The new limits will apply first for rural road users with speeds restricted to 37.5, a month before Christmas and according to sources, this could add another thirty minutes on a journey to Letterkenny from the farthest reaches of the county. undertaken a review over the past 24 months of its byelaws and has consulted with the elected Members and the public. Meanwhile a 'speed limit team' has divided numbers of locations for consideration to be addressed in line with the new time frames to be followed.

In the first instance the 31 rural locations which have been reviewed with the Cllrs. and the public will be dealt with along with a review of all rural local roads prior to these defaulting to the new 37.5mph which is 60kph. The 31 locations previously submitted sought to have the speed reduced from the original rural default of 80kph to a lower speed limit of 50/60kph – the new 60kph will address these.



Rathmullan litter problem raised again







Local Independent Cllr Pauric McGarvey has expressed frustration with the lack of progress on an escalating litter problem in the seaside village of Rathmullan.

Cllr McGarvey said he had raised the matter with the Council a year ago but the problem had only gotten worse since then. He has called on the Local Authority to put more resources in place to tackle the issue as a matter of urgency.

"I brought this same motion this time last year and the issue has gotten worse, nothing has been done to support the groups made up of volunteers. The Rathmullan Tidy Towns committee take great pride and time in the town are doing their best and have it looking its best for the summer with painted benches, flowers and planted beds. The Clean Coasts is a fantastic help and certainly do a lot to try and help with the issue. These groups are made up of retired, working and respected residents and business people and the mess they are faced with on a daily basis is simply unfair and can't continue" Cllr McGarvey said.

He says Donegal County Council must do more to resolve the issue. "The problem is not only season-



al as Rathmullan also sees many daily visitors in the spring, autumn and winter, walking the beach and using the park. I asked for a review of the bins last year and all that was done was

the open bin in the park removed and nothing to replace it. The bins that are in place are not functional and unable to cope with the amount of people and rub-bish generated. The businesses in the carpark do their bit by providing a bin outside their businesses," Cllr McGarvey said.

He has called on people to stop putting household waste in the bins and says CCTV should be set up to deter and prosecute the people doing it.

"As well as that full dog poop bags are thrown around the bases of the bins when they are full. That's

not good enough when there's no space for them anywhere else. I have witnessed firsthand the mess that's left to be cleaned up and it is embarrassing, I'm a newly elected councillor now living in Rathmullan and I want this matter to be dealt with by Donegal County Council. It just can't continue. I have asked that the Council install new functional bins, find an external company to service the bins and the toilets. CCTV needs to be installed to prosecute anyone who dumps household waste in the litter bins and around the bottle banks," Cllr McGarvey concluded.

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Speed limit cuts

There are nine locations already considered in relation to local roads in urban areas and these will be further considered under the urban speed limit review to commence in the final quarter of

With respect to other locations assessed over the past 24 months, 36 locations on regional roads and 35 locations on national roads will be further considered in accordance with the new amended speed limit guidelines and new legislation.

It is proposed to close out on the special speed limits at housing estates (slow zones) as per the ongoing review with 139 housing estates to be included in special speed limit bylaws to be in place by November 2024.

The legislation became law in April after the enactment of the legislation relevant sections relating to speed limits will start. commenced. Variations to the default speed Limits will be permitted by way of local authority byelaws in accordance with the published guidelines.

It is a priority that the new default speed limits including necessary and supporting byelaws are to be in place as soon as possible.

As a consequence, each Local Authority must now prepare a plan to complete a review of speed limits to meet these deadlines and the requirements in relation to implementing the new default speed limits.

The Bill also makes drug tests mandatory at serious collisions, allows penalty points for multiple offences to be issued at once, and fixes technical issues to scooter legislation.

The changes were planned last year when there was a sharp increase in road traffic deaths, and the trend of deaths on our roads has continued to worsen this vear

Speed limits will still be set by a process that includes councillors approving the changes, but the default limits will be lowered, including on national secondary roads, from 100 km/h to 80 km/h; on local rural roads, from 80 km/h to 60 km/h; and on roads in urban areas from 50 km/h to 30 km/h.

The change will mean that a difference from the default will have to be justified.

Bryan Walsh, Portmarnock and formerly Rathdonnell

You laid in state on the longest day. And each and every day since June 21st has been long without your presence in it.

There was still a sense of disbelief that you were gone as we approached Stafford's Funeral Home in Portmarnock. But there in the lobby your name on the electronic board on the wall left us in no doubt. Bryan Walsh, Reposing Room

Surely there had to be a mistake. A young man of 38 years lying in a wicker coffin while we filed past and found no words of true comfort as we embraced the chief mourners. And on a screen projection behind, the proof of that all too short life and of a personality pictured in every frame - that mischievous smile and wicked sense of humour shining through.

A photographic album lovingly put together and featuring so many aspects of your life. You and your beloved wife, Aoife, captured with beaming smiles at the Aviva Stadium, and holding your cherished daughter. Ellie. And your early home life with your devoted parents, John and Eileen, and siblings, Michael, Leanne and Caron. And so many more that brought some crumbs of comfort as we looked at them. But, at those moments in time, only some.

You had originally been diagnosed with a brain tumour seven years previously but had fought the fight and soldiered on. And you were a valued and popular employee in the I.T. department of the E.S.B. – as evident by the many colleagues who turned up to show their respects and share in the sorrow at Staffords Funeral Home and at the funeral service at Glasnevin Crematorium. Bryan James Walsh had entered this life on December 19th,1985, just a month after his grandfather, Brian, had passed away. He would have been so proud of his grandchild.

Bryan's friends and neighbours in Glencar Park, Solomon's Hills and John and Eileen's current abode in Rathdonnell, Letterkenny, got to know a lively and playful child who invariably had a smile on his face. And a prank or ten up his sleeve (or on Caron's sleeves as Michael recalled at the funeral service)!

National and Secondary schools underlined that popularity and his academic ability shone through.

He brought that to Dublin where he took up employment and made more friends. And nobody more important than the woman who became the love of his life.

