# Anger as access to Trá na Rossan not fit for purpose

Locals and visitors who've tried to visit Trá na Rossan beach on the Atlantic Drive close to Melmore Head this summer have been shocked by the condition of the boardwalk and the general lack of repairs at one of Donegal's most unique locations.

It is reported that the infrastructure has been neglected over a number of years.

Those with mobility issues say they are now compromised and in most instances, they do not go there anymore because the access is much too dangerous. It is obvious for many people that access to the beach is now compromised because both the boardwalk and the adjacent sandy pad are a hazard. We are told no repairs have been done in the last ten years. that's according to those who contacted the Tribune to highlight the neglect of one of Donegal's most iconic landscapes

The photographs show what is left of the broken boardwalk with missing elements of the structure. Obviously it is in a dangerous condition with most of the timber structure either broken or no longer in place.

The issue was raised during the recent elections and at least one candidate promised to bring the deterioration to the attention of Donegal County Council last May.

However, this is a work in progress according to Čllr Liam Blaney.

He told the Tribune that he was aware of the problems with the general issues

that have arisen. He confirmed that he got approval for funding of €5,000 at the April meeting of the Council and he expected that the repairs to the broken fencing might have been completed this summer - however that might have been a bit optimistic. He

acknowledged that

much more money is needed to repair other damages and he's already been in discussions with the Council.

He said he intends to ensure the necessary works are carried out and also expressed his optimism that the Cllrs will back his efforts to have Trá na Rossan restored to being fit for purpose once again.

Set among the towering landscape of the Rosguill Hills, Trá na Rossan is one of Donegal's more secluded beaches and as a result is completely unspoilt and in pristine condition. During the summer months there is barely parking space on the access road between Dundoan and Melmore. However, for the rest of the time the beach is a peaceful haven for walkers and nature watchers.

The Tribune has been told that the Council provided the car park and also improved the sandy access pad to the beach a number of years

He told the media: "Since losing my seat in 2020, I have maintained an active role in representing the people of the county and continued to work for the constituency to the very best of my ability. Politics has been my entire life's work and I am seeking the support of the party members to afford me the opportunity to contest the next General Election, so that I can continue to represent the constituency, our Contd. # Appeal following tragic Kilmacrennan crash

The two people who lost their lives in a road traffic collision late on Wednesday night were siblings P.J. and Una McGettigan both aged in their early 70s. They were both natives of Gleneraugh, Glen, Carrigart. P.J. McGettigan resided at Fawns, Termon.

The collision occurred on the N56 on the outskirts of Kilmacrennan village near the Lurgy Park football grounds at approximately 11.50pm. The driver of the second car, a woman aged in her 40s, was taken to Letterkenny University Hospital for treatment of serious but non-life threatening injuries.

A Garda Forensic Collision team carried out an investigation of the collision scene on Thursday morning. The N56 road through Kilmacrennan village was closed until early Thursday afternoon as a result of the crash. The vehicles involved

were a Ford Focus and a Dacia Duster.

Post mortem examinations on the deceased took place at LUH. Investigations into the circumstances of the collision are continuing and Gardai are appealing to witnesses to come forward. They are the seventh and eighth people to lose their lives on the county's roads so far this year. There were ten deaths in the whole of 2023 on Donegal roads.

Gardaí are appealing for any witnesses to this collision to come forward. A spokesperson said: "Any road users who may have camera footage (including dash-cam) and were travelling in the area at the time are asked to make this footage available to investigating Gardaí. Anyone with any information is asked to contact Milford Garda on 074 915 3060."

Mr. McGettigan, a former psychiatric nurse in

St Conal's Hospital and a well-known figure in boxing circles was laid to rest following Requiem Mass St Columba's Church, Termon.

He was remembered as a caring person who was devoted to his children and grandchildren.

As well as his career in healthcare he was a former coach at Carrigart Boxing Club, President of the Donegal Boxing Board and a member of the Ulster Boxing Council.

Ms. McGettigan was laid to rest a short time later on Sunday following Requiem Mass at Church of St John the Baptist, Carrigart.

Fr. Charlie Byrne recalled her as a "generous and gentle person" who dedicated herself to caring for others.

He said the tragic incident was a tremendous shock to everyone and "plunged the area into



# Freedom of **Donegal for McGuinness**

Iim McGuinness is to receive Donegal's highest honour - the Freedom of the County - following a meeting of the County Council on Monday. The 2012 All-Ireland winning manager was proposed for the accolade by new Cathaoirleach Niamh Kennedy.

