Frightening experience for Massgoers

A first-hand account of the 'fracas' both inside and outside the Church of the Irish Martyrs in Letterkenny on Sunday has revealed the seriousness of the public order issue involved.

A large number of Gardai and an Armed Response Unit were tasked to take control of the unfolding incident and Massgoers were met by a security presence at the Kiltov Roundabout.

A member of the congregation who reported the incident for the Tribune writes: "The incident that occurred on the grounds of the Church of the Irish Martyrs in Letterkenny during Mass led to five men being charged with public order offences at a Special Sitting of Letterkenny District Court on Monday.

The five who appeared before Judge Ciaran Liddy were released on bail. There was a large Garda presence as the hearing took place where the men were charged with a range of offences including public order and possession of offensive weapons at the Church of the Irish Martyrs.

The congregation attending the 11.30am Mass was frightened and shocked by the scenes that began to unfold both inside and outside the chapel. Approximately 15 minutes into the Mass, raised voices were





Man jailed for Milford woman's death

through the front window of a car driven by Cunningham when it crashed in June 2021 Ms Mc Hugh, late of Fitzroy Avenue, Belfast, and formerly Labadough, Milford.

She was laid to rest in Milford and is survived by her children Tyler-Lee, Kianna-Mai and Darci-Rose; her mother Amanda and John, extended family and friends.

A witness saw the black BMW being "reversed at speed", doing donuts and being driven erratically before the car crashed into a grass verge. Police were told an injured person had been moved from the scene and a call was later made from Ardmore Avenue in Dundonald, to emergency services saying an injured person had been brought there.

Ms McHugh was treated at the house and

brought to hospital where she died of her injuries, which included major fractures and internal bleeding.

Her injuries were consistent with being thrown through the windscreen and onto the road. The court heard a delay in treatment would have

been unlikely to have had any impact on the outcome such was the severity of her injuries. Cunningham's driving was described by one of his co-accused as "out of control".

The driver was on bail at the time of the collision and told police he was "breaching his bail to try to help" but was not the driver.

Ms McHugh's mother gave the court a victim impact statement which was quoted by the judge.

She said the loss of her daughter "leaves an emptiness that will not be fixed" and her daughter was treated like "an object".

She recalled how one of her daughter's young children screamed for weeks after Ms McHugh's death and would "reach out for their mother". The court heard Cunningham had previous convictions, the vast majority of which were for motoring offences.

Cunningham's addiction issues were outlined to the court, as well as his remorse over the inci-

The judge said he had a high likelihood of reoffending and had persisted in his denial up to the day of the trial.

As well as the eight year sentence he will serve eight years on licence and will be disqualified from driving for 10 years from the date of his release and must retake his driving test.

Clonbeg Glebe church ruins walk this Friday

This Friday evening a special guided walk to the site of the ruins of Clonbeg Church and graveyard will take place in Creeslough as part of National Heritage Week.

The church in Cloone was used since the 1600's as a chapel of ease before it was aban-

The walk planned for this Friday evening, weather permitting, is due to take place from 6pm to 7.30pm.

Walkers are asked to arrive by 6pm at Campbell's farm yard along the N56 at Cloone where they will be guided to the site. Suitable footage and clothing is required and due to the nature of the terrain of the site being a working farm dogs and children under fiver are not permitted on the walk.

Refreshments will be served afterwards in

the Creeslough Community Hub on the village's main street. In the event the walk cannot take place due to the weather the talk will take place in the Community Hub instead.

The event is organised by the Clonbeg Heritage Group and its members, along with archaeologist Kate Robb, will give details on this hidden heritage site and other areas of interest in the locality, as well as detail of work to conserve the ruins and grave-



vard and make it accessible to the public in the future. Details of the Conservation Management Plan being considered highlight that Clonbeg Glebe church was probably a 'chapel of ease' to Clondahorky and likely abandoned soon after the present church was built at Ballymore in 1752. A memorial dated 1679 recorded at the site would indicate that the church was in use at that period.

Doug Beattie gone - where now for the UUP?

Doug Beattie has resigned as leader of the Ulster Unionist Party (UUP). He destroyed the cliché that there is no political news in August.

More importantly, his resignation is another step to some sort of realignment in Northern politics.

The issues go beyond the personality of Beattie. He was certainly erratic. He was too liberal for some in the UUP base. They went to the DUP and even the TUV. He was not liberal enough for others. They went to the Alliance Party.

Beattie is like Colm Eastwood. He has a weak card. Both have played them reasonably well. Arguably, for all his zig-zagging, Beattie played better. In the Westminster election, the UUP won a seat. Importantly, it increased the overall vote.

