Three candidates have been nominated to contest the FG convention on Monday week as preparations get into full swing for a predicted general election on November 15th.

Cllr. Jimmy Kavanagh, Letterkenny has been joined by Senator Nikki Bradley, Milford and John McNulty from Kilcar. We've learnt that an anticipated interest from Inishowen did not materialise.

Council rescinds order to buy Milford houses

The proposed purchase of 17 social houses at Lough Fern Heights in Milford has ended without a reso-

After lengthy negotiations with the developer, Donegal County Council has now rescinded the order to purchase the turnkey development.

In a final attempt to resolve the issues arising, the Council offered the developer an increased figure of more that €3.733 million but the terms were not agreed.

The developer of the project, PJD Construction, has been informed by the Council that any proposals to sell the development to an AHB, will require engagement and agreement according to Cllr. 

The convention on August 26th is in the Radisson Blu Hotel at 7.30pm.

However, there is no denying that FG has really serious problems at all levels within the constituency. Their local election results point to the enormity of the task ahead even if they get a shiny new executive committee visiting every doorstep between now and polling day, the task is one of their most difficult ever.

With a growing population there is every possibility that the quota will close to 14,000 on a turn out in excess of 62%. At the local elections FG woes were evident with an 8% drop in their first

preference vote across the entire county. With those districts south of Laghey in Sligo-Leitrim the party's current strength of 8,068 votes could easily be pared back.

However in the climate of positive group thinking that marked the Taoiseach's address to the MacGill Summer School in Glenties, FG supporters will live and hope.

The greatest challenges of the past four decades have been met with energy, vision, hope, determination, and also, crucially, with optimism. In these times, where we face multiple, overlapping challenges, a key quality I would add, and the one which defines my philosophy as Taoiseach, is pragmatism."

Simon Harris said: "Pragmatism means being equal to the moment before us, while preparing carefully for the next. Pragmatism is not defined by a label like 'right' or 'left' but the action taken in the moment to solve the problems in front of us. Pragmatism is knowing over what time scale actions need to be taken, and knowing you need to bring everyone with you as you act," says he with the wisdom of an eternal optimist.

That, surely will be tested to the very limit of Donegal politics on election day...

As one seasoned campaigner for FG noted - it will take many miles burning up all the shoe leather that Fine Gael can muster if they have any ambitions of retaining Joe McHugh's seat.

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Community Centre fundraiser on tra

A fund-raising buy-a-brick campaign for a major new development at Letterkenny Community Centre is set to hit a milestone in the coming weeks. Sales to date have been very encouraging and they are now on target to pass the 200 mark shortly.

It's all part of the drive to raise funds for the new €1.4 million Jim Lynch community building - currently under construction - that will cater for public events, meetings and functions and, significantly, will also see two new state-of-the-art dressing rooms being built beside the existing astroturf (4G) playing pitch which has been a huge success since it was completed in 2019.

"The buy-a-brick campaign is an important fundraising part of this major project," centre manager Liam O'Donnell stated. "It is an opportunity for individuals, families or businesses, to buy an inscribed brick which will be placed in the new building. By doing so they are helping us to complete this new addition as we expand our facilities to meet the ever-increasing demand."

"As a non-profit organisation built by the people, for the people, we rely heavily on these fundraising initiatives to turn our community dreams into reality. Each brick is a one-off purchase and businesses can have their logo laser-engraved onto a polished granite brick, holding a place of honour in our new facilities for generations to come."

There is now also a memorial brick which is proving to be a very popular option. This is an opportunity for people to buy a brick in memory of a much loved one.

He continued: "In September we will see a big influx of people returning to classes at the centre and it is a timely reminder of just how popular it has become. We are hopeful that even more people will support our buy-a-brick campaign. We are delighted with the response to date and extend our thanks to anyone who has supported us already."

The new development will be known as the Jim Lynch Community building in memory of the late councillor, who was a leading figure on the board of directors for many years and who was also the editor of the hugely popular Letterkenny Christmas Annual which is published by the centre.

The main source of funding has been from the Community Centre Investment Fund, the Dormant Accounts Fund, and Donegal County Council. However, the balance must be met by the Community Centre through loans, and fundraising initiatives such as the buy-a-brick campaign.



Most worrying week in the North since 1974

Immigrant communities in the North are now living in fear. Even here in Omagh many immigrants are too frightened to leave their homes. Immigrants whose skin is not white are particularly worried.

That is because last week was the North's most worrying since 1974. Then the Ulster Workers Council strike brought down the first power-sharing government. (Of course, calling what happened a strike is wrong. This strike was enforced by Loyalist paramilitaries).

Events now are so frightening because the far right is on the march. Yes, 1974 was horrendous. There were 31,473 asylum seekers in the South. 304 deaths.

However, internationally, events were moving in the opposite direction. The left seemed to have the advantage. A Labour Government was elected in Britain. There was a revolution in Portugal. Across Europe parties of the hysterical. And, of course, there is a left were going forward.

The world of 2024 is different. Yes, a Labour government has been elected in Britain. But there are now hard right MPs in the British parliament. They are from the 'Reform' party of Nigel Farage. In France the National Rally is the biggest single party. Leader Marine Le Pen has a good chance of being the next President. Rightwing forces are advancing across the European Union (EU).