# Main Street dangerous structures update

At last week's Municipal District meeting the Mayor of Letterkenny, Cllr Gerry McMonagle sought an update on the three buildings that are currently fenced off on the Main Street. He also sought a response on what actions the Council intend to take to make the area safe and accessible again along with a timeframe for the works to be completed?

The Council said that following ongoing recent communication in relation to potential dangerous structures at Nos 2, 4 & 6 Upper Main Street, Letterkenny with building owners and their representative a Structural Engineers Report was submitted on their behalf.

"On review of the Structural Engineers Report and having regard to the safety risks and associated recommendations identified by the Chartered Structural Engineer, public access was closed and secured by the Council to sections of footpath, parking areas and carriageway adjacent the building frontages at Upper Main Street and Market Square.

The Council is continuing to liaise with all parties with an interest in the properties, their representatives and the Council's Structural Consultant to ensure a detailed and considered assessment is completed to identify the essential works required to ensure the safety risks associated with the structural condition of the proper-



ties are addressed.

The Council will endeavour to progress this matter with the building owners to minimise closures to the footpath, carriageway and parking areas, however the Council have to ensure measures to mitigate safety risk and potential impact and risk of the works to adjoining buildings/structures are also fully considered

A local community activist has expressed outrage that the life ring that he put on the walkway at the Port Bridge has been stolen. Colm McDaid a native of the Öldtown said:

'Disgusting that the life ring I placed on the new walkway near the Port Bridge has been stolen. Cut from the rope and the rope tied to the railings. Someone decided to take it or cut it from the rope and throw it away into the river. The lifering on the Port bridge on the Cullion road side was also interfered with. It had been thrown out and brought in again but the rope tied around the ring, not replaced in the bag provided. Photos will show what I mean.

What is the mentality of people who do this sort of thing? Why cut a rope off a life ring? Why not leave the things alone. Once again I have to replace it. This is a Council issue and it needs sorted and they still haven't placed any on Lifford bridge. It's not my job to do it. But I do it because it helps keep the community safe around our waterways, but I am losing faith to be honest it is so soul destroying."

# Ben putting his energy into political future

As the General Election edges ever closer a newcomer on the local political scene will put his name forward as a prospective candidate for Fianna Fáil in Donegal for the first time.

Termon's Ben Harkin has already enjoyed a taste of speaking in Leinster House addressing Dáil members on energy issues. At just 23-years-old, a graduate of Queen's University, he'll be

one of the youngest in the field seeking nomination.

He says he had an interest in politics from a young age and is looking forward to the experience of throwing his name into the ring with at least five others seeking to get on the ticket for Fi-

Hailing from a well-known family, his grandparents John and Betty Harkin ran the post office in Termon for many years. His parents are Eddie and Nicola.

Having grown up locally he attended secondary school in Mulroy College Milford for four years before transferring to St. Eunan's College specifically to study physics and politics, options not available to him in Mulroy at the time.

He told the Tribune: "I did four years in Mulroy College and moved for the last two years to St Eunan's College to study politics and physics. Then I went to Queens and studied software and electronic systems engineering. I have a master degree in that and it was done during covid. It was in my first year of Queen's



that I met a guy from Fanad, Michael Sweeney, who was in the same year as myself. He was part of Órga Fianna Fáil up there and we used to talk about politics and he said to come along to a meeting, so I got signed up from there."

Like many young students the global pandemic forced major changes to his college life and he returned to Termon but used the time to turn his attention to another area of interest for him, climate change and energy.

He stated: "It was during my first year when covid hit so then I started to write my book in March 2020 and it was released in 2020. Energy then became a big topic for me and climate change also became another focus of mine, so I've done a lot of writing about that. It was through that that I got to give a presentation to members of the Fianna Fail parliamentary party in Leinster House in 2022. Being there was a real defining moment for myself because of the energy that was there and all that was taking place. It was fantastic and I got a lot of questions from TD's and Senators and I just thought 'This is somewhere I want to be'. It just crystallised it for me."

The trip was hosted by one of his major influences, Pat the Cope Gallagher and he also cites former Cllr Noel McGinley and current Cllr Liam Blaney as others whose guidance he appreciates. Being one of the youngest candidates to put their name forward at present he said he hopes it would encourage other young people to engage with the political process.

