

Fears that Milford water source may collapse

The public in Milford have expressed fears that their source for public water from Lough Columkille is facing collapse because of over-extraction by Úisce Eireann to serve outlying districts in Ramelton, Fanad, Kerrykeel and Glenvar



Local farmers say the fall in water levels is the worst in living memory and there is something seriously wrong. Only recently, a unit of the Donegal Fire Service was called to assist horse who strayed into the Lough in search of water. Due to the conditions underfoot, it's reported that the horse was unable to get ashore without assistance.

A major construction of a new treatment plant at Lough Colum in 2010 was supposed to ensure a full water supply for Milford for the next fifty years.

Lough Colum is fed from underground springs and is barely dependent on rainfall and it is claimed the area had continuous rainfall from the middle of June last year until the end of September and it made no real difference.

A similar loss of supply happened at the springs fed Tullyconnell Lake in Fanad

There was a new lining installed at the Drumbern Reservoir above the town and all those repairs have been a big benefit for the consumers. Adding to the urgency says

mission except in water services that are vital to the project going ahead. There have been delays and I'm in the process of seeking final answers that are essential to ensure that the investment we are putting into the town has a fully functioning supply of water. Otherwise it cannot happen." said Mr. Kelly.

Liam Blaney said: "I've been lobbying for a proper public water supply for a long time and I believed when the new treatment plant was up and running 14 years ago there would be plenty of water to supply the Milford area for the future. But that is not the case.

Cllr. Blaney has been campaigning for years for the Ramelton catchment area to be supplied from Letterkenny added: "That is the solution and it makes common sense. Otherwise, Milford's supply will be put at further risk.

The Tribune queried Uisce Éireann six weeks ago in relation to concerns being raised about the low levels of Milford's public water supply. It was a summer from hell when it never stopped raining.

McConalogue defends record on Redress



Agriculture Minister Charlie McConalogue dropped into have a chat with Tribune Editor John McAteer on Monday.

In his first public comment in the general election campaign, Minister Charlie McConalogue has strongly rejected claims that Fianna Fail has failed the owners of homes with defective blocks in Donegal.

"I can stand over my own position and the party's record on Mica Redress. There has been real progress in the scheme where homeowners are now entitled to claim €495,000. That is a big improvement... that is a lot of money. And if more needs to be done and if flaws are identified I will move to have those issues rectified." He told the Tribune that he has played a lead role in the Cabinet to get the cap on funding increased by 10% and an 8% increase per square foot.

"I do not have any problem defending my time in Government. I agree that it has been a very difficult time for many

families, but now I really do believe we have turned a corner and getting more applications processed faster is a top priority for me," he stated.

Out on the campaign trail in Milford earlier in the week, the Minister took time to step out of his comfort zone to talk to the Tribune.

He was happy to confirm there was harmony amongst the three FF candidates, Pat the Cope and Claudia Kennedy. Any references about being shafted were quickly hung out to dry because McConalogue had a positive message for the constituency... on Monday it was canvassing in the Milford area.

He believes the party can win two seats and says their campaign is getting a fair response and the electorate is raising numerous issues on the door Contd. Page 3


Nicole wins Hairdressing 'Apprentice of the Year' Award

Concerns over delay in opening new Dunfanaghy Health Centre

Concerns that Dunfanghy's new Health Centre will not be open until early next year is a matter of much concern, according to Cllr. Michael McClafferty.

The current Health Centre on Pound Street in Dunfanaghy has been closed since October 25th and IT issues are referenced as the problem.

In the interim, the Dunfanagy community is obliged to use the centre in Creeslough. The HSE says it hopes the new building will be

opened in late December or early January. But Cllr. McClafferty said he has concerns about the delay and that it could run into 2025 before it happens.

He stated: "There are concerns in Dunfanaghy that the old surgery has closed over a week now and no sign of the new one opening.