Ireland, North and South, is not immune from these trends. Unfortunately, we Irish have shown we can be racist. Of course, there is an Irish stamp on whatever happens. But it

Unfortunately, the Irish have shown we can be racist. There has been violence. More, there are plenty of farfetched rumours. At present, there are That's tiny in a population of 5.2million. They are not allowed to work. They receive minimum payments. In the North, the numbers are much smaller. There are 2,248.

Despite facts, rumours can be confusion of immigrants and asylum seekers. Most immigrants are not asylum seekers.

Racists aren't facing reality. The North's health service runs on immigrant labour. I have had to attend hospital several times recently. Doctors, nurses and many ancillary staff were all immigrants. Often they are from Asia or Africa. Other areas of the economy also run on immigrant labour. The cleaning industry definitely does. Workers in food processing are immigrants. Increasingly, small shops and takeaways are immigrant-run. These serve communities.

Violence is having an effect. Significant numbers of immigrant nurses are talking about leaving the North. Several have been driven from their homes in Antrim. South Belfast is another area where many live. The homes of several have been attacked. Our health service is already tottering. Without immigrants it would collapse.

There has been a positive side to events. There have been large rallies in Belfast and Derry. That is because the trade unions took to the streets. That is particularly the unions in the health service.

Voices have spoken out. Some are those you would expect. But they include a group called Her Loyal Voice. They call themselves Loyalist Feminists. They have certainly been outspoken. They supported the rallies in Belfast against racist attacks. At present, the tide has definitely turned. More people are speaking out against the attacks. Many feel that is the right thing to do. I suspect others feel not speaking gets them a bad name.

Racist riots have died away for now. They will not go away. The rioting began in Southport. I have been there. It is a decayed former seaside resort North of Liverpool.

Very quickly rioting spread to a whole number of cities. To happen that needed organisation. This used types of social media. Clearly, forces had been prepared for some suitable event. When it happened, they were ready to organise rioting.

The killer of the three girls in Southport was born in Wales, He was a Christian. The family was very active in their Church. There was no backlash against Welsh people or Christians.

There were big counter-demonstrations against racist attacks. That was

very welcome. Rioting has died down. However, there are worrying signs. In a survey, 7% of people in England said they supported the riots. That is a big number. Clearly that 7% is seriously alienated from mainstream society.

There is a whole online media universe out there. This goes beyond only spreading misinformation. This helps these forces to organise.

And again, I have to return to the role of X. X was formerly Twitter. South African millionaire Elon Musk took over. X carries the most nasty posts. However, Musk carries no liability. That is very different to the Tribune. It can be dragged into the courts for anything published. Meanwhile, the Belfast riots produced weird bedfellows. 'Coolock Says No' marched with some of the wilder elements of the UDA. Some of these factions have ties to the far-right in

'Coolock Says No' and Loyalists is a marriage made in Hell. It won't last. They will turn brutally on each other. For the 'Coolock Says No' brigade Sinn Féin is not nationalist enough. Since the Belfast riots, the Southern

far right has boasted of how Nationalist it is. The UDA elements will have to turn even more Unionist. Don't rejoice too much at the falling out, though. That will only further destabilise things. Most of the violence has taken place in perceived Loyalist areas. However, most immigrants live in those areas. There is more cheap housing. But anyone thinking Northern nationalists can't be racist is foolish. **Demonising Moslem or other** immigrant groups is wrong. So is demonising certain working-class Protestant communities.

Those are some of the North's most deprived. Remember, many attacking immigrants also make life hell for their other neighbours.

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

New life set to return to Creeslough's

hidden church

A special new project is emerging in Creeslough to restore a historic church that has been hidden out of sight for many years.

by Eamonn McFadden

The ruins of Clonbeg Glebe Church and graveyard are tucked away along the Faymore River where it meets the tranquility of Sheephaven Bay at Cloone, Creeslough.

Long since abandoned, this former site of worship and the final rest place of many, was an active church as far back as the 1600's.

Now, plans are in place to conserve this special site over the coming years for future generations.

As part of National Heritage Week, on Friday, August 23rd, weather permitting, a walk is being hosted at the site by members of the Clonbeg Heritage Group together with archaeologist Kate Robb of John Cronin & Associates who says they are "delighted to share our plans to conserve the historic church and graveyard and to make this tranquil place more accessible to all."

As well as learning the history of this historic church and graveyard, you can hear how you too can help with this exciting project.

Details of the Conservation Manage-

ment Plan being considered highlight that Clonbeg Glebe church was probably a 'chapel of ease' to Clondahorky and probably abandoned soon after the present church was built at Ballymore in 1752. A memorial dated 1679 recorded at the site would indicate that the church was in use at that period.

Now, much of the ruins, which still have a number areas of building details including window arches and walls, are overgrown with vegetation, as is the adjoining graveyard. Some details of a tomb and headstone can still be observed within the grounds and one stone dates back to the 1890's which indicates the grave-

yard may have remained in use for

Landowner, Cathal, says that the area is steeped in history and it was his understanding that the last person to be laid to rest there was a man from Brockagh's called Mattie Dunlop.

Clonbeg Committee member Bernard Lafferty claims old maps show that there was a small village of up to eight houses in the vicinity of the church in the past and that nearby were the remains of a Druid's altar, which only adds to the rich history of the locality.

The heritage walk takes place on Friday, August 23rd from 6pm to 7.30pm gathering at the location along the N56 at Cloone with parking in a nearby farmyard, with refreshments being served in the Creeslough Community Hub in the main street afterwards.