This may be a dying kick. In the end of the day, a political party represents a force in society. That creates problems for the UUP and SDLP.

Let's start with the UUP. Their political space is shrinking. Since the late 1960s there has been a fundamental division in Unionism. There are those who wanted to reform. That means making some sort of concessions to Nationalism. Then there were those who rejected reform and concession.

The old Unionist Party ruled the North for 51 years. Then it fragmented.

The DUP began as the Protestant Unionist Party. This opposed the reforms of the late 1960s. That's despite these being very mild indeed. They were only granted under pressure.

Then the DUP reinvented itself. In 1998 it entered the first Executive with Sinn Féin. They were then the smaller of four parties.

Then in 2008 it signed the St An-

drews' Agreement. The DUP became admitted they only campaigned keen for power-sharing. They went far further than the mild reforms they had denounced 40 years earlier. That now leaves three sizable Unionist parties. Two favour reform. One, the Traditional Unionist Voice (TUV) opposes.

There are differences between the UUP and DUP. The UUP is generally more liberal on social issues. There is a certain split on that, though.

The DUP is also moving, slowly. The Free Presbyterian Church used to dominate the party. It still has a strong influence. The Church, though, is not the force it was. According to surveys, DUP voters are more socially liberal than Sinn Féin voters. Deputy First Minister Emma Little Pengelly has tried her hand at camogie. She sent best wishes to the Armagh Gaelic footballers. Last week she tweeted a picture of her congratulating Irish Olympic gold medallist Daniel Wiffen. Yes, all were small gestures. And the sort of gestures the DUP would have gone buck mad about in the old days. It is unclear whether the two big Unionist parties will unite in some way. One, almost certainly the UUP, may die away. The TUV has a clear space. At present that is very much a minority space.

The stood in all 18 constituencies. They were hardly noticed in most. I live in a largely Catholic part of Omagh. My neighbours are mostly older. There was no sign of the SDLP during the election.

The two MPs represent different forces. Colm Eastwood in Foyle can out-Sinn Féin when he feels he needs to. He tried to broker a partnership with Fianna Fáil. Clare Hanna has said she would have left the SDLP had that gone through. She represents South Belfast. That's the Dublin 4 of the North. She pulls a large small-u unionist vote. She could jump to Alliance while hardly breaking her stride.

The North's two nationalist parties come from the traditional split in Northern Nationalism. There were those willing to compromise, to some degree, with the Northern state. There were those who rejected any compromise.

Now Sinn Féin have gone far further in compromise than any of previous Nationalists. They support the police. Their leaders met the late Queen and current King. They withdrew from South Belfast in favour of Clare Hanna. In Lagan Valley they withdrew in favour of Alliance's Sorcha Eastwood. They also withdrew in North Down in favour of Alliance. (Ok, that didn't really matter. Their vote there is tiny). In the past,

suggesting such deals would have had them frothing at the mouth. There are now fewer differences with the SDLP. The SDLP takes seats in Westminster. They don't. There is definitely a momentum to take the

As between the two Unionist parties, there are historical differences. However, the IRA campaign ended a generation ago. Thus it matters less to a younger generation.

Ultimately, social forces are decisive in the long run. Sometimes that run can be long. Parties have a certain momentum of their own. Able leaders can keep a party afloat though its time is past. They can't do so forever.

The North's big five parties are all products of the Troubles. They have continued though those are a generation over.

The start of the Troubles broke up three big parties then dominant. The Unionist Party ruled from 1921 to 1972. Until 1968, it was a monolith. First fragmentation set in, then speeded up. The current UUP inherited the name. However, it is product of a reverse takeover by

Vanguard in the 1970s. Vanguard had been harliners. Then they turned in favour of certain concessions.

The Nationalist party usually held all majority Catholic seats outside Belfast in the old Northern Parliament. They came from the old Irish Party fusing with the pro-Treaty wing of Sinn Féin. By 1973 they had disappeared.

The Northern Ireland Labour Party was the North's third party. As recently as 1970 they got 100,000 votes. They disappeared within a couple of years. Fifty years on we are in another new situation. Some sort of realignment is overdue. We don't know exactly what it is.

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

'Defective block schemes created to protect banks' - claim

"The Irish Government's introduction of grant schemes for homeowners affected by defective concrete was primarily aimed at preventing a potential financial crisis. This defective concrete, containing high levels of the reactive iron sulphide minerals, caused walls to crack and crumble, leaving thousands of homes in dire straits. However, a closer examination reveals that the true beneficiaries of these schemes were not the homeowners but the financial institutions," so says Enda Craig. He says that all Donegal TD's and Senators know this already.

