Creeslough Supermarket planning put 'on hold'

Plans to rebuild the Creeslough Supermarket have been put on hold following an issue being raised with the proposed development Transport Infrastructure Ireland.

A decision on the proposal was expected by Donegal County Council this week but the application lodged in April has now had its status changed to "On Hold" according to the council website.

The shop was destroyed in the tragic explosion on October 7th, 2022, where ten people lost their lives and several others were injured.

Vivo Shell Ltd applied on April 18th



last to the local authority to redevelop the site with a new building and forecourt layout.

They also stated: 'The proposal, if approved, would create an adverse impact on the national road and would, in the Authority's opinion, be at variance with the foregoing national policy in relation to control of frontage development on national roads."

The letter also detailed the revised layout submitted did not "appear to address the issues identified".

"Understaffing in the health service is severely impacting the ability of staff to provide safe care and it is putting both patients and staff at risk. Staff



Three buildings on Letterkenny's Main Street were demolished at the weekend due to concerns over public safety.

Donegal County Council had put notification stickers on the buildings located in the vicinity of the Market Square requesting the owners to contact them for engagement on addressing safety issues that had been raised by engineers.

The demolition works began at 5am on Sunday, until 7am on Monday. Since the barriers went up in June there has been a push on from Cllrs and the business community for the necessary steps to be taken to carry out permanent works

Orwell's '1984' scary insight into the present

Books from the past can give a scary insight into the present. That hit me when reading George Orwell's '1984'. When I read it first, the year 1984 was 13 or 14 years into the future. Now it is 40 years in the past. '1984' gives a description of a future England under dictatorship. In that imagined society, people are bombarded with propaganda. This is worryingly like the situation today. Russia invaded Ukraine. Thus there is a sporting boycott of Russia. There are all sorts of sanctions on Russia. Russian artists and sportspeople are banned for not condemning Putin. Doing so would, of course, put them in huge danger at home. In Orwell's imagined dictatorship, one of the main slogans was 'War is Peace'. That's the attitude of Western powers to the horrors of Gaza and Lebanon.

Israel attacked Gaza. Medical experts estimate up to 10% or the population has died because of the war. The entire population has been collectively punished for the actions of Hamas. We got plenty of atrocity stories after the attacks of October last year. Most have been disproved. We are also told there were 1,100 Israeli Jews killed. However, 373 were members of the armed forces. Approximately 100 of the other dead were either Israeli Arabs or immigrant workers. To be clear, Hamas is nasty and brutal. However, pointing out the Israeli armed forces are as nasty and brutal is dangerous. This month Israel has invaded Lebanon without declaring war. Israeli bombers are pounding the capital,

CCTV is scarily common. Many even have it outside their houses. If you are going into a shop you will probably be filmed. There is filming, too, on many streets in towns. That's not just paranoia. There have been too many cases of CCTV operators spying on people in private for their own pleasure.

Then there is the way so much information is now held electronically. Records of all sorts are held that way. For a time in the 1970's I was a civil service clerk. At the back of the office was a big room full of old files. The odd time one had to be found. Doing so could take much time. Sometimes a document couldn't be found because it had been filed in the wrong place. Now all such records are stored on a small hard drive. They can be searched quickly. Someone working remotely miles

away can do so.

Then there is spying on our communication. The post was always spied on. That though, was labour intensive. Doing it unseen was near impossible.

Now most of our communication is electronic. For example, in Britain, **Government Communications** Headquarters (GCHQ) is in Cheltenham. American whistleblower Edward Snowden disclosed this was collecting all telephone and online communications in the United Kingdom. Telecoms companies BT and Cable & Wireless were working with GCHQ.

The Guardian newspaper had to destroy hard drives with revelations from Snowden. Otherwise the paper would have been prosecuted under the Official Secrets Act.

More, most of us now have smartphones. These can be used to track

I do not hold to conspiracy theories as to why we should only pay by cash. Since the pandemic I nearly always pay by card. However, I know this means that where I am when I pay can be easily tracked.

For a long time, I resisted electronic banking. But just to maintain my account I had to give in. It is not just bank branches that have closed. Whole banks have closed. Electronic banking obviously makes tracking

you so much easier.

Then there is social media. There is a conspiracy theory of the left that Trump won the 2016 American election because he had Facebook analysed. Those who say that, forget candidate Ted Cruz had hired the same social media wizards to do the same. Only political nerds like myself have heard of him. That's because Cruz's campaign sank without trace.

The really worrying part is that millions of Facebook accounts were accessed and analysed. Personal privacy was invaded.

But back to Orwell himself. He died from TB six months after '1984' was published. He was very English. That was in both the positive and negative senses.

