

He said it was: "A 'calling all cars' type of situation where the whole team could be deployed quickly to respond."

# Remembering LUH floods a decade on

On August 5th, 2014 a torrential summer downpour resulted in a huge emergency operation swinging into action at Letterkenny University Hospital as it was engulfed in a serious flood.

This came just a year after another major flood caused over €25m worth of damage to the facility.

Now a decade on, one of those who responded to both these emergencies, looks back at what it took to help remove thousands of gallons of foul flood water from the hospital in an effort to get essential services up and running as soon as possible.

Kilmacrennan's Denis Sheridan, who runs DS Environmental Services in Leiter, recalls how they played a role in assisting at these "back to back" floods at

the health facility as word began to filter out that a major incident was unfolding a few miles up the road from their base. He said: "It was five in the evening, and I was just having my dinner when my daughter came in and showed me the video on YouTube of the flooding. jumped in the truck straight away and went in where I could see the fire engines pumping water so I called the rest of the crew to come in and we began pumping water. The whole crew, who had iust clocked off after there days work, dropped everything and were there within an hour'

In a small bit of good fortune the hospital was an existing client of DS Environmental so Denis and the team had knowledge of the pipework and electri-

cal ducts underneath the hospital, which would be invaluable in the clean up operation.

He utilised a large portion of his fleet of specialised vehicles at the scene to assist Fire Services in removing flood water and debris from the scene as the emergency effort continued into the

He added: "We had 6 or 7 trucks and hundreds of metres of hosing onsite until 2am helping fire crews pump water. Our Vacuum tankers were also especially useful for pumping debris which had become a big issue. We began by pumping water out of the car park and then moved into the lift shafts which were complete-

# MAG demands O'Brien public meeting

Amid reports that the Minister for Housing Darragh O'Brien will be coming to Donegal the MICA Action Group has formally requested that he attend a public meeting to hear directly from homeowners impacted by the defective concrete

MAG said that in response, on the 8th Septem-

ber 2023, Ms Niamh Redmond, Private Secretary, replied at that time; 'the Minister hopes to visit Donegal again in the near future and will take the opportunity to meet directly with homeowners and officials engaged with the scheme. MAG says that if Minister O'Brien is planning to visit in the near future, he will already have the date scheduled in his diary. "We ask that you demonstrate respect to homeowners by providing due notice of your visit to the county so that arrangements to meet you can be made. We ask that you do not cause additional hurt to already traumatised homeowners by visiting the county unannounced and meeting with officials and other small groups behind closed doors."

MAG has written this week to Minister O'Brien again. "Given that in excess of a year has passed since the receipt of this correspondence from

your office; MAG suggests that it is timely that you meet in a public forum with homeowners in Co. Donegal. The importance of your attendance at such a meeting is paramount. Homeowners deserve the respect of having their views and lived experience heard at first hand."

In the letter MAG says homeowners have been continuously held at arm's length by the Department of Housing.

The letter to the Minister continues: "In fact, homeowners are the only stakeholders that are prevented from contributing directly to the reviews of the Defective Concrete Scheme and to a variety of other meetings including that held recently involving the newly established Appeals Panel.

The concerns in relation to the scheme are well documented as are your responses to these concerns. It is not MAG's intention to repeat all of the issues with the scheme herein. We have previously documented the significant barriers to the scheme in correspondence with yourself and your colleagues. Officials point to the increase in the cap as a success of the scheme. The reality is that the cap is irrelevant to people if they are

unable to access the scheme in the first instance." MAG also states in the letter that a huge number of homeowners are also having the recommendations of their original chartered engineers downgraded and being assigned a cheaper, unscientific recommendation option than the full demolition required. They say the use of the cap as evidence of success of the scheme is disingenuous in light of the numbers of people who are unable to access the scheme in the first instant due to a myriad of reasons, not least of which is the government's failure to make practicable its policy solution to provide for upfront costs.

In the letter MAG also address other issues. "Minister, you hold the number of applications to the scheme (1,970 as of 11/04/24) as a criteria of success. The latter is an extremely blunt instrument. Applications of homes to the scheme are very different to completion of homes, of which, over the duration of two Defective Concrete Schemes; we have 43 completed in this county and 16 in Mayo. Taking the presumably hugely underestimated official number of 7,500 houses, the number of homes completed to date represents 0.57% of the total."