# Kamala Harris roots in Antrim

In my lifetime I have seen dramatic events in American politics. Biden's withdrawing as a candidate is the latest.

Biden is the second president to do so in my lifetime. Lyndon Johnson withdrew in 1968. That was because his support for the Vietnam War was discrediting him.

From earlier, I remember the assassination of President John F Kennedy in 1963. Then there was the shooting of a second President, Ronald Reagan. That was in 1981. Reagan was seriously wounded.

In 1968 Robert (Bobby) Kennedy was leading the Democratic Primaries for the Presidency. He was shot dead. There are still questions about that killing. (Bobby Kennedy was brother of President Kennedy). This month Donald Trump has been shot at the time all polls put him ahead. I have also lived through the resignation of President Richard Nixon in 1974. Nixon waged a secret war against Cambodia. The administration, Senate and House of Representatives knew nothing of this.

He was finally forced out of office after the Watergate scandal. Nixon had hired men to break into the Democratic Party's National Committee. Nixon, like Boris Johnson or Trump, was totally out of control. He resigned the threat of being impeached. That was a year after his Vice-President, Spiro Agnew, resigned. Agnew had pleaded guilty to tax fraud. Nixon was the only President to resign. Agnew was only the second Vice-President.

Thus the last 60-odd years have been rocky.

We may yet see another unusual result. Grover Cleveland was the only American President to be voted out of office, then win another election. That second win happened in 1892. Donald Trump may become the

Meanwhile, the last few weeks have seen a ridiculous spectacle. Trump and Biden were falling over themselves with claims to stand up for the working man.

Biden has been claiming to be the 'most pro-union president ever'. The evidence is that he and a few cheer-leaders kept repeating that. Under him, inflation has eaten into wages. There have been some successful union organising drives, particularly in the Southern states. I can find no record of Biden lifting a finger to help.

He tried a new line as the Presidency slipped away from him. The 'elite' of the Democratic party was against him. He is part of that elite for half a century. He has never been known to have taken any controversial stands against big business. He was a wheeler-dealer American machine politician. For most of his career he was Senator for Delaware. In America, Delaware is known as a tax haven for companies. Biden backed that tax avoidance. He was also seen as worryingly close to the Du Pont chemical company.

Then there is his support for Israel's mass murder of civilians in Gaza. That has earned him the nickname 'Genocide Joe' for many. He attended a meeting of the extreme right-wing Israeli cabinet. He said: "I'm sure innocents have been killed and that's the price for waging a war." He also,

cynically, let slip the reason America give so much support: "Were there not an Israel, then America would have to invent one to protect her interests in the region." His government has provided most of the bombs used on Gaza's civilians.

Enough has been written about Trump's character. A civil court has found that he committed rape. Even the allegation would, in Ireland, be enough to end his career. Witness Jeffrey Donaldson, who has not been found liable.

Trump also claims the elites are after him. He comes from that elite himself. His family was wealthy. He was a reality TV host. In the noughties, he was a registered Democrat. As a rich man, he made political donations. Before 2011, most of his donations were to Democrats.

That included to Hilary Clinton. In 2004, he said: "In many cases, I probably identify more as Democrat", explaining: "It just seems that the economy does better under the Democrats than the Republicans." He only returned to the Republican Party in 2012. That was four years before he became President. Thus I can find no proof of him having any firm political views. That is, except views he thinks will get him elected.

Incidentally, he is a major supporter of gun ownership. A 20 year old with an assault rifle almost killed him. The vote for him says that a big

enchanted with the political system. Only 37% of adults have voted in recent elections.

Traditionally, the Democratic Party was seen as the part of the workers. The Republicans represented big business.



# **Funeral of Dan Logue, Downings**

The funeral took place on Saturday of Dan Logue, Downings. Aged 94, Dan was a very known and highly respected member of the local community. He was born in 1929 the son of Grace and James Logue. Dan was the youngest of seven siblings. At the age of 14 along with other young men from the locality he went to the Shetland Islands in Scotland getting work gutting herring. When Dan came back home he started his own business selling herring on a donkey and cart from Rosguill to Fanad. The transport was upgraded to a van as the business expanded. The opening of his fish factory in Downings moved the venture to another level, growing the customer base across the country and internationally.

