# Shutters fall on 33rd Dail

As the decks are cleared for the General Election, the Dail passed the Finance Bill on Tuesday night. In a vote that was guillotined the Government won the day, 75 to 55. This now leaves the Taoiseach free to call the election on November 29th.








# Ward bidding for 100% Redress seat

Charles Ward is out every spare hour he has on the campaign trail as he attempts to become the first ever 100% Redress Party member to be elected as a TD to represent Donegal in Dail Eireann.

While the main platform for Ward is full redress for the families affected by the defective concrete blocks scandal, there are other issues like health care that he is highlighting and will be raising on the floor of the Dail if elected. With four Cllrs in Lifford, Ward says the foundations are there to take a seat but he warned against complacency. "We are going to try to reach out to as many people as we can in this campaign. The 100% Redress Party is about more than the defective concrete blocks. I work in the healthcare area and can see that Letterkenny University Hospital is on its knees. It is not properly staffed with nurses or doctors. Then you look at the cost of the Dail bike shed when that money could have been put into improving the service delivery at the ED in Letterkenny. What's happening there is not the staff's fault."

Ward has taken issue with the narrative being put out into the public domain by Fianna Fail and Fine Gael that 300 houses have benefitted from the Redress Scheme. He says that the actual figure is 62 adding that there are 240 houses looking to access the scheme and many more are not in a position to proceed because of the upfront costs. "We are fighting for the futures of so many people. Then there is downgrading of houses that were supposed to be for demolition and are now only for partial repair. That is not right. Despite all that has happened there is still no regulation of the quarries. For our children we have to make sure this doesn't happen again. If I am in the Dail all the issues will have to be addressed and I won't

Ward met with Joe Morgan and Michael Connolly both members of the Board of Management.

They spoke about the building and its condition as well as developments in the European Commission regarding defective concrete. "You could sense the community spirit in Ray and what they have achieved there so it would break your heart to see what is happening to the building" Ward said.

The 100% Redress Party General Election candidate says he and his supporters are connecting with the people demonstrating their community focus.

# **Obituary for SF is too early**

Politics North and South are different. The upcoming General Election shows that.

Sinn Féin is the largest party in the North in both seats and votes. Forecasting the future is always risky. However, as of now, that is unlikely in the South.

I am not a Sinn Féin supporter. I would, though, warn opponents. Beware of wishful thinking. People very easily mistake how they think for the way others think. Elections are won by votes, not by opinion columns and letters in the Irish Times.

Let's be realistic. Sinn Féin often does itself no good in the attitude to the media. There is another side. Too many in the media tend to be too accepting of allegations against Sinn Féin. Were similar allegations made against most other parties, there would be more questioning. An example is the Brian Stanley case. Stanley decided to get his retaliation in first. An internal investigation had found him guilty of gross misconduct. He had sexually harassed a woman.

So Stanley went public alleging a 'kangaroo court'. He had alleged there was an organised move to get rid of him. That was clearly designed to produce a story that would get media sympathy. Stanley has over 40 years service in Sinn Féin. When others were purged during those years, Stanley was silent.

Then Sinn Féin released the results of the investigation. They did not look good for Stanley. Sinn Féin has now been hit with another sexual misconduct issue. A Belfast City Councillor has been suspended. He is from a strong Sinn Féin background. He has employed high-profile lawyers to fight

his case.

Certainly, Sinn Féin has been hit with all these allegations on the verge of a major election. No party wants that. I question how far the allegations will affect those who are going to vote Sinn Féin. Rather, the Party is being diverted into damage limitation rather than campaigning on policies.

A good example to look at is the DUP in the North. At the start of the year, Party Leader Jeffrey Donaldson was charged with sex abuse. (He is innocent unless proven guilty). Obviously, there can be no comment on the case until after a trial and verdict. However, the nature of those charges makes Sinn Féin's troubles seem minor. After all, the DUP claims to stand for a very strict Christian morality. There was a (United Kingdom-UK) General Election in July. Yes, the DUP lost three seats. They still polled over 170,000 votes. There was no meltdown.

In the last General Election Sinn Féin won 37 seats. Three of the TDs have since left. None of the three seem to have particularly helped their own cases.

In current circumstances, holding 37 seems very unlikely. Predictions go wrong at the best of times. Doing so this far short of an election is risking being particularly wrong. I would, though, be surprised if Sinn

Féin came back with less than 32 seats, at worst.

Let's remember that, for Sinn Féin, just about everything that could, went right in the 2020 General Election. That was their perfect storm. Some of their true believers will probably not like the comparison. But their election was like Boris Johnson's in the UK a couple of months before. Clearly, a few of those elected didn't expect to be elected. Sinn Féin didn't expect them to be elected either. Their record suggests they weren't suited to the job. However, not everything goes right all the time. After all, Sinn Féin has had bad elections before. Its obituary has been written. That writing was very premature.

Thus the Party can take a hit in terms of votes and still hold the seats. That's because Sinn Féin has a whole number of poll-toppers. Thus a hit in votes would not automatically transfer into losses of seats. Paradoxically, Solidarity-People Before Profit and left Independents might be worse hit. Several of these TDs were elected because big Sinn Féin surpluses transferred to them. Without those big surpluses, several of them might be in trouble. Also, quite a number of Sinn Féin TDs are in five-seaters. Quotas there can be quite low. Everything points to numbers of independ-

ents standing. The Far-Right in particular, will be standing in many constituencies. So far, it has failed to come together. Thus, that vote will be split between several candidates. More, those candidates are not transfer-friendly. They are significantly less transfer-friendly even than Sinn Féin. On a bad day, that scattering of votes should help some Sinn Féiners to scrape home. A factor helping Sinn Féin is the political and organisational collapse of Labour. The local and European elections could have put Labour into the grave. Instead, they kept it on life support. Sinn Féin has been able to fill and expand that vacuum. Solidarity-People Before Profit is largely Dublin-based. Even there its presence is patchy. The Greens are unlikely to collapse as completely as in the past. They will, though, take a major hit. Thus there is a discontented electorate out there. Some of that will go back to Sinn Féin.In the local elections Sinn Féin's vote fell from the dizzy heights of the opinion polls. We should take that with a certain health warning. Young working-class people are more





likely to vote Sinn Féin. They are less likely to vote in local elections than in General elections.

