The average price of agricultural land sold in 2023 was €29,500 per hectare, therefore it is not surprising that the new tax has been kicked into touch and the new government's farm minister will be left to begin all over again, to sort out the mess.

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Letterkenny man found dead in Portuguese

police stationA Letterkenny man who died while in police custody in Portugal has been named locally as 29-year-old Ryan Chan.

It is understood he was detained in custody after an alleged domestic incident in Albufeira on Tuesday, September 10th and was found unresponsive in the early hours of the following morning and was pronounced dead at the scene.

The Portuguese National Republican Guard issued a statement confirming "that the individual had been detained since the previous night, following attacks on his 29-year-old partner, using a knife (bladed weapon)".

They added: "The circumstances of the death inside the cell are being investigated, and the Guard is ensuring the necessary coordination with other agencies, namely the judiciary police, the public prosecutor's office and the general inspectorate of nternal administration.

The Kevin Bell Repatriation Rust also confirmed they were assisting in the repatriation of Mr Chan's remains.

The victim of the alleged stabbing was taken to hospital for treatment but was later discharged.



Football.... as political football in the North

At time of writing the future of Casement Park in Belfast is unclear. All points to it not being ready for 2028. However, the GAA, Northern Executive and Irish Government have all promised funds. The planned Casement is more than a football park. It is also a political football.

Broadly, Unionists are opposed. That's because it's the GAA. Broadly, Nationalists are in favour. That's because it's the GAA.

Northing, though, is quite that simple. Many, if not most, residents around Casement oppose the proposed new 31,000 seat stadium. The GAA certainly could have handled the matter better. Residents felt the stadium was rammed through.

When the land for Casement was bought, World War Two was just over. The park was opened in 1953.. Back then, the Andersonstown area was only being developed.

In the next years, Andersonstown was built up. Car ownership grew. Those attending matches abandoned their cars at will in the area. To be fair, being in a built-up area there was little parking space. Residents were hemmed in.

Residents fear this will be worse. They fear the New Casement will not just be about football. The GAA has told them there will be no more than three concerts per year. Given the size of the stadium, these will be big acts. Big acts will bring horrendous levels of traffic.

There was a possible alternative. In the noughties there was talk of building a major sports facility at the Maze. That is on the M1 Motorway, west of Lisburn. That would have provided for all major sports. The idea foundered on politics. The Maze had been the site

of the North's main prison. Some Unionists feared it would become a shrine to the IRA. I suspect some in the GAA wanted a site they could fully control.

The old Casement was closed in 2013. Since it is derelict.

There is no doubt the GAA and the Northern nationalist parties see Casement as a prestige project. Nationalists also see Belfat's major

public buildings as reflecting past Unionist domination. The Assembly sits in Stormont, seat of the old Northern Ireland Parliament. This is a spectacular building on a hill. It overlooks Belfast and surrounding area. Remember, there are cities we have never heard of in China and India with more people than the North. The British Parliament sits in the Palace of Westminster. Until after World War Two, nearly half the world was ruled from there. Compared to Stormont, it looks tiny.

The City Hall is a striking building in the city centre. It was built at the turn of the last century. That was the height of Unionist domination in Belfast. It had two of the world's biggest shipyards, and the biggest linen factory.

St Anne's Cathedral is smaller, but still imposing. The Church of Ireland cathedral dominated Donegall St. There is a Catholic cathedral

also. St Peter's is on a side street off Divis St off the Falls Road. Not only is it far smaller than St Anne's. There are several larger Catholic churches in that part of Belfast. Even the three (relatively) big football grounds are seen to reflect Unionism. The big soccer grounds are Windsor Park and the Oval. Windsor is the home ground of Linfield. They are seen as the club representing Protestantism and Loyalism. That is although the team is now very mixed. The Oval is home to Glentoran. The support is seen as Protestant. The team, though, is very mixed. For a long time it specialised in recruiting Fermanagh Gaelic footballers. Ravenhill is a rugby ground. Things have changed, but rugby in the North is still seen as Protestant. There is also Belfast's position as second city in Ireland. Dublin has Croke Park, Cork has Páirc Uí Chaoimh. A big stadium would show the GAA's importance in

The GAA is the largest sporting body in the North. The facilities are definitely not second-class. The Irish League is the soccer league. It is professional, if mostly part time professional. There are junior and intermediate GAA clubs in country parishes with better grounds than many Irish League clubs.

