SF seeks Council response to alleged 'alterations'

Sinn Féin has called for urgent clarification following the publication of an article in 'The Ditch' which claimed that "Donegal County Council secretly altered" more than 20 defective concrete block remediation applications.

Sinn Féin Group Leader on the Council, Cllr Gary Doherty said "I have written to the Chief Executive of the Council on behalf of the Sinn Féin group to request urgent clarification on

these very serious and concerning allegations made by 'The Ditch'.

That defective block homeowners, having already faced so many delays, barriers and roadblocks in their fight for 100% redress, could have their engineers' reports altered by the Council to effectively downgrade their remediation to a cheaper option is appalling.

"The Council's initial response that these unau-

thorised changes were due to "a minor technical glitch" is entirely unsatisfactory and fails to address the very real concerns being raised by homeowners and public representatives alike. We need answers from both the Council and the Housing Agency as to how and why this was allowed to happen, causing further undue anguish to defective concrete block homeowners who have already suffered so much."

The FAI's Disciplinary Committee has handed down a five-year suspension to a Rathmullan Celtic player following an alleged assault on a referee during a Donegal Junior League cup competition tie in Ramelton last month. Following the incident referee Gerard Devine abandoned the game five minutes into the second half with Swilly Rovers leading 1-0 at the time. The match official's report was sent to the FAI who, having investigated its contents, have hit J.P. Doran with a five-year-ban that means he can't play in any FAI affiliated competition until

the autumn of 2029.

There is a right to appeal the decision. The incident occurred after Swilly Rovers were awarded a penalty with Rathmulan trailing 1-0 at the time in the Brian McCormick Area Cup semi-final. In the cases where there is an alleged assault on a referee the report is not dealt with by the local league executive and instead is forwarded to the FAI's Disciplinary Control Unit.

A Donegal Junior League spokesperson expressed full support for referees adding that a very strong message had to be sent out to play-

ers, club officials and supporters that abuse or assault of match officials will not be tolerated and the appropriate disciplinary sanctions will be applied fully where there is evidence of breaches of those rules.

The spokesperson also confirmed that the result of the game at the time the match was abandoned will stand, meaning Swilly Rovers who were leading 1-0 will now go through to the Let-terkenny Area Shield final against Letterkenny Rovers. A date for that fixture will be announced in due course.



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
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Stories from Tory Island captured in new book

The rich history, culture and folklore of Tory is captured in a new book aimed at preserving the stories of the island handed down from generation to generation. Titled "S'To-



from Tory Island and is written and illustrated by island resident, Saskia Lévy-Rodgers, and is suitable for people of all ages.

This work is described as an "an essential contribution to keep some of the Tory island stories alive for all, and to allow them to travel near and far."

Saskia, originally from France, is married to Michael Oliver Rodgers, and they live on the island with their young family.

There she has gathered many stories and memories from the local community in a bid to preserve them for her own children and future generations.

She describes the island as having 150 inhabitants, being a wildlife haven for scores of rabbits and seabirds with "almost as many fairies and inhabitants of the Sidhe, and millions of ghosts." Beautifully illustrated, it has been created with care and tenderness for the island and its rich culture.

Chapters include the island's historic links to Colmcille, Balor, Lugh, its many Kings and Queens, The Tau Cross, The Round Tower and much more.

She also adds more recent history, as well as her hopes for the future of the island and its inhabitants.

She explains: "This little book is by no means ex haustive; it is not an encyclopaedia or a dictionary. It is simply a collection of memories from islanders, thoughts, ideas, and hopes put together for Shona, Sean, and Aaron, their friends, and all their potential friends in Ireland and elsewhere. "I hope that you'll find many unanswered questions in this book and that you'll seek out the answers. I also hope that you'll be fascinated by your own folklore and traditions, that you'll take a great interest in researching these stories, and that you'll come to understand their wisdom and secrets. "I hope you enjoy it, and if you have never visited Tory, I hope you might feel like visiting one day. If you do, please remember to take your litter with you, be nice and courteous, and be very careful with the big seal," she added. 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Pringle questions Taoiseach on new Mica revelations

Deputy Thomas Pringle has raised with th Taoiseach claims that homeowners' engineers recommendations for defective blocks remediation were altered on a Donegal County Council-operated portal, as he pushed for a date for publication of a revised IS465.

Addressing the Taoiseach, Simon Harris, in the Dáil on Tuesday, Deputy Pringle said: "In the last two hours, the online news publication 'The Ditch' has revealed further controversy surrounding your failing defective blocks scheme.

It has emerged that in more than 20 cases the Donegal County Council-operated portal had altered the recommendations of the homeowners' engineers.

The Taoiseach said that the review of IS465 will initially take the form of an extensive amendment to the testing protocol. He said every effort had been made to produce a public consultation draft amendment for quarter 3 of this year, but now is anticipated that it will be published by quarter 4.