In the event of bad weather, then the full event will take place in the Community Hub.

Patrons intending to join the walk are advised that as this is an active farming area no dogs are allowed on the walk, children under five are not permitted due to the uneven terrain, and strong footwear is advised for

Hockey's Off-field Drama

They didn't win a medal but they certainly made the headlines. The Australian men's hockey team are in the spotlight because of two off-field events. First, Matt Dawson faced the scenario every athlete dreads as he picked up an injury just a few weeks before the Olympics. Receiving a hefty blow from a stick, the defender sustained a serious injury to one of his fingers. When the damage was assessed the verdict was stark: surgery, months of recuperation, no chance of competing in Paris. Dawson had other ideas. In spite of his wife warning him not to do anything "rash", he struck upon another option - amputation! After having the injured portion of the finger surgically removed, Dawson joined his teammates. Yet another reason why I'm not an Olympic athlete! The second event occurred last week after the Aussies had already been eliminated as police in Paris arrested a man for allegedly buying cocaine during a night out. Turns out it was Tom Craig, another ex-

perienced member of the side. Athletes know about calculated risks of course, buying illicit drugs in a city crawling with the world's sports media takes that to extremes. Since his release from custody, Craig has apologised for his "terrible mistake". You suspect that the recriminations are not yet over. On the face of it, the two stories are on opposite ends of the spectrum. One features an athlete doing literally all he can to attain medal glory, the other features an athlete behaving unprofessionally after the opportunity for glory has been and gone. Yet both stories highlight our human tendency and ability to choose destructive paths. Criag's destructive night out hardly needs further comment. But what can we learn from Dawson's heroic effort? In one sense it's very on trend for an Olympian. Every participant at the Games will have made millions of sacrifices in pursuit of glory, few of which ever make the news.

To win gold you need to have a monomania-

cal determination to constantly improve. Yet a simple question puts that determination in context: who won the gold in 2016? The awkward truth is that few will have the foggiest clue. Even if Dawson had claimed the top prize, his sacrifice and glory would have been forgotten within a few Olympic cycles.

The stories illustrate two opposite yet similarly destructive human paths. Some of us have a habit of lurching towards obviously destructive behaviour even though we know deep down that it will end in tears. Others eschew that sort of drama and focus on improving ourselves and doing the very best we can. Yet what if all that sacrifice and effort is for something that's going to be forgotten much more quickly than we hope? Both paths point us to a deeper truth: we can't do it by ourselves. Whether we need someone to lift us out of the cycle of ruinous decisions or we need someone to orient our hearts to success that truly

lasts, the answer doesn't lie within ourselves.

As ever, the answer lies in the wisdom of the Creator.

Sinead's dad is Eddie Diver (above) a native of Coshclady, Bunbeg, and her mother is from Belmullet, Co Mayo. Her parents still reside there but Sinead emigrated to Australia over 20 years ago. She only took up marathon running in 2015 and the following year in Rio had an impressive 21st place finish. The now 47-year-old did even better in Tokyo where she crossed the Olympic Marathon in 10th place. Sinead was just over a 1km and five minutes on the road when she suffered the heartache of having to pull out of the race in Paris.

co-operative housing in the country.

The change of direction to remove the development from social housing two years ago raised many eyebrows politically and among those hoping to be housed. There was disbelief that a significant housing development was withdrawn and a group of refugees would take up residence within a number of days. that's according to those hoping to be housed at the location.

Locals in search of a house expressed dismay at this turn of events saying they could not believe what was happening given they were assured that the development was about to be released for applicants on the waiting list for housing.

Locals who had expected to be included for consideration say they were shocked to discover these properties were no longer available to them and they lobbied politicians in search of

The Council has now accepted the developer's withdrawal from the turnkey acquisition. Therefore the offer made has been rescinded, and the Council's involvement in this development has now ended.

The Council expressed disappointment with this position. It is pointed out that the development was built for the Council and the Council obtained Department approval for the developer's tendered price.

The Council also facilitated an uplift on the original tender costs due to Covid and associated inflationary costs.

Two years ago as the occupation of the houses changed, the Council said it provided advice, support and guidance to ensure that the development would comply with the required standards and cost requirements for social housing when completed.

The matter was raised by Councillor Liam Blaney at the 2022 September meeting of the Letterkenny-Milford Municipal District.

A Council response stated, 'the developer has made alternative arrangements and the houses have been occupied.

'We are crying out for social housing and you can understand why people are frustrated. The last social housing development in the Milford Electoral Area was in 2010. A lot of people were looking forward to these houses being complet-

We have to know what went on here and ensure that the same thing doesn't happen with other turnkey developments in the county," Liam Blaney told the MDC.

And responding to concerns the local authority said: "Donegal County Council is currently seeking to establish the facts around the change to the original plan by the developer and we will keep members informed accordingly."

They say they are aware of similar issues arising in other counties and the matter is now being examined at Department level.

Cllr. Donal Kelly, the Cathaoirleach of the Letterkenny-Milford MD in 2022 said the issue 'raised a lot of eyebrows and a lot of questions'.



World Junior Angling in Downings

There is a big week coming up for the Lough Swilly Junior Sea Angling Club with members taking part in the World Championships which are taking place from Saturday week the 24th of August in Downings.

The event was originally scheduled for Rathmullan but due to works at the pier, a different venue had to be found.