"As someone who fought hard for the new health centre, I have my own fears that sourcing staff was always going to be an issue. But I didn't ex-

pect it to become a reality. I have my concerns and I'm calling on the HSE to get this much needed surgery opened ahead of the winter."

He said the reason for the closure of the current Health Centre has been put down to IT issues, adding "there may be an issue with broadband". He fears that the people of the village are "falling between two stools" as a result of the issues with older people and those without cars being the most affected.

Falcarragh take away given temporary closure order

A takeaway business in Falcarragh was ordered to temporarily close after food safety concerns were raised during an inspection.

The Food Safety Authority of Ireland ordered the short term closure of Tasty Mac's, Falcarragh from 16th to 22nd October this year under European Union (Official Controls in Relation to Food Legislation) Regulations 2020 (S.I. No. 79 of 2020).

Inspectors noted flies among food and dirty cooking equipment when they inspected the property last month.

They observed unhygienic conditions and equipment in various places of the kitchen. This included dirty bowls, dirty whisks, and ingredient containers encrusted with dirt.

The Environmental Health Officer's report also noted that "a fly was found within a container of raw burgers". Flies were also observed in the food preparation area.

Insect proof screens were not provided on the doors and windows, the report added.

None of the food handling staff were wearing protective clothing or head coverings at the time. Other breaches included unclean food preparation surfaces, shelving, interiors of fridges, walls and floors, alongside a lack of cleaning chemicals. This was one of 16 businesses across Ireland served with enforcement orders by the FSAI last month

year, it never stopped raining in the general Milford area and he dismissed the response as not being relevant. He said that while the supply is dependent on underground springs, a small amount of rainwater can also enter the supply, although the adjoining area is quite small.

"There is also the possibility that rainfall may serve to increase the pressure from the springs. It is a serious situation and despite much upgrading of the system, the

reality is that Lough Columkille supply was never going to be able to supply a wider catchment area out into the Loughside in Ramelton where there are extensive farming enterprises," he stated.

At the moment we understand the Milford supply is supplemented from Cranford and Lough Salt. In its response to our queries, Úisce Eireann said: "Annually the level in the lake at Milford is at its lowest in October and 2024 is no different in that respect. How-

ever, this year, lower than average rainfall in the catchment area has resulted in the lowest lake level at Lough Columbkille for some years. Generally, the annual trends show that water levels in the lake recover and begin to rise from October onwards. In order to safeguard the water supply for the public, Uisce Éireann has urged the public to conserve water and in addition, water abstraction from the lake has been

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McConalogue defends record on Redress

Given that Sinn Fein won more than 538,000 votes at the last election, we asked the Minister if he was satisfied that the process of democracy was being best served with the main party in opposition cast into the wilderness forever...

Minister McConalogue responded: "I want to serve in a government that best serves the people and that works for them. I do not believe that the policies of Sinn Fein can work."

He would not be drawn into any further comment about parties of the Left.

We query the 10c a litre increase on a pint of milk and the general view that the prices for shopping and the cost of living is price gouging. He said there is a supply and demand dynamic at work here but "obviously I do not want food prices increasing.

The cost of living is a big challenge but we tackled these issues with extra payments in the budget, two energy credits, double payments," he stated. Asked if sees the 11% vat for the hospitality sector as 'kite flying' by Simon Harris, McConalogue being the diplomat he is, he said that the situation was being kept under review because many cannot afford more increases.

"We certainly cannot afford an increase in energy and I do not agree with it."

Will FF change the 11% Vat rate? "We are no longer in Government. We have our own proposals to deliver for the hospitality sector, so we are going to wait and see. Simon Harris is the Taoiseach and we're in the very first week of an election campaign. This government has seen much progress and that has come through a three party consensus in Cabinet."

As Minister for Agriculture, the Marine and Fisheries, it was never going to be easy for him to become a prophet in his own land. A land dominated by the scourge of Mica with his native Inishowen the epicentre of the crisis.