The Taoiseach said he took Deputy Pringle's point about not wishing to see any further slippage and the importance of adhering to timelines and he will keep a close eye on that.

Letterkenny One Act **Drama in November**

The 2024 Letterkenny One Drama Act Festival runs from Friday 1st November to Sunday 3rd November in an Grianan theatre and the committee are confident that drama enthusiasts will not be disappointed with their programme

this year. Once again the festival is bringing drama groups from all over Ireland to compete in this All Ireland competition. The festival is one of many held throughout the country during the month of November and is run jointly by the Drama League of Ireland and the Amateur Drama Council of Ireland. As in previous years, the festival has a professional adjudicator who marks each play under the headings; Direction, Acting, Presentation, Overall achievement. Drama groups may compete in five festivals this year and are awarded points from each of these categories. The Top 9 qualify for all Ireland finals.

There is a Confined & Open competition in each festival. The Open Competition is for groups with significant experience The Confined Competition is for newer groups/ more inexperienced groups/ smaller groups/groups with less resources. Plays must not be less than 20 minutes and not exceed 55 minutes. As In previous years the festival has three plays at each session. At the end of each one the adjudicator gives an open adjudication of each play in front of the audience before giving a private critique with each group. The open adjudication has

proved popular with audiences in the past and many spectators make up their own minds who deserves the awards before the final adjudication.

As in previous years, the 2024 programme has nine one act plays performed by drama groups from all over the country, three each night/ evening.

Serious problem for SF at bad time

There is a verse in the Bible about a cloud no bigger than a man's hand. For Sinn Féin, the conviction of former press officer Michael McMonagle began as such a cloud. Former Party press officer McMonagle pleaded guilty to child sex offences. He awaits sentencing. The party has mishandled the issue. However, it won't lead to a collapse of Sinn Féin. Equally, such a scan-

dal is the last thing the party needs as the General Election draws near. McMonagle left Sinn Féin after his arrest. Sinn Féin was aware of the circumstances of his departure. We must all be careful, though. At this stage McMonagle was still an innocent man. He had not been convicted. That is the case no matter how horrible the alleged offence. (Incidentally, the same is also the case with Jeffrey Donaldson). After leaving Sinn Féin he went to work for the British Heart Foundation. Again, he was a press officer. This scandal is the last issue any party wants in the run-up to a General Election. Sinn Féin is distracted from putting out politics. Instead, it is denying mishandling a sex abuse case. That stalls the campaign. It is highly unlikely to lead to any more resignations at senior levels. It is highly unlikely the Sinn Féin vote will take a major hit as a result. It is highly likely the scandal will cost them a couiple of tight seats.

The Sinn Féin advance in the South has, at best, stalled. A year or so ago all pointed to their being the biggest party after the election. They will still be a major party. But they will probably be in third place. Holding all 38 seats they won in 2020 is unlikely.

Even doing so, though, would be failure. They had been eyeing major gains. In the North, this is also a blow for Michelle O'Neill. She has had a good first 10 months as First Minister. She is good at smiling and being pleasant in public. Unionists aren't going to start voting for her.

However, many are pleasantly surprised. Since she became First Minister, this is the first major problem her party has faced. Her party has not put her forward. Conor Murphy and John O'Dowd have been put out to speak in the media. That is a certain vote of no-confidence in her ability to answer hard questions.

Let's remember Murphy and O'Dowd suffered a period of internal exile. O'Dowd stood against O'Neill for the party Vice-Presidency. Murphy publicly backed him. Now their party is depending on them. That is not a great vote of confidence in their First Minister. Above all, though, in this we should think of victims.



An appeal was lodged to An Bord Pleanala against the development by the Cloughaneely Angling Association.

Their grounds for appeal included claims of the absence of an assessment of the project under the Water Framework Directive, significant changes were made to the substantive proposal, cumulative impacts arising from the applicant's existing quarry at Fawnmore, the applicant's restoration plan was not comprehensive and that surface water run-off from the haul route could end up in the Derryreel Stream.

Refusing planning per-mission An Bord Pleanala detailed that the applicant failed to show its proposed settlement pond would be of an appropriate size and design to ensure that silted surface water and any disturbed ground water run-off from the proposed quarry would be capable of being handled satisfactorily, especially during storm events, during all

phases of the proposal. Also, that its proposed re-use of abandoned, unauthorised, existing settlement ponds would be capable of handling silted surface water run-off from the on-site access road satisfactorily, especially during storm events. It also stated that it failed

to demonstrate if their proposed silted water collection drainage system would be adequate to avert the risk of pollution to an existing pond adjacent to the siting of the proposed wheel wash.





The septic tank was ordered and any unused, surplus materials were gathered and returned to Divers.