He writes: "When legal action against the suppliers of the defective concrete proved unsuccessful, homeowners turned to their political representatives for help. The issue was raised in the Dáil multiple times, with politicians acknowledging the problem. Many homeowners faced a grim choice: continue paying substantial mortgages for homes that were slowly deteriorating or take drastic measures like

The government introduced grant schemes, stating at the time, they meant to rebuild or repair affected homes. These schemes provided a glimmer of hope for homeowners, convincing them to continue mortgage payments. The underlying strategy was to prevent a mass wave of defaults, which would have severely impacted banks and building societies. In essence, the government's staunch defense of the schemes suggests that their primary goal was to protect the banks rather than the homeowners

However, when affected homeowners attempted to use the schemes, they discovered their anti-homeowner nature. Only those with substantial additional funding could cover the shortfall between the grant and actual rebuild costs. Consequently, only a small number of houses were fixed, creating the illusion of viability while minimising the government's expenditure. This intentional propaganda misled the wider public into believing

The government and senior civil servants recognised this could only be the and needed to act quickly. The primary objective was to prevent a financial crisis triggered by mass loan defaults. The potential billions in unrecovered loans would have had severe repercussions. This clearly shows the grant schemes were introduced to give homeowners hope which would ensure continued loan payments. Oisin Orr had two winners at Pontefract on Sunday. The Rathmullan jockey was on board the Richard Fahey trained 10/11 on "Powerful Glory" in the Cure Leukaemia EBF "Newcomers" Maiden Stakes. That win Orr took the Sunday Series Best Jockey award, worth £10,000, for a third time. His second victory was in the Sky Bet Fillies' Stakes race on 11/2 shot "Marine Wave" for the same trainer Richard Fahey his second win of the day. On Saturday Orr was also in the winners enclosure on "Dare to Hope" at Ripon.

Letterkenny jockey Brandon Wilkie was a winner at race meeting in Doncaster on Saturday aboard Liberty Coach. Wilkie had another winner on Monday on 17/2 shot Sugarloaf Lenny for trainer William Knight. It was Brandon's 26th win of the season so far and his fourth first in the last ten days.

Save our dunes continues in Fanad

Last Sunday, Fanad Coastal Group volunteers armed themselves with spades, mallets and loads of energy to erect 40 mètres of chesnut fencing at the entrance to Din's Beach at Rinboy, Fanad.

The threat of erosion, potentially impacting the main road, had been identified by the recent workshops lead by Dr Kevin Lynch of Galway University and, with the support of Cllr Liam Blaney, Donegal County Council helped fund the materials.

The fencing is to limit access to areas where the sand is eroding, it will help trap sand within the fencing and will allow marram grass to grow which will stabilise the sand. Marram grass feels very strong to us but is very susceptible to trampling, dying off under light traffic. We must watch now this winter to see how the fences survive, removing them temporarily if tides are very high. A huge thank you to the volunteers. "We've been attracting between 400 and 500 in recent years, but this year it looks like the final entry could be close to 600 which is fantastic," the chairman commented.

Revenue sniffer dog raids net good to value of €390k

Irish Revenue Officers seize contraband worth over €390,000 in Dublin and Donegal with help of their detector dog Toby.

Revenue officers say they uncovered 37,600 cigarettes of various brands, with an estimated value of €31,000, representing a potential loss to the Exchequer of €24,800.

They also located cash to the value of €2,935 and a quantity of alcohol were also seized in one of the raid while cash to the value of approximately €57,500, comprising €42,102 and £13,240 was also lo-

They said both of these seizures were made as a result of intelligence led operations and with the assistance of Detector Dog and two women have been questioned in relation to these discoveries. They stated: "It is suspected that the

cash is the proceeds of, or intended for use in, criminal activity and is detained by Revenue in accordance with proceeds of crime legislation. Revenue officers were granted a three-month cash detention order in respect of each cash discovery." In addition, the following seizures were made by Revenue officers examining parcels at a premises in Dublin: approximately 9.5kgs of herbal cannabis, with a value of almost €189,000,

various quantities of other illegal drugs, with an estimated value of

approximately €9,400, and a quantity of retail goods, with an estimated value of over €101,000.

The illegal drugs were discovered in parcels that originated in the USA, the United Kingdom, India, Canada, Spain and Thailand, and were destined for various addresses nationwide.