He returns time and time again to the positives delivered by Fianna Fail and having a senior Cabinet Minister in the county has delivered since the formation of

the government... 'We go all the way down to Limerick to find the next senior Minister, so I think my time in Government over the last four and a half years has been very important and it has made a very positive difference,' he states. If returned to Government would you like to retain your portfolio? "I certainly would because my four and

a half years have been a great experience and a great challenge. I am

delighted to have been the Donegal Voice in Cabinet where I was able to lobby for so many projects that will be beneficial to our county."

Being in Milford, it was opportune for the Minster to remind our readers of the benefits of the Three Towns Sewage project, obviously there are many environmental and health benefits and it will make a massive difference.

At least the people of Milford, Rathmullan and Ramelton will breathe more easily and kayakers will no longer fret about falling overboard in the Swilly estuary only to surface looking like an advert for hot chocolate.

This was the scheme that was projected to cost €17 million in November 2018. Will the final cost be much more than €50m? we wondered. He said he was not aware of any changes to the original figure in the contract.

And he wanted to highlight the Towns First Initiative and the investment already granted 'through myself in Cabinet'. And there is good progress on the horizon on a new national school and he did not accept our view that it will be four to five years before there are pupils in the desks

in the new building... "It will be much sooner than that and I want to ensure that when the Inspectors' Report on the existing building is completed, my priority is to have the project moved to a funding platform," he said. "Milford will be well

served by the Town First Project which I am proud to bring forward for funding. This is going to be a big job...'

But do not look beyond the state of town's main thoroughfare and the vacant properties. And

what about job creation?

He said that many similar towns across the country faced the same challenges and he hoped this new initiative will bring success and breathe life into the business enterprises that continue to serve their communities.

He also referenced major investments in Ramelton: the village renewal scheme with funding of over €6m and the flood prevention allocation of €8m on the Shore Road.

And further out along the Swilly, the Minister said he was delighted with works on Rathmullan Pier where €4 million is being invested. He noted the completion of the restoration of Portsalon Pier at a cost of €1.5m.

Returning to agriculture he referenced the increases he's overseen in the sheep scheme with the subsidy going from €10 to €25 per ewe and coming from that background in agriculture he said the suckler and sheep sector is very important to him.

"This year, there is a suckler cow subsidy of €225 per animal and next year that will rise to €325. In the tillage sector the future is much stronger and I've worked to make the farm sector in Donegal much stronger."

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Referencing the controversies over Acres, the environment scheme he agreed there had been teething problems. Funding has been doubled. That has been a big help.

"Farmers in Donegal are getting 10% of all payments,' said the minister.

Farmers were angry over the method of 'scoring' the farm to determine the level of payments. That is now resolved and the majority in the suckler sector are happy.

He says that with the latest increases farming in Donegal is much stronger, but what about attracting younger people to farm the soil.

He stated that a series of projects have been put in place to make farming a choice, either permanently or part-time and is optimistic. "However, this is something that is constantly being reviewed because we need a younger generation to look to the future and the preseration of an industry and a way of life that is vital for rural Ireland and rural families.

N56: planning restricted zone?

On that note, we noted that the N56 is set to become a planning restricted zone due to the mandate of the Office of the Planning Regulator and what is the Minister' view about the County Development Plan including the new restrictions on the N56 being voted through the Council with the backing of FF Cllrs.

McConalogue said it was obvious that the same kind of difficulties are arising in many other rural counties.

We will examine the consequences of the new regulations in how they impact on the N56 and the concerns over the construction of new hous-

And if changes are needed, then Fianna Fail will deliver those changes,' he added.

Asked if the OPR was yet another piece of bureaucracy, the Minister said the Office was need-

ed, however flexibility was required.

"It is one of FF's key objectives to promote rural areas, to allow them to grow and to be able to build houses and develop the infrastructure," he stated.

He said that the county's sports capital funding of €13.5m was a record and we were the fourth highest in Ireland. I welcome the news that 89 clubs in Donegal have been recipients of sports funding.