MAG have also highlighted comments made in the Dáil on 11/04/2024, when Sinn Deputy Eoin Ó Broin asked Minister O'Brien for his views on the growing concerns of homeowners relative to the scheme. "You stressed that you were 'committed to working through the concerns'. If you were truthful and genuine in that response, you will make yourself available to meet in a public forum with affected homeowners.

MAG believes that if you are planning to visit in the near future, you already have the date scheduled in your diary. We ask that you demonstrate respect to homeowners by providing due notice of your visit to the county so that arrangements to meet you can be made. We ask that you do not cause additional hurt to already traumatised homeowners by visiting the county unannounced and meeting with officials and other small groups behind closed doors. Given your political status, MAG are sure you are in agreement that transparency and accountability are of paramount importance.

MAG anticipate your timely response, in order that the appropriate arrangements can be made.

In his introductory remarks at the outset of the Mass, Fr. Gorman, himself a native of Letterkenny, who described it as an honour to have been asked to celebrate it, said friends to reminisce about

the past and think about all the decent people from the town who had gone to their rest.

"I think especially of Dessie Kelly who was a fundamental part of Letterkenny and of this Reunion. We pray for all the dead and ask the Lord to grant them a place of light, happiness and

# **Omagh Bomb Inquiry gets underway**

The Preliminary Hearing of the Omagh Bombing Inquiry took place on Wednesday of last week. This was in the town's Strule Arts Centre. The Bomb exploded down the street. There was a care for victim families. There was an opening statement. Then relatives were given a couple of minutes to go outside if they wished. Then Counsel for the Inquiry read the names of the 29 dead. A minute's silence followed. All in the room who could, stood for this. Counsellors from the Wave Trauma Centre were present.

The Bombing is now almost a generation past. Trauma and hurt remain. Breda Devine and Maura Monaghan were the two youngest victims. Both should now be approaching 30. The Bombing of August 15th 1998 was the worst single atrocity of the Troubles. Twenty-nine were killed, and unborn twins. There was a forgotten 30th victim. Gareth White was killed in East Belfast when an ambulance rushing a critically ill victim to hospital struck his car.

The Inquiry will not include his death. The Chair of the Inquiry is senior Scottish judge, Lord Alan Turnbull. The Inquiry will examine whether the Bombing "could reasonably have been prevented by UK state authorities."

Families were present, but there is no such body as 'the Omagh families'. Twenty-seven families lost members. Two-thirds were from outside Omagh. They are scattered across Tyrone, Donegal, England and Spain. They come from a variety of religious backgrounds. There is a spectrum of political backgrounds. Most, though, are like most in people in the North (or anywhere). They are not particularly political.

Two groups represent some families. One is the Omagh Support and Self-Help Group. The other is the Families

Moving On group. Most families are in neither group. No-one speaks on behalf of all, or even a majority of,

The preliminary hearing was the first time in well over 20 years either all families, or at least representatives, were together.

Unfortunately Laurence Rush did not live to see the Inquiry. He died 12 years ago. The Bombing killed his wife, Libby. Laurence was a friend. I have several times drove him to Belfast for Court hearings.

Laurence was always angry at the Real IRA. He had no doubts they were, first of all, responsible for the Bombing. But he also had questions about security service involvement. There was an Inquest on the victims in 2000. There, Michael Mansfield represented Laurence. Mansfield is one of the top criminal defence and human rights barristers in Britain. I listened to his careful questioning of witnesses. Mansfield's questions established no police were on duty in Omagh town centre on the day of the bombing. Nearly a quarter of a century on that remains explained. Laurence began legal action against

the Secretary of State and Chief Constable for negligence. This was not a popular stand at the time. There was a campaign to marginalise and discredit him. He was expalled from the Omagh Support and Self-Help Group. Then, it was the only group

representing victims. It was also significantly larger than either of the current groups. In his statement at the Preliminary Hearing, Mansfield explained: "... in this quest (for truth and accountability) Laurence Rush stood alone, steadfast, undaunted and undeterred, even though by obvious questions, by the barbs of criticism and outright hostility he faced in public, in private and in the courtroom. That's a reference to the inquest." Laurence had a long fight to have his case heard. His son, Anthony, is continuing that.