Fittingly enough for a man who loved sport -



Arsenal F.C. being his club of choice – they met in Becky Morgan's pub following an Ireland/Italy Six Nations match.

There may be one or two people around claiming they introduced them to one another but the fact is they fell for each other almost immediately. A true love story so appropriate enough that last year Becky Morgan's Pub became 'The

Storyteller' after changing hands. Bryan and Aoife story and love continued through the years following his diagnosis - her job as an oncology nurse enabling her to keep alert to the signs.

And in the months and weeks before his passing, the signs and his health deteriorated badly and the three months of lifetime predicted by his medical team turned into weeks and finally hours until on Tuesday June 18th he succumbed - his parents, John and Eileen posting the devastating news on a family WhatsApp site with the briefest and most heart wrenching of messages: **'OUR BABY BOY R.I.P."**

The inevitability of it didn't prevent the tears the anguish continuing over the next few days at the funeral home and the funeral service itself. There in front of a huge number of family, friends, colleagues and others who had made the trip from Donegal and Mayo (Bryan's other adopted county where he had spent so many happy summers with his uncles and cousins and learned how to play pranks!) Aoife spoke movingly about her husband's battle and how Bryan had spoken of "disappointment after disappointment" as the respective treatment failed to respond.

Flanked by her beloved brother, Eoin, she recalled Bryan and herself's initial meeting and life together before and after the diagnosis.

A few short days before he passed they had gone away together where they told each other what they meant to one another and shared a glass of wine and reflections on their time together. It had, said Aoife, been a privilege to know him and to love him and she spoke of how she and Ellie would now have to go on without him.

Bryan's elder brother, Michael, also addressed the attendance pointing out that he tried to think of an opening joke to make the celebration of his life what he would have wanted.

"But the more I wracked my brains trying to think of a joke that Bryan would appreciate – he had a great sense of humour - the more I realised it was Bryan's last joke - one social introvert trying to talk about another!"

Thanking all who had travelled for the funeral service, he said: 'Anyone who was lucky enough to have come across him in their lives knew there was something very special about him." Describing his brother as a "naturally gifted

Michael described how amazing Aoife had been during the years of treatment along

with her family.
"Mum and dad, thank you for giving us Bryan. He was taken away from us far too early but he will live forever in our hearts."

Before the curtains drew on an all too young life, the service conductor introduced some of the songs that meant so much to Aoife and Bryan including their wedding song, Bell X1's 'The End is Nigh'; Sinead O'Connor's 'She Moved Thru' the Fair'; and a haunting version of 'Somewhere Over the Rainbow.'

Grief, they say, is the price of love and all the grief we felt was a true indication of all the love we had for you, Bryan. Rest in peace.

Drink/drug driving testing clarified

Local Gardaí have clarified a query on when they carry out drink and drug testing on drivers involved in road traffic collisions.

The measures relate to new legislation introduced in May.

Gardaí said they have been asked to clarify at what type of collisions do Gardaí perform drug/alcohol test-

They stated: "Since Friday 31st May 2024 it is mandatory for members of An Garda Síochána who attend

at the scene of a road traffic collision where there are injuries to test the drivers of all vehicles involved for the presence of both alcohol and drugs. Gardaí would not ordinarily test drivers for alcohol and/or drugs at the scene of a material damage collision where there are no injuries but sometimes they do if they suspect that an offence may have occurred or if they form their opinion that one or both of the drivers are under the influence."

The North had another quiet 12th

This year's 12th of July was one of the quietest of the past couple of hundred years. Recent Twelfths have been similar.

The North is far from perfect. I don't buy the myth that all was solved by the Good Friday Agreement of 1998. Bill Clinton, Tony Blair and John Hume did not wave a magic want with the help of Bertie Ahern.

I do, though, compare this year to Twelfths within my lifetime. In 1972, 15 people were killed over three days from July 11th to July 13th. Times like the 1950s were seen as 'quiet'. Even then, though, there were riots in various places. This was as Orange marches were forced through Catholic areas.

Thus rioting was part of the Twelfth for many years. We are too early to say rioting has died out. We can say there is, at worst, a lull.

There are now no significant contentious marches. The last was at Rasharkin in Co Antrim. Controversy there ended a few years ago. There was agreement between the Orange Order in the area and Nationalist residents. This year there were rumblings of controversy in Ardoyne, North Belfast. This came to nothing. The Orange Order decided not to try to force an evening march through.

This year there were few violent incidents. There were no deaths and no serious injuries.

That is despite there being always tension at this time of year. This is known as the 'Marching Season'. The Twelfth is the high point. There are literally hundreds of parades from Easter onwards. Thousands take part in some. Others are a couple of dozen marching to a wee country

There is enough bigotry still about. Eleventh Night bonfires in some places burn tricolours and election posters from Nationalist parties. One in Newtownabbey had an effigy of SDLP leader Colm Eastwood. Maybe the most extreme was in Moygashel, Co Tyrone. The village is just outside Dungannon. There was a mock police car on top of the bonfire. Inside were effigies of Jeffery Donaldson and leading Sinn Féin member Gerry Kelly.

The Twelfth takes place, too, at a time of bright evenings. The schools are closed. Thus there are thousands of young people at a loose end. A riot means excitement. For many this used to be recreational rioting. However, such can snowball. They can explode and become vicious in the extreme.

There is enough happening to remind us that there is plenty of inflammable material about. On the Eleventh Night there are widespread bonfires. This is part of the tradition of bonfires around the middle of summer. This tradition has been customised for Orangeism.

On one hand, the bonfires are a bit of crack. For some, it's a way of celebrating their identity. The other side is that they can be a magnet for anti-social behaviour.

And forget the big politics of the situation. There are safety issues. Last year a man was killed when he fell from a tall bonfire in Larne. People, mostly young, regularly suffer burns when something goes wrong. Some years ago a bonfire got out of control on the Shankill Road. A row of houses was burned.