In his homily Fr. Charlie Byrne recalled his own school days at Holy Cross College, Falcarragh and Dan's blue van doing a delivery of fish every Thursday evening for the Friday dinners. Dan made lifelong friends in the fishing ports of Killybegs, Burtonport and Greencastle and further afield. He was generous in spirit, donating a carved wooden image of St. Colmcille to the Church of the St. John Baptist Carrigart. Dan was immersed in the life of the local community and involved in many different organisations. He had a passion for the GAA and was one of those that negotiated the acquisition of the current grounds and was also instrumental in the development of the clubhouse which was only



the second of its kind in the county at that time. He held a variety of positions with Na Dunaibh including Chairperson and was also a GAA

In a tribute the Fishing Daily website said Dan was a renowned fish merchant. "Known for his extensive experience and deep knowledge of the fishing industry, Dan established himself as a prominent figure within the local and regional seafood trade at a young age. He first began his lifetime in seafood in the 1930s as a young boy, buying herring from local boats and traveling around the countryside selling them door-todoor with a donkey and creels.

Through hard graft over the decades, Dan established a fish factory in the village and named the company Sheephaven Seafoods Teoranta. His son Jimmy joined him after finishing university in 1982. The company grew to become one of the most successful seafood companies in the country, providing seafood produce to hotel and catering establishments in Ireland and building up large export markets in Israel, Europe, and the USA. Sheephaven Seafoods provided world-class seafood products sourced mainly in Ireland.

It was also the first Irish company to be awarded a Kosher Licence for smoked salmon products and supplied the Dan chain of hotels in Israel, as well as Jewish communities in Europe and the United States.

Dan had an unwavering commitment to the fishing industry. Every buyer and seller of fish in the country knew his approach, which never changed over the decades. It could be said that consistency was the key to his success. It was early mornings and late nights seven days a week, and even when he retired, he barely slowed down.

His efforts contributed to the economic vitality of Downings and the surrounding areas, providing employment and supporting the local economy. In addition to his commercial activities, Dan Logue was involved in various initiatives and collaborations. He was involved with CLG Na Dúnaibh and the Downings Sea Angling Festival. His expertise and reputation made him a key player in the Irish seafood industry, respected by peers and customers alike.

His son Jimmy paid tribute to him saying that he was the last of the generation that started out selling herring by donkey and creel, but he also praised him for his humanity saying 'No matter what or where he was, he always had time for people."

Dan passed away at the family home on Thursday. He was predeceased by his wife Cait in October 2017. Dan is survived by his son Jimmy and daughter Bríd; grandchildren John, his fianceé Áine and daughter Caitlín; Kitty and her son Ronan; Sarah, her partner Carl and their son Caoimhín; Anna, her partner David and their children Daithí and Aoibhí.

Remains reposed at the family residence from Thursday. Funeral was from there on Saturday to the Church of St John the Baptist for Requiem Mass which was celebrated by Fr. Charlie Byrne. Readings were by Dan's son Jimmy and Aine. Prayers of the Faithful were read by Gerard, Anna, Evelyn and Brigid. Gifts were brought to the Altar by Brig, Cait, Daithi and Ronan. After Holy Communion a eulogy was read by Dan's nephew John Carr. Members of the Na Dunaibh GAA Club formed a Guard of honour. Interment took place afterwards in the adjoining cemetery where Fr. Byrne said the graveside prayers. The Fisherman's Lament was sung at the graveside by Mickey Cavanagh a retired skipper from Greencastle and a life long friend of Dan's.



# Council has €3.7m deficit

The Local Government Auditors Report has noted that Donegal County Council has a cumulative deficit of €3.7m (2022: €4.9m) on the Statement of Comprehensive Income at the end of December 2023. The Auditor Seamus Leonard said that whilst acknowledging an improving deficit reduction it continues to be a matter to address in future accounting periods. The Report was brought before Cllrs during Monday's meeting in Lifford.

In his response Chief Executive John McLaughlin said there was improvement on the Revenue Account for 2023 of €1,151,999. He also pointed out that over a five-year period,


În his homily Fr. Charlie Byrne described Una as a generous, kind, gentle person. As well as her day job she was a carer in the true sense of the


word looking after her mother in her later years and also her aunt Brigid when she returned home from Philadelphia.





Gardaí are appealing for witnesses to two recent incidents of criminal damage that happened at The Mall, Ramelton recently.