While Laurence was taking his case, the Support and Self-Help Group was sidetracked. This was into a Civil Action against members and alleged members of the Real IRA. This took pressure off police on both sides of the Border. They have the skills and resources to catch the bombers. That is not the job of a bunch of relatives. One of those promoting this Civil Action was the late Sean O'Callaghan. He worked for Irish and British security services inside the IRA. He worked for Irish and British security services. In 1985 he murdered an alleged Garda informer, John Corcoran from Cork. At the time, O'Callaghan was himself a Garda agent. O'Callaghan was never charged with this murder. I spoke to him twice. He found him sinister. The Civil Action was hailed as ground-breaking. There was

circus. Nothing was achieved. The Courts made findings against some individuals. Damages were awarded. These were meaningless. The individuals had no assets. Subsequently at least one family involved raised concerns about legal fees charged. Many who should have known better were swept along with the hype. I remember a prominent journalist telling me all was now over. That was worrying. He was high profile. He should have known better.

Then in 2001 Police Ombudsman Nuala O'Loan issued a report. This found police had knowledge from two sources. On August 4th a man rang Omagh police to say there would be an attack in the town on August 15th. He named three men and a family as involved. The other warning came from Peter Keeley. Keeley had told police a bomb was being made in the Dundalkarea. Keeley was a Newry man who had joined the British Army. He was recruited into its intelligence wing. As an agent he infiltrated the Official IRA, (Provisional) IRA and

Real IRA.

As Laurence's case trundled on, others also took action. The Secretary of State said he would not grant a public inquiry. In 2021 the High Court overturned that decision. Mr Justice Horner ruled "that there was a real prospect of preventing the Omagh bombing." The Inquiry proper will begin on January 27th next year. Certainly, I expect the security services to hide evidence. I will only judge the inquiry when it is over. No ruling will change the reality that the Real IRA planted the bomb. Nobody forced them to do so. They allowed themselves to be tools of the British security services.





## What ever happened to Eric Liddell?

Paris 1924 - a stunning victory in the 400m, a world record, the world at his feet, an unprecedented and even yet unsurpassed domination of world sprinting from 100m to 400m beckoned. The film of Eric Liddell's Olympic triumph won four Oscars. But what happened to Eric Liddell? The second half of Eric Liddell's life is every bit as inspiring as the first. In the Hollywood version Liddell is heard to say, "God made me fast." But in reality what he said was "God made me for China." He had been born in China, the son of godly missionary parents, and felt that the Chinese people were his people. His motto was: Christ for the world, for the world needs Christ. He returned to China in 1925. It was a bleak time, the country was unstable and in turmoil, experiencing the aftereffects of war and famine. But still Liddell went. He had a message to tell - 'the Great Message' he called it - the message of Jesus' life, death and resurrection and the salvation that Christ brings. In 1934 he married Florence MacKenzie, the daughter of Canadian missionaries, and together they had three daughters (one of whom he would never see). In 1937, his happy life was interrupted by the inva-sion of the Japanese forces into Northern China. But this didn't stop Liddell. He continued to

people about Christ, and showing compassion to all he met. Liddell's work became dangerous amidst the brutality of the Japanese soldiers. On one occasion he risked his life to make a long detour to pick up two Chinese men he had heard about, victims of a botched execution, and bring them to safety. Liddell and other British nationals were advised by their government to leave China, but in typical sacrificial fashion, Liddell chose to stay - sending his pregnant wife and two daughters on to Canada. In 1943 the Japanese rounded up westerners and sent them to an internment camp. And here again we see the heart of Liddell. He was servant of all - he chopped wood, pumped water, cleaned latrines, saw the elderly were cared for, entertained the children, unloaded supplies, did odd jobs, organised competitions to keep up spirits, preached, taught and set exams for the students. One prisoner said, "Later I realised he did everything." When he found a boy with no shoes in the cold winter, Liddell gave him his pair of running shoes. He treated everyone with dignity and value. A prostitute in the camp told how he had put up a shelf for her, saying, He was the first man to do something for me without asking for a favour in return." He refused to see the Japanese guards as the enemy, seeing them instead as lost sheep. He called his fellow prisoners not



to hate the guards, but to pray for and forgive them. This he lived out. As 1944 progressed, his health began to fail, but not his faith. Liddell faced death in early 1945, scribbling a last message in faint pencil on a page, "All will be well". And it would be, not because he was a wonderful man, although he was, but because he trusted a wonderful Saviour - one he saw worth leaving fame and fortune behind for in order that others might know this Saviour too. His race was over. He was with the Saviour he loved and served so well. He was mourned and honoured both in the prison camp and over all of Scotland.