Then there are environmental issues. Bonfire burn old tyres, pallets, old mattresses and the likes. The

smoke and fumes are toxic. Burned out, they still leave toxic residues on the ground. This is blown about, or swept into watercourses.

This does not get as much attention; as violence. Over the years, though, the pollution has caused illness and deaths. Because deaths aren't immediate, they don't get the same attention as violent deaths.

Then there is the anti-social behaviour. The Belfast Twelfth has become notorious for anti-social behaviour on parts of the route. That leaves those areas with bottles and cans scattered all over the place. There is also much puking and peeing on the street. That's a reason why the Orange Order itself is shortening the route.

Even more sinister were events in Antrim Town's Ballycraigy Estate. Eight African families have been intimidated out of the estate. Some were families of nurses in the town's hospital. Some, too, had been living in the estate for some time.

There was a poisonous mix of home-grown bigotry and racism. Some of those involved have ties to the far right in Britain. As the farright has developed in the South, that will increase tension. Ballycraigy is one of the few places

where remnants of the Loyalist Volunteer Force (LVF) still exist. The driving forces are two notorious brothers. The LVF itself is riddled with state agents. It murdered my friends Martin O'Hagan and Rosemary Nelson.

The Twelfth celebrates the Battle of the Boyne. In this, the Pope backed King William. That is because the battle had little to do with Irish affairs. Nor had the war of which it was a part. This was part of a European war. The great powers of the day were fighting it out. It happened that a significant part of that was done in Ireland.

My late father knew Catholic families in South Tyrone. These families had a tradition their ancestors had fought on William's side at the Boyne. That's because the landlord had mobilised his tenants for that

William's victory did not bring civil and religious liberty. Obviously, Penal Laws were strengthened against Catholics. Presbyterians and other

dissenters were persecuted also. That was long ago and the world has changed. However, Orange marches can rile even the mildest Catholics who wouldn't even think themselves Nationalist. That's because they see the Twelfth as boasting of superiority over them. Sometimes there is genuine misunderstanding. Other times there is deliberate provocation. I often talked to a Loyalist community worker in Belfast, now dead. He denounced 'seaside Orangemen'. They came from outside and wanted to march in contentious parts of Belfast. Then they left, and local community workers had to clear up the mess. This year, at least so far, there has been no mess.

Nikki Bradley takes her seat in Seanad

Milford's new Senator, Nikki Bradley has taken her seat in Seanad Eireann saying her recent nomination was an "incredible personal honour". A long-time disability rights campaigner, Senator Bradley, was appointed to the Seanad last Wednesday by Taoiseach Simon Harris.

She replaces Regina Doherty, who was elected to the European Parliament for the Dublin constituency last month.

The Taoiseach said he is honoured to be able to appoint Ms Bradley to the Seanad that her presence there is an important one for the northwest region. She had previously downplayed links to

a potential career in politics but had been linked to Fine Gael as a possible candidate in the next General Election.

Now she said the time is right for her as she had been building her voice as "an advocate and a voice for people like me with disabilities and their families."

Senator Bradley was diagnosed with a rare form of bone cancer called Ewing's Sarcoma aged 16. She has endured a number of major surgeries and went on to become the founder of 'Fighting Fit For Ewing's' that aims to increase awareness about the disease while encouraging people to view exercise as a form of rehabilitation.

Making her maiden Seanad speech she thanked the Taoiseach for his nomination and her family and finance for their support.

She stated: "First and foremost, I thank everybody in this room. I have been welcomed warmly, as have my family who are here today. I am so honoured to see them here, including my fiancée. We have been given the warmest welcome and I thank everyone for that. I also thank the Taoiseach because without his nomination, obviously I would not be here. This is an incredible personal honour for me.

"Once the madness dies down, I am genuinely so excited to actually get to work. What I have been working towards over the past number of years is to be an advocate and a voice for people like me with disabilities and their families. I have been through quite a few things myself but I have learned from them and have grown to become quite resilient as a result. I want to be able to pass that knowledge and experience on to other people. I want to improve services for everybody

other people might overlook but they can impact a disabled person's daily life and reduce their quality of life. I am determined to tackle those smaller issues as much as the wider ones." Being a voice for young people is another key area for her.

"Another area I really want to focus on is young people. They are the decision-makers of tomorrow. I want to encourage more young people to use their vote. I also want to encourage fully able young people as well as those with reduced mobility to look at sport because there is a direct correlation between a positive mental attitude and sport. It is important for young people to get outside into the open air and enjoy what our country has to offer. These are some of the many things, off the top of my head, that I am thinking about and I am so looking forward to working with everyone here. Once again, thanks so much for the opportunity," she concluded.

Diagnosed with a rare form of bone cancer at sixteen she had a second hip replacement by the age of twenty six.

Following her diagnosis she started an awareness campaign called 'Fighting Fit For Ewing's' (FFFE) in 2013 when she was told she would remain on crutches for the rest of her life.

She stated previously: "It was at this point that I decided to take my life back. Too many years had been wasted while I waited to get better. That meeting with my consultant was the kick start that I needed. Three weeks later, Fighting Fit For Ewing's was born."

Ramelton without 'day-care' since 2010

Ramelton has been without a day care facility for these past fourteen years and that deficit remains to be addressed. Former Cllr. Ian McGarvey who had a big interest in Ramelton's Day Care Service fought hard to have the service restored there. It was discontinued in August 2010.

It was located within the Community Hospital and the HSE said the closure was a temporary

measure due to the shortage of nursing staff. In more recent times, Cllrs. Ciaran Brogan and Pauric McGarvey have met with HSE officials who promised that when progress was achieved they would be informed. So far, that has not happened.

At this week's Health Forum West meeting, Cllr. Declan Meehan asked about planning permission granted for a healthcare facility to host services such as OT, physiotherapy and day centre. The premises is at Forquar and Gleenkeen Milford.

Meehan asked for information on when this facility will be open for HSE and patient use and a breakdown of clinical spaces and services available there.