Those local elections were also poor for Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael. Both lost seats and votes. In this election, 18 of 35 FG TDs elected last time are standing down. They are not stupid. Maybe they sense something of what the public is thinking.



#### **Carrigart up twelve points**

#### Rathmullan on the up with improved score

Rathmullan Tidy Towns group have improved their score following the release of the annual Tidy Towns Competition 2024 Adjudication Report. The group climbed to a score of 327 this year, compared to 313 in 2023.

They commend the group on their strong committee and links with local schools.

They stated: "The Tidy Towns group work under the umbrella of Rathmullan the Way Forward, a united voice for all the community. 

It's a big week for election lovers. Not only does it look like the worst kept secret in Ireland will finally be announced but across the pond the biggest show of them all is finally upon us. I have at least one friend who will spend all of Tuesday night scoffing snacks in front of live electoral college projections.

Just a few days ago, another vote reached its conclusion as the UK Conservative Party elected their new leader. Kemi Badenoch is now the official leader of the Opposition, although whether she will contest a General Election before being ousted by her hopelessly divided parliamentary party is anyone's guess. Badenoch's victory came at the end of a strange old contest: a low energy meander that barely seemed to make a splash on the public consciousness. The race did provide one fascinating moment a few weeks ago as the now Tory leader penned a Sunday Telegraph article laying out some of her policies. The article contained one phrase that sparked a maelstrom of criticism as Badenoch declared that, "not all cultures are equal-

# Food for thought



The backlash was predictable. Laura Kuenssberg took her to task on BBC One. James O'Brien offered

the usual disingenuous soundbites on LBC. A raft of Guardian columnists sounded their xenophobia sirens and went on the attack. Yet as much as it is deemed unsayable by the media establishment, Badenoch wasn't wrong. Secondary schools in Afghanistan are strictly boys only zones. Women living in Iran dare not leave home without carefully covering themselves from head to toe. Millions of young girls in parts of Africa and Indonesia are horrifically injured by genital mutilation carried out in the name of cultural tradition. If all cultures are equally valid then the oppression of women must logically be con-

sidered on a par with Irish dancing or afternoon tea. I can think of plenty of reasons to criticise the new Tory leader, but her comments on cultural relativism are not one of them. Sure, every culture has both its strong points and its blind spots, but some are so appallingly regressive that they must be condemned in the strongest possible terms. To pretend otherwise is to fail those who suffer under their harshest traditions. Inevitably it is women and minorities who tend to bear the brunt. In fact, we should go further than Badenoch and dig a little deeper. Why is it that women are treated like property in some cultures while

they are valued and free in others? Why is equality under the law at the heart of some cultures while such a notion would be unthinkable in others?

A historical study unearths an inconvenient truth: values such as empathy, equality, and respect didn't arise in a vacuum but gradually found acceptance as Christianity spread and transformed the cultures into which it arrived. The dramatic spread of the Gospel provided the soil that these cherished concepts needed in order to blossom. The usual suspects won't acknowledge it if course, but even those with a distaste for Christianity tend to like its fruit.

She was accompanied by Deputies Pádraig Mac Lochlainn and Pearse Doherty and they set out Sinn Féin's absolute commitment to deliver 100% redress for all defective block homeowners.

Ms. McDonald said "We had lengthy and detailed discussions with families in Inishowen whose homes have been impacted by the defective block scandal. Thousands of families, through no fault of their own have been left in an appalling situation for years now because of the use of defective blocks in their homes. They have been very badly let down by the outgoing Fianna Fáil/Fine Gael government who have not taken this issue seriously and have shown no urgency.

The result is that only a very small

number of homeowners out of the thousands affected have had their homes remediated but they have had to pay tens of thousands of euro themselves. This is utterly unfair and everyone else continues to be left in limbo with no certainty for the future. We set out Sinn Féin's commitment to deliver 100% redress which would ensure that all residential properties are remediated with surrounding walls and ancillary buildings covered. It would also include holiday homes and rental properties that remain in the rental sector with no clawback for the first three properties. Separately, we will audit commercial and community properties to identify the extent and scale of what is required and options for redress. We have a clear plan and have ensured that the funding will be in place from day one so that the maximum number of homes can be remediated quickly."

John was an All-Ireland winner with Glenree AC On many occasions, John and his brother Patrick, thumbed the seven miles from Dooey to train in Glenree or sometimes they took the "shortcut" up Tramore Beach.

Frank Kelly from Creeslough was the first Glenree FC manager. They entered the Donegal League in the 74/75 season. Myles Gallagher remembered the late Jim McFadden sending out letters to all the club secretaries in the league to vote Glenree into the league. It worked. Their first game was at home against Killea FC on 29th September 1974 with Killea winning by 2-0. Former Irish League and League of Ireland players, Jimbo Crossan and Richie Kelly were play-



ing for Killea.

Mick McGettigan is the oldest surviving member of the first Glenree Sports Club meeting that took place in Tommy and Teasie McBrides house in Umlagh. Mick and perhaps Bernie McLaughlin have spent the most time on the day-to-day business of Glenree over the last fifty years. They are two men that have done trojan work for the club.

29 Transition Year students from Loreto CS Milford have been helping and driving the project forward, ably led by their teacher Roisin Coyle with the cooperation of Principal Margaret O'Connor. The digital hub at gteic Carraig Airt has also been invaluable as a meeting point for those involved with the benefit of using their facilities to build the book momentum.