There's an air of tidying up and maybe rolling towards the end now. I suppose you could say I'm cap fairly tightened and the blood pressure not out of the woods yet, but I can see the fence. That's what the consultant said to me 37 years ago when they were considering letting Mark out of the neonatal intensive care unit and up to the maternity ward for a few hours. Funny the things that stick in your mind; all that's left of it. Talking of the same Mark, we had an unexpected and extremely enjoyable visit from himself and Nicolle on the Sunday while they were en route from Galway back to Kerrykeel. I was between shifts in work and was feeling a bit loose endish so it was a perfect time to see them. They had taken an overnight trip to the city of Tribes on the Saturday and finished up with a boat trip on the canal before heading our way. I never knew there was a canal in Galway. Mind you, I don't know much at all about Galway, but whenever I have time to ease off a bit I intend to visit a lot of this little country.

I was chatting with a fella last Sunday and he was saying that for the past week he's been working on the roads, putting up loads of new 60km speed signs where there were previously 80km signs. These roads are a few hairs past butt-crack, in the arsehole of absolutely nowhere in rural Cavan.

It was unusual to come back to the house between shifts without the awful wall of heat hitting me when I opened the door, or the ould dog panting and gasping for air. I took advantage of the peace and quiet and got stuck into changing beds and hoovering the shack from top to bottom. There were millions left homeless and many of those millions met the sole of my shoe as they scuttled for the nearest crack in the wall or floor, of which there are many. I don't mind them anywhere on the planet as long as they stay out of the few square yards I live in. "Personal space guys", as the ad on telly says. I finished work at 8pm and headed for Athlone to scrape Himself up and get him back to his own nest to roost for the night.

I enjoy night driving, I find the dark more comfortable on the eyes and it's a peaceful time for sorting things out in the mind. To give him fair play, he knows by now that I won't chat while I'm driving so he leaves me alone to enjoy the silence or to listen to music. He was in remarkably good shape when I picked him up and made it into the correct car, upright and unaided. I stuck my head round the door of his room before I left for work the following morning and the duvet was still rising and falling so I took it that he had weathered another bash safely.

I went over to Ballyhaise between shifts last

I hree-star cap for hotels who don't

Senator Nikki Bradley has written to Fáilte Ireland urging that no hotel is to receive more than three stars without adequately catering for people with disabilities.

She outlined how the current Fáilte Ireland star-rating system does not account for hotels' accessible facilities and an appropriate level of awareness and respect amongst staff.

"No hotel should be given more than three stars if they cannot provide a high-quality service to people of all abilities. Integrating accessibility into the guidelines would encourage hotels to improve their services and experiences. I know from engaging with many hotels that they are enthusiastic about making these improvements, and this reform would guide and incentivise their efforts. I have had far too many difficult and uncoma lack of appropriate facilities and design for people with disabilities.

Unfortunately, I am not alone in experiencing these types of scenarios, and they are a daily occurrence for people with disabilities simply going about their lives. In its current criteria, the comprehensive guidelines only make minor reference to the use of universal design

practice guidelines, and beyond that there is no more mention of disability or accessibility. There are many simple changes hotels could make and have a real difference for people with disabilities such as providing on-site parking close to entrances, modified room features, and ensuring there are working lifts. In many cases, these are not in place due to a lack of a person with lived experiences being at the table when designing and running hotels." she said.

Sixth spot finish for Kerr in MotoAmerica Superstock Champ

Richard Kerr and the AMD Motorsport team concluded their 2024 MotoAmerica Superstock 1000 Championship campaign at the weekend and did so in style with fifth and sixth place finishes at the New Jersey Motorsports Park seeing them claim sixth overall in the final standings.

Located in Millville, New Jersey in the Northeastern region of the United States, the New Jersey Motorsports Park first held racing in 2008, and the 2.25mile circuit saw County Donegal's Kerr have his best qualifying performance of the season with an excellent fifth overall in the mixed conditions on the CBR1000RR Honda Fireblade. The opening 14-lap Superstock race saw the 24-year old occupy fourth in the early stages but as the race wore on, he suffered a lack of grip with the rear tyre and had to drop back, eventually finishing sixth, 16.1s behind race winner and fellow Honda rider Hayden Gillim. Continuing to make changes to the setup of the Honda, to aid with grip in particular, the second race went a lot better for Richard as he ran with the leading pack for much of the way. Running as high as third for several laps, he battled with Jayson Uribe and Benjamin Smith for much of the way and took a fine fifth at the chequered flag, this time only eight seconds behind Gillim who won both the race and the championship. The two Superbike races, held over 20 laps, were always going to be more challenging affairs with Richard lining up in 12th on the grid after qualifying again saw mixed conditions. The races were

dry throughout though and after taking 14th in the first race he improved to an excellent ninth in the second race where he set his fastest lap of the weekend at 1'22.008. This was less than a second slower than race winner Loris Baz's best lap on the Warhorse Racing Ducati. Richard said "New Jersey was a good weekend for sure and there were a lot of positives to take out of it. We changed

Budget '25: A cold winter for social welfare recipients

Any Budget that justifies giving multi-millionaires the same energy-credit note as old age pensioners and the lowly paid needs a total reset of their thinking. And to wonder at how a targeted approach could have given 40,000 children in poverty a real life-line. FG will soon be fourteen years in power and they've lost sight of the real Ireland where homelessness and poverty are a constant reminder of their failure.