In reply the HSE said that a facility in Milford has been identified as an option and discussions have taken place with the landlord in this regard.

Any proposed lease arrangement will be subject to national approval. There would also be a requirement for fit out works prior to occupancy. The process needs to be advanced further over the coming period before a timeframe for availability of any such facility can be advised.







Red Cross update on Creeslough appeal funding

A public meeting held on Tuesday evening in Creeslough heard that the Irish Red Cross Society are seeking engagement and ways to identify where the funds remaining from the appeal can be best spent.

The meeting took place in Creeslough Day Centre and was attended by members of local voluntary groups and individuals who heard from Liam O'Dwyer and Niall Keane from the Red Cross.

They outlined that of the €1.9million raised following the tragedy that claimed ten lives and left others injured following the explosion on October 7th, 2022, that €144,146 of the fund has been earmarked for a "legacy Community Project", which has yet to be determined

They also gave a breakdown of the funds

raised during the appeal outlining that 67 'general donations' totaling €41,180 via bank, postal or phone contributions were received; 72 donations from community events totaled €125,694; 145 corporate donations totaled €1.334,048; and 5,878 public donations came via the website totaling €405,427.

With deductions for tax advice, fees, vouched costs, online translation charges 3rd party support costs for some families, as well as the funds retained for the legacy project, €1,715,857.46 was distributed in a number of categories including Loss of Income, €195,640, replacement of possessions €141,428.23, general emergency assistance €149,938.12, funeral and related costs €53,399.65, rents €11,451.46, bereaved families €1,001,000 and persons injured €163,000.


They highlighted that no contractors had been paid directly from the fund.

They said they had already received feedback on potential areas for the remaining funding to be spent included on trauma support and mental health, youth development and on commoration o the tragedy, but added they were open to further suggestions from those within the local community and related areas affected.

They said they intend to create a new website to highlight the available funds and also terms of reference as a guide for public interaction on potential projects they could support in due course as well as for making online applications for the funding.

While a number of people present expressed a view that they would like to see a remembrance garden created, the Red Cross representatives said that this was an area that could be explored if the community wished to do so. They did highlight a recent suggestion in local

media that the fund potentially could be used to purchase the site of the tragedy to create such a garden but said this was not feasible as the land in question was in private ownership and was not for sale.



They also said they are hoping to establish a committee of three to four local representatives and an independent person from outside the community to help with the decision making process on how the allocations are made.

Among the terms of references suggested include that no award will exceed €40,000 in any one instance and the fund is open to people who reside outside of Creeslough but have been affected by the tragedy.







Leave Your Bags Behind

"Go forwards, do not take your bag! Go forwards, do not take your bag!" The instructions could hardly be clearer and yet they were roundly ignored by the sheepish passengers onboard a flight at San Francisco airport last weekend.

Thankfully the flight had not yet taken off when the lithium battery in a passenger's laptop burst into flames. With passengers being crammed into an enclosed space that was filling with smoke, it was imperative that an evacuation be carried out immediately yet there was nothing immediate about what unfolded: rather than scurrying for the exits, a number of those caught up in the chaos instinctively reached for their baggage in the overhead lockers.

If you watch on YouTube you can hear the exasperation in the flight attendants' voices as they plead with them to quit rummaging around and let others get past. Credit to the staff who managed to remain professional even amidst

such frustration; some of what the other passengers had to say is unfit for publication.

You would think that when it comes to an emergency like this, common sense would prevail. You would think that with lives potentially being at stake, people would forget about the tat in their suitcases and get out before it's too late. At the very least we tell ourselves that WE would think clearly and do the right thing in this situation. Yet would we really? Time after time it has been shown that people just don't think rationally in emergencies. This is not the first time that an aircraft evacuation has been held up by an irrational regard for baggage and it won't be the last. In fact, it's not even the first time I've written about it and so I'd like to remake the same point as last time.

The incident at San Francisco and other incidents like it remind me of the plea in Hebrews 12:1: "Lay aside every weight... looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith." It is possible for someone to know that he or she is in danger, even danger of the eternal kind. It is possible for someone to hear that Jesus Christ is the only way of escaping that danger. And yet it is possible for someone to neglect the way of escape because, like the passengers in San Francisco, they're weighed down by baggage.

For some, the baggage is made up of things they long to cling on to but are terrified of losing if they come to faith. They weigh up implications for their relationships, their family dynamics, their hobbies, or their standing in their communities and, as terrifying as the danger may be, the thought of parting with what they have worked to accumulate can somehow seem more frightening still.

The good news from San Francisco was that noone was killed amidst the melee. The even better news is that it illustrates God's warning earlier



in the book and reminds us of its urgency. "How shall we escape if we ignore so great a salvation?" (Hebrews 2:3)

Government bans 51-week leases - Minister McConalogue

The introduction of emergency legislation aimed at stopping student accommodation providers from forcing students to pay for housing during the summer period is a welcome development, according to Donegal minister, Charlie McConalogue.

The legislation bans accommodation providers from only providing 51week leases to students.

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine said that the legislation, which has been signed into law, was expedited by his party colleague, Minister Darragh O'Brien, due to a recent increase in student accommodation providers only offering 51-week leases for students.

This ban on students being forced to pay for 51-week leases for student accommodation is necessary because providers have increasingly been forcing students to pay for housing during the summer. This creates unnecessary hardship and additional costs for students and their families.

"Fianna Fáil in government is committed to removing barriers to education wherever possible and will continue to tackle issues with student accommodation and housing through our Housing for All plan," the Donegal minister added.

The First Day of Spring Nancy Tucker

Eight-year-old Chrissie is hard to like. Already she could be described as a vindictive little bully. She spends her days between being neglected by her parents and by verbally abusing and bullying her 'friends'. This book gives the reader an insight into the mind of a child starved of attention and filled with envy and hatred toward another younger child who is dearly loved. Chrissie commits one of society's most heinous of crimes and murders the little boy. Totally lacking in compassion she states

that 'it felt wonderful'. It is hard not to feel slight pity for Chrissie as she wanders from house to house trying to scrounge for food or pushes to be invited to stay for dinner by reluctant neighbours. She is starving and just wants to be loved, something that people find hard to do because of her vindictive nature.