The retail goods were seized due to infringements of Intellectual Property Rights.

Investigations into all seizures are ongoing. These seizures are part of Revenue's ongoing operations targeting smuggling and shadow economy activity. If businesses, or members of the public, have any information regarding smuggling, they can contact Revenue in confidence on 1800 295 295.

on the phones in contacting every last delegate before September 12th.

In the 2020 general election, Pat the Cope's seat seemed in danger into the second day of counting at the Aura in Letterkenny.

On the 9th count Thomas Pringle, Joe McHugh and Fianna Fáil's Charlie Mc-Conalogue - who had topped the poll in 2016 - were elected without reaching the quota. The loser was Gallagher who was first elected to Donegal County Council in 1979.

He was most constant figure for FF in Donegal politics. He was first elected to the Dail in 1981 and was Leas-Cheann Comhairle in the last Dáil.

He put his defeat down to transfers of course, and the Sinn Féin tsunami. Pearse Doherty and Padraig Mac Lochlainn won more than 45% of the first preference with the former more than 8,000 above the quota.

And in the new spirit of friendship between FF and FG we are told there is not even a breath of fresh air separating them. However some of those voices are a bit ropey in that they were in the vanguard in proposing names for FG's convention on next Monday evening.

In that respect the 'Vote No. 2 for the Cope,' from FG has a certain flair, even though it may prove hollow.

Meanwhile as Fine Gael prepares for their convention, their General Secretary, John Carroll is in Donegal this week sounding out strategy and the party's chances of retaining Joe McHugh's

Back in Fianna Fail, there are six candidates seeking two nominations.

However, its predicted that field may quickly shorten to two runners. What, with Seanad nominations on the agenda there is almost bound to be a jockeying to attract the eye of Micheál Martin despite the fact the Tanaiste's televised appearance with a Donegal politician is best forgotten.

It's expected that delegates will be asked to register from 6pm on convention night. In former times - going back a decade the party had close to 1,500 registered members in Donegal.

However those numbers have fallen considerably.

Minister Charlie McConalogue will be joined by former Deputy Pat the Cope Gallagher and Cllr. Michael Naughton who topped the poll with 1,847 (13.3%) in the Donegal electoral area in June's local elections.

Sources told the Tribune he will be a formidable candidate with a sound base of FF's grassroots. He's also well-known in Letterkenny where he's been the Manager of the Clanree Hotel for a number of years. And then there's his contribution to the GAA across the county.

Pat the Cope has confirmed what many were saying for quite some time... he's going to the convention with the ambition of winning enough delegate votes to put him on the ticket.

And it would seem that he's got a strong backroom team eager to join him on the

He is one of Fianna Fail's longest serving and most loyal members, as a dep-

uty, an MEP, a junior minister and a Leas-Ceann Comhairle. It is obvious he carries a huge legacy of looking after his constituents and he will hope that the errors of 2020 when his return the Dail was taken for granted, will not be repeated.

Meanwhile FG's convention is in the Radisson Blu Hotel Letterkenny on Monday night and it's expected to select two candidates. And the emerging news is one for the record books... Čllr Jimmy Kavanagh is reported to have received a record number of nominations. Senator Niki Bradley, Milford and John McNulty, Kilcar are the other contenders.

Meanwhile senior figures in the organisation have expressed disappointment with last week's political commentary in the Tribune that read: "Their local election results point to the enormity of the task ahead even if they have a shiny new constituency executive committee visiting every doorstep between now and polling day."

"I take exception to the comment about a shiny new executive. There is damn all wrong with the one we have, so why should we want to change? Our executive committee is elected democratically ... you are listening to those who are no longer members of the party," we were told by a party official in response to our coverage last week.

As for the remark about why FG should change their constituency executive, perhaps the point being missed amid the rush of strategy meetings and important preparations, was about 5,200 good rea-

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sons for change. However, the party is on a roll, fair dues to all concerned in keeping the home fires burning.

people and people with a disability. The grants available to private home owners are 80% funded by the Dept of Housing, with a 20% contribution from the resources of each local authority.