He turned to the situation at LUH and the ongoing issues. He said the government had invested heavily in more beds, (49 additional beds opened, 10 more beds brought back to being used): more finances and more staffing: the appointment of a neurologist and a second in the near future.

"More needs to be done, but staffing levels have increased by 50% in this government's term. However LUH is a challenge as are all other hospitals. We've also invested in a new 110 bed nursing unit at Knocknamona and that is a significant investment in our four years in office? he said.

He stated that he was proud of being involved in getting a new veterinary college at the Atlantic Technological University in Letterkenny and in the financial investment of €25m from his own Dept. of Agriculture.

Proud to march for Gaza

On Saturday last I was proud to be one of thousands who marched through Dublin. We were protesting at the mass murder Israeli forces are carrying out on the people of Gaza and Lebanon.

In my time there have been only two world issues that energised world opinion so much. One was the Vietnam War of 50-odd years ago. The other was Apartheid in South Africa.

The Dublin marches are monthly, and also big. There have been very few examples of such huge marches. From experience, a campaign usually has at best two large marches or demonstrations. People only have a certain energy.

This is different. This month's march was larger than last month's. We left from Parnell Square. The crowd stretched the length of O'Connell Street. I would say that there were at least 10,000. The great majority weren't political activists. They were ordinary members of the public. Events horrify them. I travelled from Omagh with a friend who is a retired postman. I met a man who has travelled from Enniskillen. I met another who comes most months from Mullaghmore, Co Sligo. I can remember no campaign that kept up such momentum. That is despite no apparent results. Rather the Israelis have widened attacks and become more extreme. Despite pressure, the so-called international community has done nothing. The International Criminal Court issued an arrest warrant for Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. Fortunately for him, he is not some small-time African leader who annoyed the Western powers. The warrant has had no effect. He has travelled the world pretty much at will. He spoke to the American

Congress in Washington. Democrats Apartheid is defined as "a particuand Republicans tried to out-do one another in enthusiasm.

'Genocide Joe' Biden pretends to be a pleasant old man. He is arming the Israeli forces to the hilt. Donald Trump will face difficulties in finding a way to be more extreme. The European Union is the second-largest supplier of weapons, after America. Germany is particularly enthusiastic about arming Israel. Germany murdered most of its Jews during the War. Most of the rest were driven out. Were they so genuinely concerned for Jewish people, why were they not welcomed back in their home country. Then there is Keir Starmer. He has said the Israeli government had the right to cut off food, electricity and

water from Gaza. The words of the Irish Government are far nicer. However, weapons are being moved to Israel through Shannon. Others are being flown through Irish airspace. This is illegal under Irish law.

The Government refuses to enact the Occupied Territories Bill. They excuse it as being allegedly illegal under EU law. American multinationals have put on pressure. Being concerned about suffering humanity is ok. But apparently we can't upset our friends in America. Thus helping mass murder is easier.

As to Israel, it is an apartheid state.

larly severe form of institutional discrimination and systematic oppression based on race or ethnicity, and is prohibited by international law." The International Court of Justice has ruled Israel is implementing apartheid. Among those who agree with that are the former head of the Israeli intelligence service and the former head of the Israeli army's Northern Command. Genocide has been loosely thrown about in too many circumstances. However, it can be used about Gaza. At the start of the Israeli attack, Gaza had just over 2.1 million people. They were crammed into an

area less than half the size of County Louth. Since October last year, medical

experts put the death toll at 200,000. That is about 10% of the population. Seventy percent were women and children. The death toll is equivalent to one year of the Great Famine here, as a proportion of the population. That is genocide in anybody's opinion.

A sign of genocide is that a United Nations Commission of Inquiry has round Israeli forces have deliberately destroyed the health services in Gaza. Thus people are dying not just from war-related injuries. Ordinary diseases, normally quite minor, are killing as well. The water supply has been destroyed. Less than

5% of water is now fit for human consumption. That brings all sorts of diseases. Making that worse, all sewage treatment plants have been destroyed. The electricity grid has been crippled. At least two-thirds of housing units have been destroyed or damaged.