Years later and released from a secure children's home, Chrissie or Julia as she is now known is a single Mother. She is living with the guilt of what she did fifteen years ago. She wants to be a good mother, but she does not know how to do it. Her greatest fear is that social services may take her daughter Molly away from her especially after Molly breaks her arm after a fall. She starts receiving silent telephone calls and worries that someone knows the truth about her past. This compels her into taking drastic action, facing up to her horrific past and returning home and to the

Mother that detested her.

This book is not for everyone. It is the disturbing story of a desperate child who carries out the worst of crimes in order to feel power and get the attention that she craves at home. A thought-provoking psychological drama that is so well written, it is hard not to recommend.

Despite the long distance he regularly returned to his native Scotland each year, as well some time in Cranford where he would regularly stay in Logues Guesthouse.





Meehan must provide facts as 'an affected homeowner'

This is a matter of integrity, truth and trust and only Cllr. Meehan can answer the many questions arising.

I was among his 2,074 voters who believed his narrative as the unvarnished truth. He put it on public record time after time that he was 'an affected homeowner'. But where was the proof of a mica test to back up that statement?

Because Meehan's response to queries from last week's Irish Daily Mail left more questions than answers.

I was one of those that voted on his narrative that he was 'an affected homeowner with defective blocks'.

Had he said he was not 'an affected homeowner,' I would not have voted for him. Therefore he's raised serious doubts in my mind about why he put this claim up front and personal.

Did Declan Meehan misled voters on June 7th? I have the most serious reservations about having put my vote and trust in him. I have to ask, did he tell me the truth or did he mislead me... or what? Meehan told the 'Irish Daily Mail' in their mica probe about being 'an affected homeowner' that he believed he had addressed all issues on local radio and that he'd be making no further comment. That is the first question among many others he must address. There is no hiding behind 'a visual inspection'. That is only an opinion and does not count in the cut and thrust of an election when we depend on being given the facts and nothing else.

This is the new Cllr who went on record campaigning on people being hungry for change and they want honesty, transparency and integrity.

Cllr. Meehan said he tracked down the engineer who carried out the initial test. "Off the record he sent us a text to say "the test wasn't carried out to IS456 standard but indicated high levels of mica and would definitely not be clear of mica if it was tested."

But there is no logical reason for tracking down any engineer, other than to carry out a full mica test. And so far the electorate is waiting for Meehan to tell them why he failed to have the mica test carried out because it was the only relevant option given that he was publicly using his 'affected homeowner' status in the election.

On Wednesday of last week 'The Irish Daily Mail' published a lead story 'Mica Politician: My Home On Sale Without Defects'. It was written by Ian Begley and Craig Hughes.

Their standfirst read: "Donegal councillor denies using scandal for his political advantage as Government says this proves need for checks on any redress scheme."

The reference was in relation to correspondence from the Attorney General, Paul Gallagher SC on September 7th 2021 sent to the Minister for the Environment, Darragh O'Brien in relation to a proposed redress scheme that included this county.

The Attorney General's remarks have been attacked by mica campaigners.

At the other end of the scale Mica campaigners claim they believe the Government has been engaged in a

'go-slow' mechanism that has been delaying payments to homeowners rebuilding their 'mica infected' houses in Donegal.

In the Milford LEA, Declan Meehan made it absolutely clear to the electorate he was 'an affected homeowner' and this mantra would become a big message on the doorsteps as it became a dominant feature. Nobody questioned the truth of his claim, seemingly, secure in the knowledge that he had proof for the information put in front of voters.

However, Meehan has failed to provide any real clarity on why, in the first instance he made the claim without any proof of tests required to substantiate that claim.

Cllr. Meehan is facing questions about putting a false narrative in front of the voters and so far he's ignored that issue.

Meehan's commentary included living with 'firsthand experience as an affected homeowner' and who can advocate on a wide range of challenges faced by families. This was not built on any proof other than a 'visual inspection'. This seems an astonishing claim that demands the clarity of his test results before making these statements..

The 'Irish Daily Mail' states in their lead paragraph:

"A newly elected councillor who claimed he was told his home was 'riddled with mica' and joined a legal class action on the issue has placed his house on the market saying he has now learned it does not contain defective materials...

he has denied a suggestion that he was seeking to make political advantage out of a miserable situation for others and insists the new test results on his home are a real stroke of luck." Many will not agree with such a

Yet Meehan carried on a narrative that effectively had no legal basis and he stated: "As an affected homeowner with defective blocks, I am sick of hearing from FF and FG that this scheme is working for people.

It's not. The numbers don't lie. We can't afford another five years of the same representatives in the Milford Electoral Area."

One of the golden rules in politics is that it's vital to provide facts before putting 'fine details that withstand any scrutiny' into the public domain.

Facts are facts... all else are not. Meehan failed to do so and the electorate deserves answers and full disclosure from him.

Clearly that is what the electorate expects from election candidates at a time when waffle, flannel and spin are all too prevalent.

Cllr. Meehan failed to establish the facts and he has to explain why he failed to do so, all the while stating he was 'an affected homeowner' - but affected by what?

That is a leading question that he has failed to answer.

Because, otherwise he is leaving other election candidates in Milford and indeed the electorate wondering if his original claim slewed the result in his favour, or of more import that might have denied others a much bigger

Now it is up to Meehan to remove all such concerns in the interests of the public

interests of the public. This was an emotive subject with just about everyone informing the mica homeowners 'had their backs' on mica redress. Given the reality of these claims, the facts are clear: Mica Redress is beyond the reach of Councillors and indeed that of Donegal County Council. It rests with the government through the offices of the Minister for the Environment. However, mica became the topic of emotive debate from heartbroken families who've had to stand aside and wonder why their life investments are crumbling into dust. In reality, the candidates were not troubled by nests of

far right views. It would have been disingenuous of candidates to merely hint they could do something about the crisis. And blaming the three outgoing Cllrs for doing nothing in the previous five years was also touted strongly on the campaign trail. It was also a false narrative as the successful candidates got returned to Lifford on the back of their track record of the previous five years.