There are three distinct grant types including the Housing Adaptation Grant for People with a Disability. It assists people with a disability to have necessary adaptations, repairs or improvement works carried out in order to make their accommodation more suitable for their needs. Also available is the Mobility Aids Grant. It fast track grants to cover a basic suite of works to address the mobility problems of a member of a household. Qualifying works include the provision of stair lifts, level access showers, access ramps, grab rails and some minor adaptation works

Thirdly, there is the Housing Aid for Older People Grant which assists older people living in poor housing conditions to have necessary repairs or improvements carried out. Grant eligible works include structural repairs or improvements, re-wiring, fixing or replacement of windows and doors, provision of water supply and sanitary facilities, and provision of heating. Just under two years ago a survey of Occupational Therapists in Ireland found that over two thirds of them had experienced burnout as a result of their job in the previous 12 months. The survey was conducted by the Association of Occupational Therapists of Ireland. Findings from the survey also indicated that almost half had considered leaving the profession in the previous year. The results of the survey were presented at AOTI's annual conference in Athlone in October

Commenting at the time Odhrán Allen, CEO of AOTI said: "Occupational Therapists are facing severely challenging and deteriorating working conditions that negatively affect their capacity to provide a high quality service and impact their mental health and overall wellbeing.

Mr Allen said that against the backdrop of a rising demand for Occupational Therapist interventions, there were many seriously understaffed services, and rapidly growing waiting lists, making the provision of sustained, high-quality services that help children and adults to participate in everyday meaningful activities is increasingly unrealistic.

In their response to queries from the Tribune, the HSE response also stated: "The department has implemented a waitlist initiative to respond to longer waiting referrals (over 6 months) for Housing Adaptation Grants. This coupled with the continued work by the primary care occupational therapists with clients presenting with highest priority clinical need has meant that in 2024 to date, 49 Housing Adaptation Grant Assessments & Reports have been completed. The service plans to continue with this initiative to address the remaining 38 referrals waiting for assessment."

The ten men will leave Letterkenny on Friday week the 30th of August on the first leg of the journey with the final destination being the English city of Bolton. Moyle Hill man Paul McGinley had the original idea to do a charity event for both the Donegal and Bolton Hospices in memory of family members. First and foremost he wanted to do something for the Donegal Hospice where his late mother Frances was so well cared for prior to her death in May 2022. Frances was formerly a member of the Hegarty family from the Mountain Top. Paul McGinley's link to the Bolton Hospice has come as a result of following the fortunes of the city's football club. Bolton Wanderers are based in Greater Manchester and compete in League One.

"I have been going over to games regularly and was at 13 matches last season. I am a season ticket holder. Myself and my

wife Shauna have made a lot of friends over there. John McGinley who used to play for Bolton is someone that I meet regularly. He is involved with the Bolton Hospice so that is the reason for supporting them. My mother Frances passed away at the Donegal Hospice two years ago so I always wanted to do something for them. I wanted to do something that wasn't too easy but still doable. I do a bit of cycling but nothing competitive. My father Gerard would have done more than me. He would have done a lot of the Sligo to Letterkenny cycles" Paul said.

The ten men team will also include Paul's two brothers Ciaran and Gerard Jnr and his uncle Pat Hegarty who starred in athletics with Finn Valley for many years. Also doing the 250km cycle are Paul's cousins Christopher and Eamonn McGinley, nephew Dylan McGarrigle along with Lexie Diver (Milford) and the Scott brothers Mark and Ivan (Portlean). They have been meeting up regularly as a group over the past month having done their own individual training previously.

"We have been doing up to 70k in a night. I am looking forward to getting going now. We will leave from Letterkenny on the Friday morning and get to Belfast Port for the ferry in the evening. We will then cycle on Saturday morning to the Bolton Hospice first and onto the football ground for the Exeter game. A dinner is being organised for us that night. There is a minibus coming over as well with some supporters so it will be good to meet up afterwards."

Paul was in Bolton on Saturday for the league game against Wrexham which ended 0-0. He was there also for a promotional event for the sponsored cycle. A quiz and darts event are among additional fundraisers being organised in the coming weeks for a very worthy cause. Two Roads, **Two Crowds**

My wife's favourite poem opens with the lines: Two roads diverged in a yellow wood It's from the wonderfully evocative and thought-provoking, 'The Road Not Taken' by Robert Frost. It comes to mind in a tangential sort of way because of two video clips I saw today almost one above the other on my Facebook feed. One was a video of legendary rockers AC/ DC performing at Croke Park last Saturday. The vast crowd of 80,000 was singing along to one of AC/DC's greatest hits. The other video was also of a crowd singing last Saturday in Kilkenny - 700 people, a large enough crowd in the circumstances, for it was at a Christian conference. There the similarity ended. One crowd was belting out, "I'm on the highway to Hell"; the other, "All people that on earth do dwell, sing to the Lord with cheerful voice" words from Psalm 100. I was in one of those crowds and was deeply moved - yet when I saw the other I was deeply moved too. Hearing so many Christians singing with one voice in praise to God was tremendous - it moved me to tears at one point. But hearing a hundred times more people screaming with Brian Johnson, "I'm on the highway to Hell" moved me to tears too - a different sort of tears, tears of sorrow. Hell is no singing matter. You might say, "It's only a song" - but Hell isn't simply a song lyric, it's an eternal destiny, a place so unutterably awful and bleak that I wouldn't wish it