The event is being organised by a local committee under the direction of Chairperson Charlie Devlin. It's the first time ever that these World Championships are coming to Donegal and its testament to the great work being done by the Club over the past six years that the event is being staged in the County.

Around 50 junior anglers in the U21 age group will compete including four from Letterk-enny Orlagh McLean, Hannah John and the Donaghey brothers James and Patrick. Some of them already have experience representing Ireland at the World Championships (2022) in Albufeira, Portugal and last year in Cork. They are all members of the Lough Swilly Junior Sea Angling Club who have already hosted two All-Ireland Championships.

After a huge amount of work over the past year Charlie Devlin is looking forward now to the official opening of the 23rd World Championships in Letterkenny on Saturday week. "It's just great

to bring the World's to Donegal. It's never been here before. The World Junior event is only going a few years so to have it here is fantastic. It's costing around €80,000 to run it but it is worth between €250,000 and €300,000 to the local economy. The boats are booked out in Downings for that week. The Station House Hotel is also booked out so that's a big boost for local businesses," Devlin said.

The Club was only established six years ago to provide a recreational outlet for young people who were maybe not as much into mainstream sports. Charlie Devlin said it all started out as a bit of a social gathering before the club was officially launched and it's been a huge success. "I have to give a lot of credit to the late Cecil Browne from Inch Island who had many a chat with me about the need to get the next generation involved in angling. He was a boat skipper and could see where things were going. We have a championship trophy named after Cecil."

There are junior anglers coming from countries including Croatia, Spain, Italy and Germany. They will be arriving on Saturday week the 24th and will take part in the official opening parade at 4pm from the St. Eunan's Cathedral Carpark to the Station House Hotel. There will be lots of entertainment laid on for the visitors including traditional Irish music. The young anglers will (Secretary, Paddy Donaghey and Lisa John who

In the Footsteps of Colmcille

The 3rd annual Slí Cholmcille Walking Pilgrimage/Retreat took place from July 21st to July 28th and was a resounding success. UR-WAN - Understanding Rural - Women in Agriculture Needs

The ACRES Co-operation team for County Donegal are delighted to announce details of two events that will focus on the role of women in agriculture. The team have brought together a range of experts to discuss this important topic and showcase some of the work that women are doing in the sector.

ACRES Project Officer Aileen Collery explains, "The 2020 Census of Agriculture in Ireland shows that women account for just 13% of all farm holders across the country. The Census also pointed to the fact that 58,000 women existed within Irish farming without visibility or farm holder status. Not only does this underrepresent the input of

women in agriculture, it also negatively impacts their ability to avail of funding through agricultural schemes or lending institutes, and their ability to independently access support groups."

'These events run by our team at ACRES Donegal aim to discuss what the key issues are for women in farming, what challenges they face and what resources are needed to level the farming 'playing field. We are encouraging as many females farmers of all ages to join us on Tuesday 20th or Wednesday 21st August to have their voices heard. In particular, we very much welcome women from families which are already in the ACRES co-operation scheme so we can explore opportunities for further engagement."

of the ditch. The blackcurrant bushes had a very small crop of big, juicy berries. I only got four colanders of berries from the four bushes which is about half the regular crop, despite the fact that they were netted from an early stage and totally bird proof. As luck would have it, I was meeting my good friend Jacinta for a trawl of the second-hand shops and lunch in Cavan on the Saturday. Her husband Tony is a member of the Cathedral Choir and he was singing at a centenary Mass for The Missionary Sisters of the Holy Rosary in the cathedral that

After our fruitless ramble through the shops we met Tony for lunch where we were discussing the season's gardening, among other things. They happened to mention that they had recently been gathering blackcurrants in a friend's orchard and remarked on the vast amount of fruit going to waste. I was green with envy and lo and behold didn't Jacinta ring me the next day to say they had picked two buckets of the precious berries for me. I was gone out the door like a hot snot from a dragon's nostril and over to Ballyhaise to collect them. They're the most highly prized fruit in this house for their vitamin rich goodness over the winter. What struck me even more than the small crop of fruit this year was the complete absence of wasps.

Normally I would be surrounded by hoards of wasps and have had many a sting on the fingers from picking berries which had sleepy, replete wasps inside them. Not one wasp or sting this time. I've only met about three wasps altogether this year and they were noticeably smaller than any previous year. Did the wet autumn/ winter/spring do them in, or is the cold summer curtailing their breeding?

I can't say I miss them but I suspect that they

fulfil some vital role in the eco system and that their absence will have a detrimental effect somewhere down the line. Likewise the bees... there have been fewer of them too apparently, although I haven't noticed it because with all the flowers round the porch we get every bee that's going the road dropping in for a snack. It's like a sort of bee filling station and coffee shop. It's just as well swallows don't eat bees or ours would be so fat they'd have to get the boat back to Africa next month.

Their second clutch of scaldies is flying around now and they come into the house every time the door is open. 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All Island Rail Reviews: Money for the rest, not the West

So says Dr. Joe Kelly, former member of the Western **Development Commission.**

He said: "If they could dig a trench and push Donegal and the North West out towards Rockall the Government and their officials would do so. (Rockall is an uninhabitable granite islet in the North Atlantic Ocean. Rockall with nothing at all.)

The Government's newly released 2024 All-Island Rail Review (AIRR) has shown utter contempt for the people of Donegal and the Border Region. We are abandoned yet again.