The fact that there was no real breakthrough for the coalition government in the budget will not be a surprise to anyone, barring Simon Harris. Never before in the history of Ireland has so much been given away in the €18.5bn pre-election budget that has been hammered by the Irish Fiscal Council as boom to bust policies.

Eat your heart out Bertie Ahern and Charlie McCreevey. The Celtic Tiger continues to haunt Ireland and throwing money at winning elections is a derisory attempt at fooling the electorate. There's nothing much in the budget that will have a positive impact on people's lives. I doubt that anyone on a low income will be any better off in a year's time.

The reality that this is an election budget that will see the cohort of middle-income earners do well. However the sceptre of poverty will still be there next year and the one after. Because the notion of €12 making any discernable difference is a joke. The IFC said the budget package amounts to €9.1 billion. This is substantial compared to what would have been seen in the preCovid era. The Budget contained €6.9 billion of permanent measures. The tax package is effectively neutral. That is, €1.4 billion of tax cuts cancel out what would be

the carryover impact of measures introduced previously. Spending measures total €6.9 billion

(€5.3 billion current and €1.6 billion capital). The rest of the €9.1 billion package then relates to temporary cost-of-living measures. There has been a marginal boost in support for Fine Gael in the latest Sunday Independent 'Ireland Thinks' poll but support is down for their coalition partners Fianna Fáil, while the Green Party remains unchanged. No surprises there at all.

What was really surprising was how grown up politicians leaked with abandon what they'd assumed to be real life-changing increases: on what planet does this Cabinet reside? Not at all surprisingly, the Budget failed to give any real bounce to the Coalition parties, with Fine Gael up one point to 26%, Fianna Fáil down two points to 19% and the Greens unchanged on 4%. If the social welfare recipients

were already struggling before last week's Budget, they face the reality that they will be worse off this time next year as the cost of living continues to be a huge challenge for so many.

But in reality, it was the middle income ground that was the government's target vote last week in the mad race to appeal to a universal audience. Those that needed it most got a mere tuppence worth but for middle Ireland, they were given a hell of lot more.

Fine Gael is too long in office and despite the Simon Harris one-man-show touring every country crossroads over the summer, there is no change of substance. He's all about positivity, pragmatism, promise and better times for all. But how is he proposing that will happen? More than anything else, the government and Harris reside in a bubble of their own creation where familiarity breeds a narrative driven by the spin machine with an agenda far removed from reality. Harris is a classic of this genre. You've only to ask and Simon will promise. Do not look beyond his time as Health Minister. To say that Jack Chambers made quite the balls of handing out billion after billion without telling us that from now until the end of next year the cost of running Ireland Inc will be at least beyond €33 billion. And insofar as Paschal Donohue's vision stretches, he sounded as if he'd literally take-off from the floor of the Dail in his excess outburst of enthusiasm to talk up the record of government. He's been in power for much too long and his sense of exuberance would be better placed in a comedy piece with Oliver Callan. To say that Budget 2025 was as uninspiring as Friday night's Late Late show might not be too far off the mark apart from the former costing billions of euros more. Mind you, RTE is not short of cash with a bailout of €725 million in government funding over the next three years. The station is to receive €225 million next year from TV license fee revenue and direct Exchequer funding combined. In 2026, the funding will rise to €240 million, rising to €260 million in 2027. And to think they wanted another €30 million for next year! And if that is prudent budgeting what about Jack

Chambers' first attempt? It

seems outrageous that those in low incomes will remain forgotten and left out in the cold.

It is a disaster that the hospitality sector has been treated so badly. For many people in rural Ireland, we notice the number of outlets now closed and precious jobs lost, the local pubs shuttered leaving a vacuum for so many remote parts of the countryside. Over six hundred outlets have gone since last September when the VAT rose to 13.5%. For small enterprise, the recovery from the pandemic the pathway back to busines has been a torture with energy prices high enough to leave too many premises under threat of survival.

And many will not open again as long as this government remains in office. In that respect, the next five years will see more and more places shut down and we will be the poorer as a result. For some inexplicable reason and after a record Exchequer surplus, this is a budget that flatlines: there are no big ideas: no game changers with no concept of vision for the future: no new agenda to provide the infrastructure for a country now growing at more than 100,000 every



Targeted increases to those on low incomes could have made the Budget worthy of representing the basic principle of equality. The government has been guilty of giving equal increases to rich and poor alike and it is quite difficult to understand the rationale for this practice.