### Long Island Colm Toibin

If you, like myself loved Brooklyn by Colm Toibin you will surely love this sequel, Long Island. The novel again centres around Eilis. It is 20 years on, and she is now living in Long Island with her husband Tony and their two children. She is within

a close proximity of all Tony's tight knit Italian family. She is literally surrounded by them. Tony, it turns out has been unfaithful to his Irish wife and Eilis is trying to come to terms with his disloyalty and that of his family as they all discuss what should be done with the imminent arrival of the child resulting from his fling. Eilis decides to return to Enniscorthy after a 20-year absence. She returns just in time for her Mothers 80th

Birthday and on arrival she figures that there has been little change in the village. One thing that has not changed is the feelings that she has for her former love interest Jim. Jim Farrell is still living in Enniscorthy and unbeknownst to Eilis is now seeing. her childhood school friend, widowed Nancy. The narrative is shared from the perspectives of not just Eilis, but Nancy and Jim also. We get to see how Eilis family has gotten on over the last twenty years, her Mother and her brothers. The relationship with

> her mother is a fraught one but when Eilis's children join her in Ireland, we get to see a softer side of her Mother.

> There are lots of strong characters within this lovely book, the women in particular most definitely take the lead. Eilis is a very complex character but spontaneous in a way that brings the drama to the story. The book ends with uncertainty and leaves and left me wanting to know more about what

will happen to Eilis. There had better be a follow

# **Social Media: lunatics** taking over the asylum!

While the rioting in Belfast at the weekend had the capacity to shock us all, the bigger question is could a similar occurrence happen here? It is only days since we watched Garda officers in Coolock being pelted with bricks and any implement the rioters could lay their hand on. From this distance in Donegal, I was shocked to realise that our brave law enforcers seemed poorly equipped in terms of riot proof helmets or much else as they battled the odds with great courage.

The far right rioting in Belfast at the weekend and further afield in the UK is a real threat to community well-being and democracy. These actions serve no purpose other than to inflame passions, threaten lives or serious injury. They also attack the police and cause untold damage. And the rioting has led to a real fear of the unknown for so many families who are relatively new to this kind of madness.

We already witnessed the scenes from Coolock and across the Border at the weekend as the police have come under sustained attack. Watching the television footage, it looks obvious the Gardai do not have the tools at their disposal to deal with these situations.

Have we reached a crossroads where this rioting will get out of control... and then what? While there always has to be time and space for protest, that can only have any real effect when it's done within the law. We had serious riots in Dublin and there is no point in pretending that a similar flame could easily be ignited by some airheads on mobile phones spreading false rumours, lies and incitement that threatens the foundations of the State: but how prepared are our security forces in dealing with the incidents in Rotherham on Sunday night? The slaughter of three young girls on Monday of last week at a dance class in Southport shocked everyone. However the misinformation and lies that

suddenly became the catalyst for the violent rioting and extensive damage that continued to grow and spread into this week.

Almost thirty years since the massacre of sixteen children and a teacher in Dunblane, perhaps the time is right to press the reset button. This tragedy led to 750,000 petitions to change the law. And that is what happened: within months of the tragedy, new legislation was enacted to outlaw the ownership of handguns. Perhaps, now is the time to revisit and licence access to social media in order to make users obey a code that would stop and punish false information going online. Now, the death of three children in Southport and the dreadful aftermath calls for a renewed attempt to make social media posts accountable in law. In reality, Irish law allows those who've been libelled and identified to take appropriate action in the courts. And there are cases where that happens. But social media is such a cesspit that not many take it seriously. The far right exploits this laisse faerie tolerance. The reaction to the false narrative from Southport shocked many in Britain in these past ten days and it is depressingly inevitable. What shocks us even more is the extent of the rioting across so many parts of the UK. The randomness of it all... the lack of purpose other than to create as much damage as possible and to put lives at risk. And the UK's prime minister has promised

a tough response to stop 'a breakdown in law and order on our streets'.