Therefore the management of the clarity of the mica claims put into the public domain by Declan Meehan in his election campaign deserves the utmost detail from him.

His response has been seen as a dismissive response to queries from the 'Irish Daily Mail'. It falls far short of public expectations and well below his own stated claims of public service. He addressed the mica issue at his campaign launch saying: "As a Mica affected homeowner the scheme does not meet

er the scheme does not meet the needs of anyone. It's a huge failing on part of the Government; it is inaccessible for many, due to the administration and the Council needs to be held accountable for it. Our three County Councillors are doing nothing about it. Once I get my teeth into it I won't give up."

For Cllr. Meehan to tell the 'Irish Daily Mail' that he believed he had addressed all issues on local radio and that he'd not be making any further comment was simply deplorable.

By his response he has only added to the demand for more questions rather than answers. Yet, he is the elected one and the only person with responsibility to ensure he had a mica test on his home before putting it into the public domain.

To claim that he had a 'visual inspection' carried out on his home is simply not addressing the issue. Who told him his house was 'riddled with mica'? Can he clarify if he's checked to establish how many others were given similar information by his source? Can he tell the public why he failed to ensure he had undertaken a mica test that would be crucial to his direction of travel in the local elections? It is quite extraordinary and is stretching cognitive clarity that Cllr. Meehan would claim to be 'an affected homeowner' in his campaign information, when in



fact he did not have proof of a mica test.

Cllr. Meehan, you must inform the voters why you failed to have the results of a mica test on your home and put into the public domain before we voted for you on June 7th? After all no institution, banking, legal or statutory will ever accept a visual inspection of a house being free of mica as a metric for forming a definitive legal status.

And that is why a full suite of tests had to be carried out before announcing on March 9th that he was seeking election to the Council. This is not rocket science and it is not expensive. So why did Meehan not ensure these tests were completed last year or in enough time before the election campaign began?

This had to be the most basic of measures to ensure that what was put into the public domain was fully informed and without prejudice because it may have had the potential to deliver - or not, depending how convincing the candidate came across in the campaign.

Establishing the basic legal facts are the most fundamental foundations of political participation. Therefore Meehan must address this matter in a comprehensive manner. He must put the facts into the public domain rather than his own interpretation that it was 'a stroke of luck'. It is really unwise in this country to mention a stroke of luck and politics in the same sentence. Nothing there to query, so let's move on. However in an ever challenging demand for clarity in public office, this is exactly what Meehan was calling for in the local elections! And rightly so. Meehan campaign literature stated: "The Defective Blocks Redress Scheme needs a complete overhaul. It does not deliver what homeowners need and it is, for many, entirely inaccessible due to the administrative shortcomings and costs associated.

We need a stronger, proactive voice at the table on this issue - one who, like Declan, has firsthand experience as an affected homeowner, and who can advocate effectively on the wide range of challenges faced by families."

By his failure to address the issues raised in the 'Irish Daily Mail' he has simply left himself wide open for the public to draw their own conclusions. Saying he had addressed the issues on local radio is highly presumptive because having listened to him and who gave him a vote, I have to confess I'm none the wiser with his answers. And I'm not alone in that view.

And he went on to top the poll in the Milford area and was duly elected on the 4th count. And with every candidate and every party claiming to be in favour of mica redress, the reality is that among the nine candidates in Milford, there was one true registered 'Party' in the contest. The 100% Redress Party. Eamonn Jackson was that candidate. Along with a dedicated team he had a very powerful message and a powerful life experience. To say that he polled very poorly on 502 votes is quite the mystery when all around him his party colleagues were winning four seats and in contention for one other - in Stranorlar.

This result in the Milford area was a huge shock to 100% Redress given that they polled 7,400 votes in Donegal. Questions will be raised as to if and why 100% Redress voters were persuaded to back others in the lead into election day.

Cllr. Meehan has now raised concerns in his failure to respond in any logical manner to newspaper queries about his claims that he was 'an affected homeowner with firsthand experience'

In the local elections, Meehan's claims were not accompanied by mica test results to justify his

Meehan's responses have failed to address the most basic issues raised. His 'no further comment' says it all.



Melmore water being cut deliberately-claim

The anger and frustration of local communities over the failure of Donegal County Council to address basic demands came into the open in Downings on Monday night when the Mevagh Development Group accused officials in Lifford of 'faceless bureaucracy' who had no interest in local communities or their affairs.

Accusations were made during the meeting that a booster supply

pump to improve water pressure in the Melmore area was turned off at crucial times.

Cllr. Liam Blaney said a comment that the water supply was being 'deliberately cut' was a matter of the most urgent concern and he would seek an immediate response from the Council's water services

Speakers at the meeting alleged that there was an agenda to cut the supply when holiday homes were occupied.

The meeting heard that officials were 'only toying about with local communities' and it was contended they were doing likewise with the elected representatives.

The meeting in the 'Teach Ceoil' in Clontallagh was attended by the three newly elected Cllrs. for the Milford area and they heard stinging criticisms of the Council's failure to come to terms with the ongoing infrastructure problems. The Cllrs. also heard criticisms of the political process which it was alleged had let down such small rural areas.

At the heart of the criticisms was the evergreen problem of a lack of water amid claims by the residents that a basic reservoir on Gainne Hill would solve the crisis. The meeting heard that officialdom had already failed to listen to community concerns and there were predictions that despite expenditure of six hundred

impact on delivering a satisfactory supply to the Atlantic Drive area of the parish. Claims of 'hidden agendas' and political agendas' and the water pumps not operating at appropriate times were levelled with the Cllrs saying they were not aware of this and these matters would be raised at next week's electoral area meeting in Milford.