But with the kind of mindset that deems it a great idea to splash nine million euros on phone pouches for students is way out of kilter with public thinking. And to think the students get much of their test exercises from college on their mobile phones. This is a cold climate for the elderly because the cost of living remains far too high and I can sympathise with old people waking in the night feeling cold and miserable. It does not need to be this way, however, the government does not seem interested in making it a great country for the elderly who have to count every cent to stay out of debt. We now have record amounts of money to spend, can you imagine what it might be like for the well-off and how badly they needed that extra €12 a week to survive? They are unlikely to awaken in the early morning feeling cold and wondering if they can afford an extra bag of coal next week. For pensioners, this Budget is mean: the €12 increase will only buy a bale of briquettes and a lottery scratch card. It means that those who feel the cost of living is too much, before the next twelve months is out, that situation will only worsen.

Shame on the architects of this budget when they had the money and the means to make a real difference for Ireland's most vulnerable sector.

The average household will make small gains from the Budget, but it will not reduce overall poverty levels, according to an analysis by the Economic and Social and Research Institute.

That is not surprising because so many on low income payments dread yet another winter leaving them short of money, struggling on a meagre income. And if the Taoiseach seems taken aback by that, the reality is that he lives in the bubble of positive hype: that is the BS coming from the government's spin machine every single day. Of course the budget is good for some: those who have most will gain the most but the notion of giving vulnerable people a pittance reflects how the parties in government are out of touch, in office for half a generation of failing to solve the crises that continue to haunt this country. This budget has merely put more sticking plaster solutions on housing, on the crumbling health services, on roads and water infrastructure and there are few incentives to live in rural Ireland. The ESRI has calculated that the cost of untargeted cost of living measures such as energy credits and double child benefit payments would have been enough to finance a second tier of child benefit and lift 40,000 youngsters out of poverty. It also warned the withdrawal of cost-ofliving measures may increase the risk of poverty for pensioners and the disabled unless there are accompanying welfare increases. It said the reduction in the energy credit from €450 this year to €250 in Budget 2025 will disproportionately affect households on fixed incomes, such as pensioners, for whom this credit represents a large proportion of income.

Kerrykeel: A village under siege

As residents of Kerrykeel claim their town has become a no-go area after midnight due to a huge increase in anti-social behaviour, community leaders there have called for a visible garda presence and increased numbers to combat the worst excesses of this problem.

Over the past couple of years it is alleged that gangs of youths have made the area around the locked up garda station and enterprise building the base of their operations.

Shocked residents say the amount of joy riders and drug dealers has increased alarmingly and all the while the community has been forced to remain silent for fear of reprisals or being forced off the road by these thugs. Responding to the problems Supt. Bart Faulkner

at Milford said he was fully aware of the difficulties and a series of measures have been implemented. He accepted that teenagers roaming the roads in old cars was a huge problem and soft drugs was also an issue which they were dealing with.

The Supt. said that a substantial number of illegal vehicles had been impounded in recent weeks and with additional resources now available progress is being made.

Supt. Faulkner said that while he's about to leave the Milford District on transfer to Dublin it was important to point out to the community that either he or is successor would be available at all times to meet members of the community on a totally confidential basis.

He said: 'We are addressing this problem and we are serious about it and with the extra resources now available we are confident we can deal with the situation.'

The Gardai cannot comment publicly on concerns over the perceived lack of officer numbers beyond saying this is a matter for the political process. However the general public see rural garda stations closed almost permanently with no visible garda presence and assurances are no

longer enough to satisfy their concerns. The Tribune understands that in recent weeks more company cars have been confiscated in the Kerrykeel area than anywhere else in the county and gardai say they will continue this policy of surveillance and identification of the drivers. Gardai also point to the fact that they've had more success in solving petty crimes in the Milford District in the past year than at any other time and the numbers of incidents being reported have fallen steadily.

The seriousness of the situation is reflected in the fact that nobody was prepared to go on the record or be photographed. At the same time the community has rejected a garda plea to hold a public meeting to highlight the problem. The reason being that nobody is prepared to stand up publicly and voice their concerns-the fear of intimidation is painfully obvious. We were told that around twenty teenagers regularly arrive in Kerrykeel to compete in road races and this is putting lives locally and across the Fanad peninsula at serious risk.

There are many reports of these clapped out cars being driven two-abreast at breakneck speeds on back roads at three in the morning. Meanwhile we are told that back in the village more teenagers are is also alleged that requests from local gardai for resources and manpower to address this problem over the past two years were rejected by the powers that be in Garda Headquarters in Dublin.

'Young hoods and teenage thugs have been allowed to take over our town and we have nobody to claim it back. They are above the law and have this day and age when Donegal County Council been for years and they are giving their two fingers to the gardai knowing full well they are going to get away with it. Where are the gardai and what are they doing about it?

That was an opinion that echoes louder than anything else this week from within a community

living in dread and fear. Ironically this same community says that extra gardai has never been a problem in the village previously and they point to hundreds of officers who were bussed into the village on three occasions back in 1997 as the community resisted an Esat mobile phone mast being erected in the grounds of the garda station. The community child line leaders say if they are seen talking to the media they will be targeted by the joy riders whom they saw have been allowed to take the law into their own hands.