And instead of the Olympics coverage we are watching riot police standing across a street in Southport. They are wearing helmets and have transparent shields. Clouds of black smoke are rising into the air behind them. There are bricks lying on the street. Some cars are on fire in the background. There are also officers with dogs.

And police in the UK are bracing for potential further violent far-right demonstrations in the wake of several skirmishes after online misinformation attributed the stabbing of three children at a Taylor Swift-themed summer holiday dance class to a Muslim immigrant.

Demonstrations were being promoted online since then in Sunderland, Belfast, Cardiff, Liverpool and Manchester, using phrases including "enough is enough," "save our kids" and "stop the boats". Prime Minister Keir Starmer pledged to end the mayhem and said police across the UK would be given more resources to stop "a breakdown in law and order on our streets". The British government's adviser on political violence and disruption John Woodcock said there was a "concerted and coordinated" attempt to spread the vio-

lence. The murders on Monday of last week of Alice Dasilva Aguiar, 9, Elsie Dot Stancombe, 7, and Bebe King, 6, in the seaside town of Southport shocked a country where knife crime is a longstanding and vexing problem, though mass stabbings are rare. Seventeen-year-old Axel Rudakubana was charged with murder over the knife attacks. He was charged with 10 counts of attempted murder for the eight children and two adults who were wounded.Rudakubana was born in the United Kingdom to Rwandan parents and lived close to the scene of the attack.

A violent demonstration in Southport on Tuesday was followed by others around the country, fuelled in part by online misinformation that said the attacker was Muslim and an immigrant.

Suspects who are under 18 are usually not named in the UK, but judge Andrew Menary ordered that Rudakubana could be identified, in part to stop the spread of misinformation.

Far-right demonstrators held several violent protests in response to the murders, clashing with police outside a mosque in Southport and hurling beer cans, bottles and flares near the prime minister's office in London the next day.

Police officers were pelted with bottles and eggs in the town of Hartlepool in northeast England, where a police car was set ablaze. Seven men aged 28 to 54 were charged with violent disorder and were due in court Friday, the local Cleveland Police force said.

The Muslim Council of Britain urged mosques to review and strengthen their security protocols during Friday prayer amid fears of protests "seeking to intimidate Muslim communities and mosques."

While the rioting in Belfast at the weekend had the capacity to shock us all, the bigger question is could a similar occurrence happen here? It is only days since we watched Garda officers in Coolock being pelted with bricks and any implement the rioters could lay their hand on. From this distance in Done-

gal, I was shocked to realise that our brave law enforcers seemed poorly equipped in terms of riot proof helmets or much else as they battled the odds with great courage. It is not all that long ago since we saw the Dail come under attack and this was the most serious of situations. I wonder what lessons have been learnt from the experience and to what extent has the Gardai been afforded much better protection. Too many officers on duty are getting injured from bricks being thrown. Here in Ireland, it is no longer safe for the leaders of Government to reside in their own homes and in the heart of their own community. Despite our travails and threats since Partition, this is the first generation of politicians who are under threat from within this State. And that is a very real and dangerous sit-



uation with a handful of extremists fanning the flames of hatred and attracting a like mindset who really do not have an opinion of their own.

Social media is the most dangerous of tools in the wrong hands. And we are already familiar with this behaviour in Donegal: we were witness to the personal attacks on one local election candidate in what was the lowest of low attempts to destroy the candidate's character. In fairness the attempt failed.

The keyboard warriors in the main are driven by external ideation and in many instances, there is no regard for facts or clear thinking.

In the wrong hands, social media is a dangerous vehicle of negativity, spreading lies and fake news. The fact that so many are eager to engage in spreading this rumour mongering is, at best, highly worrying. The far right is a place for many hidden traits and mysterious characters whose sum total of thinking can never add up all their own parts. This is a kind of fundamentalism that does not need a base, other than to attack the lawmakers, to damage property in the mistaken belief that their version of law and order is best delivered by thuggery and a mindset of questionable rational thinking.