Ulster.

There is an important question. Even from a GAA point of view, could the money be better spent? Casement was the home ground of Antrim. Antrim was one of three dominant Ulster Gaelic football teams in the first half of the last century. Before the Great War they won six Ulster titles in a row. They were the first Ulster team to reach an All-Ireland final. They reached back-to-back finals before the Great War. The Cavan team of the late 1940s was one of the great teams. They won three All-Irelands. Antrim beaten twice. Antrim was big when Donegal, Down and Tyrone hadn't even won Ulster. Then Antrim imploded. They won their last Ulster title in 1951. Hurling is also strong in Antrim. The Glens are a particularly strong hurling area. However, Offaly has

number of clubs. There must be a suspicion that Casement is a vanity project. After all, the GAA's Celtic Park in Derry City is a vanity project. It was developed right beside the Derry City ground at the Brandywell. That is despite Derry not being a

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



New Veterinary Programme for ATU

A new dual-campus veterinary medicine programme has been established between Atlantic Technical University (ATU) Donegal in Letterkenny and ATU Mountbellew in Galway.

A second veterinary programme will be established at South East Technological University in Kilkenny.

Once they are up and running the new programme will contribute to 80 additional veterinary graduates in Ireland each year, it is claimed.

The new Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine and Surgery (BVMS) programme will primarily take place at ATU Donegal, in collaboration with ATU Mount-

Students enrolled in the program are expected to spend up to two semesters on the Mountbellew farm, where they will engage with local veterinary practices while other teaching and clinical facilities will be based at the Donegal

A statement announcing the news said

ATU is working towards meeting regulatory and validation requirements for an initial intake of 30 students in September 2025, with plans to increase this to 40 students in subsequent years. It is anticipated the first enrollments will take place in September 2025.

Minister Charlie McConalogue confirmed that ATU is one of two locations for a veterinary school that cost €50 million to establish. "I have worked closely with the ATU over the last two years, and I congratulate all involved in the process. It is a significant development for third-level education in the North West, and for agriculture in the region as well. The clinical part of the veterinary course will be provided in Letterkenny, while the practical side will be delivered in collaboration with Mountbellew Agricultural College in Galway. I look forward to ATU working towards the commencement of the courses in 2025," Minister McConalogue added.

They stated: "VCI accreditation enables professional recognition in Ireland

She stated: "For years, students who did not get accepted into the programme in UCD were forced to travel abroad. The addition of this new programme will allow more students who wish to study veterinary medicine to stay in Ireland to get their degree."

Fine Gael candidate John McNulty, welcomed the announcement and praised the initiative, stating, "This new programme is a fantastic development for our region. I recently met with members of Donegal IFA, and a shortage of support for veterinary practices was a real concern discussed."

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The late Bernard Dillon

The death occurred on Monday of Bernard Dillon one of Letterkenny's best known businessmen. Bernard who resided on Ballyraine Road passed away at the Donegal Hospice. He was aged 94.



Glowing tributes have been paid to the Roscommon native who made Letterkenny his home for over 60 years ago. Bernard and his brother Jimmy (RIP July 2022) started the landmark Dillons Supermarket on the town's Main Street which is now a hotel. They had already opened a small grocery business on Main Street. A decade later, they decided to expand, acquiring adjoining land and buildings to build a groundbreaking new supermarket.

Letterkenny History said it was revolutionary at the time as prior to this customers who required bread and milk etc. asked the merchant to fetch it for them. Now customers could take the various goods off the shelves themselves, place them in their basket or trolley and pay for them at the counter. This new system of shopping changed the way that local people shopped for their groceries and brought many people to the town from around the county to do their shopping and witness this exciting new way to buy their groceries.

The Supermarket closed in 1998, being demolished a year later to make way for a new hotel. Originally named the Letterkenny Court Hotel, it was taken over by the McKeever family in 2014, who decided to retain the link to the well-known and popular landmark and appropriately renamed it Dillon's Hotel.

Dillons Supermarket had been a huge success and it was an outlet where so many customers came to do their weekly shopping. Bernard was a visionary and wanted to see the Cathedral Town prosper. That led him to being a founding member of the Letterkenny Chamber of Commerce in 1965. Their 60th anniversary is next year. Although retired from business for over 25 years he was still a Chamber member until very recently.