Glenheo: bog standard water

A water supply from a bog hole might represent a bog standard effort from Donegal County Council to meet the needs of those whom it serves. But that's exactly what is happening for the householders in Glenhoe above Carrigart dealing in drugs and openly plying their trade. It in September 2004. They find it hard to believe that after more than a hundred years of local government in Donegal that their Council can continue to fail their most basic needs in such a shameful and uninspiring manner.

> The Glenheo area has never known what its like to have a public water supply and even in prides itself on its record of so called progress this is patently ridiculous.... but very true.

> We met with the representative of the houses on Tuesday to hear a tale of catastrophe and woe. And rather astonishingly in an area where holiday homes now dwarf the indigenous population by about ten to one it is only the locals who can't have a proper public water supply, said Andy Coyle.

> He says the Council simply cannot give the local residents a water supply because there is not enough of the precious liquid on tap in Donegal. Yet developers constructing a rake of holiday homes have no difficulty whatever. This sounds astonishing but again many other communities have been making similar complaints particularly about planning and development issues. First of all it would be wrong to suggest the Council has done nothing in Glenhoe. They actually know where Glenheo is and I happen to know this confidentially since Council engineers have gone to the trouble of writing letters to politicians pointing out why they can't have water, unlike every where else on this planet.

> The townland of Glenheo sits high above the village of Carrigart in a picturesque location which is wonderful: apart from having no public water supply. They've been trying their best

for years to convince the powers that be that this

community is similar to any other: but is anyone listening. Obviously not since they've now had to resort to the pages of their local newspaper to highlight this injustice. But of course having no water is nothing new in Donegal despite all the oul nonsense of hype and political spin that is visited upon us especially when an election is around the corner.

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And it would also seem that a big job of works up at Cranford is meant to improve things with plans to pour some more water into the system. But there is no indication that Glenheo is included in this greater schedule of events.

Andrew Coyle took us to see where his family source their water. It is a hole in the ground up on the hill. At first glance the liquid looks like a strong malt whiskey or poiteen that has not been properly distilled. I shudder to think that any community is having to use this stuff in this day and age. What is even worse is that nobody can assure this community that they will eventually get a public water supply. Glenhoe has eight permanent homes and they've been there for generations. Since 2001 many more new houses and holiday houses have been built. The locals say that boreholes were being used but that has now been stopped by the authorities because there is too much of going on and it could have a detrimental impact on the existing supplies.

Andrew Coyle say's he's already been refused planning permission for a site because there is no water. However he's now been informed that water is not a pre-requisite for planning.

And for the moment we shall leave the last word to Andrew Coyle. 'If were from Northern Ireland and building a holiday home, we'd have no bother at all getting a proper water supply. Hopefully someone somewhere even in Donegal County Council will explain that one to everyone's satisfaction.

Donegal County Council could be lynched if they leave streets unswept and other road services cancelled between now and the end of the year. They are in a wee spot of bother since their budget for these services is already spent.

Cllr. Dessie Larkin was speaking at the Council's Letterkenny area meeting on Tuesday when the roads engineer, Pat Gillespie dropped the bombshell that they're skint for maintenance money and its still only September.

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Street sweeping will have to be binned and other services abandoned since they've already run over budget by €18,500.

And adding to this woeful handling was a comment from James Boyle the senior county roads engineer. He says there is no facility to allow for overspending and pointed out that their budget for non-national roads maintenance has been reduced over the past three years. It is not clear how this crisis can be

addressed but it would seem they vations might suggest.

In a heated debate Dessie Larkin demanded that the road sweeping service be maintained while describing the 2004 allocation of €350,000 as peanuts and he proposed that future maintenance programmes be administered from the environment budget.

Gillespie's report shows that this year's overall roads maintenance budget of €327,909 had been exceeded and to continue the road sweeping programme for the remainder of the year would cost another €25,000.

New plans for Oldtown bypass

The Letterkenny area roads manager Pat Gillespie is to seek the support of Councillors to have funding prioritised in the 2006 Budget for a €1.5 million relief route from Dunnes Stores to Sallaghagraine. The need for a by-pass at this location has been widely debated since it was raised by SF Cllr. Gerry Mc-Monagle recently.

Cllrs Ciaran Brogan and Dessie Larkin have called for the route to be prioritised to alleviate the chronic traffic congestion at Oldtown, Griers and the Back Road. At Tuesday's Electoral Area Meeting Pat Gillespie said when the Business Park to Kilmacrennan Road was completed Members should strongly consider putting the Dunnes Stores Link to the top of the list to receive all available funding. The Area Manager also gave an up-

date on the four schemes that are ongoing saying further works will be required on the Business Park, Castleshanaghan and Coologhy roads next year while it is hoped to complete the purchase of lands for the Leck works in the coming months.