Dr Edmund and Pat Coyle have been thanked for the use of their property for sporting activities over the past 50 years. Their son David is allowing the continued use of the ground for playing and training up to the present day.

# A Rathmullan Woman in exile... Everything has its time • my time with horses is done

I was in Rathmullan again last week for a couple of nights. It's unusual for me to go up for two consecutive weeks because it means taking time off work and leaving folk without their regular cover. But unfortunately, my head is not good at the moment; I'm on a greatly increased amount of meds, the sleep is haywire and I just needed to get away for a couple of days peace and quiet. It's a strange and unsettling place to be in your head and body; sort of disassociated from everything around you, like you're in a soundproof glass bubble, remotely watching someone else's life happening.

Until the next wave of despair (Despair (noun) the complete loss or absence of hope) overwhelms you and you're drowning in a tsunami of grief again. Then you know for absolute certainty that this is your life and there's no escaping it until the end. I am extremely fortunate to have the support of my family and friends, and my work acts as a buffer to help put some structure on the interminable days. In time this will pass... or it won't, but right here, right now the clock is still ticking.

Outside the glass bubble of isolation the parallel life continues to lurch forward. I bought an old shipping container so that I would have a safe, dry place to store my meagre belongings until the house is ready. I have no shed or garage and every nook and cranny belonging to the family is crammed with the detritus of life. I have to thank Paddy Sweeney of Sweeney Containers and Cabins, Letterkenny for his top class, professional service, and also for his kindness, humanity and understanding. I would unreservedly recommend him to anyone looking for a secure self storage unit or any form of container unit. Back at the build, the lads had all the sewerage and water pipes completed and were finishing up the landscaping. The place looked like the

aftermath of a world war but a few loads of gravel and deluges of rain will wash the ground clean and it will all heal itself over the winter. John had the light fittings in place in the house and I got Margaret to come over to keep an eye while I climbed the ladder to put in bulbs. Part of the ceiling is very high and I needed someone to say how it happened in case I took flight from the ladder. The electricity and heating go live on Friday 8th, which will be a massive step forward and it will finally allow me to think about getting the tiling and second fix carpentry done. I know that when I boil the first kettle of water to make the first pot of tea that it will be a great achievement and the realisation of a lifelong goal, but at the moment there's no joy in me for celebrations.

The nine reactor cattle were valued, to everybody's satisfaction, and duly went off to the factory. With a bit of luck the next TB test will be clear, but at the very least it will be an easier test because the cattle will already be housed for the winter. Himself is having trouble with his back at the moment so I'm doing the feeding when I'm here. It suits the cattle because my inability to sleep well means that they get fed long before sun/crow rise and it passes an empty hour for me. The horses were rugged last week while they were dry. There are only three left this winter as I grad-

ually phase them out. Everything has its time and my time with horses is done. They were a wonderful part of life and I was fortunate to have some great successes over the years, but now it's time to move on. The sheep are doing a good thrive and putting on condition on the late grass. There are just under forty of them this year; a little less than a third of the previous flock, and lambing is due to start around February 17th. I sold my own flock and put the money towards the house. Another part of my life that has run its course and reached the end. The woollies, like the horses, were a great source of pleasure and interest over the years, but you need land for them, and I am not a landowner. I am gradually emptying all the summer planters and readying the garden for winter. I like this time of year when everything gets tidied away and the soil is in big heaps, resting and refreshing for next year.

I will move my geraniums and dahlias to Rathmullan so they don't fall victim to the hard, midland frosts here. I had 10 daffodil bulbs riding round in the front of the Caddy for about a month while I waited for the head to come right again. I'm still waiting for that,

but I planted the bulbs anyway in two buckets when I was in Rathmullan last week so they'll be coming along. They'll come in useful somewhere in the spring.

I was in Cavan the other day, looking for a go of fold up packing boxes to pack my belongings into for moving. On the way down the street I took a notion to call into a second hand furniture shop to see if I could pick up a narrow reclining chair for Himself. It's not so much that he has a skinny arse (far from it!), but there's no space in this gaff for the modern, thickly upholstered chairs. I was the only client in the shop and the owner was showing me around and chatting, as you do. He happened to make some remark about how I seemed troubled and sure the flood gates opened and I bawled for Ireland. He was the kindest fella you could meet and he gave me a big hug and a mug of tea and we ended up having a great chat. I've met some of the nicest, most understanding folk during this dark patch and I'm very grateful to each of them for their time and care. With a bit of luck the sun will rise again some day soon and hope will return. Look after your mental health because without it you have nothing.



# Like the Wolfe Tones hit... its an election once again

Labour is floundering in the polls and gone are the glory days when they won 33 Dail seats in 2011. They were architects of their own failure in backing the austerity measures introduced by FG and the working classes have not forgotten that shameful episode.

Remember when election slogans and party policies were not believed by any sane member of the public... seems like a long, long way back. Back in fact it was January 2020 when FF and FG rubbished each other so much, we feared the enamel would fall off each other's teeth. This really was pie in the sky propaganda. It was all make believe, smoke and mirrors to keep the Shinners from getting their mitts on the keys to the Cabinet room.

And with the backing of the media the same stunt has been pulled in the past month and it has worked like magic... if that is what you really want. Micheál Martin's election message was vague 'An Ireland for All". Oh my.... oh my Gawd, who dreamt up that wearisome tittle-tattle? It was so, so not

and a free track of 'A nation once Again' for everyone on the electoral register. It was the main soundtrack for FF's battle hymn of the Republic... a key phrase without meaning or purpose, neither a philosophy or direction. Martin has continued to reside in the political shadows of his pet project of a Shared Island Initiative. At the general election he claimed that the kind of future offered by Fine Gael would make people "shiver" and Mr Varadkar's party had made many people's future difficult and uncertain and he cited the number of homeless children. He hardly needs reminding that homelessness has increased by 41% since the last election. This is as shameful as it is a sordid reflection on a government with all the money and no real solutions or roadmark to make the country more equal for all. Despite a strong economic

Despite a strong economic performance, Leo Varadkar could not be confident of a return to power in 2020. The country's economy was once again booming, full employment becoming a reality and corporations taxes flying through the roof.