Letterkenny Chamber paid a special tribute to the man who was inextricably linked with business in the town for over six decades. "Bernard was made an Honorary Member of the Chamber in 1997, when he retired from the family business. No person was more deserving of the accolade. 59 years service to any organisation is a remarkable achievement, but when you give your time and expertise for free then it is pure selflessness.

Bernard attended the inaugural meeting of the Chamber in 1965. He had great foresight and realised that a Chamber would serve the town well into the future. Despite the fact that he was busy with the supermarket, he wanted to commit to it and to ensure that it became part of the commercial development of Letterkenny.

He was heavily involved particularly in the St. Patrick's Day Parade acting as our Judging Panel Chair for many years, a job that he took very seriously.

We offer our heartfelt sympathy to his wife Brid, children, Ciarán, Bronagh and Sinead and all his family."





Rome to Rathmullan – a Unique Event



The commemoration of the Flight of the Earls in Rathmullan on the 417th anniversary this year, centred on magnificent artworks by artist Anne McCloy of Derry. These are beautifully crafted tracings from the ornate grave-slabs in the church of San Pietro in Montorio, Rome where the O'Neill and O'Donnell exiles were buried. How do you measure generosity?

We measure generosity in different ways. Consider a few: Who is the recipient? You are driving home some evening; it's wet and miserable - and along the side of the road you see hazard-lights flashing. Someone is struggling in the driving rain to get a flat wheel loosened. You recognise them - it's that person who has been backstabbing (and front-stabbing) you. They have lied about you, turned people against you and manipulated those close to you. What will you do? You decide to stop to help. You end up taking them to your home, warming them by the fire and providing a hot meal. It's generous by any measure.

Another way to measure generosity is by what is given - It's your birthday and someone gives you this incredible gift. You know they have gone to an immense amount of effort to get this just right. It is exactly what you needed - they have understood your circumstances, your trials - you - and this is perfect. You are deeply moved to the very core of your being each time you look at what they have done.

Or a third way to measure generosity is by what price is paid. A person could give you something extravagant, but it hasn't actually cost them much - maybe they won it, or are repurposing a gift they received, or had a spare sitting around. But then there is the

person who has dug deep, not just in terms of money, but in time and effort, to get you exactly the thing you needed. You know it cost them to provide this for you. And each time you look at it you are moved by their lavish generosity. I was preaching on Sunday at the baptism of a little boy called Theodore - his name means 'Gift of God'. I wanted us to think about God's generosity to us. The verse I picked was from Paul's letter to the **Ephesians:**

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith - and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God - not by works, so that no one can boast" (v8,9)

Here is God's generosity: his rescue plan, his salvation is not something we earn or deserve, but it is his gift to us. Are you used to thinking of God as generous? That's what we see here. But just how generous?

How deserving is the recipient? We certainly didn't deserve it. Earlier verses tell us that we have done much that displeases God, yet he still holds out a gift to us! Like the car stopping, he is the last person we would expect to be offering us this gift.

What about the gift itself? God's gift contains forgiveness, adoption into his family, rescue from our old nature and from Hell, and an eternity



of perfect life. A previous verse calls this 'exceeding riches' - and so it is! What was the price paid? God could have more easily created another universe than forgiven our sins. To do that, all he had to do was speak. To redeem you and me he had to taste suffering and death, be despised and rejected by men, unjustly treated, accused, beaten, condemned and crucified. He had to bear our sins, and the punishment those sins deserved. All that he was willing to pay so that we could be offered this gift. By any measure he is a generous God. The only question is - what will you do with that generosity receive it, or reject it?

enough to invite me to their watch party and not everyone in the room was a bat-shit crazy, misogynistic, racist Trump devotee. Take Kendell Herrera and Eliana Castillo, two college-age women who looked like they got lost on their way to a Sabrina Carpenter concert. Tragically, under 50% of the 18-29 age demographic voted in the 2020 election. Not only will both be voting this time around, they will be campaigning. For Trump, obviously.

"Looking at the last debate against Biden, you would have to agree there was a stronger argument from the other side tonight but overall he just had stronger points." Kendall looked at her friend for support. "Right?"

