spokespersons whom we contacted this week said that some of their areas already seem too distant from Milford and transferring Garda controls to Letterkenny is a matter of real concern.

It is also not clear if these proposed changes will see a more visible presence of Gardai on patrol. The real fear is that the new plan with all its bells and whistles will leave many parishes more remote than ever before and with the presence of fewer officers being evident.

In recent years there's been a noticeable absence of Garda patrols in many rural areas and there are renewed fears that the new policing system may not help that situation. In fact these rural areas complain that they rarely get sight of a patrol car.

Despite the rising population and increased immigration, Garda numbers are in a worrying decline. As of April 30th this year 2024, the force stands at a total of 14,013 members, with just over 11,050 serving as rank-and-file Gardaí.

This is a stark contrast to the overall strength of 14,750 in March 2020, when the current Minister for Justice took office and the country's population was 300,000 less. Thus, under this coalition, we are witnessing a concerning drop of over 1,000 in rank-and-file Gardaí, even as our population grows.

Details of the Donegal changes were revealed in the Tribune in February 2023 and Milford was seen as the biggest big loser.

That is still on the cards and the political silence is deafening.


Senior hurling title for Burt Underdogs Burt produced a brilliant perfor-