He also spoke about adopting an alternative approach to spending on the roads programme. "At the moment the four schemes are get-

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ting approximately a quarter of the available funding. Perhaps when the existing schemes are progressed to a particular level consideration could be given to focusing the funding on one or two jobs to speed up their completion" he said. He also referred to a review of the current priority list saying that: "An ex-ample of a route, which should be considered for funding as a priority is the Dunnes Stores to Sallaghagraine or River Diversion Project as it has been previously known. Whether it is a river diversion or two bridges this link is rapidly becoming a necessity. At present the Sallaghagraine and Kirkstown area is showing indications of major development, not to mention the new Leisure Complex. As there is no alternative route all of these are going to increase the volume of traffic on Ballymacool Terrace and the Junctions at the Back Road, Griers and Dunnes. This road {Dunnes Link} should be treated as a priority." Cllr Larkin pointed out that a number of years ago Dunnes Stores was

to assist with a £1 million contribution to the relief road and asked that the Council reopen discussions with company representatives on a deal which would have the potential to benefit their business.

Senior roads engineer James Boyle told Members that it was a small part of the private land purchased in the area for the construction of the new road from Unifi to the N56 Kilmacrennan Road. At the time of this deal it was further agreed that the County Council would sell the 1.64 portion to the IDA for the same price in order for the state body to add to their land property portfolio in the area. A proposal by the Respond Voluntary Housing Association, supported by Donegal County Council for the construction of 24 houses has been approved for funding by the Department of the Environment. The project which will include communal facilities will be built on Council land at Óldtown. According to Letterkenny area housing manager Patsy Lafferty work should commence on site in early 2005 subject to land transfer and legal matters being finalised. "The proposed development will be managed by Respond and will be a significant contribution towards meeting the needs of those on the Letterkenny Housing list" he said.

Woodlands Junction blackspot: Larkin Cllr Dessie Larkin has called for upgrading works to be carried out on the junction at Woodlands National School following a recent serious car accident. Larkin said: "The Woodlands junction is now a major blackspot with residents telling me that there is an accident every week." However Cllr. Ciaran Brogan said that the road from the Elmwood Downs junction to Tara Court needed work before moving further out the Ramelton Road. The FF Member said a barrier was required on one side to protect local dwellings. Cllr. Brogan also pointed to the absence of a turning lane at Tara Court on a very busy route.

I'd been on the road for three weeks, spending virtually all of my time in Trump World, chatting to his adoring foot soldiers at rallies and churches and coffee shops. Which reminds me - how do you spot a Trump supporter at Starbucks? She's the one bitching about the disastrous state of the American economy while waiting for her \$24 Double Vanilla Bean Mocha Frappuccino. True story. I also spent a lot of time trying to navigate the Trump campaign media apparatus. I know you're not interested in war stories from the frontlines of campaign journalism so I'll just leave you with this. Imagine you are a speck of household dust swept up by a breeze and

"Roe v Wade was a case that came out of Texas and it gave women the freedom to make their own health care choices. Kamala Harris will codify those rights back into law and that's why we need to do everything we can to get her elected."

Up until election day in the States, while American voters decide who to vote for in the 2024 Presidential election, former Tribune journalist, Lawrence Donegan will be travelling across the USA, from his home town just north of the Golden Gate Bridge, into Nevada and Arizona. From there he will head west to New Mexico and then north to Colorado, followed by Wyoming and Montana. After that, he's not exactly sure but expect to find him in the swing states that will decide this election - Wisconsin, Michigan, Philadelphia.

His final destination is Palm Beach, Florida, where Donald Trump will be hosting his election night party at his Mar-a-Lago club/home. Lawrence still hasn't received an invite yet but there's still time.

He said "I've been thinking about this journey for a long time, about the story I intend to write. I was going to call it Goodbye Donald. I figured Trump's electoral hopes were as lost as his relationship with truth. My story would serve as my gift to anyone who cared, an epithet for the American nightmare now over. Not any more, not now that Trump is favoured to win. For now, I'll write under the working title, Goodbye Donald? - a question, obviously, not a statement. I thought I knew America and Americans. I thought this country and the folks who live here had given up on Donald Trump. I was wrong. Turns out I knew the wrong Americans and the wrong America. It is time to hit the road and find out why."

> "And I said before I'd rather not. Thanks anyway."

IT SEEMS a strange thing to say about an event with so much political star power but the best speaker of the day was a young local woman called Laurel Marcinkus. She told a harrowing story about how she almost lost her life in hospital while doctors debated whether or not they could legally induce the birth of her daughter, knowing that the baby would not survive. Without the induced birth Laurel herself could die. "After the Surpeme Court overturned Roe v Wade, Wisconsin was enforcing an 1849 law banning abortions unless the life of the mother was at risk. But the question was whether or not I qualified under that exemption. Two different doctors needed to be consulted about my case, which meant for an entire day I was bleeding, getting sicker and sicker," she said. Laurel broke down at this point. A few people started crying. I'm not sure how many more of these official events I'll attend between now and election day - to be honest, I much prefer to be out there talking to ordinary people in informal settings - but I doubt I'll witness a more poignant and powerful moment. "I'd really appreciate it if you moved up the front."