on my worst enemy. It is where all goodness, joy, laughter and pleasure is gone, and only pain, suffering, judgment and the blackest regret remains. Contrary to AC/DC's lyrics there will be no 'Party time' nor will there be any friendship for you to enjoy ('My friends are gonna be there too'). To hear 80,000 people singing is a bit like hearing 80,000 Jews in 1941 singing "I'm on the highway to Auschwitz." It's soul-chilling. The juxtaposition of the two videos, and their two crowds, reminded me of something Jesus said, "Wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it." (Matthew 7:13-14) Psalm 100 alludes to that narrower road - one that leads right up to the gates of Heaven itself: "O enter then his gates with praise, approach with joy his courts unto" Jesus Christ came to make it possible for us to avoid the joyless awfulness of Hell, and to enjoy the joyful wonder of Heaven. Astonishingly he could have sung the lyrics "I'm on the highway to Hell" more truly than anyone, for he went there on the Cross to pay for all our Hell-deserving sin, so that we could enter his courts with joy. He is the way, the narrow road that leads to life, the road less travelled. Choose carefully which road






Burt could host the Olympics!

The Burt area of Donegal has the potential to host an Olympic Games. That might seem like a mad idea but there is one man, a native of the county, who believes that the dream is worth pursuing with cross-border support. The man who wants to remain anonymous for now says a number of high profile political and sporting figures have been briefed on the Burt Olympics plan.

Among them are Northern Ireland First Ministers Michelle O'Neill and Emma Little-Pengelly, Deputy Charlie McConalogue, former MEP Mairead McGuinness, J.P. McManus and Jarlath Burns.

He describes Burt as one of the beautiful places on the planet. "It is one of the most exciting places to be on the planet. You have the Grianan of Aileach and then there is really good flat land in Burt where an Olympic village could be built with a stadium

that would be the most environmentally friendly in the world. It is close to the sea for water sports and there are golf courses nearby in Buncrana and Ballyliffin. In Derry there is a big GAA facility in Dungiven that could be used as well."

He has already met Emma Little-Pengelly and gave her an outline of his ambitions. He has also sent the details of his vision to Michelle O'Neill while he is working on organising a meeting with the Mayor of Derry Lilian Seenoi Barr. On this side of the border the Minister for Agriculture Charlie McConalogue is also aware of the Burt Olympic plan as is former MEP and new EU Commissioner Mairead McGuinness . He has also talked to a former senior Donegal politician and made contact with wealthy Irish citizens including J.P. McManus. "I have given the details to businessmen like J.P. McManus. This is a countrywide plan to make it happen. The Olympics are going to be in Los Angeles in 2028 and Brisbane in 2032. I believe it can happen here quite quickly if the support is there. I want to see the politicians and business people coming back to me with their responses."

He says the Paris Olympics was in general a success with little con-

troversy where men and women of different colour and ethnicity were treated equally while the exclusion of a country like Russia was the right thing to do with Putin's actions denying the athletes the opportunity to compete on the world stage. Again he reiterated that Burt was the perfect place for an Olympic arena.

"You have clean air. There are no extreme weather conditions. Burt is the promised land. It is the nearest place to heaven on earth. In an ideal world it would be the epicentre. Whatever type of a stadium is built it would be environmentally and ecologically friendly.

It would be a venue that you could maintain and use for other purposes. I have done my bit now it's time for others to come to me and hopefully it's something that they will run with for the good of Donegal. I played a lot of sport and see the benefits it brings in so many ways. This is not about me, that's why for now at least I want to remain anon-

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Country's record failure in constrution not a surprise

The nation expects a general election before Christmas and the odds favour the civil war parties. FF and FG will be at the starting gate and that will be interesting if only to guess how close they come to having an overall majority... But is it really that simple?

Now that the Rose of Tralee is done and dusted for another year, you just have to wonder what surprises RTE has in store to fill the spaces in television land for the winter?

The predictably boring Late Late Show will be announced in a fanfare of hype and then there's 'Dancing with the Stars' in the new year? And insofar as the panel on The Sunday Game goes, wouldn't be great if it was gone come next summer's championships.