Of the proposed costing of €37 billion, in this national Railway Report, it is suggested that only 20 Kilometres of Donegal may get €200-€300 million of the estimated budget of 37 thousand million (€37

That spend suggestion is just over 1% of the overall National spend and subject to government and Stormont approval. In other words 99% of this rail budget will be spent outside Donegal.

Clearly the All-Island Rail Review is money for the rest, not the West, money for Dublin, not Donegal. The report confirms, on Page 13: "This is an indicative artistic interpretation... The pathways delineated on this illustration are conceptual in nature and should not be interpreted as a precise or literal depiction of potential routes or route corridors."

In other words, it is a work of fiction. It's election time (Am Togcháin) and looking back at other election promises: Letterkenny was promised an airport - it didn't happen : Donegal was promised a gas line into Derry - it didn't happen: Donegal was

There is no political will to provide competitive infrastructure or do anything for Donegal. The false

promised reliable energy supplies - it didn't happen: Dual carriageways - it didn't happen.

hope, from D2, that a mere single track rail connection into Derry in this new report will happen, sometime in the far distant future, is insulting and fictitious.

Furthermore, on page 133, the Railway Report states: "The 'Modelling undertaken' for the North west of Ireland 'showed there would be very low demand for passenger rail services on this route and that building a railway on this corridor would have significant adverse impact on the environment."


This single statement from the report declares that one third of the land mass of Ireland will continue to be neglected. It also reveals that

Inshore fishing scheme for Donegal fleet

The new scheme to support and enable the economic development of inshore fishing is good news for the Donegal fleet, according to the Minister Charlie McConalogue. An inshore census was conducted by BIM in 2023, the analysis of which will be available shortly. This new scheme will build on this knowledge base by capturing additional detailed information in relation to the current market knowledge and routes to market being used by inshore fishers as well as their ability to identify and access new markets.

He said: "It will provide for the completion of a further survey by applicants, to inform and enable a detailed and comprehensive assessment of these aspects of the sector. This in turn will allow the Department and BIM to develop and target effective supports that will assist inshore fishers to respond to the market challenges they face."

"I have met with representatives of the inshore fleet on a number of occasions to discuss the challenges facing this fleet, in particular those

affecting their ability to access markets. I had indicated previously at the Joint Oireachtas Committee meeting in June that I would be progressing a scheme specifically in response to these challenges. One of the challenges that we have faced when designing supports for the inshore fleet has been the gaps in the data and knowledge available to us. Once we have this additional data, we will then be able to target supports more effectively and support the continued economic viability of the inshore fleet in coming years, Minister McConalogue added.

In order to encourage participation in the survey, and in recognition of the significant administrative work involved for those who do participate, the scheme will make provision for applicants to receive a payment, and the survey will be carried out in two stages. Payments will be based on vessel length, and will be paid in two instalments, one on completion of each stage of the survey. Under the scheme, a total of €3,500

Mica: the agenda for generations not yet born

It is entirely possible that Fine Gael and Fianna Fail will be back in government next time: and the time after. FF is the longest serving party in government and it may remain in office well beyond 2040. Micheál Martin could easily grow old waiting for someone else to challenge him. In these circumstances, the current defective blocks legislation is not likely to be changed. If we round up remediation completions in Donegal to be less than 100 this year, the stats tell us that at this rate of progress, the mica crisis will be around into the next century... and perhaps ... long after 3000AD.

It's mid August in the silly season of political guessing. Otherwise there's been little sunshine and not much to cheer about.

This is Donegal and the holiday season is passing as we are heading into deep autumn.

And for thousands of families in mica infected homes it is yet another year of gloom and fear about what the future holds for them heading into winter. It is estimated that 7,000 homes in the county may be af-

fected with defective materials. This doesn't account for other buildings that are damaged including business premises, farm buildings and retail premises. And as we examine the last 'Ireland Thinks' poll the omens for any real change or improvements to the remediation scheme may be much further away than we want to think. The legislation is written into law and nothing short of a Dail vote can change this legislation. Fianna Fail and Fine Gael seem happy enough to keep the remediation legislation as it is. However there is a broad consensus that change is urgently needed. And few of those waiting for remediation and the delays in processing cases disagree with the need for an

entirely new process. This is going to be the big election red flag for Donegal because with FG in Government into its fourteenth year, it is obvious that they will take much of the blame for failing to deliver on remediation. It is going to be very difficult for them to confront the electorate on the doorsteps of this county with a rationale about their party delivering on defective blocks and no reassurance or slick use of phrasing is going to solve that crisis. For starters, who is going to believe the waffle from candidates for the parties in the current Government, especially families living with crumbling blocks?

However, with a FF Minister for the Environment there will be serious pressure to answer why the legislation was driven through the Dail with the MAG amendments disregarded and not deemed worthy of being debated on the floor of the House. As in most election campaigns there is a rush of promises and worthless claims. However, truth is always the real casualty. Every candidate in Donegal will be calling for the remediation legislation to be changed and each and every one of them knows the political facts and where exactly their parties have failed to deliver on 100% remediation.

Government party candidates will spiff about mica being a priority. But if that was true, the crisis would long be resolved and every defective home would have completed a programme of remediation.

And you can bet that every single candidate contesting seats in Donegal will offer to help, be it in sentiment about having the backs of the people, lobbying the government and it's a sure bet that mica families will be told of meeting the Taoiseach of the day about the problems arising. That's some help. After all, Taoisigh have been to Donegal, saw the devastation and left without offering satisfactory 100% remediation solutions.