Denis Boyce who runs a caravan park said the council could have adopted a number of options if they were serious about tackling the water crisis. In his own instance Mr. Boyce had two wells drilled to provide his own private supply. One well was yielding six hundred gallons per hour while the second one was pumping three hundred gallons.

The response 'the Council is not serious about us, echoed round the room as the meeting continued to hammer home the list of failures they'd experienced since their foundations over three years ago.

Joe O'Donnell said their primary problem with the water supply was that the old reservoir at Gainne was constructed long ago to cater for less than forty houses. He said despite hundreds of new developments in the intervening years the reservoir capacity had remained the

The Councillors were asked to respond to questions as to their powers in Lifford and indeed if they carried any clout at

all. It was claimed they were helpless in effecting change. "We have to depend on the Cllrs. but they don't seem to have sufficient clout to being about that change. Is the Council being run by faceless men who make the decisions and do you have any power at all, queried Joe O'Donnell, the Chairperson of the Mevagh Development Group.

It was claimed that a simple solution of extra storage capacity costing no more than fifteen thousand Euro had been completely ignored by council engineers and this was completely unacceptable. The meeting heard, once again, that the water crisis in the Melmore area was a perennial one and despite many complaints and promises no real progress was being made.

Cllrs. Liam Blaney: Noel McBride and Ian McGarvey said they would do everything possible to address the queries and concerns raised and in relation to claims that the water pumps were not in operation at crucial times Blaney said this was a very serious allegation. He promised to have this matter raised with the relevant authorities immediately.

He said an allegation that the water pump was turned off deliberately was a very serious matter and this was the first he had heard of it and he would be seeking urgent clarification on this issue.

'We want answers to our questions' was an oft-repeated comment as the meeting drew to an unresolved finish.

New group to represent resident's concerns in Letterkenny

A new organisation has been formed in Letterkenny to be an overall representative body for local residents associations.

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The aim of the new group is to create a better environment by addressing resident's concerns on planning, environmental and infrastructure issues under a single umbrella. In recent years a number of residents groups have highlighted and campaigned against particular developments in the town. The new Community Residents Group was launched on Tuesday night and there are plans to meet with the Town Council later in the year to discuss the relevant issues that have been raised at a number of consultation meetings in recent months. The organisation plans to be a lobbying-community pressure group. The seeds of the new umbrella group

began last March when representatives from Ballymacool and Whitethorn met with a large number of interested groups in the town. It proved to be a very worthwhile exercise and set in train the moves to establish the umbrella association which it is hoped will have a stronger voice in dealing with relevant issues. The new group has, to a great extent achieved their aim of a broad geographical

Margaret Toner, Project Co-ordinator of Letterkenny Community Development Project has agreed to facilitate the setting up of the new group. A steering group has been working hard over the past four months to get everything in place for this week's

The areas covered include Glencar, Ballyboe, Oldtown, Gortlee, Ballymacool and Mountain Top.

At Tuesday night's meeting with the media, frustration was expressed with the planning system that they say has allowed over-development where services like sewers were unable to meet the excessive demands.

Rezoning controversies such as in Ballymacool were also highlighted with claims that the Council was totally ignoring the community when it came to such developments. The new group aims to present a united front and will move to meet with Letterkenny Town Council in the autumn to address a number of their priorities. It is hoped that a good working relationship can be nurtured between the two bodies where full consultation on matters of mutual interest will be the order of the day.

The group will be asking the local authority to liaise with them on future plans for the town.

The Secretary, Francis McCafferty explained that the consultation process was ongoing with the aim of giving as many people as possible the opportunity to submit the issues that concern them.

The officer board includes Fran Burns, Chairperson; Francis Mc-Cafferty, Secretary; Tom Crossan PRO; Vice Chairman, Noel Reilly; Ass. Secretary, Bridie Peoples; Ass. PRO Karl Curran. Including the officers there is a total of 33 residents on the committee.

Mountain Top group wins quarry appeal

The news has been given a guarded welcome by the resident's committee who are still waiting a full report from the national planning board. A strong campaign of opposition was mounted to the proposed development by the Mountain Top Quarry firm over the past 18 months.

The Calhame/Ballaghderg resident's action group held public meetings highlighting their concerns on health and environmental grounds as well as opposition to such a commercial business in a growing residential area. Last November Donegal County Council granted planning permission for the retention and extension of the Calhame quarry. The residents group then lodged an appeal with An Bord Pleanala.

Confirmation that their objection was upheld has been greeted with a sense of relief and a feeling on their part that justice can still be got in this country.

Declan Orr is one of the residents who lives closest to the quarry and this week he said that confirmation of the successful appeal was the best news that they had all year. He added that the Calhame/Ballaghderg resident's action group had fought a long and lonely battle on the controversial planning application while he <a>ment in the area.

expressed disappointment with the lack of support that had come from the Councillors in the Milford Electoral Area.

Mr Orr said that the Inishowen Sinn Fein Cllr Padraig McLochlainn was the only public representative that had taken an interest in their case.

Having spent €8,000 personally in the campaign against the Calhame quarry Mr Orr says he now intends to pursue Donegal County Council under the Freedom of Information Act in an attempt to identify the names of Councillors who he claims backed the planning application. According to a spokesperson for An Bord Pleanala the grant of planning application was overturned because of conflicting information in relation to the nature and extent of development to be retained and extended.

The spokesperson added the application didn't comply with the requirements of the planning and development regulations 2001 and precluded the Bord from considering granting permission which would be contrary to the proper planning and sustainable develop-



Vandalism and damage to private properties and homes has also been carried out. This behaviour is extremely concerning and worrying. I urge anyone that may have any information regarding this spate of concerning activities to please contact the local Garda."