But who knows what might happen now that RTE has been handed a whopping bailout of €725 million in the next three years... so what else is new or will RTE be back with cap in hand looking for more money?

Don't you know! Maybe, just maybe Simon Harris will extend these similar magic increases to hard pressed services in housing, health, infrastructure, education, Garda numbers, road policing, more nursing posts and more beds, to doctors, physios and just about every other sector of the public service. They are all hard pressed for personnel and in a country that has expanded by two million in recent years, would it not be great if this pressure attracted levels of staffing, that ending queues for hospital appointments and much more. **Expect Simon to make loads** of big promises: he's been doing that for ten years and his record of delivery does not match anybody's expectations. But, for some inexplicable

reason, his fortunes are soaring in the opinion polls despite having delivered nothing apart from aspirations, promises and hope. For most people in search of hope they no longer turn to politicians and rely on a visit to the Shrine at Knock to get a pair of rosary beads blessed or climb the Reek where St. Patrick looked out across Clew Bay and called the faithful there to pray!

But all is not lost just yet. The nation expects a general election before Christmas and the odds favour the civil war groups all decked out in their finest greenery. FF and FG will be there at the starting post and that will be interesting if only to guess how close they can come to having an overall majority. From this distance there is a fair bet they'll need 88 seats for a working majority. Someone may have to create a brand new party to fill the gap. With FG on 24% and FF on 20% in the opinion polls, they could end up with a gap of fifteen to twenty seats to make up the deficit for a clear majority. Imagine if most of the newly elected Independents were to be on board that bus trip to the Aras to collect their seals of office?

But the latest shock news about the country's record failure in building new houses falling away behind the population growth makes for quite stark reading. The first reaction has to be why did nobody tell the Government the game was over. Otherwise Simon

Harris would be in the Tribune spinning like a top chatting about constructing 250,000 new houses in the next four and a half years. On reflection, this figure will fall short of targets unless people pack up and leave the island.

However, I'd love to hear Darragh O'Brien put some sense on why housing construction has been one of Ireland's largest disasters since Noah's Big Flood Night.

A huge task by all accounts. God found one righteous man. Noah was the main one in whom God confided his intention.

"I am about to bring on the Flood ..." Not a bother at all says Noah and he brought along all God's creatures great and small and he climbed on board the Ark in his six hundredth year of life. They're not made like him anymore.

If only Harris and his Government were doing their work properly, this nation would not be so badly in need of housing.

Here on Planet Earth, Ireland's population growth is outpacing the delivery of new homes at a rate of almost four to one, new analysis suggests.

The research from Savills Ireland compared Ireland with several other advanced western economies and found this country fares the worst in terms of population growth to housing delivery. Ireland's ratio of 3.8 people added to the population for every unit of housing delivered was 80% worse than that of the UK (2.1 ratio) and double that of Australia (1.9). It was also significantly worse than the US (1.5) and Germany (0.9), which Savills said highlighted that Ireland "really does stand out alone" in the severity of

its housing shortages. "Ireland has unique drivers - a delayed natural population boom, high migration due to strong economic growth, and structural legacy issues resulting from the Celtic Tiger crash - that explains why Ireland has the unenviable position having the worst supply to population growth of the countries

analysed," Savill's director of research John Ring said. "At present, we are running to stay still and a more aggressive approach to promoting new housing supply is warranted compared to our peers."

Mr Ring added that progress has been made in terms of supply but the scale of the housing crisis "remains large", and that new Government targets around the delivery of housing over the coming months is to be welcomed.

"New targets should be reasonable but also ambitious and challenging, which recognise the seriousness of Ireland's housing crisis as outlined in this analysis," he said.

The research from Savills came as the latest Property Price Index from the Central Statistics Office (CSO) showed that the cost of purchasing a home in Ireland rose 8.6% in the 12 months to June 2024.

The median price of a home purchased in Ireland over the last year was €337,500, the CSO said. The median is the middle figure in a row of numbers sorted from top to bottom, as opposed to the average.

Trevor Grant, the chair of Irish Mortgage Advisors, said: "This is the tenth consecutive month that annual house prices have increased and means that many prospective first-time buyers will continue to see their chances of buying a home slip away from them.

"Current Government house building targets are well below that though **Taoiseach Simon Harris has** suggested that more realistic and ambitious housing targets will be set in the Budget. It is imperative that any such targets are delivered on. While housing commencements are at record levels this year, we are simply not building enough properties quickly enough." And months out from the general election, housing in one phase or the other is going to be one of the top public issues in the campaign. And it's been that way for over thirty years and despite the 'huge steps forward'



it would seem the Government is going in the opposite direction.