Sabbath day holy. He believed that Sunday was for worship, not for competing, and so he indicated that he would not be running.

bear by the British Olympic Association, calling on him to do his part for his country. The press also piled on - labelling him a traitor and of having his priorities wrong. But Liddell would not be shaken. Even when an Olympic committee member told him that the Continental Sabbath ended at noon, Eric replied, "Mine lasts all day!" For Eric Liddell, Jesus meant far more to him than gold medals, honour and prestige. His saviour had faced greater opposition on the way to the cross to die for him, so Liddell wasn't going to let a little pressure push him to back down and dishonour his Saviour. Instead he entered for the 400m - an event so different from the 100m that few run both even today. In the build-up to the Games and in the heats other athletes broke the world record three times and Liddell wasn't given a chance against them. As he left his hotel for the final, one of the British team masseurs pressed a folded note into his hand. It read, 'It says in the Old Book, "Him that honours me, I will honour." Here was an encouraging reminder of God's faithfulness. Liddell was drawn in the outside lane where he couldn't see his competitors until too late. Not that it mattered - he set off at a blazing pace, determined 'to run the first 200m as fast as I can, and the second 200 faster'. No one thought he could maintain the pace, but even as his rivals closed fractionally he sped off again and burst through the tape five metres ahead of his nearest rival, breaking the thrice-bro-




ken world record with a time of 47.6 seconds. The crowd went wild. Liddell had put his saviour first - that's why he's one of my heroes - and would have done so whether he won gold or not. But here was a reminder that God is no man's debtor - those who entrust themselves to him and follow him will not ultimately lose out.



# The Navvy Poet has lessons for Simon Harris

For a man with only three years in primary education, Patrick MacGill, in his writings and poetry offers a very unique perspective on his life as a Socialist. Were he alive today, it is highly improbable to visualise him having any truck with Fianna Fail or Fine Gael or indeed in the manner in which this country is run and managed. Taoiseach Simon Harris was in Glenties and brought another promise to the table of eternal optimism. He said: "The greatest challenges of the past four decades have been met with energy, vision, hope, determination, and also, crucially, with optimism.

On these wet and dreary evenings, July is traditionally quiet in the media, mainly because most sane citizens are tanning themselves in the Mediterranean. Moreover, this year with the political parties on the summer break, they are occupied with preparations for the general election. And all the while the Government is spending more time explaining that it is imperative to run the full term until the Dail must be dissolved by February 19th rather than during the Halloween break.

But regardless of those heavyweight issues, the Taoiseach of the day will always be the keynote speaker at the legendary MacGill Summer School. And Simon Harris came along at the weekend to explain that there will be a focus on optimism and pragmatism during his time as leader of the country. Exactly what Harris has been doing to promote optimism and pragmatism since coming into the Government some eight years ago is quite difficult to understand since everyone has their own perception of these vague terms.

Harris has forgotton about all the failures that recent Governments have delivered. He said: "The greatest challenges of the past four decades have been met with energy, vision, hope, determination, and also, crucially, with optimism. In these times, where we face multiple, overlapping

challenges, a key quality I would add, and the one which defines my philosophy as Taoiseach, is pragmatism. Pragmatism means being equal to the moment before us, while preparing carefully for the next. Pragmatism is not defined by a label like 'right' or 'left' but the action taken in the moment to solve the problems in front of us. Pragmatism is knowing over what time scale actions need to be taken, and knowing you need to bring everyone with you as you act."

Words of pragmatic intent, probably!

The Patrick MacGill Summer School was first held in 1981 and it commemorates the life and time of the 'Navvy Poet' who was born in the Glen of Glenties in 1890 in that first generation in the shadow of the Great Hunger. And like so many of his kith and kin he emigrated to Scotland where began a new chapter of his life. He saw active service in the British Army and in later life he married and would emigrate to the United States where he died in the nineteen

For a man with only three years in primary education, MacGill, in his writings and poetry offers a very unique perspective on his life as a Socialist. Were he alive today, it highly improbable to visualise him having any truck with Fianna Fail or Fine Gael or indeed in the manner in which this country is run and

managed. The MacGill Summer School has been an international platform for poets, the noble and the great figures on the world stage as they gather to deliver their views on current topics. And Harris made yet another promise: that's now his modus operandi in being quite the expert on dealing with major issues for these past eight years in Cabinet. And on his first visit as Taoiseach to Glenties, Harris did not disappoint insofar as you are happy with the expert view on delivering promises. But exactly what has he achieved since being elected to the Dail in 2011? Before the general election in 2011, Harris wrote a letter saying he would not support any legislation to allow abortion services. He had moved from that position within two years, but he was not dissimilar to many of his colleagues. What gave Harris his biggest headaches were his

own promises that could

not be delivered - reducing

waiting times for scoliosis

operations to four months;

setting ambitious timelines

for the introduction of free

GP care, promises on the

completion of the national

children's hospital, hospital

waiting lists and medical

staffing.