Second half fade costs Donegal dearly

Galway 1-14 Donegal 0-15

For the one and only time in this championship season Donegal's composure let them in the second half of Sunday's All-Ireland Senior Football semi-final. That allowed Galway to get over the line with some difficulty after Pauric Joyce's side were fortunate to be level at the break courtesy of a soft Paul Conroy goal. After a slow start Jim McGuinness's men were the better side and their superb scoring conversion rate that had been a hallmark of their campaign continued. But in the second half Galway successfully slowed up the game and then Donegal's shot selection and passing accuracy dipped alarmingly. And in the end that is what brought down the curtain on what was still a hugely in charge.

In the team named by McGuinness on Friday Naomh Conaill's Jeaic Mac Ceallabhuí was included to start at right half-back in place of Carndonagh's Conor O'Donnell who was not even listed among the subs. But there wasn't a lot of surprise when Mac Ceallabhuí was then one of three late changes before the throw-in on Sunday. The Naomh Conaill man was replaced by Caolan McColgan while Cloughaneely's Jason McGee returned after missing the previous two games against Clare and Louth due to injury. Mc-Gee and Aaron Doherty replaced Niall O'Donnell and Daire O Baoill. Also listed among replacements was Glenfin's Luke McGlynn who was promoted to the matchday pansuccessful year for the squad at the el with Conor O'Donnell ruled out start of McGuinness's second term altogether. A super season despite Croker defeat

When Jim McGuinness spoke in Donegal Town after the Ulster Final triumph he said there was only one other major trophy to go after. It might have been his first season in charge of this Donegal team but he wasn't settling for the Anglo Celt Cup. Sam Maguire was firmly in his sights and all the Glenties man's meticulous planning was geared towards reaching the All-Ireland Final. There was only one blip in Cork on the way to Sunday's semi-final. Donegal finished top of the group and automatically into the quarter-final where they defeated Louth.

They went into Sunday's game in a confident mood and rightly so after a hugely impressive season where McGuinness guided the team to the Division 2 league title and then the Ulster Final success. Going into the second half of the Galway game, Donegal were in a good place in terms of the goal of reaching the All-Ireland decider. But from the time that Paddy McBrearty converted a 46th minute free that confidence and composure drained from the players legs.

Was there also an element of fatigue engulfing a squad that has put in a massive shift in terms of training and competitive games since last autumn? Or was it a case that the winning line was in sight and that impacted their way of playing? Galway did make it a bit harder for the Donegal attack in the second half but that ultimately wasn't the reason for the defeat. Chances that were being converted in some style in the first half just didn't happen in the final quarter. The opportunities were there to win the game and that is something that the squad and management team will be so disappointed about.


Galway's more recent experience of an All-Ireland semi-final and final certainly helped them in the closing stages of Sunday's game. Over the whole game Padraig Joyce got a number of things

right including pretty much nullifying the influence of both Peader Mogan and Ryan McHugh. Mogan only became prominent in the final ten minutes but even then there was no joy for the St. Nauls man. Galway were masters in winning their own long kick-outs. They also didn't allow Donegal a single shot on goal and keeper Gleeson didn't have a save of note to make.

Likewise Sean Patton wasn't tested apart from the goal but there were a few high balls into the danger area that caused anxious moments. Eoghain Ban Gallagher's 46th minute departure didn't help the Donegal cause. He sustained an injury after winning a free that was certainly soft with Paddy McBrearty successfully converting the placed ball. The absence from the matchday squad of Conor O'Donnell due to injury was a big blow. Whether he would have been able to give the team that extra edge we will never know. Jason McGee was much less of an influence on Sunday due to the injury that had kept out of both the Clare and Louth games.

Even though there was still a chance to win through injury time with a one point and then two gap there was a sense that it was going to be Galway's day when Oisin Gallen missed a relatively easy free in the 62nd minute. The Donegal attackers had lost their 'Mojo' and the McGuinness magic that almost always works wonders in tight corners just couldn't get his team over the line on this occasion. The body language in the latter stages of the second half demonstrated his frustration and maybe just a feeling of helplessness that the players weren't able to deliver this

McGuinness won't be too hard on the players and rightfully reflected on how much had been achieved in the 2024 season. But, talk of next year and being more bedded in as a squad is not

something the Glenties men was ever thinking about coming up to Sunday's semi-final. The only thing that mattered was going all out to win the semi-final. The fact that Galway were way below their best and still won is hard to take from a Donegal management perspective. While star men like Comer and Walsh were not at the full level of fitness credit must go to the opposition defence and in particular Brendan McCole and Eoghan Ban Gallagher. They also managed to stifle the threat of Cillian McDaid who was Man of the Match against Dublin. It must also be noted that the Galway captain Sean Kelly was not fit to play any part.

The Donegal substitutes Daire O'Baoill, Jack

McKelvey, Hugh McFadden, Niall O'Donnell and Odhran Doherty were unable to turn the game around. Of the other unused substitutes probably only Jamie Brennan would have been considered as an attacking option. The other subs were goalkeeper Gavin Mulreany, defenders Mark Curran who did feature a bit in earlier rounds and Stephen McMenamin (Red Hughs) whose only championship appearance was as a sub in the easy victory over Clare. Also unused were young attacker Luke McGlynn who didn't feature at all in the campaign. The other forward on the bench was Naomh Conaill's Charlies McGuinness who was in the match day squad throughout the eight-game championship season with the No. 26 jersey but didn't see a minute of action.

Apart from the one bad wide each Michael Langan and Oisin Gallen were Donegal's two best players from an offensive perspective on Sunday followed by Ciaran Thompson and Shane O'Donnell. Brendan McCole was the pick of a defensive setup that overall did quite well as a unit. Jim McGuinness and his management team will now throw a forensic eye over the club championship to try and unearth a few more players to freshen things up for next season. There will be a little break now for the Donegal squad and management team.

McGuinness as always has put in an unbelievable shift since taking over for his second stint in charge of the Donegal senior footballers. Along with his management team that includes Neil McGee, Colm Anthony McFadden and Luke Barrett, he has given the County a great lift. The panel were given a sense of self-belief to deliver on the pitch after a hard pre-season training programme. 