Now, Israeli forces have split Gaza in half. They drove a road from the Israeli Border to the sea. Since the start of October, no supplies have been allowed into the Northern part of Gaza.

The people have been ordered to evacuate. But Israeli soldiers often shoot down people who try to move. More, the people have nowhere to go. Ninety five percent of the population is displaced. From experience those in the North fear they will be killed even if they move to supposed 'safe zones' in the South. Starvation, disease and winter may well kill most of those in Northern Gaza. I'm no Hamas fan. Reality is they put up a harder fight than Israeli forces expected. So the Israeli army will primarily sit and starve them.

Already, Israeli settlers are getting ready to move in. That, again, is



DELIVERING THE NEW **DEFECTIVE CONCRETE BLOCKS SCHEME**

The new scheme continues to roll out with over 300 houses now under construction in the county and over 50 fully completed. The first annual increase in rates under the scheme was agreed by Cabinet in October and will see an average 8% increase in payments for all currently in the scheme and the overall cap increase by 10%.

This will see the average grant paid under the scheme rise by €26,000 to €356,000 with an additional €37,500 also available through SEAI energy grants.

The maximum funding available under the scheme for rebuilding a home has now risen to €499,500.



UNPRECEDENTED INVESTMENT IN DONEGAL PIERS AND HARBOURS

As Minister for the Marine over the last four years, I have delivered funding for 25 pier and harbour projects across Donegal.

Of the €50 million spent on county council owned piers and harbours nationally, €28 million, or 56%, of

the total has been spent in Donegal. I also increased the percentage of project costs that are covered by department grants from 70% to 95% to reduce county council cofunding requirements.

This has seen the completion of long-awaited projects such as Portsalon Pier renewal at a cost of over €1.5 million, while Rathmullan Pier is nearing completion with an investment of over €4 million.

Significant funding has been delivered to help regenerate our towns and villages.

The regeneration of Letterkenny town centre is supported by **€16.6 million Urban Redevelopment** funding and involves the Linear Park scheme, a re-imagined Market Square, a Cathedral Quarter Park and the Revival of the Old Courthouse.

Ramelton received €6,359,895 for the Reimagining Ramelton Project.

The Ramelton, Milford and Rathmullan Wastewater Scheme has seen an **investment of €50 million** to end the discharge of raw sewage into the Leannan Estuary, Lough Swilly and Maggie's Burn, while it will also safeguard the environment and supporting social and economic development.

NEW LETTERKENNY COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

The new hospital will comprise of **110 beds** including a mix





I had a funeral last week of a wonderful godly lady. She had spent many years trusting in her Saviour and was more than ready to meet him. In thinking of her funeral I was reminded of several things:

There's a verse in the Bible that says, "It is better to go to a house of mourning than to go to a house of feasting, for death is the destiny of everyone; the living should take this to heart." (Ecclesiastes 7:2)

I was reminded of a talk on YouTube by Kathryn Mannix, a palliative care doctor, who said, "Human beings are the only animals capable of contemplating their own mortality, and they've been doing that for thousands of years." And yet she would go on to point out that we have distanced ourselves from it in recent decades.

It's something we talk less and less about. They say that in the Victorian era death was a common topic of conversation, and sex never. Yet we have reversed this, sex is plastered everywhere, and death hardly ever spoken of. And we are the poorer for it. People face it with unspoken fear and unreadiness. I remember visiting a nursing

home and taking a friend with me - he was in his mid-nineties. He asked if there was anyone older than him - only one. Then

he pointed at me and said, "I'm going to say something that this young one can't - it would seem impudent from him, but since I am almost the oldest in the room I can say it." Then he said, "My friends, we are going to die

soon, and no one is talking to us about it. And as perhaps the closest one to it, I want to talk to you about it." And so with pathos and compassion this elderly man spoke, and the residents and the staff all listened as he told of how he had found a way to face death with hope - it was a moving experience. We do need to think about it. Death is not natural - just because it happens to all of

us doesn't make it so. It is an ugly intruder, hence why the poet said "Rage, rage against the dying of the light" - we know it is an interruption of the beauty and grandeur

If elected, I will request to relevant Government Ministers that this limited access on planning be removed from the Development Plan and that a common sense approach be adopted in keeping with the planning regulations that are in place for the rest of the County" he concluded.