What MacGill might have made of this latest input from Harris in discussing the idea of a new department to tackle nationwide issues, such as housing? Being a pragmatism and that from reading his material, I'd imagine MacGill might just wonder what is the purpose of yet another tedious idea given that the government is already overloaded with experts in their own field and failing to resolve crisis after crisis in Health, Education and what about the escalating financial costs for the National Children's Hospital? Regardless of more money being allocated at our expense, the Government simply has failed to bring these crises under control, not alone resolve the lack of progress in making

Ireland's public services deliver for the people. And Patrick MacGill might also wonder what kind of a political system we have that tolerates delays in the completion of major infrastructure projects and why they are almost always running away over budget. The last thing that might cross his mind would be to create another failure. And I'd imagine that Patrick MacGill might advise the Government and Simon Harris to examine how targets are continually met on target by private enterprise. He would have no great sympathy for entrepreneurs but having been born into a poverty stricken Ireland and under the control of the British Empire, nobody knew better how difficult life on a traditional small-holding was with eleven children to feed... and not a word about childcare or education. He belonged to that generation where every family was equal - equally in poverty. Harris talks about many things and many of these big ticket issues have not moved far in his eight years in Government. And insofar as his 250,000 new houses by 2029, that is as far out as the Government plans to

When not potato picking MacGill worked as a navvy and he travelled widely visiting libraries and educating himself by reading the great authors of the era. At the age of twenty he worked on the Caledonian Railway and began writing both books and poetry, often a nostalgic look back to his life in Ireland, as in 'Children of the Dead End' and 'The Rat Pit'.

'The Song of the Shovel'



continues to be an inspiration: he was

also a renowned socialist and supporter of the Russian Revolution. Dail Eireann was but a dream when the young MacGill left Ireland and things have changed utterly and forever. In the meantime the Dail shall return on September 18th: it will have a highly positive budget, then a mid-term break for Hallowen. And on December 19th the House is on holiday until next year regardless of election or not, they'll be back on January 15th. The fact that there are only 13 days notified for Dail sittings in 2025 is the clearest indication that February 19th marks the end of this Government's term of office. In reality there are only 51 sitting days remaining until Simon Harris has to trot off to meet President Higgins to tell him the date of the general election.

Nobody, absolutely nobody, believes that February 19th is the final day of this Government.

More likely than not, all party bosses and their back office staff have October 24th marked into their iPads, when the Halloween break begins. It may also signal the last sitting day of the current government. Although, Harris may wait for ten days to call the election just ahead of going back into the office.

Harris has an inspiring way of creating

positivity and he'll promise anything rather than take it away and consider why the health service is a basket case or why too many young couples are leaving Ireland because they'll never be able to construct a new house, not alone be able to pay a monthly rent of €1,500. Money is amazing and the cost of living can make it disappear quicker than the late magician, Paul Daniels could make Debbie McGee disappear in a ball of mystique.

"When it comes to the concurrent challenges we face – war in Ukraine, migration, climate change – it seems to me that most people are less preoccupied with ideology and more concerned with effective crisis management and political pragmatism.

I don't consider the labels of left and right particularly meaningful in a country and a European union where a political majority has converged on issues where we used to diverge in those directions," he said.

He also emphasised the need for Ireland to meet its climate targets, and told the audience the State was delivering "for many" – despite shortfalls in many state services such as housing and healthcare. "Does the State deliver for you? Is your experience of Ireland in your youth, in your working life, in your life as a parent, in your community life, in your later years, getting better?

.We also know the answer for many is a heartfelt no. I hear the children, the parents, the workers, the communities, and our older citizens. I hear them every day as Taoiseach.

I pledge to deliver for them, pragmatically. I pledge to pass the test of making their government work for them." So what's Harris waiting for?

# Council bombshell

Donegal County Council is to demolish the potato store and public toilets at Rathmullan to make way for a car park and environment works.

When the demolition is complete the nearest public toilets will be five miles away in Ramelton and tourism interests say they are disgusted that the Council would even consider removing the only public utility in the town.