And there are real questions too: is the mica crisis to serious to handle and what is a real figure of costs for the damaged properties? And where does the buck stop in the blame game about who is ultimately responsible for the cost of damaged properties? Be sure what you are told has a basis in fact: if a politician turns up saying they are affected homeowners with defective blocks, ask them to produce a copy of their test results to give credence to such claims because that is all they are. Nothing but a professional test of the cores of the blockwork counts. But in politics, some have a tendency to lose the run of themselves and assume a status way above public expectations of their status. Only a core test will tell the truth - and more than ever we need truth in politics. The mica campaigners have travelled a hard road littered with government failures to address a crisis that may top ten billion Euros. But the country does have the money and plenty of it. Yet the political willpower is shamefully absent and has been for years.

Measure the current progress on remediation from an estimate of 7,000 buildings. And that figure is rising with every passing month. If we round up remediation completions in Donegal to 100 this year, the stats tell us that the mica crisis will be still around by the year 3,000 and you can add on another hundred years for the replacement of public buildings, commercial and

retail units, housing estates and farm buildings. It is imperative that the current legislation is overwritten because remediation progress has been delayed and then more 'further information' requests arrive. From what I've seen, this is disaster personified and the delays right across the responses from the government are quite staggering. Fianna Fail has been in power for 83 years and in any democracy that is a bit rich

even if they are proud of the nation's progress. But does that include the voters? Fine Gael got off to the slowest of starts after Cumann na nGaedheal, the National Centre Party and the Blueshirts formed a merger in 1933. But here they are now and there is every possibility they will be in office until after 2030 and 2040. Imagine how many candidates are waiting in the wings. Right now there are so many

issues around Mica emerging courtesy of 'Ditch' and they are quite extraordinary. Now, there is never any issue with anyone meeting with the Attorney General... However, one has to wonder about the values of that in resolving the crisis. Wouldn't it be the best political news for affected families and wouldn't it be highly positive if meeting the Attorney General resolved the calamity of defective homes in Donegal, once and for evermore? The Ditch website reported: "Attorney general Rossa Fanning mediated an

internal Fine Gael dispute over the controversial mica scheme after TD Joe McHugh resigned the party whip". Fanning it is alleged - in unpublished correspondence gave advice to Leo Varadkar, warning that a mica candidate might win a seat in the next election, after he held a private meeting with a local TD.

The Deputy told Varadkar the issue was "politically very sensitive" and advised that the Electoral Commission's work on constituency boundaries may influence whether



a mica candidate would be successful in an election.

Fanning's role as a broker for internal party matters could be challenged given his constitutional role as the government's chief legal adviser, however the Attorney General in his experience has the best interests of Donegal at its core in his thinking and legal experience.

The Attorney general met with Deputy McHugh in February, 2023 and the meeting came after he'd resigned the Fine Gael party whip in July 2022 over the government's introduction of legislation for a new scheme for defective block homeowners. McHugh said he wasn't satisfied with the scheme, comments his constituents have echoed.

The day after meeting with McHugh, the Attorney General briefed Taoiseach Leo Varadkar. "As you are well aware, the Deputy has long-standing and well-documented concerns about the remediation scheme provided for householders affected by Mica. This will not in any way be news to you in circumstances where deputy McHugh has resigned the whip and left the Fine Gael parliamentary party over the issue," wrote Fanning in his letter to Varadkar according to The Ditch.

McHugh expressed the view that a mica candidate stood a reasonable possibility of success in the next general election depending on the reconfiguration of the constituencies after the Electoral Commission has completed its work..." warned Fanning."

That expression of 'reasonable possibility of success' has delivered four Council seats and seems more than likely to deliver at least one TD... if not a second. And 'The Ditch' also revealed that a previous Attorney General, Paul Gallagher wrote to Minister Daragh O'Brien in 2001 with a warning that claims for demolishing and rebuilding houses – as opposed to repairing them – under the scheme would "climb very significantly (including in Donegal) as further claims are made. Homeowners would claim for rebuilds because of "banking and insurance issues", reported the Ditch.

In correspondence where he advised the government on means of keeping the costs of the scheme down, The Ditch reported: 'Gallagher said: "In Donegal on the other hand, it is hoped that rebuilding would be the exception and that the other remedial options would more likely to be applicable. Demolishing and rebuilding, which campaigners maintain is required," he wrote. Gallagher, it is claimed, was clear that the state shouldn't accept liability.

"It is also important that no concession is made that the State has any liability in this regard," said 'The Ditch' reporting from 2021.

Meanwhile the latest Ireland Thinks poll reveals the current opinions of the electorate. Fine Gael commands the headlines with 24% and FF is on 20%. The third Government partner, the Green Party, is on 4%. At the 2020 general election these three parties formed a Govt with a combined 51%.

That figure is now 48%.

Shortly afterwards the new vocational school was opened and many of the Mount Marian pupils went to school there from 1959 onwards. In 1966 the new Loreto Convent was constructed.

there through all those changes: essentially without ever changing, itself. Of course the normalities of life are all there: the births, marriages and deaths: the good times and the bad and the occasions that binds community life together as a solid unit. They all remember the important dates and events on the estate and the number of children in every house. Kenneth Bradley was the first child to be born there and there are so many more anecdotes of every day life here in Donegal.