Eliana is for Trump but that wasn't always the case. "I used to be right down the middle but in the last couple of years I've been growing up and maturing, and seeing what's been going on and it's not good."

In an age when Gen Z is boastfully checking out of politics, this kind of engagement is to be admired and encouraged. Kendall and Elina are young and attractive. They probably had other options, even on a Tuesday night in Phoenix.

'Mike', on the other hand, surely had a wide-open Google calendar. Leathery and agitated, he stood at the back of the room barking at the projection screen throughout, as if the moderators could hear him. "That's not true. She's lying. Do something." Mike could hardly watch at times. He put his head in his hands and stomped off down the corridor so he couldn't see what was going on.

I caught him in a calmer moment. That's when he told me his name was Mike.

"How do you think it's going, Mike?" "The problem is that none of these people are telling us what is going on in this country and that's exactly how they like it because if we Americans are ignorant then they can control us much more easily."

Who's controlling us - Trump? That got him agitated again. He went over to the cooler to get a bottle of water and took his time to return, having

finally formulated an answer. "None of this matters."

You could have fooled me, Mike.

The watch party started at 5pm, an hour before the debate. I got there early, just in time to gate-crash a training session for Trump Force 47, the name given to the volunteer army of supporters who will be out knocking on doors and making calls for the next eight weeks. JP, a full-time party official and Phoenix area captain for the Trump campaign, was in charge. "If there are any journalists here they gotta leave now because this is only for Trump Force members."

I confess I stayed put but JP seemed like a stand-up guy so I feel duty-bound to respect his off-the-record request. But I will say this - if you are out knocking on doors for Trump and collect 30 phone numbers you'll get a free Trump Force 47 baseball cap. After JP's talk, it was game on.

There is no need here for a tick-tock of the evening. You can get that elsewhere. My job is to report from the election frontline and I have to tell you the Trump folks at Arizona HQ genuinely believed their guy won. They loved it when he told Harris, "Wait a minute, I'm talking now" and cheered to the rafters when he said, "I'm going to send you a MAGA hat." At one point, the video stream buffered with Trump mid-rant, triggering the conspiracy theorists in the room. "Hey, I wish I had a button like that and could shut someone up whenever

I wanted." As time went by, interest waned. Ninety minutes is a long time even for political junkies and, besides, the foreign policy segments were way too detailed for general consumption. By the end, even when Trump was making his final pitch to the country, conversations were ongoing in every corner.

Nobody cheered at the end. Everyone gathered their stuff and left. I talked to a few people as they departed and they all gave Trump the thumbs up. I asked if anyone had been following the debate on social media. The verdict was in and he had been adjudged the loser. Bigly. "It's always about feelings and vibes, isn't it? When it's about the law our guy wins every time." said an African-American guy called Talib. I was sure the night had been catastrophic for Trump. He came across as too angry and the whole "they're eating cats and dogs in Springfield, Ohio' line was memorably insane, even for Trump. What right-minded person is going to listen to that nonsense and think, "There's my President"?

I was in the minority of one, though, until I caught the elevator down to the ground floor with Mikel Ann Dylan. She had grabbed a pile of Trump campaign memorabilia on her way out. An older woman who walked with a stick, she was smart and articulate, at that stage of her life where she says what was on her mind and doesn't give a hoot for the consequences. "Kalama is a liar and she lies all the time. But if I'm a Democrat and I look at her performance tonight, I'd say she did pretty well. And I'd agree with that. She did do really well."

Full marks for honesty but Mikel better be warned. It won't matter how many phone numbers she collects for Trump Force 47 - any more sacrilege like that and she won't get a baseball cap to add to her memorabilia collection.

100% Mica Redress.... Back on the road again

Defective Blocks. With 7,400 votes for 100% Redress in the local elections, this is now an opportunity to drive home to the Government that people are sick to the teeth of being treated as second class citizens.

We have the record to prove it: lowest income per capita in Ireland: lowest disposable income: lack of infrastructure with no dual carriageway or a train service to Dublin.

Does this Government care about Donegal? No, they don't.

It is Donegal's nightmare story of the generations. In the first instance, the defective blocks crisis is a legacy of political ineptitude and failure. And more than ever it is fairly obvious the current government really has no interest other than public relations spin.