There was, though, an Irish connection. His first wife's father was Laurence O'Shaughnessy from Valentia Island. She died in 1945. She was very able and modest. She was willing to support Orwell from the background. She made him into a writer.

There is even a thin connection to

Donegal. Orwell wrote '1984' at the top of the island of Jura off Scotland. That was because he was afraid of nuclear war. Such fear was very reasonable in 1948-9. In 1945 the Americans had dropped two atomic bombs on Japan. Thus Orwell went to the most remote part of a remote island to write. His hope was that he and his son would be safe there. You can see the mountains of Jura from Malin Head.

That's only a very minor reason to read '1984'. If you read electronic books, you can now download it for free. And if you prefer the feel of paper, you can always borrow from the Library. You will understand some more of the world we live in. And you will worry.

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



Wildlife Rangers WRC case "not well founded"

A Workplace Relations Commission case brought by a former National Parks and Wildlife Service Conservation Ranger against his employer has been deemed "not well founded".

The case had been ongoing over a six year period due to postponements and ill health and centered around an alleged breach under the Terms of Employment (Information) Act 1994. Mark Byrne had been employed as a National Parks and Wildlife Service Conservation Ranger by the Dept of Culture Heritage Ğaeltacht/ National Parks and Wildlife Service.

The WRC judgment details that on the complainants return from a period of leave on Monday 3rd September 2018, the Complainant was telephoned by his manager, who advised him that from that day on, he would be required to work from home and he received an email confirming the same instruction.

He alleged that in terms of his complaint under the Terms of Employment (Information) Act 1994 that he got no prior notice of this change to his contract and claimed that changing from working outside to being confined to indoor office duties at home was a complete change to his contractual terms and that he should have been given prior notice before this change took effect.

Under cross examination he confirmed that the date upon which the change was communicated to him in writing (by email) was Monday 3rd September 2018, which was the date that the change to his contractual terms took effect.

Also, he did not deny that his original contract permitted his work location to change to other locations which included working in a home office.

He also accepted that for the last two years of when he worked from home, from 18th February 2020 until he tendered his resignation in March 2022, he was placed on paid administrative leave.

The WRC report adds after six years there were unsuccessful attempts to mediate the case and the final adjudication hearing took place on October 1st, 2024 by which time the Complainant had not worked for the Respondent for over two and a half years having tendered his resignation. Workplace Relations Commission Adjudication Officer, Emile Daly, stated in her conclusion that the 1994 Act protects employees from having verbal-only contracts and its purpose is to protect employees from a lack of clarity in the terms of their employment.

In his evidence the Complainant accepted that he was informed on the phone on September 1st, 2018 by his manager on the day he returned from leave that from then on, his work would be home/office based. He accepted that on the same day he also received an email from the Respondent confirming this.

She added: "The Complainant's evidence is that he received a notification (by way of email) in writing on the day that the change to his contract took place, namely 3rd September 2018. Arising from this evidence, I find that there is nothing to support the complaint that a breach under section 5 of the 1994 Act took

"As I have so found, it is unnecessary for me to go on to consider the Respondent's point of whether the decision to make his work office based was within his original contractual terms. Because even I accept that moving him to work from home was a

change to his contract, no breach would occur if the employee is notified in writing no later than the day that the change took place, which was exactly what the Complainant says happened to him. For the above reason I find this complaint to be not well founded."

Pringle calls for urgent reform at LUH

are expected to work under severe pressure constantly and it's not sustainable or acceptable.

"Something's got to give and unfortunately, it is the public who are left to suffer this government's inaction. I have been raising the fact that LUH needs urgent reform and far greater focus on recruitment for years now." he said, noting that last year saw over 4,000 hospital cancellations at LUH.

He added: "It is clear that understaffing is a significant issue in Letterkenny and the staffing levels across the public health service need to be addressed immediately. But, as I often say, recruitment is only part of the solution. We need to be focusing on retention as well. "I have seen so many young medical professionals from Donegal leave in search of a better life and a much better

health system to work in and that is to be expected given the immense stress and pressure they are forced to work under in the HSE. It is vitally important that we are doing everything we can to retain all health workers, including migrant doctors, nurses and consultants, who play a vital role in our hospitals. He said: "Severe staff deficits also exist in the National Ambulance Service, and this needs to be addressed urgently."

Cabrini was predeceased by her husband John in May 2021.







Do Everything Without Complaining

It's official: the countdown to Christmas is on. In the last fortnight I've seen a billboard announcing festive bargains, a baker taking Christmas cake orders, and more than one supermarket shelf devoted to all things tinselly.

For hapless husbands the festive season brings a degree of anxiety as we desperately scour our brains for suitable gifts for the women in our lives. Is it just me or does the head scratching seem to come around quicker every year?