The bombshell announcement that the Council has taken a corporate decision to demolish the building has led to anger and bewilderment locally. The latest plan for Rathmullan will cost over €200,000 and the work is due to start early next

A planning brief for the renovations will now be written and the Council officials will present their designs to another public consultation meeting later in the year.

The decision to tank the potato store was made known during a public meeting hosted by the Council in the town on Thursday night and so far seventeen complaints have been made to Social Enterprise Ireland: an organisation that has carried out studies for a number of organisations

The manner in which the Council came to decide to tumble the potato store is likely to be addressed during the Milford electoral area meeting in ten days time. However it is already being claimed the store should stay and be utilised as a commercial building. It is also claimed the original decision to remove the potato store no longer applies because the marina project has been taken off the agenda. Community spokespersons have told the Tribune that the additional parking needed for a marina of 125 berths would have required the removal of the store to create the space needed to accommodate the anticipated level of traffic.

"That need is no longer there and as a result the removal of the potato store has also disappeared and the Council must now revisit their decision as a result of us losing out on the marina" said the spokesperson.

# Meadowbank roads to be repaired

the subject of a lengthy debate at Monday's Town Council meeting.

The Cllrs. were informed that its planned to go ahead with some initial repair works. The Council is awaiting an opinion from their legal representatives on the financial obligations in relation to the estate takeover under the current legislation.

The Town Clerk Paddy Doherty said that an initial financial contribution commitment from the residents had been withdrawn but the Town Council was now proposing to proceed with fixing the large-scale pothole problem and the intention was to start immediately subject to the green light on insurance clearance.

Sinn Fein Cllr. Gerry McMonagle urged that there be no quick fix measure on the matter and called on the Council to proceed with the full takeover. However the Town Clerk pointed out that there were a number of estates in the same category as Meadowbank.

Cllr. Damien Blake said the roads in the area were exceptionally bad and another winter could see the estate made impassable. Echoing those sentiments Cllr. Victor Fisher said the pothole problem was so bad that even the school bus was refusing to go up there while Cllr. Jim Lynch pointed out that prior to the works this year.

the Meadowbank estate in Letterkenny was to upgrade the estate on a phased basis. He highlighted the engineer's opinion at the time which stressed that drainage was the key issue to be addressed in Meadowbank and he felt that fixing potholes in the short term would probably not be the permanent solution.

Mayor Dessie Larkin supported the proposal to move forward with initial works because of the state of the roads. He pointed out that other estates had similar problems and the Town Council would have to look at their budget in terms of the financial implications involved. Cllr. Ciaran Brogan said he had raised the Meadowbank takover a number of times in the previous Council and understood that an agreement was on the table with residents prior to the election.

Brogan suggested that politics had been played with the takeover in the lead up to the local elections.

An overall audit is currently being carried out on estates and Cllr. Brogan pointed that the Town Council would then have some hard decisions to make. He also emphasised the need for the local authority to set certain standards for completion of works on estates. Cllr. Dessie Larkin was informed that the overall cost of the infrastructural upgrade was €350,000 with €80,000 being set aside for

The ongoing controversy of the take over of local elections there had been agreement Despite Cllr. Larkin's assertion that Meadowbank was a priority Cllr. McMonagle said there had been a lack of commitment on the matter and also raised doubts over the residents agreement to make a financial contribution.

> Town Clerk Paddy Doherty said such a letter had been received but Cllr. McMonagle claimed that the correspondence only had the support of a couple of people from the estate. The Sinn Fein Member said it would be pointless spending €80,000 where there was a poor substructure to support the pothole works.

> Cllr. McMonagle also spoke about what he described as serious concerns on the state of fire hydrants facilities in the area. Cllr. Jimmy Harte said that Meadowbank had been used as a political football during the election campaign adding that he had been too embarrassed to canvass there because he simply wasn't in a position to promise the residents that their problems would be resolved.

> The County Manager Michael McLoone addressing the issues raised by the Members said that a system must be put in place to supervise multiple developments combined with enforcement of conditions.

> In relation to developments that are already in existence he suggested that efforts be made to deal with them in a pragmatic manner which would include the Meadowbank Estate.



# Belgian national dies in diving tragedy

A diver who died after getting into difficulty off the Donegal coast on Monday was from Belgium.

Luk Heyvaert, who was in his 50's, had been diving with a local group around 30km off Tory Island when the tragedy happened.