This is equally as bad as the manner in which so many families have been cynically left hung out to dry in the lousiest way possible because two attorneys general have advised the Government to avoid full financial exposure as a consequence of the potential costs involved. Surely, if Governments have failed the homeowners it is time to pursue those who are to blame. Where was the oversight and where was the implementation of the Government's own regulations? And how come nothing happened?

This was the era of the Celtic Tiger and as many as 93,000 new houses were constructed in 2006 and so began a crisis in the industry. To this very day a price continues to be paid in the remediation of private housing estates, sewerage treatment plants and installation of lighting and footpaths.

That time for passing the parcel on the mica time bomb has passed and now more than ever, the campaigners who are forced to live with deflective blocks must redouble their efforts to drive the campaign forward, assured in the knowledge they

have justice and an overwhelming support at their backs. Keeping a campaign of this kind running year after year can drain energy, impetus and too many doors in Government Buildings have been shamefully shut in the faces of campaigners. Campaign fatigue is a very real issue when people are trying to break down the doors of official Ireland in so many long term fights. But rather than it being turned into a negative, the opposite has to be reality. All of the hundreds of meetings have not been in vain. This is and continues to be a massive learning curve and it's far from over. The knowledge gleaned from the experience of the experts in this country, in Dublin or in the EU Parliament and the results from the ballot box in the June elections - these are a powerful positive factor and the fight may only be the beginning. '100% Mica Redress - Back on the Road Again' has to be the only way forward because government parties are simply not listening.

To think that every new obstacle deemed feasible is being put in their way is outrageous but that's been the objective from day one.

T here's a political agenda out there (much of it coming from Fianna Fail) that naively suggests that homeowners will not actually be out of pocket after remediation is completed - that's a story of an ignorant political dimension. We can ill afford false claims, especially from politicians.

There is very clear evidence out there that homeowners rebuilding a 1,200 sq feet house will be more than €80,000 out of pocket and that's before renting accommodation is factored into the final cost. In the most basic of terms, there are families who are not half ways towards paying off their mortgages.

The FF appointed Attorney General Paul Gallagher in his advice to the Government said, "In Donegal... it is hoped that re-building would be the exception and that the other remedial options"

which would be cheaper"would more likely to be applicable."

In those circumstances it is hard to see the financial institutions willing to lend another hundred grand for remediation. And more homeowners who can access the maximum of €420,000 are also learning their rebuild could stretch to a deficit of €120,000. That's some grant solution... but given the lousy way the defective blocks legislation was driven through the Dail, it is obvious the Government did that in a hurry before the consequences were found out. But more importantly, it is hard to see the affordability of hard wrought families, already overburdened with mounting debts, being able to repay that extra burden. Imagine homeowners in the process of remediation and getting the full compensation (minus the new 10% increase being proposed) being out of pocket to the tune of more than a hundred and twenty thousand Euros! And those are not isolated cases. Shame on you Darragh O'Brien and the Leaders of the Government for failing the people has ignored the costs of remediation, trauma and the health stresses of raising children in homes very far from safe.

For a rationale of the Government mindset, look back in disbelief as two Oireachtas Members Donegal took to the media to drive their story and the positivity around the ubiquitous 'sliding scale' deal.

This was going to be a deal to remove all obstacles. It would deliver redress for everyone and every family in the land would suddenly rise up in unison thanking and worshiping these heroes for their... well for having the brass balls to try and sell a failed scheme. Instead they chose to sell the Fianna Fail gospel. However Donegal people are not fooled by this glib and opportunistic nonsense.

But unlike these naive politicians, people in defective block homes had more sense and called out the deal for what it was... a total sham. However there was no apology for trying to sell this failed notion. Months later it disappeared from the Environment Minister's agenda without a word of apology from the local politicians who'd assured the nation that the deal was the next big thing since we learned the earth was suffering the impacts of global warming. And true to form, the 'sliding scale' was replaced and written into legislation with a formula that will leave many homeowners saddled with the kind of debts they cannot afford.

Well known campaigner, Enda Craig who contributes to our 'Letters Column' has a particular line on the entire disaster.

He writes: "When legal action against the suppliers of the defective concrete proved unsuccessful, homeowners turned to their political representatives for help. The issue was raised in the Dáil multiple times, with politicians acknowledging the problem. Many homeowners faced a grim choice: continue paying substantial mortgages for homes that were slowly deteriorating or take drastic measures like returning their house keys and stopping repayments.