This haplessness was immortalised in one of our country's great festive staples - the Father Ted Christmas special. During this iconic episode, Ted and Dougal present Mrs Doyle with a gift that, on the face of it, was tailor-made for the parochial house's beleaguered housekeep-

No doubt they were won over by the suave salesman's claim that the "TeaMaster really takes the misery out of making tea", but Mrs Doyle wasn't sold, bluntly commenting that actu-



ally, she liked the misery. Almost thirty Christmases have been and gone, yet Mrs Doyle's line

continues to act like a mirror on Irish society. We sure do like misery. How else can you explain the hundreds of thousands of listeners who tune into Liveline or the fact that Joe Duffy is RTE's highest paid radio star? Whether it's the weather, the traffic, or the weekly shop, complaining is part of the fabric of Irish life. That's why I found Philippians chapter 2 so interesting when we looked at it in church last week. In verse 12, God tells us to "work out our salvation" - to take what has been done for us by Jesus and knead it into the nooks and crannies of our lives. Fascinatingly, the very first aspect of the task he highlights is

in verse 14: "Do everything without complaining or arguing".

Christians are to be so transformed by the work of Christ within them that our changed lives should be readily apparent to others. In a world that sees "venting" as a cathartic thing, lives that are free from the blight of complaining should stick out. That is precisely the point God makes in verse 15 as he describes us "shining like stars in the universe". It's not that we're to walk around in a state of constant bliss, never being ruffled by problems or setbacks. Yet when we appreciate just how much Jesus Christ suffered for us and just how richly he

has blessed us we are able to dispense with the sort of grumbling that is habitual. This is something I have seen many times as a pastor. I have met many followers of Jesus who, quite frankly, have a great deal to complain about. Whether it is chronic illness, disability, unfair treatment, bereavement, or any number of other hardships, no-one would fault them for letting off some steam. And yet they don't because their whole outlook on suffering has been transformed by what Jesus Christ has done for them. And so, they shine like stars. And just like stars, their light is most vividly seen in the

Four new rainwater planters have been just recently been completed, funded by Local Authority Waters Programme (LAWPRO) and we're grateful to Paul Doherty and Seamus Gavigan for their invaluable assistance with this novel idea. The theory is that the diverted rainwater from the downpipes will filter through the soil to keep the plants healthy, while excess water is drained off and a reservoir is retained at the bottom for dry periods. The planters are currently installed at the St Vincent de Paul Centre, HSE Medical Centre, outside the former Post office, and RDRC and have been planted initially with seasonal plants, herbs and spring bulbs, with more additions as the seasons progress. At this time of year, after an entire season of growing vegetables or flowers, its time to give a little boost to the soil. Not only have the plants likely depleted it, but the overall texture and structure will have changed somewhat too, which results in dry crumbly soil, and may not support another growing season. The best way to fix this is to add nutrients, and spent coffee grounds are a great source of fertiliser. As well as recharging the soil, they'll help loosen up the structure, and help absorb moisture now over the winter months into spring. So bring a bucket or container with you when you next go for a walk on Rathmullan beach, and Jennifer or David at the Pier coffee wagons will be happy to supply you with some, free of charge.

If you notice any faulty street lighting in



A Rathmullan Woman in exile...

Trees turning russet and yellow - leaves drifting in the wind

I had to bring Himself up to the Bons Secours again last week. He gets his lungs hoovered out a couple of times a year ago to rid him of any lingering cigarette butts and bits of pipe tobacco from when he was a heavy smoker. He quit about twenty years ago, but those fellas always leave their track and he's paying dearly for it now, not to mention the money that went up in smoke when he was at it.

I had about four hours to kill while he was in the hospital and it was a beautiful day so I hopped over to Glasnevin cemetery and visited Mark's father and grandparents. It was a peaceful place for a walk and the residents were very quiet and didn't bother me. I hadn't been to the grave in years so it was nice to catch up with some people from my past.

I hadn't been in good form from the neck up for about a week, and the sleep is a bit messed up with the result that I found myself up at the cairns on Lough Crew for the sunrise earlier that morning. I was hoping that the rising sun would give me a bit of a lift and that I could leave a few of the horrors there in return as a gift to the gods. It was a kind of a day for the dead, but at least they don't cause you as much grief as the living. After I chatted to the ghosts and the myriad squirrels in Glasnevin I sailed on to Leopardstown where I had arranged to meet an old friend for a late lunch. When we lived near Clane in Co Kildare Aidan and his family were our neighbours. Shortly after we moved to Donegal his parents separated and the family moved to Dublin where we kept in touch for several years before drifting apart.