For some inexplicable reason, you will find numbers of these keyboard warriors influenced by external sources, seemingly with a narcissistic belief of their own self-importance and the need to have their egos massaged. These disciples of the keyboard seem fulfilled by someone around them who exudes an importance that is not shared or justified. These extremists have no electoral mandate and are quite happy to ignore those who put their trust in the elected government of the people. Governments are never perfect: however we elect them in the spirit of democracy. And if not happy, another general election will come along, so we can try again. However, there is a silent alternative view being promoted that our government wants to rid the country of Irish people to create space for refugees and cheap labour. Even here in Ireland we must be acutely aware of those spreading ill-judged claims that have no foundation whatsoever. The far right has a role in the promotion of this evil that has been gathering for quite some time. However, none of these dangers emerged in the recent elections and that is something surprising given that many's the armchair pundit is promoting this false

However, there is evil out there, look no further than some of the cringeworthy claims emerging on social media platforms. It is something of a mystery that any group or individual can go on social media inciting hatred, lies and misinformation. The reality is that those claims are in fact libel and as such the perpetrators are open to legal challenge through due process. Unfortunately for many, social media is a disaster best left aside because the abuses thrown around need to be contained within the laws of the land. And when these keyboard idiots get away with this behaviour, the lunatics are taking over the asylum...and these numbers are growing by the day.







# 300 jobs axed at Unifi

The troubled Unifi textile plant at Letterkenny is to shut down leaving the 300 remaining workers without a job. The news was given to the employees when they were called to a special meeting in the factory on Wednesday afternoon amid speculation that around fifty more redundancies were to be announced.

The closure will become effective at the end of October and in the intervening period the company will wind down it's polyester yarn production.

And underlying the loss of jobs in Letterkenny the local Chamber of Commerce has warned that the factory closure will mean a deficit of fourteen million Euro to the town per year. Eamon Stevenson said that as a consequence of this loss he feared that other elements of employment would also face difficulties in surviving.

The Tanaiste Mary Harney reacted with typical bravery. She expressed dismay at the losses saying it would be a severe setback for the local economy. These remarks will obviously be a huge boost to the body politic in Donegal.



### Man jailed for Donegal rape of new mother

A man who raped a woman as she slept in bed be-several previous convictions including for assault and side her boyfriend and newborn baby at a house in Donegal has been jailed for eight years at the Central Criminal Court.

Shaun O'Donnell, 34, of Woodlands Way, Whinmore, Leeds, UK was found guilty by a jury of one count of rape and one count of sexual assault at the property on March 26th, 2021, following a trial.

A previous hearing heard that O'Donnell had been staying over with the woman and her partner for drinks the night before and the following morning, climbed into bed where the couple was sleeping beside their newborn baby and raped the woman.

The woman initially thought it was her partner, before she turned around and realised it was O'Donnell. When confronted, O'Donnell said he did not remember anything and denied the allegation when interviewed by gardaí.

O'Donnell, who works in construction in the UK has

dangerous driving.

The victim said her body had not fully recovered from having her baby when she was raped adding i was the worst experience of her life and deeply affected her and her family.

Mr Justice Keane described the victim impact statement as "impressively written and deeply affecting". Justice Keane noted O'Donnell has previous convictions, but none for violent or sexual offending nad imposed a sentence of eight years on the rape count. He did not suspend any part of the sentence, noting that O'Donnell declined to take part in victim-focused work saying there was "no realistic prospect" of encouraging rehabilitation.

O'Donnell also received a concurrent sentence of two years and eight months in relation to the sexual assault charge.

The Letterkenny man goes in the semi-final after an outstanding performance in his heat on Wednesday morning. The Finn Valley AC member finished second in a time of 1:45.15. The 31-year-old was just pipped on

the line by Gabriel Tual of France. The top three from each of the six heats qualified automatically for the semi-finals. English was just 0.02 seconds behind Tual, who clocked 1:45.13. Third across the line was Tshepiso Masalela (Botswana) in a time of 1:45.58.







The participating Day Centres are Creeslough, Falcarragh, Maghery, Gaoth Dobhair, Fanad, Toraí, Árainn Mhór, Baile na Finne and Anagaire.

The raised beds are wheelchair accessible and have a variety of aromatic plants which not only give a burst of colour but some are edible as well. Plants such as Rosemary, Thyme, Coriander, strawberries, cabbages, parsley and chives are some of the edibles growing in the raised beds. Through the project the day centres have also been supplied with small hand tools which will allow their clients get involved in the planting, weeding and caring for the plants. Day Centre clients attending the events have also received booklets giving information on healthy eating for older people as well as Action Men booklets for the Mens Sheds members.