The site of a couple of acres was purchased by the Council from Doalty McGinley and it was the first such large scale housing development in the town. Some local men were employed by Barrs to help in the construction.

The early residents recall taking occupation of their gleaming new homes. There are minute recollections of their sturdy construction: in fact the families had to whack lumps of cement off the insides of the windows and the places had painted and furniture put in. designs were fairly similar. Downstairs a big living room: a scullery and a larder under the stairs for keeping the milk bottles cool, and it worked perfectly. Just off the front hall was a small bedroom while upstairs there were two bedrooms and a bathroom. Out the back

And to illustrate the point the Council put in three public lights on the estate.

The events recalled with pride up here includes the ordination of Fr. Willie Peoples in June of 1982. In fact the Marian Shrine was erected shortly after with Eithne Sullivan donating the statue of Our Blessed Lady. This stature had been in the old Lagg chapel for generations and today it is enclosed in glass and an annual Mass is celebrated there. Eithne was Fr. Willie's teacher and on his ordination she presented him with the statue. Today it takes pride of place on the edge of the green. As Fianna Fail prepares for a major rebranding of ous concern to Fianna Fail. the party following a disastrous performance in the June elections senior party officials have told the Tribune that a number of senior personalities in Donegal are facing the possibility of expulsion.

This was a direction from Headquarters and it went against the opinions and the landscape locally where it was estimated they already faced an uphill battle in holding their seat. As it panned out they fared badly and their vote dropped to a disastrous 14.17% to leave them out of the running.

At the same time support for Dr. James Mc-Daid's campaign in the Euro elections fall seriously short of expectations right across both Donegal constituencies and he was surprisingly eliminated at the end of the third count. On the first count he polled a very disappointing 52,139, some 13,182 behind SF's Pearse Doherty.

and stalls for all ages to enjoy.



Patsy Sheridan remembered at the Flagpole


Kilmacrennan Celtic 5-3 Rathmullan Celtic

The Joseph Sheridan Memorial Cup nine-a-side Final on Friday night was especially poignant for the family and friends of the late Patsy Sheridan. It was the first time that Patsy wasn't there at the Flagpole to present the cup in memory of his son Joseph. One of the town's legendary footballers Patsy passed away last November. Kilmacrennan Celtic were the deserving winners against the hosts. At the presentation afterwards Rathmullan Celtic committee member Mark Curran took time to reflect on Patsy football legacy in the seaside town and further afield. He said he would never be forgotten and the annual summer cup will be there as a memory to him as it has and will continue to be for his son Joseph.

On the field on Friday night it was Kilmac who took command of the 2024 decider. Man of the Match Chris Dillon had his side a goal in front on six minutes on his way to a hat-trick. At the other end Charlie McAteer's neat turn bought him a bit of space for a good strike that was well saved by Killian Hagan. But, then on 16 minutes Kilmac doubled their advantage as Paul Bradley got past both McAteer and Daire Sheridan down the right and his cross from the end-line was steered home by Sam Howard.

Just a minute later Dillon made it 3-0 and while the margin might have flattered them little there's no doubt that they were the better side. Eamonn Sheridan had a number of young players in action including Daire Sheridan and Iarlaith Duffy who did quite well in the full-back roles while Brian Desmond and Kyle Martin did have good spells in the middle of the park. The introduction of Jay Curran up front in the second half did work but never quite enough to wipe out Kilmac's big advantage.


Martin saw a shot go just over the bar while Desmond had an effort diverted out at the expense of a corner. Kyle Martin took that set-piece short to Kevin O'Donnell who fired over the crossbar. Peter completes 240km cycle

A Galway man completed his 'unforgettable and life-affirming' five-day 240-kilometer charity cycle for the Irish Kidney Association with a dialysis machine in tow across the country arriving on a wet windy day to a rapturous reception at the symbolic Circle of Life National Commemorative Garden for Organ Donors in Salthill, Galway on Sunday 4th August.

Peter Conboy from Ballygar on the Galway - Roscommon border began his Cycle of Life journey at Temple Street Children's Hospital in Dublin, (on Wednesday 31st July,) where his wife (from Falcarragh) Liz Ferry's kidney journey also started on dialysis when she was a teen, and fittingly concluded at a Garden honouring organ donors, grateful for the gift of life she received 22 years ago.

Despite the tiredness and being wet and cold, Peter was elated as he was greeted with a warm embrace by Liz and a rousing reception in the garden, with family, friends, and supporters including locals and members of the Galway Branch of the Irish Kidney Association. Greeting them also was Martina Goggin, who along with her husband Denis, who are responsible for the the creation of the Circle of Life National

Commemorative Garden for organ donors, having themselves had to face the heartbreaking decision after losing their son but giving life to others through his organ donation. Undeterred by the wet and windy weather, those attending celebrated the end of Peter's symbolic journey that not only raised funds for the charity but also significantly heightened organ donor awareness. Throughout the five days Cycle of Life, Peter was greeted with goodwill and support in every town he passed through. Locals, children, adults, and volunteer members of the Irish Kidney Association welcomed him warmly, spending hours engaging with him. This unique spectacle of a bicycle pulling along a large, decommissioned dialysis machine, supplied by B. Braun, generated significant interest and awareness about organ donation, as donor cards were

Peter said, "This experience was about far more than the physical challenge. It was about being visible and raising awareness for a cause that is deeply personal to me.