I hadn't met Aidan for about thirty years, although we've been talking on the phone every couple months for a couple of years. I enjoyed the drive across Dublin, apart from the blinding sunlight which under different circumstances would have been very welcome. The city looked well in its autumn glory and I really noticed the trees turning russet and yellow and the piles of leaves

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drifting in the wind.

It was lovely to meet Aidan again and we had a very nice lunch and chat before I crossed back over to Glasnevin to scrape Himself off the operating table. It was a pleasant drive back in the dusk, with one of the first of the beautiful sunsets that are a trademark of October and November.

I was in Rathmullan a fortnight ago to have a look at the work on the sewerage system and to meet with the fella from Cash & Carry Kitchens. I was very disappointed to hear that the ESB had been out that morning to make the connection, only to find that the duct wasn't vet in the trench for them. That has put everything back another two or three weeks which is annoying at this stage because so much work depends on the electricity from now on.

It's the only time on the build that any of the lads have let me down, so maybe I can't whinge too much... but I was pretty annoyed and disappointed. It kind of paled into insignificance the next day when I got the message at breakfast that my dear friend Jim's beloved wife had passed away a few hours earlier after a long battle with dementia. He cared for her with absolute love and compassion throughout her long illness; he did her proud to the end. May they both rest now and be in peace.

We had another herd test last week, having had a couple of reactors on the previous test. The vet who was doing the test must have powdered his brain or something that morning because he never stopped chatter-

ing and talking gobbledygook. I couldn't make head or tail out of his blathering and I certainly wasn't in any form for listening to him, but fair play to him he got on with the job reasonably efficiently. Himself lost the plot in the end and simply walked away in

I had left his dinner in the oven that morning to slow cook so he was at the trough when I got in, with just enough time to have a rapid wash, change and out the door to go to my counsellor. Lucy listens to me and helps me to keep some little glimmer of hope alive when the bad times come round; I don't know where I'd be, or if I'd be, without her.

Three days later, when the TB test was read there were nine reactors in the herd. Hopefully when they're culled the next test will be clear. He can't buy in cattle while the herd is restricted so he'll miss out on a bit of value when fellas are reducing numbers before the winter. The joys of farming!

Last weekend was my busy one, when I had three extra shifts in work both days. I didn't mind it this time because it occupies the mind and there was nothing else I had any interest in doing anyway.

The Crosserlough GAA club, which both my clients are members of had qualified for the county final a fortnight earlier and the excitement was up to ninety in both households. I was booked to do a full afternoon's care with one of them on Sunday while his wife went to the final in Breffni Park. We had a grand time of it, the two of us, dozing

on the sofa like two bookends. It was peaceful and warm looking out as storm Ashley swept through the country. Crosserlough duly won in fine style and I'm sure the celebrations will be legendary for days. When the next carer came to relieve me I headed for Cavan to go to the Daniel O'Donnell concert in the cathedral. It was being run in aid of the cathedral maintenance fund and the local Vincent de Paul. It was lovely to see Jacinta again and have a good natter while we waited for the great man himself to appear.

The drawback of the cathedral (apart from the bum numbing hard pews) is that unless you're in the centre aisle there's bound to be a pillar in your sightline. We found ourselves watching almost all the proceedings on the screens in the side aisle... in black and white. Daniel only sang hymns and churchy songs, in line with his rather staunch catholic beliefs and the whole thing was just a bit boring. He did sing some of the great old hymns like How Great Thou Art, but they were terribly slow and drawn out. We would both have been happy to leave at the interval but we were in company so that wasn't a runner.

I was tired and not in good form and was glad when it ended at 9.30 and I could escape. I'm glad to have had a "Daniel" experience, but one was half a one too many. Each to their own. I have work in the morning and another session with Lucy tomorrow afternoon to try and find some hope in my currently fucked up head, so I'm going to bed and hopefully to sleep. Maybe the sun will rise on a brighter day tomorrow.

This current situation is utter madness because it is not affordable and we are facing a collapse in the market. And that has to happen because the Government's housing strategy is flawed and they've presided over the debacle that is the construction of housing.

The latest CSO stats are saying that the prices in August were running 10.4% up on last year, with a broadly consistent picture across urban and rural Ireland. Having weathered the sharp increase in interest rates from summer 2022 to the

middle of last year with a mere slowdown, prices are now rising rapidly again. Remarkably, the latest pickup in price growth started around the turn of the year, months before the first European Central Bank interest rate cut and has gathered pace ever since

There is a seriously flawed set of policies in Government, be it in housing, health, infrastructure, water services and health and the lack of real progress stands out as the government's legacy... FG has been in power for close to fourteen years and the country has most of the same old scars and deficits.