The government introduced grant schemes, stating at the time, they meant to rebuild or repair affected homes. These schemes provided a glimmer of hope for homeowners, convincing them to continue mortgage payments. The underlying strategy was to prevent a mass wave of defaults, which would have severely



impacted banks and building societies. In essence, the government's staunch defence of the schemes suggests that their primary goal was to protect the banks rather than the homeowners

However, when affected homeowners attempted to use the schemes, they discovered their anti-homeowner nature. Only those with substantial additional funding could cover the shortfall between the grant and actual rebuild costs. Consequently, only a small number of houses were fixed, creating the illusion of viability while minimising the government's expenditure. This intentional propaganda misled the wider public into believing that most homeowners were receiving genuine assistance. This was blatantly untrue and is still going on from government, media and politicians to this day.

Before the schemes, many homeowners received no support from banks, mortgage companies, or the government. Faced with rapidly deteriorating and failing properties, some returned their keys to the bank and others stopped mortgage repayments, leaving financial institutions with non-performing loans.

The government and senior civil servants recognised this could only be the solution and needed to act quickly. The primary objective was to prevent a financial crisis triggered by mass loan defaults. The potential billions in unrecovered loans would have had severe repercussions. This clearly shows the grant schemes were introduced to give homeowners hope which would ensure continued loan payments. However, the reality was different: the grants were designed to safeguard financial institutions' bottom lines."

So where to now? Obviously the highway is a part of the response and there is a serious and urgent need to increase the level of campaigning with public meetings and opinion pieces in the media... and more pressure on government TD's and Senators. The defective blocks homeowners also have another big option and that is to contest the general election. With 7,400 votes in the local elections, this is an opportunity of a lifetime to drive home to the Government that the people are sick to the teeth of being treated as second class citizens. Does this Government care about Donegal and the electorate that resides here? No, they don't.

There is no way of taking legal action against the various elements of the construction trade or much else at this point in the campaign. Banks are not accepting liability for loaning on the asset, and insurance companies are not liable either.

What choices do the homeowners have?

The one thing they cannot be denied is access to the ballot box on election day. That being so, now is the time to select candidates and take control of the political narrative and make sure that those with defective homes have a full engineering test completed by Petrolabs.

I know it is a big cost and for some it is unaffordable... but without it, you cannot legally claim to be an affected homeowner with defective blocks.

Any money left over after all the costs have been covered will go to the Donegal Mental Health Services Patients Comfort Fund and the Donegal Women's Centre.



Son of Termon parents revoked Chaplin re-entry to the US

It was September 18th 1952 and Charlie Chaplin left New York for the London premiere of his new movie 'Limelight' but little did he realise that the son of parents born in Termon would revoke his re-entry permit.

When Patrick McGrenra of Barnes and his wife Bridget Gallagher from Fawns, in the parish of Termon, fled the familiar poverty of their whitewashed cottage for America, little did they guess that their son James Patrick McGrenra would make it all the way to the White House.

Not only that, McGrenra would go on to play a leading role in one of the most colourful events in American legal history, involving English comic genius Charlie Chaplin's fall from grace - perhaps the most dramatic ever descent in stardom.

James Patrick McGrenra was welcomed into this world on July 8th, 1895. Being devout and practical parents they sent him to the parochial school, but he quit classes to take up employment in a Philadelphia print shop.

When the United States entered the fray of World War One, James immediately enlisted, serving as an observation pilot and adjutant with the 111th Infantry.

At the end of hostilities, he returned home with a new-found view of the world and a strong will to further his education. Graduating from law school, James built up a successful practice and became active in local politics. In due course, McGrenra was elected to Congress in 1936, standing under the Democrat banner in Pennsylvania, a seat he held for four terms. His talents and loyalty did not go unnoticed, and President Franklin D. Roosevelt created a position for James in the Justice Department. Judge McGrenra quickly established a reputation as a formidable enforcer, a trait very much admired by President Truman who, in the spring of 1952, confirmed James Patrick McGrenra as Attorney General - the top law post in the United States of America - an occasion joyfully celebrated by his relatives back in

While McGrenra's career was progressing, Charlie Chaplin had risen to fame during the era of the silent screen, an international icon encompassing both adulation and controversy. Like McGrenra's parents in Termon, Chaplin's childhood in London was one of prevalent poverty and hardship, and he was sent to 'The Workhouse' twice before the age of nine. Furthermore, when he was fourteen, his mother was committed to a mental asylum.