The opinion polls showed Fianna Fáil in front and they hoped to gain fifteen seats. But there was no doubting the big issues were housing, homelessness and health. And then from out of nowhere the issue of government plans to increase the old age pension to 68 created a roadblock for a few brief days. And the big issues this time are the very same, so no change there apart from the country rolling in money and a lack of ambition in investing and indeed borrowing money to address once and for all the crisis in housing and health... A billion here: another billion there is merely a sticking plaster solution and that has been proven time and time again in these last ten budgets. There are solutions for everything, yet the old order

stayeth the same.

Like the UK, the Republic of

Ireland has been extending the pension age from 65 to 68 because people are living longer and there are fears about the future financial implications. But why worry when we can safely leave it to the politicians to make a total hames of things?

Ever since Covid, Budget Days have been full of double payments, non-targeted energy credits of €450: meanwhile the Government has presided over a housing crisis that locks too many young families out of the property market and the health service is a basket case with 850,000 waiting to see a consultant or for a surgical procedure. And if we were in a position to construct 60,0000 new houses per year, where is the workforce? And where is the accommodation to house them? Obviously modular houses at €452,000 a time are out of the question. Micheál Martin had a dominant role in election 2020: "People are angry" over crises in health and housing and it "clearly is time for a change in government". He said a Fianna Fáil gov-

ernment would "really focus on tangible and credible improvements" in health, housing and reducing the cost of living in areas like insurance, childcare and education costs. He promised Fianna Fáil would put forward a "very comprehensive, positive agenda" in terms of dealing with these issues in the election. "Our philosophy is 'An Ireland for All'. That's our commitment and that's what we're going to deliver in terms of policies during this campaign and in the aftermath of this general election." Well... it lacked imagination and a bit of magic. He added that people in an **Emergency Department to**day 'can't wait for Fine Gael's future'. Tanaiste, those same people are still waiting... Where is your solution and what exactly have you done to resolve the crisis apart from Stephen Donnelly throwing billions more at the HSE and no com-



parable reductions in waiting times? So where now for him or his party? Speaking at Sunday's Wolfe Tone Commemoration in Bodenstown Cemetery, Mr. Martin laid out Fianna Fail's priorities for the upcoming general election. Bodenstown is close to the heartland of Fianna Fail. He confirmed the party will fight the election based on the idea of a better future for Ireland and will focus on positive action.

He said the party differs from others because they are willing to undertake what he describes as the long hard work of building reconciliation and understanding. He said if elected, Fianna Fail would add one billion euro to the shared island initiative. Cost of living will be a key priority for the party and he said he will bring down energy prices with a new two pronged approach.

Regarding the issue of healthcare the Tanaiste said they'll expand services and deliver a step-change in public access to GPs. Meanwhile in relation to housing Michael Martin said if elected Fianna Fail would reduce construction costs by investing in critical infrastructure.

He said the party will publish their full manifesto in the coming days and he confirmed that the date for the election will be announced this week - great stuff! This sounds well worn political points but one has to seriously question the lack of ambition: answers about why current housing targets are fifty percent of what is required to resolve the massive log-jam in a system that failed the country. We need new original and brave decisions

from Fianna Fail. Perhaps it's time to look at what Simon

Harris is promising: and promise is the operating tagline.

Back to polling day in 2020, Storm Ciara was sweeping across Ireland on Saturday, bringing floods and power cuts and ripping up trees in its wake, Irish voters delivered an electoral uprooting all of their own. 45 years ago FF and FG – regularly polled over 80% of the votes in most elections.

That was the stand out showing of Sinn Féin and they actually won most votes and 37 seats.

But the kind of change that the voters want is far from settled. However, the need for change is more urgent now than it was in 2020. The party only ran 42 candidates across the 39 constituencies. A fortnight is a long time in politics and SF has faced the wrath of the media and those issues are around child protection mainly. But to what extent have the SF policy documents also been buried in the disaster and was that a disaster they should have foreseen and dealt with?

# Pat the Cope Gallagher: inspired by his legenda

Fianna's Fail's Pat the Cope Gallagher is the grandson of the founder of The Templecrone Co-Op. He's immensely proud to bear the name. There is no doubt that when he completes his 5k walk every morning at 6.00am, he is inspired by the 'Cope' legacy. It is from where he gets the passion, the energy and the drive to serve the people with a dedication that is writ large across his political career.

This general election will be Pat the Cope Gallagher's sixteenth time to seek a mandate from the people and he's looking forward to the campaign with the same enthusiasm and energy as he did in 1979 when he first ran for a seat on Donegal County Council.

This Pat the Cope's 11th General Election campaign and his team, one of the most energised and experienced, are burning the midnight oil to ensure that every FF vote is harvested and as many more as possible. It's a very daunting task, but it's no bother to the Cope who is revelling in the challenge. The burning ambition is to win back the seat that Pat held through nine general elections.

Fianna Fail's Pat the Cope is the grandson of the founder of The Templecrone Co-Op. He's immensely proud to bear the name. It is a very long way back to Christmas Night 1871 and the birth of Patrick Gallagher in the mountainy Rosses townland of Cleendara. One of nine children, this was the man who would become the founder of 'The Templecrone Co-Operative Society' His autobiography is the stuff of heroes and 'The Cope' is forever etched in history. There is no doubt that when he completes his walk every morning, he is inspired by 'the

Cope' and it is from where he gets the desire, the energy and the drive to serve the people with a dedication that is writ large across his political career.