The country is up to its elbows in issues, problems, waiting to see a consultant... a hospital bed or even a house. The scourge of substance abuse, binges of drink and a huge lack of respect for fellow beings is quite shocking. Society has regressed: look no further than any waiting room in the country where so many are glued to their phones and are forever surfing the same half dozen useless porn sites and texting their friends in what is a pure zombie-like fashion.

What are the government's plans in dealing with this regression because this has all the hallmarks of a serious mental health crisis?

Budget 2025 was as equally flawed as the previous ones.

Too much money to throw around but in a totally reckless manner. It is long past the point where the absurdity of firing energy credits at everyone and anyone with a postal address has outlived its purpose.

This budget has flatlined because the Finance Minister, Jack Chambers was the same old, same old dose as his predecessors with the typical strategy of handing money to rich and poor alike in the most shameful manner.
But it could and should have

been different. The country is flooded with the largesse of corporation taxes and that should have been the key for Jack Chambers to make a really big statement on Budget Day that might go a long way to eliminate poverty. It is well past the time for clear ideas to reduce poverty. A targetted response should have been given to the lowest cohort on social welfare and pensioners with a €25 a week increase to lift them out of a meagre way of life. And in future years, those low incomes could so easily have been indexed linked to ensure the recipients would escape the poverty trap that is all too prevalent in the country.

That was a huge failure and a negative deficit of thinking by the Finance Minister... but he lacked the social conscience to take that tentative step that might have made the record surplus of Budget 2025 an occasion to remember... But why should Jack Chambers be different to his predecessors? Because he's young, new and allegedly has a conscience of social inclusion. But where was that on October 1st?

In reality a general election is badly needed. The main indicators are suggesting no real change in the make-up of the next Dail. However, that will happen whenever the electorate has voted. It is their decision and if they are happy with the current lacklustre achievements of the Irish parliament, then so be it. Simon Harris is new to the job: yet his delivery on improvements is weak apart from promise heaped on promise. Micheál Martin is tagging along and apart from a preference to have the general election before the middle of February when the mandate is officially over. November 29th is the preferred date of the Green Party leader, Roderic O'Gorman but

Late Toy Show... oops? That is definitely out unless the election is on the following day. After all, the Government has a very definite eye on the Toy Show because it is the biggest cash cow of the entire year. And the show is going to be milked dry this year because in their wisdom RTE has decided to have 32 children from each county in Ireland to participate in the first Late Late Toy Show County Parade. At least it's not about being the best singer or the best dancer - it's about having county pride in buckets. Thankfully, RTE has made no mention of another pantomime. And into the bargain all the party buffs have stolen the best lines... but its simply going to the same reheated scripts dressed up in more promises for Christmas. And before the election could be called there was one hell of a shock at the weekend when FG's deputy leader, Heather Humphreys called time on her political career. She will be missed, not only for her honest approach but in her huge interest in rural Ireland where she's delivered in spade fulls. She has made the shock decision not to run in the upcoming general election despite having contested the leadership six months

In a statement Ms Humphreys said that after 21 years as a public representative she has decided not to seek re-election.

"Politicians are human too; we give all we can for as long as we can but time catches up on us all. As I get older, my health and energy levels are not what they were and I know going forward that I would not be able to give the job the time and commitment it deserves," the Social Protection Minister said.

Ms Humphreys has served in various cabinet positions since 2014, including as Minister for Business, Enterprise, and Innovation, as Minister for Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, and Minister for Arts, Heritage, Regional, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs.

Her decision to stand down means 18 of the 35 Fine Gael TDs elected in 2020 will not be contesting the election.

This poses a big headache for Simon Harris because the majority of his deputies have no national political experience.

And there are some weeks to go before the close of nominations and who knows what other shocks are in store.

The fact that a leading party has more than half of its deputies not seeking to contest their seats may have unintended consequences for FG because they are unlikely to be able to hold all the vacancies.

It is really asking questions about the life of a TD but for some inexplicable reason the rush out the door seems oddly at variance with the vantage point in the opinion polls. Heather Humphreys was actively seeking to lead the party only six months ago so why the sudden decision to pack it in now?

Meeting told: Il screw Bertie

As the fallout from the sacking of Dr. James McDaid in the Cabinet reshuffle continues to reverberate around the north west a strongly worded letter of protest has been rattled off to Bertie Ahern from close friends in the constituency. In a hastily arranged and highly secretive meeting on last Thursday night a select group of McDaid supporters met in Letterkenny to consider what action, if any was available to them and indeed to contemplate what the future held in store for the party following his sacking.

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One irate member of the organisation who seemed somewhat carried away with the shock of the sacking summed up the mood of the evening. Her plaintiff call ran parallel to current political thinking in Donegal NE: 'When I lay my hands on Bertie - I'll screw him.'