This novel by Irish author Louise O Neill is set in an imaginary future society where girls have ceased being born and are manufactured purely for the pleasure of the hierarchy (men). The women, known as Eves, are schooled up until the age of seventeen. At this school they are cut off from the

outside world and spend their days learning how to be a physically perfect and dutiful wife. At the age of seventeen the Eves will be placed into three categories upon which their futures will be decided. At their 'Ceremony' they may be one of the lucky ten to be chosen as a companion (wife) by the hierarchy. On the other hand it may be decided that the Eve will leave the school to become a concubine living the rest of their lives sexually gratifying the hierarchy. The concubines will most likely live

together in a brothel of sorts. Strong Trade Sees Lamb Prices Up This Week

IFA Sheep chair Adrian Gallagher said lamb prices continue to rise as factories struggle to match supplies, with market demand lifting prices by a further 10c/kg this week. "Supplies of suitably finished lambs are extremely tight on the ground as weekly spring lamb throughput continues to fall. Total lamb throughput is currently back 9% to date in 2024," he said.

Sheep meat produced across the EU and UK is also down this year and factories must stand firm and maximise returns from the marketplace. Lambs are making from €7.60kg to €7.90kg in general, with up to €8.00/kg paid on weights to 23.5kg. Cull ewes are making from €3.80/kg to €4.20/kg in general. The mart trade has also strengthened for finished and store lambs, ensuring farmers are under no pressure to offload lambs that require further feeding. He said, "Lower volumes here, and reduced imports of lamb from outside the EU to our key export markets, will help underpin the trade for the remainder of the year. Its important factories continue this upward trajectory in prices to maintain confidence in the sector and ensure store lamb buyers remain active in marts.

How many clangers can we expect this time?

Remember the last General Election campaign? How could you have forgotten? Were we not living in fear of another uprising? In January 2020, Leo Varadkar was faced with a vote of no confidence in the Health Minister, Simon Harris. If your memory serves you right, you'll recall that Harris signed the contract for the National Children's Hospital.

Roll up... roll up for the last few sausages and a toasted burger. If there's a takeaway down the street or if the last pub in the village is still open, tell them Cousin Simon is offering the hospitality sector a 2% cut in Vat three days after the Finance Bill was guillotined in the Dail. In effect what Harris has done is to hammer those now paying VAT at 9%. Fine Gael's plan was immediately undercut with Jack Chambers stating it would increase energy prices. Micheál Martin said the rate of 11% would only drive up costs for householders through higher gas and electricity prices. Finance Minister Jack Chambers explained a VAT reduction to 11% had been considered during budget negotiations this year but it was found that rates on gas and electricity bills would increase to 11% as a result.

In fact, Harris is increasing the 9% VAT rate by 2% and he's offering credits to try and cover the costs.

Simon's not joking because this is FG policy.

We are already getting used to Simon Harris rushing around the aisles in the supermarkets with a fixed smile and half scared in case he's asked to justify the 10c a litre increase in milk.

But FF is not going to beit's only in the last couple ofoutdone because they've gotyears that we've had the money

such a promising record. Uncle Micheál wants to hand you a 30% cut in the price of a second hand house. But don't be tempted to go back to the Celtic Tiger and start building half an estate because there will be a property crash like no other.

Thank you Fianna Fail. Remember the last General Election campaign? How could you have forgotten? Were we not living in fear of another uprising? In January 2020, Leo Varadkar was facing a vote of confidence in the Health Minister, Simon Harris: remember he was the one that signed the contract for the National Children's Hospital...