Even in today's times, Paddy Cope's autobiography is inspirational in the manner that he overcame many obstacles on the road to setting up the 'Cope'. And he did it well because the company's delivery vans are out across many parts of Donegal serving the needs of the community.

Paddy Gallagher's book is forever entwined within the mood music of an Ireland, oppressed, under British law and the hard earned few shillings to exist were scarce and many were forced to emigrate. The Templecrone Co-Op and its founder survived those harsh times with hope, inspiration, the people and their kindred spirit. It is a rich part of a history of which we all should be justifiably proud because we owe everything to the pioneering spirit that drove a movement that has continued to serve many parts of Donegal to the present day.

And like most simple ideas, the Co-Op began in Cleendara when along with a few neighbours, smallholders among the stony gray fields, Paddy Gallagher pulled together the idea that might give them a bit of bargaining power to buy bags manures... it was original and few others apart from the revered Fr. James McDyer has come to epitomise the spirit of Donegal.

Paddy the Cope became the first Chairman of this small group and so began the legend of the Templecrone Co-operative Society. And in the early nineteen fifties, Paddy Gallagher harnessed the energy from the local river to provide electricity for Dungloe, the various business premises and local industry. The man became a huge inspiration in the Rosses and he was the moving spirit and Chairman. The legacy that would become 'Paddy the Cope' first small steps grew from one small seedling of inspiration. The people of Donegal are Pat the Cope's community and his political input in politics

is part of that legacy. And the family history is likely the reason that Pat earned a B. Comm. degree at University College Galway.

#### **Misled by Micheal Barnier**

After being selected to contest the General Election, Pat The Cope delivered the best speech of the night: full of enthusiasm and forward thinking. He declared he was as enthusiastic as ever and the campaign is taking him out on the roads well travelled in a career of 45 years.

He told the 300 strong convention that he felt he felt sold out by Michel Barnier on Ireland's fishing quotas. Barnier had been the EU chief negotiator in the Brexit talks when he met Deputy Gallagher in 2019, was the European Union's Chief Negotiator in the Brexit talks when he met with then Deputy Gallagher. Barnier has since become the Prime Minister of France, elected to the office only last month.

One of the compromises agreed on Brexit centered on the UK being allowed to reclaim control over fishing waters.

Ireland, as one of the EU countries most reliant on British waters for fishing, was disproportionately affected, losing around 15% of its quota

Pat the Cope told the FF grassroots on convention night: "We have lost the equivalent of €224 million worth of fish over that period. Michel Barnier sat across a table in Dáil Éireann and told me: 'The fishing industry will not be affected while I am negotiating the Brexit deal'.


"How foolish I was to have listened to him. He sold us out at the time. We didn't get what he promised. He said negotiations on fisheries would be inextricably linked with trade and we wouldn't lose..."

Pat was always a Fianna Fail activist and he was first elected in 1979 to Donegal County Council for the Glenties Electoral area. Back then the elected members had real clout and could deliver for their communities. Lifford was a proactive hub for all political parties and none. And there were more important meetings of importance in the corridors than inside the Chamber and we all recall the racket when the County Manager

put a penny on the commercial rates... it was the closest we came to a riot since the foundation of the State!

The Council was a hard hitting Chamber of debate and the rivalry between FF and FG was intense... then Independent Fianna Fail arrived on the scene with four Members. They were to offer a new dynamic and a real challenge for the established parties on the Council. In his time. Pat the Cope became close to Neil Blaney and his party because they contributed in a positive way to the debates... some of which were never-ending! Pat enjoyed the cut and thrust of the Council and he was re-elected in 1985 and might have contested the local elections in 1991, but he was a TD and dual-membership was removed... but not for the benefit of the people. He was Council Chairman in 1985/86.

He has an immense record of serving people over all his life. If you need a passport in a hurry or a hospital bed... then Pat's the man on the ball and he knows almost all the important people who can help out. He was first elected to the Dail in 1981 for Donegal South West and was returned again in Feb 82 and Nov 82. His record of service in the Dail continued following the general elections of 1987,1989,1992, 2002, 2007 and 2016: he lost out in the 2020 election and that is one of the reasons he's back in the campaign. He believes he's got unfinished business serving Donegal and he brings a huge wealth of experience that will stand the county well in the years ahead. He's proud to have served in the Dail under FF leaders, Charlie Haughey, Albert Reynolds and Bertie Ahern and in his time there have also been strong FG Taoisigh: Garrett Fitzgerald through to Enda Kenny and Leo Varadkar. Pat being a fluent Irish speaker has always had a strong interest in their communities, the fishing industry, rural affairs and farming and in retaining the population on the Western seaboard. February 1981 was the election FF should have won with Charles Haughey as party leader. In a close contest FF ended up losing 4.5% of the popular vote and were down six seats to 78. Labour's Frank Cluskey joined FG in forming a government with 80 seats: it was four short of a majority and seemed destined not to last very long.


This was the first of five general elections in the eighties and the country seemed a basket case. Pat the Cope had a front row seat in those historic Dails.

He was returned as an MEP for the North-West constituency in the 2009 European Parliament election and he replaced Brian Crowley as the head of Fianna Fáil's European delegation.

Gallagher lost his seat at the 2014 European Parliament election.

He returned to domestic politics to successfully contest the 2002 general election, and was appointed Minister of State at the Department of the Environment and Local Government in June 2002. In Taoiseach Bertie Ahern's reshuffle in 2004, he was appointed Minister of State at the Department of Environment and Local Government and at the Department of Communications, Marine and Natural Resources from 29th September 2004 to 14th February 2006. Following a period in this role, Gallagher was appointed as Minister of State at the Department of Transport from 14th February 2006 where he served until 14th June 2007. From 20st June 2007 to 12th May 2008, he served as Minister of State at the Depart-

ed after Brian Cowen became Taoiseach in May 2008.