This was the first time Laurel had spoken in public about the loss of her daughter. I chatted to her husband, Kelly McCormack, afterward and he said she was really nervous all week. "I'm so proud of her," he said. When you are out there in Trumpworld, it is difficult to concentrate on anything else. The Red madness is all-consuming. You stay awake a night, wondering exactly what it is you are watching and now it is that one deeply flawed person - let's be truthful, a sociopathic, untethered conman - has been able to fool and continues to fool so many people. No wonder I hadn't been able to get a proper sense of what was going on with the Blue. But from afar, it all looked a bit uptight and restrained, as if the Harris campaign was scared of making a mistake. I guess I'll discover more now that I'm heading into the swing states, where the election will be decided. "For the last time - I won't be moving to the front of the stage." I'll never forget Laurel Marcinkus. These personal stories hit hard, much harder than the million-dollar ads, cute videos on TikTok, and even anything said by the starriest of political stars. Authenticity remains undefeated. I don't know who said that and I bet you don't either. So I'm going to claim it as my own. Authenticity remains undefeated. Ordinary people telling their extraordinary stories to the voters might not guarantee election victory but it'll make more of a difference to the result than how an early morning campaign stop in Waukesha looks on local TV.

As Donegal champions, Caolan McDaid's side now enter the Ulster Intermediate Club Championship where they will meet the Tyrone champions at the beginning of next month.





"We write to say that many members of our congregation at Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Kerrykeel are dismayed and annoyed at the manner in which our Saturday evening Mass was cancelled in favour of St. Peter's Church in Milford. Our Mass was at 6pm on Saturdays: Milford already had a 7.30pm Mass on Saturdays. But to our amazement that time is now changed to 6pm for no logical reason. There was a vote to decide on a couple of options: our main interest was to retain our 6pm Mass on Saturdays. However, with the Kerrykeel and Milford Church congregations being under the same administration, someone in their wisdom decided that in the best interests of the Church, a vote should be held. Nobody consulted with us about our choice. We were ignored.



Harps last match was a fortnight ago in Tralee against Kerry F.C. There was no game for Darren Murphy's side last weekend as their First Division fixture against Wexford Youths was postponed as they had an FAI Senior Cup semi-final against Drogheda Utd on Sunday. That game ended in heartbreak for Wexford losing 3-2 to Drogheda whose late winner came from ex-Harps striker Adam Foley.

That Wexford game has been refixed for this coming Monday in Ballybofey (7.45). And the final game of the regulation season for Harps is on Friday week 18th of October against Treaty Utd at Finn Park. 

An announcement through gritted teeth

Recently my wife and I welcomed our third child into the world and had the joy of making a baby announcement to our friends. We loved reading the congratulatory WhatsApps as they came in and enjoyed soaking in the well wishes of our nearest and dearest. If only we could have bottled the feeling!

Not all baby announcements are quite like that though. Just a few days before our new arrival, one man announced a new arrival and the tone could not have

been more different. Dave Grohl, lead singer and guitarist of Foo Fighters and formerly Nirvana's drummer, took to social media to announce the birth of his daughter. Alas, and I feel for the poor girl, this read like an announcement made through gritted teeth. It's a short announcement,

so I'll copy it out in full: "I've recently become the father of a new baby daughter, born outside of my marriage. I plan to be a loving and supportive parent to her. I love my wife

can to regain their trust and earn their forgiveness. We're grateful for your consideration toward all the children involved as we move forward together. - Dave."

Aside from the almost palpable levels of cringe, there are two things that strike me about this non-apology apology. First is what "Dave" doesn't say, second is what he does. What he doesn't actually say, at least publicly, is "sorry". Sure, he alludes to broken trust, but at no point does he explicitly acknowledge wrongdoing on his part. I can only hope any private apology was very different because a betrayed

wife deserves better. What he does say is no less pathetic. He immediately moves from the bare facts of his adultery to a list of what HE is going to do to put things right. He will be a supportive father. He will regain his family's trust. He will earn their forgiveness. Yet anyone who has been on the receiving end of marital betrayal will know that adultery's agony does not fade easily. It takes a long time for trust to be regained... if it can ever be regained at all. There is much to learn from this non-apology, and not just for those who have been unfaithful to their spouses.

Perhaps the most telling word of all and the one that is most out of place is "earn". Grohl hopes to earn his family's forgiveness. Yet forgiveness is always something that is granted; it is never something that is earned. That is something the gospel teaches us: our sins are too serious and our lives too broken to earn our way back into the fold. Yet there is a flip side to the pain of acknowledging this: our confidence of forgiveness no longer depends on how well we can atone for our sin and rests instead on the wonderful grace of God.