In an RTE Radio interview on January 12th 2020, Varadkar acknowledged that there is a "deep crisis in our health service" and said that hearing of people who had bad experiences "pains me". Despite this, the Taoiseach said that progress has been made "that never really gets acknowledged" but that "it was never going to be a quick fix".

He stated: "We had 12,000 beds in our hospital system, in our back in 2005. A policy decision, an ideological decision was made by Fianna Fáil in government to take 2,000 beds out, to cut 2,000 beds, they did. Then there was a financial crisis, and it's only in the last couple of to reverse that policy and we have been reversing it." And when things could not get worse for FG, they suddenly did.

A few weeks before the general election, plans were announced to commemorate the RIC as part of the decade of centenaries. It was the most genuine clanger ever to hit Fine Gael and I suspect it damaged their profile. The proposal stirred up old grievances reaching back a century. The Fine Gael minister overseeing the plan, Charlie Flanagan, was cast as a Black and Tan sympathiser. Whatever happened to the **RIC commemoration?** Charlie is not running again but he is still in the news: saying "Fine Gael and Fianna Fáil must strive to rule together in a majority government. Last thing the country wants is another left-wing tail wagging two dogs." How many clangers can we expect this time? This is the shortest of cam-

paigns with the minimum three weeks to get it done and dusted. And as we are seeing already, campaigns do matter. After the local and EU elections in June, a survey by the **Electoral Commission found** that half of all voters made up their minds in the last week of the campaign... so listen up because the opinion polls will be crucial. And Donegal as a five-seater and a retiring FG deputy, there will be much attention from the pollsters. As yet it is too early to read the trends because there is a more independently minded voting mindset. The adversarial climate that drove the campaigns up 2011 is gone. Fianna Fail were well and truly hammered in the shadow of the property crash and a new era dawned and Fine Gael has been in office ever since. Good or Bad? You are the judge and by voting, you are part of the democratic process. Believe it or not, it is vital to cast your vote for many reasons. We won the right to have con-

trol of our own destiny and our freedom in very difficult times. We should cherish that through the legitimate systems that govern our electoral processes. We have that privilege at Local and EU Elections, in General Elections and in referendums. Many voters nowadays do not belong to any party. And while many will vote for one of the longstanding groups, their vote is not a given because a new generation of voters mark their ballot papers in what is really a civic manner. They tend to vote for whoever ticks most of their boxes.

Already the general election campaign has all the hallmarks of auction politics and we are reminded of 1977 when FF's promises removed domestic rates and car tax. This was the very first turbo charged election campaign and for decades after, the people were left with no arse in their trousers because there was no plan B. And now Simon Harris is Taoiseach, my goodness what a difference an election can make. Harris was the reason for the General Election in 2020 when the Taoiseach Leo Varadkar faced a vote of no confidence in the Minister for Health. Just now the postman has delivered another double payout and the Christmas rush there's another half a dozen to come before Santa comes flying down the chimney. As the campaign for the general election moves up the political agenda this week we already know that some records will be broken before the 34th Dail meets. Back in 2020 the health system was described as a 'basket case'. So was housing and both still fit that template of failure. In politics change happens at a snail's pace: but not when it comes to increasing the number of Deputies in the House. For a start there are 174 deputies and those numbers are set to increase at a rate of two new TD's with every passing year. By 2030 the number of



Dail Deputies will exceed two hundred. The fact is that general elections and the constituency numbers are dictated by the 1937 Constitution is patently ridiculous. To continue to have between 20,000 and 30,000 people per TD is an outdated regulation that has failed to move with the progress of the country's communications network is unbelievable.

In an era going back to that of the oil lamp and the bush telegraph to a modern society of communications - mobile phones, text messaging, social media and in an age of digital freedom our failure to change the electoral mandate as laid out in the Constitution is one of the biggest fault lines in politics.