Owen, originally from Ray and now based in Gortahork, may work in the roads department of Donegal County Council by day but in recent years he has a enjoyed delving into the world of songwriting and poetry in his free time, much of it based around the people and places who helped shape his own life, as well as the community and issues he sees around him.

Not only is it the process of crafting his own original work that he enjoys but also the moments these creations have connecting with others when he gets to share them at live events.

He takes part in regular monthly open music nights in the Shamrock Bar in Falcarragh, and recently he brought his storytelling, poetry and songs to entertain the staff and residents of the Lakehouse Nursing Home in Portnablagh.

He gave the background of each of his competitions that detailed the people, places and events that inspired them, which resonated nostalgically with many. He was joined on the day by musician Noreen Potter and Charlie Sweeney, who recited the poem "The Creeslough Boy", as well as giving a rousing rendition of the Boys from Killybegs.

Owen explained that many of the places and people he refers to in his works would still be fondly remembered in the locality.

In the days after his visit he penned at new composition dedicated to the hard working and dedicated staff of the Lakehouse

He says while he enjoys the feedback from others he also gets "a great deal back" from the experience.

Indeed, writing the songs was his main focus when starting out and performing and singing was only an after thought he explained, adding that he has grown in confidence from attending weekly songwriting workshops hosted in the Devlin Hall, Letterkenny by Maria mcCormack. Maria is very well-known for her own unique compositions and Owen says that this has been a huge support to him and rarely a week goes by that he doesn't attend and he leaves with more confidence and inspiration.

Speaking of his early days he explained: "My father, Joe, was a fiddle player since he was young and was alway musical. None of us took up the fiddle but then none of us tried it. His thought was always 'It's up to themselves if they want to play it'. My mother, Sadie, was always into music as well without being overtly so. I recall when we grew up in Glasgow

for part of my life, when the big purchase was a record player and there was a great array of records and I recall my father having music from Hank Williams and The Clancy Brothers. By osmosis you start to delve into it and I enjoyed reading as a wee fella and you learn alot about the singers of the songs by reading the back of the record sleeves. I suppose that is what got me interested in it and what led on to a bit of song writing in later life. I was always interested in them and I was always interested in songs that could bring out a feeling in you. That's some gift to be able to do that and for you to be able to get what the artist was trying to say - to me that was always a very powerful thing".

His love of live music and going to gigs and seeing artists like the legendary Townes Van Zant and Kris Kristoferson, were an inspiration to him, as well as more local traditions.

He added: "There is a great history and tradition of writing songs around our area and in some ways that was starting to go away because maybe it started to seem old fashioned but I thought the stories we have around our own place are worth exploring and there is power in these stories to record parts of history and folklore through the lines of a song. It can help preserve these moments and maybe it could prompt people to want to find out more about them in future."

"If you look at our history, I'm not ashamed to say it, but if you go back 100 or 150 years, our ancestors came from hard times and that is something I think about. Some of the themes I return to and acknowledge the hard times people had in the past. Also, I do see a political dimension to some of the songs as well

notes it was in the last five to six years he started more seriously to craft a few complete songs. Now he says he has around 20 that he is happy with as well as a range of others done in part or are a work in progress.

His audience in the Lake House enjoyed his song about the famous Ray River Inn, a popular late night spot back in the day and the people who frequented it. Owen said he recently learned of a family seeking out the song to be played at a funeral of a former Tunnel Tiger having heard it some time ago. As a volume of opposition gathers to the proposed landfill site at Meenaboll, some 11.6 miles south of Glenveagh Castle elected members of the Council say they've been told conflicting opinions by senior council officials as to the areas the project will serve should it go ahead.

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These representatives are now saying publicly that along with the Milford and Glenties areas the refuse from Letterkenny town will also be sent to Meenaboll and they've been given this information be senior personnel within Donegal County Council.

At the same time other members say that Letterkenny has not been identified to them as a possibility and it was never their understanding that it would.

As the campaign of opposition moves up a gear the pressure is now building on the politicians to explain why Meenaboll is more suited for a dumping ground rather than Corravaddy.

Public meetings in Gartan and Fintown have given the thumbs down to the proposed landfill site at Meenaboll and there have been angry exchanges between the Cllrs. and members of the public on the issue.

The group opposing the landfill have accused the politicians of driving the agenda for the Council and at the same time very little by way of relative information has been provided by Lifford.

Udaras member Sean O'Baoill from Fintown and others say they've told very categorically the Meenaboll site will take in the refuse from Letterkenny and they are uniting in opposition to any such strategy.

Cllrs. are now saying their belief in supporting a county waste management strategy was on a basis that each of the electoral areas would have its own facility. And they point out that the proposals for Meenaboll flies in the face of the actual plan.

Cllr. Enda Bonner speaking at Fintown on Monday said he was seriously concerned about the prospect of the refuse from Letterkenny Town being included in the landfill site at Meenaboll. He opposed the original idea two years ago saying that every electoral area should have a landfill of their own. He says the Manager responded saying that there should be at least three or four such sites and that insofar as possible the views

expressed would be accommodated.

ClÎr Bonner said he was not opposed to landfills. However he could not support refuse from places like Letterkenny being transferred fifteen miles. He pointed out that the road over Meenaroy with three dangerous bridges was in no way suitable for an increase of an extra 25 refuse trucks per day. He has also questioned the methodology employed by the Council in identifying landfill sites. On the basis of a digitally generated presentation he was impressed with the data on Meenaboll as a potential site. However the Council had failed to identify one single site in either Inishowen or Letterkenny and he wanted to know why and what exactly is the current position.

One of the major questions the Council has now to answer is what is right with Meenaboll that was so wrong in locating a landfill at Corravaddy. The question has been amplified at the public meetings and the notion that public opinion dictated a change of heart despite a very substantial investment at Corravaddy will simply not wash, say those now opposing Meenaboll.