Despite these early adversities, Chaplin embarked on a career touring music halls as a gifted, young actor and comedian. Soon his obvious talent was spotted by the growing American film industry. With a dogged determination to succeed, Chaplin continued to hone his stagecraft and in time developed his legendary film persona 'The Tramp'. Chaplin then co-founded distribution company United Artists giving him complete directorship of his productions. He initially refused to make films with dialogue and it wasn't until 1940 that he released his first 'talkie' The Great Dictator – a political satire of Hitler. However, Chaplin's political opinions were in stark contrast to that of McGrenra. His political

pursuits triggered incendiary issues with wary

American authorities during World War II, particularly when he campaigned for the opening of a second front to aid the Soviet Union's battle against Nazi Germany. Chaplin also attended functions given by Soviet diplomats in Los Angeles. Such activities

meant Chaplin was considered "dangerously progressive and amoral". As Cold War fears grew, the FBI launched an official investigation and he was accused of communist sympathies while questions

were raised over his failure to take-up American citizenship.

Charlie Chaplin denied being a communist. Instead he labelled himself a "peace-monger", but felt the USA government's effort to suppress the ideology was an unacceptable infringement of civil liberties. Unwilling to be silenced, he continued to vocalise his views.

In June 1947, as public sentiment began to frown down upon the artist, Democrat politician, John E. Rankin, a leading spokesman for the House of Un-American Activities Commit-



tee, castigated Chaplin in Congress saying: "Chaplin's very life in Hollywood is detrimental to the moral fabric of America. He should be deported and gotten rid of at once, and his loathsome pictures be kept from the eyes of the American youth." Although his next movie, 'Limelight' was devoid of political themes, Chaplin decided to hold the world premiere in London, it being the setting of the film. So on 18th September, 1952, at New York, he boarded the Queen Elizabeth with his family and set sail for England. The very next day, James

McGrenra, exerting his

influence as United States Attorney General, revoked Chaplin's re-entry permit. The decision was taken that he would have to submit to an interview concerning his political views and moral behaviour to re-enter

McGrenra told the American media he had "a pretty good case against Chaplin". However, on the basis of FBI files released in the 1980s, the US Government had no real evidence to prevent the performer's re-entry. Still, when Chaplin received the telegram informing him of McGrenra's ruling, he quietly and privately decided to cut all connections

with the United States. He later divulged: "Whether I re-entered that

unhappy country or not was of little consequence to me. I would like to have told them the sooner I was rid of that hate-beleaguered atmosphere the better. I was fed up of America's insults and moral pomposity."

Settling in Switzerland with his wife and family, Chaplin put his Beverly Hills house and Hollywood film studio up for sale, severing the last of his ties with the United States in 1955.

Charlie Chaplin remained a controversial figure throughout the 1950s, especially after he was awarded the International Peace Prize by the communist-led World Peace Council, and his meetings with Soviet leader, Nikita Khrush-

However, during the evening of his life, the political atmosphere began to change and in 1972, Chaplin returned to the United States for the first time in 20 years.

At the Academy Awards gala, he received a rapturous reception and a 12-minute standing ovation, the longest in the Academy's history for "the incalculable effect he has had in making motion pictures the art form of this century".

In the early morning of Christmas Day 1977, Charlie Chaplin died at home after suffering a stroke in his sleep. He was 88 years old, leaving more than 100 million dollars to his widow. Ironically, after James Patrick McGrenra quit public office, he famously commented: "I wouldn't do it again for 100 million dollars, but on the other hand, I wouldn't have missed it for twice that much!"

There are over 60,000 townlands in Ireland and they remain one of the pillars of modern Irish life. On this







Myles Gallagher remembered the late Jim McFadden sending out letters to all the club secretaries in the league to vote Glenree into the league. It worked. Mick McGettigan is the oldest surviv-

ing member of the first Glenree Sports Club meeting. Mick and perhaps Bernie McLaughlin have spent the most time on the day-to-day business of Glenree over the fifty plus years. They are two men that have done trojan work for the club.