Fear of change: fear of the unknown has led to a systemic failure to put the country on a realistic footing that reflects the changes and the local TD's office is twenty seconds away.

While I've not seen all the party policy statements, I'm not sure that any of them are making a call for a referendum to change the Constitution's position to make the kind of changes needed in line for a modern democracy and to reduce the number of TDs because we're now in the kind of territory that makes it impossible for the Electoral Commission to redraw county boundaries in a manner whereby each county boundary will have as little change as possible.

The electoral rules laid down in the Constitution are archaic and long past the time to reflect a society that is resident in the 21st. century.

Things would have been very different in 1937 but it seems almost unbelievable that De Valera tied down any changes to meet the progress of future generations by a referendum. It is equally unbelievable that we had so many new Dail eras: this is the 25th since 1938. Back then there were 34 constituencies and 138 seats. Can Simon Harris as a new Taoiseach use his much publicised energy, enthusiasm, pragmatism



and forward thinking to hold a referendum to make the changes necessary?

I doubt that he will!

Mention of Harris making headlines, he was the headlines when Leo Varadkar dissolved the Dail in 2020.

The Deputy behind the motion was Michael Collins. The Cork SW TD said: there is an unprecedented crisis in the health care system. He said that the number of people consistently on hospital trolleys, lengthy hospital waiting lists.

Michael Healy-Rae said the health service is "in a shambles" and Mr Harris should be ashamed of his tenure.

While a no-confidence motion in Minister Harris had been mooted since early December this new motion put Taoiseach Leo Varadkar into a tailspin.

The Taoiseach counted the numbers... obviously he counted them twice. The general election was not due to the middle of Summer. But with no choice, Varadkar, called a General Election for February 8th. Harris would not return to the Health portfolio.

For many years Fanad had tried to win the Buncrana Cup finally managing to do so in 1984 when the late James O'Doherty was the manager. The managers over the years have included Fr. Sweeney, James O'Doherty, Eamonn McConigley, Ollie Horgan, Michael Deeney and currently in charge is Arthur Lynch. Fanad Utd had planned to celebrate a football milestone in 2020. It was 50 years since the Club was formed and a function had been scheduled but with Covid that had to be shelved. It has taken a few years after the pandemic ended for things to return to normality. The function should be a great social occasion and chance for former teammates to meet up again to share memories of the rich sporting history of Fanad Utd.

She was joined at the event by her Irish team mates Ruby Knox, Tom Breen and Gearoid McDaid and ISA officials and mixed with members of the Irish Olympic team including the medal winners from the Paris Games.

Bea said the event was "surreal". She stated: "What a surreal experience to be surrounded by 100 years of Irish Olympians. Thank you to the Irish Surfing Association for this experience. And to Team Ireland Olympic, what a night to remember.

A real pinch me moment." In 1922, the Irish Olympic Council was established and recognised by the International Olympic Committee, with the first team competing at the Paris Olympic Games in 1924. In the one hundred years between Paris

1924 and Paris 2024, over one thousand athletes have competed for Ireland, and as a nation, we have won 45 medals.

The Paris 2024 Medallists won the PTSB Inspiring a Nation Award 2024 including Kellie Harrington (boxing gold), Rhys McClenaghan (gymnastics gold), Daniel Wiffen (swimming gold and bronze), Paul O'Donovan (rowing gold), Fintan McCarthy (rowing gold), Philip Doyle (rowing bronze), Mona McSharry (swim-ming bronze). Daire Lynch (rowing bronze) was also awarded, but unable to attend the evening.

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Two-time Olympic Champion and Olympic silver medallist, Paul O'Donovan was the winner of the Deloitte Lifetime Achievement Award being the only Irish athlete who has won a medal at three consecutive Olympic Games and has been unbeaten at the World Championships since 2016. Two-time Olympic Champion Kellie Harrington won the Flogas Community Ambassador Award

Olympic silver medallist, Sonia O'Sullivan was the winner of the Allianz Olympic Legacy Award.