It was the sort of pro-active sentiment not usually associated in the confines of normal party room politics.

Startled supporters said the irony of these remarks was not lost since all of those present had held Ahern close to their chests since he became the FF leader ten years ago.

No comment has been forthcoming as to whether the Taoiseach is looking at this remark as a threat or a promise and it's not clear if this is the official party line in the constituency at the moment. A number of options were up for debate but a suggestion that a protest picket be placed at the Mount Errigal Hotel on Friday afternoon for the visit of the Taoiseach was rejected after some brief discussion.

'We would be shamed, what with that Westlife crowd there as well, muttered one lonesome

When things finally settled down to a more rational level of debate it was agreed to write a letter of protest to Ahern expressing disgust and consternation at the turning tide of events. The

mood of the evening was described as one of emotion mixed with anger; however a number of important contributions were made about the positive impact and the amount of funding that McDaid had delivered across the county.

Sources close enough (allegedly) to FF told the Tribune the FF leader came in for the kind of criticism not heard at a party gathering in Donegal since the sacking of Neil Blaney in the Arms Crisis of May 1970.


We understand the language was both rich and colourful. However it was not all one-way traffic. Bertie, the missus and daughter were in Donegal for a wedding on Friday and he seemed completely non-plussed at the row going on behind the scenes. He trotted out the usual garbage about the difficulty of leaving McDaid out of the equation: the great and loyal party man he is: but he gave no indication whatever as to why this constituency was shafted in such a rotten fashion.

The under current of anger over the dismissal of Jim McDaid has not yet settled down and it is expected the constituency Dail Ceanntair will meet shortly to consider the position. However on the surface it would seem there are very few options left to debate at this stage.

One prominent figure in the party said that it was now too late to discuss the situation since the decision was made and would not be changed.

Getting a teaching start was not all that difficult in the late 1960s and it was his friend and fellow UCG graduate Michael Cannon from Ballymichael in Fanad who told him that Donegal VEC had advertised posts. And so it was off to the VEC offices in Letterkenny to fill in a couple of application forms on the window ledge. His first teaching job in 1967 was in Ballyshannon VS for 12 years. It was during his 12 year stint in Ballyshannon that Cathal says his teaching life took a major leap forward. He succeeded Annie O'Friel as Vice-Principal in Milford and was elevated to the top job in in 1987. It was a job that he really wanted but there were really challenging time ahead as the five classroom school built in 1957 needed a major upgrade with 300 pupils attending the facility on the Kerrykeel Road. Initially there was talk of an amalgamation with the Loreto Convent School which fell through and all the while the student numbers were rising with 482 enrolled for the 1994 academic year. By now the sights were firmly set on a brand new vocational school after the Minister for Education, Niamh

Breathnach had dispatched Pat Keating a senior official from her Department to identify the educational needs and preferences of the Milford catchment area. The outcome of the deliberations was two new schools.

The new £3.5 million school building took two years to complete and it opened its doors for the first time in October 1999 with the official ceremony being performed in June of the following year.

It was a great day for everybody concerned. The changeover was a huge process with the movement of equipment and files along with getting all the new systems up and running." And one didn't have to go far for a name for the new educational establishment with Mulroy College being the popular choice. At present the school has an enrollment of 450 pupils and 33 teachers: double the number that were employed in 1979 when Cathal Greene first came to Milford.

With 37 years completed in the profession Cathal feels it is time to call it a day and let someone new in with fresh ideas and a drive to bring the school forward. "I have enjoyed working with people and have made a lot of friends down the years. I like to see people doing well and coming back to tell us that the school had helped them achieve some of their goals in life. There are plenty of parents who were pupils when I started here who are now sending their own kids to Mulroy. And there are a sprinkling of former students who have gone on to get teaching posts at the school including Liam McDevitt, Declan Doherty and Andrew McFadden. For Cathal the hardest times were the tragedies which occurred involving pupils from the college. "We had more than our fair share of tragedies involving students that affected the whole community.

on sanctions under threat

The new EU measures put in place to protect Ireland's salmon farming industry are under threat with processors in Finland forcing their government to lobby the Council of Ministers to have the anti-dumping measures removed.

The Council of Ministers will meet in the next month to debate the complaints and if Finland is successful in overturning the anti-dumping measures it could have disastrous consequences for the entire industry. It would pave the way for Norway to flood the European market with below cost salmon.

Finland does not produce any fish itself and buys the bulk of its salmon from Norway. They have been heavily dependent on cheap salmon and they've accused the EU of undermining their industry with these new anti-dumping measures.