The support and interest we received along the way were nothing short of incredible. The goodwill and stories shared with us were deeply moving. I'm profoundly grateful to everyone who helped and supported us, especially my wife Liz, who followed

along for most of the journey.
Liz said, "I am so proud of Peter, he is an inspiration. When he first mentioned to me about doing this, I thought the challenge was so perfect for Peter, and something he would do with conviction and that it would have a big impact. His Cycle of Life this week has sparked so much conversation along the way about organ donation. Having the visual of the physical dialysis machine has given people a better understanding of the impact of being tied to a dialysis machine. When I was a young patient, a teenager, I faced an uncertain future and my confidence was shaken. While on dialysis for 11 hours a night, I often wondered what my future would hold. The gift of a donor's kidney less than a year later gave me a future most people take for granted.

And that future included meeting the love of my life Peter. I'm 22 years transplanted and I am living life to the full. The donor family will always hold a special place in my heart and I will be forever grateful to them. They have given me so much to look forward to. Peter's Cycle of Life is his way of honouring their thoughtful gift".







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Calls for Horgan to come back

It's unlikely to happen but Finn Harps fans have been calling this week for Ollie Horgan to return been calling this week for Ollie Horgan to return beaten 2-0 by Wexford Youths in the league on Friday night. Wexford also defeated Athlone to the managerial role in Ballybofey amid genuine fears that the club might never see Premier Division football again after the fiasco of the last two seasons.

That fan reaction is coming on the back of a recent dismal run of results that has now seen Darren Murphy's side slip to third from bottom. There is no managerial vacancy at Finn Park but the silence from the club since Friday night's loss in Wexford has been deafening.

Horgan is happy in his role as assistant-manager at Galway Utd who are in the top six and still in with a chance of securing a place in European competition so his coming back is a very long shot not helped by the circumstances of his departure from Harps after giving nine years of loyal service. He lost virtually a whole squad of good players at the end of the 2021 season because they were on one-year contracts in the Premier Division. A year later in the First Division, Harps were offering players two-year contracts.

When Horgan took over Harps in 2014 it took him the first season to get to grips with the squad he had inherited with one or two of them having to be confronted about their commitment to the cause. They didn't like that approach because they weren't used to it but the next season there were no downing tools from those players as Horgan also brought in new faces to shake things up.

But for now it's Darren Murphy and his backroom team that have had a challenging week trying to work out a way of getting back on track for a promotion play-off spot. Maybe, it is welcome that Finn Harps doesn't have a game this weekend due to the FAI Senior Cup. Harps are out of the competition after the loss to Cork City away on Monday night in a backlog fixture.

Those results mean that Harps drop from fifth to seventh in the First Division table. Wexford are now fifth and Cobh Ramblers sixth. Treaty are just two points behind Harps in eighth place. Fifth place guarantees a play-off place and just a fortnight ago Harps had been in a reasonably comfortable fourth place in the table. Now they are in a dogfight for that precious fifth place.

The next league game for Harps is away to UCD on Friday week the 23rd August. UCD are in FAI Cup action this Saturday evening against Sligo Rovers at the Showgrounds. So they will have had the benefit of a competitive match but do have to travel so it will be interesting to see how all that pans out when Harps go to Belfield. For now Harps are only one place better off in the league than last season when they finished second from bottom. The new manager Davey Rogers who had been appointed to much fanfare on a four-year contract in December 2022 had left by apparent mutual consent. That was just nine months into this tenure. That was a costly failure between his salary and whatever was paid to him from his outstanding contract.

Darren Murphy had been appointed by Rogers to be his assistant-manager. He took over from Rogers on a caretaker basis until the end of the 2023 season. Murphy was subsequently appointed as the permanent boss but there was no fouryear contract and probably won't be ever again at Finn Park. Now Murphy finds himself in not to dissimilar a situation as Rogers. He had a good first half of the season and is very popular with the players. That is a good thing to an extent as long as the players are not too comfortable. Young players like Gavin McAteer have been in-

at Turners Cross last month. Murphy's men were troduced and done well but need to be managed

in a responsible way in order to develop physically for the challenges of senior soccer. It just looks now as if the squad as a whole is suffering from the fatigue of the season especially the last five weeks where they had four long day trips to Cork twice, Cobh, Treaty and Wexford. That is absolutely brutal on part-time footballers. These players are owed a duty of care better than they ĥave received.

The club has paid dearly for the costs incurred with the last manager just coincidentally it was announced at the start of the 2024 season that the management and players had agreed to forego overnight stays in order to allow the money saved to be diverted to the new stadium development. That hasn't been heard about since a meeting in the Villa Rose Hotel on April 28th. The appointment of a CEO to oversee the stadium development was to happen within a month, the meeting was told as fatigue had set in with the team that had been driving the new stadium development for 20 years. Nearly three months later there is no word of that CEO appointment. Neither has there been any update on the sale of Finn Park which the club said was necessary to build the new pitch and stands in Stranorlar. As part of the Government grant arrangement the club is obliged to raise €1.5 million themselves. They were hoping to realise that figure from selling Finn Park but is not at all straightforward as the ground is not owned by the club. There are a number of trustees who look after it for the communities of Ballybofey and Stranorlar. Selling Finn Park was never part of the original agreement to build the new stadium.

Indeed, legendary Finn Harps manager Patsy McGowan says League of Ireland football should continue at the ground and all that is needed is a new Stand to replace the corrugated tin structure that has been there for the past 50