The two public meetings have seen angry exchanges with councillors and the local residents accused them of being on the side of the Council and despite repeated claims that they were present to hear the community concerns residents alleged the Council was putting in 'this superdump' by stealth and no information had been provided.

The closing date for objections to the proposal is November 8th and there are widespread complaints that the Council has failed to provide the necessary information to the public to make a balanced decision on the project. However it is most likely that objections will be lodged.

The Cllrs in attendance in Gartan and Fintown included were Ian McGarvey: Noel McBride: Liam Blaney: Enda Bonner: David Alcorn: Brian O'Domhnaill: Udaras member Sean O'Baoill and Adrian MacFhearraigh of the Green Party. The Cllrs. explained in some detail the extent of the non-technical report which had been given to them. However the meeting felt that this fell far short of the report of the actual environmental impact study.

It was alleged this report has not been given to the opposition group.

# Silting problems at Magheraroarty

Silting problems and lack of berthing for ferry boats at Magheraroarty Pier were aired in Lifford on Monday when Cllr. Padriag Doherty raised the matter and sought urgent action by the Council to rectify the problems that had arisen.

Cllr. Doherty gave a history of the works on the pier which are highly commended: however there are a number of key issues preventing the facility from reaching its fullest potential. During the renovations at the Pier a channel was made out to the deeper waters and Doherty now says that boat operators claim its width is causing a danger in heavy weather. Sand is silting up as well and one part of the pier is not being used as a result.

MacLochlainn was seeking to estab-lish the exact protocol in relation to the Council's strategy on the six sites already identified by DeLoitte who'd carried out the survey that highlighted the privately promoted Fahan Marina as the flagship in the county.

The SF Cllr. accused the Council of spending €1.26 million on an earlier study by Kirk McClure and Morton identifying Rathmullan as a priority project. He detailed the extent of the history of consultation processes and how different groups had reached different conclusions.

He failed to understand that later another group of consultants had excluded Rathmullan as a priority and this needed to be clarified.

Among the interested parties in the pub-lic gallery was John McDaid of the Fahan project and he heard MacLochlainn suggest that what had happened there read like a fairy tale: were it not so serious. He argued it was absolutely crucial that Fahan be given a fair crack of the whip and that this group must be supported since their investment was saving the taxpayers millions.

A debate on a Council motion in the He said that John McDaid was investing four million Euro in Fahan and he has put his life savings into the development of the marina.

He accused the Council of promoting other projects in direct competition with Fahan and this, he said 'was a scandalous waste of public monies'.

MacLochlainn said that McDaid must be encouraged and that had not happened. He called on the rest of the Chamber to rectify this injustice. He suggested that the €1.26 million spent on consultancy fees was a disgrace especially when private investment was there to do the job without any liability on the taxpayers. He then stated that the Council continued to drag in red herrings about the legal status of Fahan when everyone knew it was fully above board.

In a lengthy and often confusing debate MacLochlainn was accused of excluding other potential marina sites particularly in West Donegal with the motion: this he denied strenuously.


# Palm Beach Florida... a little piece of Fanad


Monsignor Bernard McGrenehan celebrated his first Mass in St. Edward's in 1945 and became parish priest in 1971, staying until his retirement in 1992. For many years of Monsignor McGrenehan's tenure he was assisted by his Assistant Pastor, Father Walter Hartnett, whose mother was Marjorie Powers from Glinsk.





Brother Danny Letterkenny. Predeceased by his siblings Jim, Nellie, Patrick, Eddie, Bridget, Theresa, Hugh, Tony, and Kevin. Relatives and friends attended his Visitation at St. Thomas of Villanova Rosemont Chapel, Rosemont, PA, followed by his Funeral Mass.

His family have paid tribute to him by saying "From a young age, Dad taught us the value of hard work through his own unwavering example. He believed that a strong work ethic was not just important, but profoundly rewarding. He was a man of his word, and his integrity shaped our family values.

Family was everything to him. He cherished the bonds we shared and made it a priority to keep our family close. Before he left Ireland in 1953 to come the US he made a promise to his father-in-law that he would bring Mary, our mother, back to Ireland to visit (as many who left rarely returned). He honoured that promise, returning again and again creating beautiful memories for all of us along the way. His commitment to bringing us allowed us to forge meaningful connections with all of our Irish cousins and deepen our roots.

Dad was a responsible provider who believed in the power of education. He made sure that each of us had the opportunity to pursue our dreams through education without hesitation.

He was an entrepreneur. His entrepreneurial spirit began at the age of ten, in Letterkenny, Ireland working on their family farm, and butcher shops. He was a paperboy, law firm delivery post boy and picked blackberries to get paid by the weight. In his teens, he drove semi-truck transporting goods from the North of Ireland to the South where he took it upon himself to have his own "side business" importing Butter and Cigarettes to the South (where these items were hard to get). He was the first UBER. Dances were very big in Ireland back in the day, and in the country, taxis were not an easy option. In his teens, mid 1940's, he earned enough to buy a van. He was going to the dance of course, but he wasn't one to spend the whole night dancing. So, he would pick people up and drop them off at the dance. They would pay him so much per person. He then stayed at the dance, had fun, would do the same with a few trips after the dance.

In 1953, he wanted to see what was across the Pond. He took Mary and off they went. He worked from butchering to sales for Swift and Company for 20+ years. Simultaneously, in 1969, opened his own butcher shop, Glen-Nor Butcher Shop (run by Mary our Mom, AKA Mary the Butcher). In 1974, purchased Ithan Food Market in Ithan PA, and in the

late 1980's, opened two restaurants in Galway, one showcasing Philadelphia Cheesesteaks and American fare (Phillies), the other a specialty café with deli food (Nifty Fifties). Even after retiring, he continued to run the Ithan Food Market for 20 years, leaving a lasting impact on the community.