After processing the product is then sold into EU markets in France and Germany. The new EU measures have hit this element of the industry heavily and Norway itself has refused to accept the new regime where salmon imports from non EU countries were curtailed. The new regulations imposed a surcharge of 18% on production over-quota.

As Ireland and Scotland await the deliberations within the Council of Ministers fears are now being openly expressed that they face an uphill battle to retain the protective status that prevents their fish prices being undermined by Norway and Chile.

The EU Commission agreed to put in place sanctions on surplus fish to allow price stabilisation both here and in Scotland where Norwegian produced salmon were being dumped at below cost. For many years Norway has been accused of supporting their fish farms with 'hidden State subsidies'.

Then in the summer of 2001 Norway reneged on an agreement with the EU and began dumping salmon into the market. In those three years the Norwegian industry lost millions of pounds but they continued to develop and expand. There have been angry claims they were being strongly subsidised by their government.

Town Council in loop over traffic system

Letterkenny Town Council has voted to scrap part of the one-way system on the Loop Road despite receiving a report recommending its retention. The review of the operation of the system was debated on Monday where seven councillors voted for the introduction of a two way system on the Pearse Road from JJ Reid's back to Larkin's Lane. Concerns were raised about safety for pedestrians and claims by traders that their revenue that dropped significantly since the introduction of the systems two years ago.

During the meeting Ciaran Brogan alleged that there was a fabricated letter in the file supporting the retention of the one-way-system. Pat Gillespie the Roads Manager refuted Brogan's claim.

Mayor Dessie Larkin was the only dissenting voice who had asked for time to allow the Council's engineering section to introduce measures to address the problems that had been highlighted. Members were told that funding was in place to put in pedestrian crossings, put down footpaths and relocate an entry to a shopping area.

The free flow one-way traffic system was implemented on a trial basis with temporary kerbing and cones at junctions in December, 2002. Pat Gillespie said it had an instantaneous effect on the local Pearse Road network with traffic congestion eradicated instantly. In their review the Council's road design section carried out a traffic analysis using the Saturn computer program. It produces numeric and graphical data but does not produce computer-simulated outputs such as showing graphics to simulate vehicles moving around the network. According to the report the results reaffirmed the efficiency and effectiveness of the free flow junction, one-way system. Analysis of all the alternative scenarios tested highlighted increased congestion and delays to traffic flow in all cases. The report's main recommendation states that the: "The investigations that has already been carried out conclude that any proposal to change the existing one-way scheme to two-way would result in a considerable increase in delay to traffic and could discourage vehicles from using this part of the town. Therefore, it is recommended that the current one way system be retained at this time.

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Cllr. Damien Blake said he was disappointed with the report because there was no reference to safety. He expressed concern for pedestrians trying to cross at the cinema and at Larkin's Lane. Ciaran Brogan pointed out that a decision was taken at the July meeting to revisit the two way system because of the problems that had been experienced by traders and the number of accidents that had occurred.


Brogan also criticised the general lack of pedestrian crossings adding that it was hard to avoid an accident on the Loop Road. Cllr. Brogan asked that the Council's Road Design team come up with a plan to introduce a two-way-system. Cllr. Jimmy Harte said business people on the route had to be listened while Cllr. Neil Clarke said there was problems with traffic control in the entire town. Cllr Jean Crossan said she wouldn't like to be crossing the Loop Road at any time adding that business had been hit by the current system and she called for the introduction of the two-waysystem for a trial period. Agreeing with Cllr. Crossan's point about trade Cllr. Gerry McMonagle said that those concerns had to be taken on board since much of the Council's revenue comes from this source while Cllr. Jim Lynch pointed to evidence of accidents on the Loop Road and suggested that improved signs might be simple solution to the problems.

"How are things going?"

"What?" Al said. Tom grimaced. 'Al doesn't hear too well," he said. "That's why I'm here to help him out."

Judging by the absence of customers, things weren't going too well. After about ten minutes a silver-haired woman came in looking for a yard sign supporting a local proposition. "What?" Al said.

Tom got out of his seat to take care of business. "Sorry about Al," he said. "He doesn't hear too well." He found her the yard sign she was looking for and resumed a conversation with me. I asked him about the crazy things


Trump had been saying out on the campaign trail.