Apart from the upcoming Irish election there is the coverage of America's Presidential Election and that is fascinating and that should tick the boxes for compulsive viewing right up to November 5th and beyond. It's the greatest show on earth and the live coverage from the campaign is already fascinating.

And the Tribune will have regular updates from our sources in Washington. Because the outcome of this election will impact our economy in one way or the other. Look only at the number of US companies that are based here and the tens of thousands employed either directly or indirectly. We've done very well because of these jobs and that was set in train all those years ago with very favourable tax incentives to lure the rich Yankee groups. This is the sixtieth presidential election since 1789 and 40 of the 46 presidents have been elected this way. All have been male. The US. uses an electoral college system, where each state has a specified number of electors. In this system, each State has a fixed number of electors based on their population size, and they vote for their candidate with the most popular votes within their State or district. Since 1964, there have been 538 electoral votes available and candidates need a minimum of 270 votes to win. Because of this system, candidates do not have to win over fifty percent of the popular votes across the country, but just win in enough States to receive a total of 270 electoral college votes. The use of this system is a source of debate in the U.S.; those in favour claim that it prevents candidates from focusing on the interests of urban populations, and must also appeal to smaller and less-populous States.

From 1789 until 1820, there was no popular vote, and the President was then chosen only by the electors from each State. George Washington was unanimously voted for by the electorate, receiving one hundred percent of the votes in both elections. From 1824, the popular vote became the selected choice among electors to decide who to vote for.

And from 1924, the difference in the share of both votes has varied, with several candidates receiving over ninety percent of the electoral votes while only receiving between fifty and sixty percent of the

popular vote.

Since 1824, there have been 49 elections, and in 18 of these the winner did not receive over fifty percent of the popular vote. In the majority of these cases, the winner did receive a plurality of the votes, however there have been five instances where the winner of the electoral college vote lost the popular vote to another candidate.

The most recent example of this was in 2016, where Hillary Clinton won approximately three million more votes than Donald Trump.

has been given a lifeline this week after the European Commission agreed to impose temporary restrictions to stop low cost salmon being dumped into EU markets.

The new restrictions will come as a major boost for Marine Harvest based in the Fanad Peninsula and they have a staff level of 190 workers in a county that has already been devastated by redundancies in the textile industry.

The Fanad operation is there for 25 years and it's the only major employer outside of Letterkenny. The jobs there are now secure and the decision will give Marine Harvest hope for the future that they can expand and protect their existing assets in Ireland. The new measures will see non-EU supplies monitored and if their products go over quota they will be surcharged by 18%. Richie Flynn who is CEO of the Irish Salmon Growers Association said that in effect this deal will see a 12% reduction in import tonnage and this will be a huge benefit to the industry and producers can now breathe a sigh of relief.

The measures take the form of what is in effect an annual quota on imports which represent two thirds of EU consumption and prices are now expected to stabilise and rise by around 18% which is the margin required for profitability.

However the new measures are only temporary and will last for two hundred days. In February the European Commission will examine the consequences of the restrictions before a decision of any permanency

The new measures were achieved only after the British Prime Minister Tony Blair intervened to stop the Scottish aquaculture industry from being decimated. Massive over-supply has affected the UK and Irish industry seriously and several companies were considering getting out of the business as prices plummeted. Richie Flynn said the good news was welcome and that Irish government officials had worked diligently with his own organisation as well as the UK to achieve this result.

He said the decision would serve to stem the tide of cheap imports and allow the industry here to plan for the future with a greater degree of confidence than they might have anticipated earlier in the season.

The application to Donegal County Council also includes upgrading and widening of the main Letterkenny to Glenties Road and associated infrastructure works. The Ballymacool group was initially opposed the rezoning of the lands for residential purposes say they were given to understand that three detailed masterplans were to be submitted prior to any application being accepted by Donegal County Council. The Group claims that Ballymacool is already overdeveloped with a lack of infrastructure to meet the demands of the area. In recent weeks Cllr. Victor Fisher has been given complaints of a foul sewage odour at Ballymacool Terrace. The special meeting needed the signatures of five councillors is expected to take place within the next fortnight. 

The campaign focuses on delivering the MMR vaccine to key groups, who may have missed their vaccines in the past:

Children

Young adults

Health and Care workers.

Those eligible are those born in Ireland from 1.1.1978 and do not have evidence of two MMR vaccines or if born outside of Ireland and do not have evidence of two MMR vaccines at any age.