Dad was an avid reader, always staying informed by reading Barron's, the Wall Street Journal daily and of course his Irish Echo. He loved the stock market and would often share his insights. We fondly remember our conversation once, imagining he should have his own talk show called "Irish Joe's Corner," where he would have shared his straightforward, honest takes on the market. No slants or biases. Ok, we admit it, probably the main reason for Dad going to Heaven is a chance to see if they have any better stock tips up there.

He had a gift for conversation - loved telling stories, an audience was optional. Dinner was the apex of etiquette, he taught us the proper way to mix the peas, carrots and gravy "Innnn" the mashed potatoes and sometimes the meat.

At his core, Dad was a big kid at heart. The joy on his grandkids' faces as they saw him approach the driveway was a testament to the love and warmth he brought into our lives. He had wit with many funny sayings. One Example- For large footed family members he would say "Hey Pal, you've got a good grip on the earth". Another "I am not always right, but I am never wrong." We feel truly blessed to have had such a wonderful father who imparted invaluable lessons throughout our lives. His presence will be deeply missed, but his spirit will continue to guide us. Thank you, Dad, for everything"

This was part of a global day of similar assemblies of people and events, so the Rev Niall Johnston in conjunction with Debra Moore, Christine and Patrick Knowles and Bill Arnold who supplied refreshments afterwards in the Hotel. As the rev explained to me this event was about highlighting the plight of the Palestinian Christians and hoping to raise some funds to go towards an ecumenical charity that supports Christians throughout the holy land. Its more about raising awareness rather than collecting money which is secondary but without money it is hard to provide the help needed. Rev Niall lives in Dunfanaghy with his roots in Faugher outside the town and flies to Jerusalem every month for nine to ten days, where Christians make up only 2% of the people. But everyone Muslim, Christian and non-faith all work together in these terrible difficult situations. I asked him does he have any insight into how the conflict would come to an end? Well internally its about everyone talking to everyone





are talking and do want peace, and externally it's about putting pressure on our governments to keep the plight of Palestinian christens alive and to ensure that we honour the agreements we made to bring peace between Palestine and Israel. Rev Niall Johnston is a Church of England priest whose work on conflict prevention and resolution means that he has significant overseas work experience with a considerable amount of time being spent in the Holy Land and surrounding countries. In July 2023, he marked the 30th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood by presiding at Eucharists in the Eye Hospital chapel and St

George's Cathedral in Jerusalem. A passionate supporter of the Eye Hospital Group, Niall's focus is on raising awareness of the Group's work whilst also supporting fundraising. He

is a frequent visitor to the Eye Hospital campuses and is well known to many of the staff both clinical and non-clinical. Niall is Deputy Great Almoner and the Provincial Prelate of London.



## **McNulty worried** about Construction **Workforce Shortage**

John McNulty, Fine Gael General Election candidate, is urging Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment Peter Burke to take immediate action in reviewing Ireland's critical skills list. This plea follows a recent report from the Fiscal Council indicating that the country requires an additional 80,000 construction workers to tackle pressing infrastructure needs, particularly in the housing sector. The report underscores the pressing demand for skilled workers in construction, a sector currently facing a severe shortage of essential tradespeople, including construction workers, plasterers, labourers, electricians, and plumbers - skills that are not currently reflected on the critical skills list. Without these vital tradespeople, key housing projects will continue to stall, further exacerbating the ongoing housing crisis in Donegal and across Ireland. John McNulty stated, "The construction industry is the backbone of our economy, and we must ensure that we have the skilled workers necessary to meet our urgent housing needs. The shortage of 80,000 workers is a wake-up call for our government. The absence of essential trades on the critical skills list is a significant oversight. We must act now to address not only the current workforce shortages but also to ensure that we can meet future housing demands as Ireland continues to grow. "Donegal has immense potential, and with the right workforce in place, we can build a stronger, more sustainable future for our communities. I urge Minister to act swiftly to ensure that our critical skills list reflects the urgent need for skilled workers in the construction sector to help resolve the ongoing housing crisis," he added.

Donegal INHFA Officers meeting with Minister for Agriculture Charlie McConalogue.

The Irish Natura and Hill Farmers Association (INHFA) have held meetings with Minister Mc-Conalogue in Kerry and Donegal as they seek to find workable solutions to ongoing issues around ACRES payments.

Speaking on this National Chair Pheilim Molloy stressed that "the 4,000 farmers currently awaiting balancing payments must be paid in addition to those farmers that are still awaiting their first ACRES payment."

In their meetings with the Minister the INHFA delegations (which were led by Pheilim Molloy in Donegal and John Joe Fitzgerald in Kerry) outline the urgent need to get these payments made in addition to addressing the ongoing issues farmers are experiencing, especially in ACRES CP areas.

These issues Molloy detailed include "lack of information on commonage scorecards which has for many farmers led to low scores and payment rates that has seen demands from the DAFM for the repayment of monies."

In addition to this, farmers have, he added "being denied the opportunity to address issues that could improve their score and the support through specific actions because the DAFM have failed to facilitate actions under the Non Produc-

tive Investments (NPIs) and Landscape Actions (LAs)."

In their meetings Molloy detailed how the Minister "was presented with a document outlining INHFA proposals to resolve many of the issues while also ensuring that all farmers currently waiting on payments are paid. The delegations also pushed the Minister for further engagement between the INHFA and Department staff

In his response the Minister agreed to facilitate such a meeting as soon as possible and also agreed to consider how the scheme could be improved."

Since the meetings with the INHFA delegations the Minister has announced an ACRES scheme review which Molloy has welcomed. However, the INHFA Chair stressed that "any review must involve active engagement with the key stakeholders including farming organisations such as the INHFA."

In concluding Molloy returned to the ongoing issues around ACRES and demanded that "no farmer be left behind, adding that the INHFA proposals to pay all farmers on a score of eight can be the basis to ensure farmers are paid, while also providing the time to address more fundamental issues that have dogged the scheme."