THE SAME thought occurred to me when I rocked up to Allen County HQ in Fort Wayne, Indiana, a couple of hours north. Typically, it was closed when I got there, though a pleasant young guy was waiting outside. Caleb Wakeman had just landed a job with the GOP in the next-door county. He was delivering a box of leaflets. We got chatting for a while - turned out he wasn't much of a fan of Trump either - until a woman called Sue Richards appeared at the door and welcomed us in. She had been inside all along but had forgotten to open up at the designated time. This didn't matter. There are bible shops in Gomorrah with more foot traffic than the Allen County Republican Party office

The three of us talked about the election. I asked how the local "Get out the vote" operation was going. Sue shrugged and got all nostalgic. "Things are different these days. It's not like it was back in 2012 and 2016, before the pandemic. We don't really go out and knock on doors anymore. We don't have enough people around." I could bore you for hours with

stories like this. In Livonia, Michigan, I tracked down the local GOP headquarters from the phone book but when I got there the doors were padlocked. "They closed down about nine called Keisha who worked in the dentist's office next door. In Omaha, Nebraska, where the vital 2nd **Congressional District** Electoral College vote could decide the election, the local GOP office was closed. "The people in the party now are mostly MAGA. They hate their local congressman Don Bacon because he said something mean about Trump. They want him to lose so they're not doing any campaigning." Meanwhile, it was standing room only at the local Democratic party office. The difference was even more striking in Grand Rapids, Michigan. I visited both parties' offices in the space of an hour. The GOP

was closed for the day. The

only evidence of activity I could see through the glass doors was a clipboard lying on a table. Across town, the Democrats' office was buzzing with volunteers coming and going. Eight - eight! - full-time staffers were working on whatever these kinds of people do.

I dug around on Google on this subject just in case my eyes have been deceiving me but apparently they're not. 'Republicans are starting to raise alarms about Trump's ground game', ran the headline on this piece in Politico this week. Honestly, these people don't know the half of it. If Lara Trump, the co-chair of the

Republican National Committee, was reading this (as I'm sure she is) she would say I'm whistling to keep my spirits up, that the GOP has "farmed out" its ground game operation in places like Arizona to conservative groups like Turning Point Action, a student-orientated outfit which as far as I can tell functions better as a dating forum than an election machine. In Pheonix, I watched a couple of 22-yearold guys - Area Captains, to give them their official designation - try to corral a roomful of elderly cranks who had only shown up for the free pizza into something called Trump Force 47. I honestly felt sorry for those two kids and, believe me, it takes a lot of effort to feel sorry for a young Nazi. So, sorry Lara, I'm not buying it. To misquote my dear departed months ago," said a woman mother, I wouldn't send Turning Point Action to the shops for a loaf of bread, never mind ask them to win me a swing state in a Presidential election.

It could be that none of the above matters, that the enthusiasm for Trump has been under-estimated as it was in 2016 and that his supporters will come out in such numbers that organsiation - or lack thereof - will have counted for nothing. More staggeringly, my lying eyes will have failed me again. I note today that the Harris campaign passed the \$1 billion in campaign contributions raised. If she loses and you were one of the people who chipped in a few bucks her help out be sure to ask for your money back. You can use it to buy a one-way ticket to Canada, anywhere to escape the reach of Turning Point Action, or as it will be known once Lara starts farming out the functions of government under the new regime - the FBI.





London Senior Football Championship Final

North London Shamrocks make history

A North London Shamrocks side backboned by Donegal players made their own little piece of UK GAA history on Sunday by winning the London Senior Football Championship for the first time after overcoming St Kiernans 1-11 to 1-8.

Former St. Michael's and Donegal player Peter Witherow was the manager while ex-St. Eunan's man Ciaran Greene was on the backroom team along with Michael Boyle who kept goals for Termon and Donegal senior sides for a number of

Ten Donegal men started in Ruislip for the Shamrocks including Conor McGonigle (Fanad Gaels), Nathan McElwaine (Termon), captain Michael Miller (St. Eunan's) and Liam Kelly (St. Michael's). The other six were Sean McMonagle (St. Nauls), Michael Carroll (Gweedore), Ultan Boyle; Daniel Clarke (Naomh Colmcille), Joe McGill (Convoy) and Ciaran Diver (Moville). Among the used subs were Johnny Sweeney (Ardara), Paddy Dolan (Convoy) and Oran Hilley (Naomh Colmcille).

The Donegal contingent also contributed 0-8 of the 1-11. Carroll, McGill and Diver registered two points each. McMonagle and Clarke were the other Donegal score contributors. In adverse weather conditions St Kiernans the three-time London

champions got the first two scores of the final at Ruislip. The north London side opened their account in the eighth minute courtesy of St. Nauls man Sean McMonagle.

It was 0-3 each after 15 minutes with Michael Carroll and Joe McGill on target for Shamrocks before Ruairi Rafferty got a goal to put Witheow's side in front for the first time in the decider. Carroll, Rafferty and Ciaran Diver had their team comfortably in front at a stage but then they conceded a soft goal. Still, the North London Shamrocks led 1-6 to 1-4 at the break.