He was taken from the water by Malin Coastguard and taken to Letterkenny University Hospital but was later pronounced dead.

A spokesperson confirmed: "Gardaí were alerted to an incident in the water North West of Donegal on Monday afternoon. A male (50s) got into difficulty in the water.

He was removed from the water by Malin Coastguard and brought to LUH where he was pronounced deceased. A file will be prepared for the Coroner's Court."



# Husband's charity cycle with dialysis machine in tow

An epic five day fundraising challenge inspired by a Falcarragh woman will see her husband cycle over 200km while towing a kidney dialysis machine across Ireland. Next Wednesday, July 31st, Peter Conboy from Ballygar, Galway will embark on a charity 'Cycle of Life' across the country, starting from Temple Street Children's Hospital in Dublin, where his Donegal wife was a patient more than two decades before. His journey will end at the National Commemorative Garden for organ donors in Salthill, Galway on August 4th.

Peter's efforts stems from the past experience of chronic kidney disease by his wife Elizabeth 'Liz' Ferry, a native of Falcarragh. Diagnosed at thirteen, she became a patient at Temple Street Children's Hospital, and she endured peritoneal dialysis at home for six nights a week, for eleven hours at a time, until a donor kidney became available less than a year later. She underwent her life-changing kidney transplant at Beaumont Hospital in May 2002.

Unlike other long-distance charity rides, the Galway native will tow a dialysis machine symbolising the journey of patients on dialysis towards the hope of a life-saving transplant.

Peter explained, "This was the first chapter in a new life for Liz, enabling her to complete her college degree, travel the world, marry me, and enjoy life to the full. None of this would have been possible without the selfless decision made by her donor's family. We are eternally grateful." He added "I'd love for people to come out to meet me in the towns I stop in along the way, or give me a wave if they see me, but most of all



I hope I will remind people to support the work of the Irish Kidney Association and also to share their wishes about organ donation. I encourage everyone to carry a donor card, note their consent on your driving licence with code 115, or set up the organ donor app on your phone."

Falcarragh's Liz: "As a young teenager, facing an uncertain future with chronic renal disease

was incredibly tough. My confidence was shaken, and I often wondered what my future would hold. The gift of a donor's kidney gave me a future that most people take for granted. It allowed me to meet the love of my life and share a wonderful life with Peter."

**Hundreds of Council services to make online leap** 

Every local authority in Ireland will have 90% of their services available online by 2030 under a multi-million euro transformation of local Government online services.

The Local Government Digital & ICT Strategy 2030, launched on Thursday July 18th, by Minister of State for Local Government and Planning, Alan Dillon, will radically change how the public interacts with county and city councils.

The plan also aims to roll out national online local Government services - meaning planning applications, licences, permits, payments, community grants and motor tax will be available at the touch of a button and accessible via mobile 'phones. The strategy aims to give councils the facility to implement new technological initiatives which to date may not exist in all authorities.

That includes information about community facilities such as location, opening hours and events in parks, recreation centres, pitches, playgrounds and trails. Another facility which is set for full rollout across the country is the extension of early warning alerts - currently available in some councils - for flooding, health alerts such as e-coli warnings, as well as information from pollution and water quality sensors.

A key aim is also to reclaim the countless hours council staff spend on paperwork over the course of their working week, resulting in improved in-person access to the local authority services for those who do not want to take the digital op-



Ruadh did keep the score board ticking over but were always playing catch-up.



Letterkenny and Dungloe are the only two ambulance bases with more than one crew on duty at any given time, where Letterkenny can have between three and four crews on duty per day and two per night. Dungloe had two on duty per day and one at night. All other bases are listed as having one crew on each of the two daily shifts being cov-

The response for JJ McGowan, Chief Ambulance Officer - West said: W"The resources based at these locations provide 24-hour 7-day cover. The table below indicates the number of ambulances on duty at each location from Monday to Sunday over a 24-hour pe-

Where a station has more than one crew i.e. Letterkenny and Dungloe the shift start times are staggered as per the below bullet points (pictured above)"

He added: "Letterkenny when it has four crew start times are 7am, 8am, 10am and 11am. When it has 3 day crews start times are 7am, 8am and 10am. All nights shift are 1900 and 2000 start times. Dungloe start times are 8am and 10am with night crew commencing at 2000. Pathfinder and the Community are county based and respond to call across the county."
